

LITTLE TIME LEFT FOR WAR ON PESTS

District Horticultural Inspector Advises Immediate Protective Measures

Very little time remains for fruit growers in the Twin Falls district to gain control of orchard pests. E. V. Clifton, district horticultural inspector, announced last evening.

Dormant and delayed dormant sprays, the inspector declared, must be applied immediately if they are to be effective. A partial survey of the Twin Falls district, according to the inspector, shows that little spraying has been done this season for control of leaf roller, scale, blister mite, peach twig borer or black cherry aphid on fruit trees, or elm and maple scale on shade trees.

Unfavorable weather conditions have made difficult the application of spray prior to last week, but with weather showing signs of settling, growers are urged to get into action immediately, because, according to the inspector, a week or ten days is about all the time left, and that period may be shortened if warm weather sets in.

Only materials and spray formulae recommended by Claude Wakefield and C. W. Hunsicker, heads of the departments of entomology and plant pathology of the state university experiment stations, are reliable for Idaho conditions, the inspector stated. He sounded a warning against use of secret formulae and sprays which have not yet had a thorough trial under all conditions in Idaho. Growers were advised to use such formulae and sprays in only a limited way, if at all.

Following are the sprays and combination sprays recommended for pest control in the Twin Falls district:

For leaf roller, bad infestations, a 7 per cent actual oil spray using either the standard prepared spray oils of which there are several on the market or they may be prepared at home, using red engine oil, calcium caseinate, and water.

Directions for preparing the same successfully may be had from the inspector. Where a bad infestation of blister mite and leaf-roller occurs a 4 or 5 per cent actual oil content spray added to lime sulphur solution 1 to 6 or its equivalent in dry lime sulphur, put on while the trees are dormant will give results of 100 per cent if trees are thoroughly drenched from top to bottom.

For scale alone either a 4 per cent actual oil or lime-sulphur, 1 gallon to 6 gallons of water or its equivalent in dry lime sulphur is recommended. The same spray is recommended for blister-mite alone and lime-sulphur is recommended exclusively for the control of peach-twig borer, the pest that gives us wormy peaches. Black cherry aphid, which gives many cherry growers trouble can be controlled by using 40 per cent nicotine-sulphate at the rate of three-fourths of a pint and 5 pints of copper-

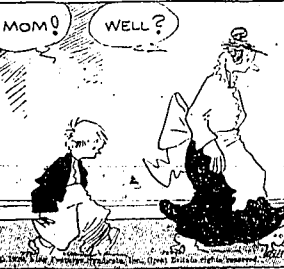

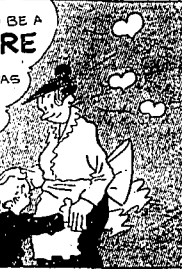

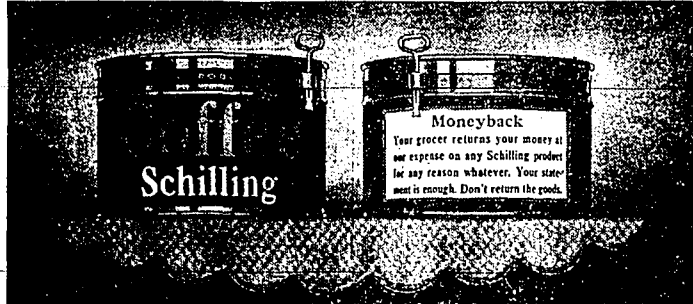

There was none of the fanfare that usually greets the public appearance of the home run king, no cheering crowds, only a handful of newspapermen and a dozen spruced-up kids. The three were worshipping, snatching a moment of prayer before bustling off to work, seemed not to recognize the bronzed giant kneeling within the small, attractive woman at the altar rail of the modest neighborhood parish.

Ruth and his bride and friends shortly before 6 A. M. and without ostentation hurried through the few scores of curious onlookers in the rain on the sidewalk. They went immediately to the altar rail where Father William H. Hughes awaited them in his vestments to perform the ceremony. The couple was attended by Mr. and Mrs. George H. Lovell, Secordaire.

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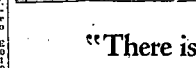

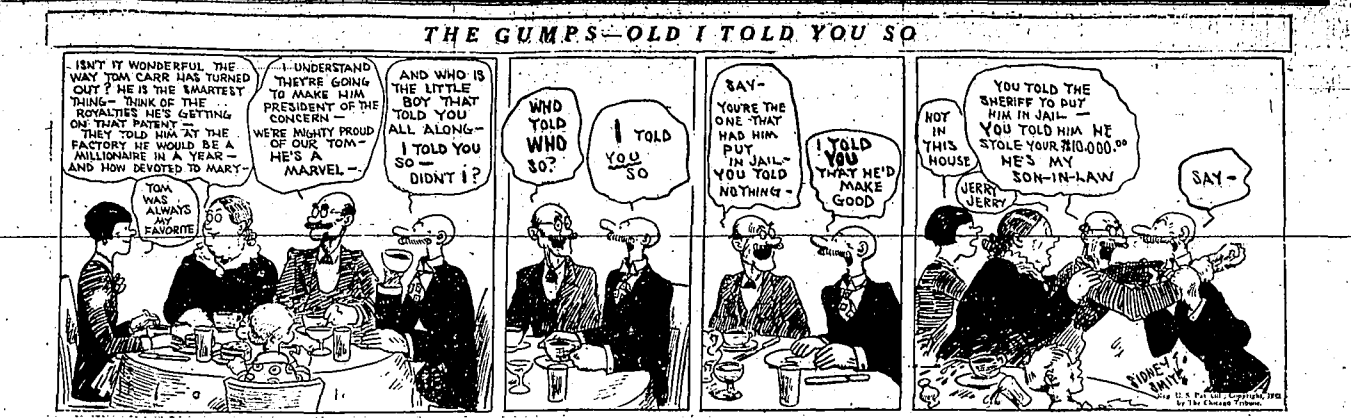
