Young Professional Advances to Front In Qualifying Round

George Von Elm and Bobby Cruickshank Follow In Second Place With 73; Others Make Poor Scores

By FRANK H. KING (Associated Press Staff Writer) LONDON, May 6.—Fred Young, pro, this morning walked with different feet in the company of his elders as he went out with the world's greatest golfers for the first qualifying round of the British open. Tonight he had a perfect right to approach these great men who had won 75 medals for his 72 was good enough to lead the field for the first day.

There may be trouble in store for the younger generation who barely missed selection for the British Ryder cup team but, for today at least there is no name above his.

Young, 25, scored 55 with scores of 72 was scratched an American amateur and Scottish-American pro. George Von Elm was the best, scoring 69. Bobby Cruickshank's 73 was the best contribution of the "professional" contingent from the United States.

The first round was played in the wildest weather experienced in a British open championship in half a century. The rain was so heavy that the players found it a trying experience. On the whole, however, they played well, some that the sturdy British natives, who only Ed Dudley of the American Ryder cup team, who took 85 strokes today, was regarded as in danger of going out to qualify. Jimmy Farrell, open champion of the United States, with a nine at the seventeenth hole, turned in a card of 62, but Farrell friends expected him to clip many strokes from that figure in the second qualifying round tomorrow.

Gene Sarason, who floundered around in 81, and Al Espinosa with 80, shared Farrell's moments of disquiet, but they were expected to do better. Tommy Stainforth, Walter Hagen, the visiting team captain who knows his British golf course, scored 75.

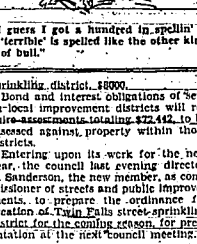
Mayor and Commissioners Apportion Duties to Department Heads, Re-Elect Aides and Act on Budget

The chief commissioner of accounts and finances and vice president of the council, is to have charge of records and accounts of the city and all other matters requiring collection and payment of money; bonds of city officers; security for city funds; preparation for mechanical obligations of the city and of districts formed by or within the city, and of taxes and assessments of the city.

Extra Sleep Hours Aid to Greater Accuracy, Laboratory Expert Says

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE, Associated Press Science Editor. It is not only the amount of sleep, but the quality of sleep, that is needed for accuracy in brain work.

These findings are from sleep tests now going on in the Columbia psychology laboratory, under direction of Dr. Donald A. Laird, director.

Purely physical functions require no sleep. Mental functions, however, require sleep. Some of them appear completely recovered within one hour of sleep. Mental accuracy, however, requires four hours of sleep. Each hour of sleep disclosed added improvement in the quality of accuracy.

"What do we want from sleep?" Dr. Laird asks. "If merely reaction time or coordination of learning speed, possibly four hours would be adequate. But if we want greater learning accuracy or more improvement in the taking mental function, more than a dot counting context, then the indications are that three hours is none too many."

Healthy, active college men were experimented upon, he says, "so our conclusions can be applied with scientific precaution only to young men just entering manhood. It is possible that old people and the opposite sex might yield different results, although there are no specially serious reasons for assuming definitely that they would."

Federal Funds Aid in Development of Deposits of Potash

INVESTIGATOR LOOKS TO WYOMING BUTTES FOR NATION'S NEEDS

Congressmen Make Available \$50,000 For Commercial Exploitation of Underdeveloped Raw Materials

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Congress hopes this autumn will see the door wide open to the commercial exploitation of undeveloped potash raw materials known to exist liberally in the United States. It has made available \$50,000 a year for the next four years to develop deposits jointly by the departments of agriculture and commerce.

Accordingly, the bureau of agriculture and soils of the department of agriculture has additional funds in the amount of \$25,000 a year for investigations it started in 1911 in connection with the United States geological survey.

At that time America was dependent entirely on the German monopoly for all the potash used in agriculture in this country. The total value of \$18,000,000 a year. During the war, when this country was cut off from potash supplies, the survey started in 1911 revealed resources that private industry took over and developed to the point of producing an amount that met 40 per cent of the American requirements.

Of the wartime projects, Senie's lake in California is the most important source of commercial American potash. Foreign competition has so lowered the price of potash that the domestic output has dropped to about 15,000 tons a year, or from 20 to 25 per cent of domestic needs.

It is estimated that the lake could produce all the potash required if the process were cheap enough to meet foreign competition. Resulting agricultural potash must be cheap, congress has appropriated funds for fundamental chemical research in the hope that it will find byproducts that can be produced commercially to share, if not to bear entirely, the cost of extracting the potash.

AUCKLAND, May 6 (AP)—New Zealand is making a bold bid for the apple markets of Europe and South America. Forty thousand cases are being shipped to Hamburg, the sale having been negotiated at a price of 14 shillings (about \$7.20) a case. Hamburg. Other shipments are going to Rotterdam for distribution to the Scandinavian countries.

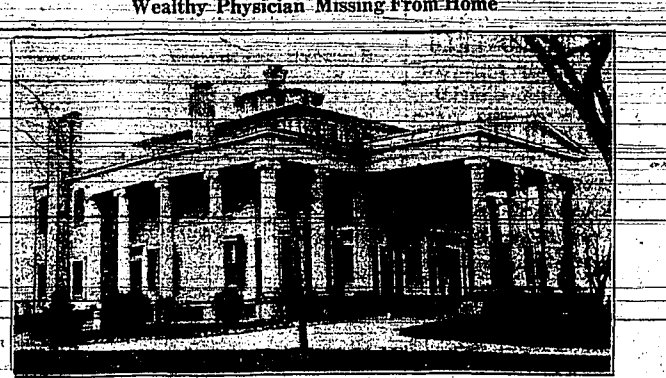
New Zealand apples already are competing with the American product on the British market, which naturally favors the empire-grown fruit. Auckland apple-growers have had a particularly good season, and the exportable balance is expected to be fully 50 per cent above last season's figure, which 65,000 cases were exported, principally to Great Britain and South America.

On this occasion there is every indication that Auckland will export 100,000 cases, and the dominion total certainly will pass the 1,000,000 mark reached for the first time last season. New Zealand's prospects have been improved by the fact that the Australian crop largely failed.

A considerable quantity of apples also is destined on consignment to South America. "If we get last year's price on the South American market, say 17 to 20 shillings, we will be satisfied," said a well known exporter.

Offers A New Spray Program That Removes Spray Residue



By J. F. Littooy A spray program that will aid towards easy removal of the residue on spray residue, as also to give better control of the codling moth and result in higher grade fruit, will be welcome information to the apple industry.

During the past two years, because of the residue left, many growers lessened the required applications of spray and suffered heavy losses due to worm damaged fruit.

Others suffered losses because of excess residue. This condition caused strife bordering on feudalism against the well-meaning law-enforcement officials.

There has never been a time in the history of the codling moth control when there is so much confusion as prevails today to decide what kind of spray to use, how much, when, and then finally, how to remove the spray residue to give the fruit a clean, marketable appearance.

FRUITGROWERS ARE TRAPPED BETWEEN LAWS

Confusion Between Laws

The confusion that confronts the apple grower today is brought about by the mandates of law. The State and economic laws compel the apple grower to spray the residue on his apples, and the recent Federal mandate compels him to take it off so as to supply the consumer clean fruit. Federal, State and other entomologists experts all agree that, under certain conditions, it is necessary to have an excess of residue on the fruit to afford ample protection. Even double the standard amount of residue is recommended by them to be applied two days before the double standard of 4 lbs. of lead to the acre (the control is difficult), in order to subdue the first brood of the codling moth in getting along the apple sections most of the growers use the double standard of 4 lbs. of lead to the acre. Experts who are in agreement with the standard amount, but few of the growers are experts. Often the weather interferes with spraying to prevent the residue from being applied. If the weather is bad, the infestation is bad, timeliness of application is very important, and as the weather often interferes (cannot be forecasted), the only way to be certain to such an extent as to prevent injury to the fruit is to use an excess of the very first activities of the codling moth, and keep it there at all times during the first brood period, ending approximately by July 15.

The control factor comes first and residue removal next. Removal of residue is of minor importance today, due to the fact that the Federal and State officials have cooperated with the growers in this matter. The Federal and State officials have introduced the use of the very first activities of the codling moth, and keep it there at all times during the first brood period, ending approximately by July 15.

Use Oil to Remove Residue

However residue it may seem, the FLUXIT research department positively recommends the use of FLUXIT to aid materially in residue removal. This research was begun three years ago, and for three years it has never failed in one of the largest orchards in Southern Idaho. It is not the oil that contributes to difficult residue removal, but the manner in which the lead residue is applied.

How to Use Summer Oil to Remove Residue. If the summer oil is applied over the spot type of lead spray coverage where no FLUXIT is used, then the oil will cause the residue to be removed. The oil is applied in the same manner as the FLUXIT is used, with all the lead sprays throughout the season and it is sprayed over this type of spray coverage applied at the end of the spray season and about a month before the start of the application of the apple, which the residue will be removed by weather erosion before the harvest.

The correct, scientific explanation of this process of residue removal has not yet been ascertained. However, the Federal and State research workers are now cooperating in this oil spray program to ascertain the scientific facts correctly.

Incontestable Evidence

At the advice of the writer, one of the largest apple growers at Nampa, Idaho, used summer oil of heavy viscosity for residue removal two years ago (1927), and has used oil every year since that time. This lighter viscosity, with the result that he has never washed or wiped the apples with a mechanical device. His lead crop passes muster, easily each year for domestic requirements. However, much of it borders on export. The second harvest apple orchard in Idaho near Nampa, is also marketing its apples without washing.

Last year (1928), near Fruitland, Idaho, the results in two orchards, adjoining each other, varied greatly in residue removal. Both the same number of apples, one calyx and four covers, using three pounds of lead to 100 gallons of oil application. This is considered a very heavy dosage and proves that the grower can use such heavy dosage or more without causing any difficulty whatsoever in residue removal. Both growers used the same washing machine, using the same 22-wiping equipment. Results: One grower's apples showed 300 and could not pass the domestic tolerance, and he had to send his fruit to a central packing house to have it acid washed. The other grower's apples showed 300 in residue and passed for export with just the dry wiping. Rags were changed twice daily. This is the record of two apple growers. Both growers, using the same washing machine, used the same oil, and the same amount of oil, and the same amount of lead, and the same amount of oil was applied with FLUXIT.

deposits on apples thus making it difficult to remove, especially by dry cleansing.

The rose leaf hopper is one of the most difficult insects to control, and each year finds its increase in many orchards. Entomologists can advise the growers how best to control this pest, and when this pest becomes so serious as times that the apple leaves become white, because the hoppers strip the sap from the leaves required for its development of chlorophyll, that keeps the leaves green. Thus the leaves are in an anemic, instead of healthy condition. The oil-miscible combination of the best spray for its control and can be applied with the lead sprays. The adult hoppers fly from the tree instantly as the spray is applied. However, many can be caught with the spray if the one spraying is alert to catch them on the wings with high pressure spraying.

Residue Feudalism Lingering

While many growers are not so far from the apple growing industry, there is yet the echo of feudalism in some sections over the residue question. Growers are aroused because of some apparent inconsistencies which they consider contradictory. The chief cause of this today, arises out of the fact that some growers cannot understand why their neighbor's fruit will pass muster for market tolerance, while theirs will not even though the domestic tolerance is widely exceeded. Such conditions make it especially hard, not alone on the apple grower, but on the inspection officials, who are helpful, intentional, and conscientious.

The Theory of Residue Removal With Oil

The following is the theory of the functioning of FLUXIT with summer oil for the easy removal of spray residue: FLUXIT spreads the spray deposited over the apple as efficiently that it forms a uniform coating, composed of microscopic particles of lead, all in close contact, so as to touch each other, thus forming a unified, connected mass of lead particles all over the apple. As each application of spray is applied, another layer of lead is formed over the preceding one. This forms jagged layers, one above another, depending on the number of sprays applied. At the end of the season the fruit is enclosed in a thin, uniform incrustation of practically insoluble spray particles. When the summer oil is applied over this incrustation it penetrates between the microscopic particles and surrounds each lead particle with a film of oil. This brings the particles into a unified mass, as the oil acts as a check against cracking of this dried incrustation. As the apple expands, the growth of the fruit breaks up the film into divisions, which loosen by the action of the wind and the waxiness of the apple, and finally fall off in small flakes before the harvesting of the fruit.

Using Summer Oil for Codling Moth Control

Those using summer oil for better codling moth control should be guided by the directions given by the oil spray manufacturers and entomologists. These manufacturers usually have experts in the field to guide the growers. Those using two applications of oil, usually plan to apply it at the peak of the egg laying period of the first and second broods. In the warmer climates, where the second brood is more difficult to control, and the growers not expert (about 80% are not experts), more applications of oil, applied with lead so as to afford protection of the egg, will be necessary to prevent more injury to the fruit. The oil is applied in the same manner as the fruit from second to the first grade. Thus the grade of fruit is raised to better value, the codling moth kept under good control, as well as other injurious insects, as aphids and spider mites, leaf hoppers, and crawler scales.

Mildew High Residue

Mildew on the apple is caused by a fungus mycelium forming a russet network formation over the apple, which may lower the grade. This russet structure holds the fine lead particles, making it very difficult to remove. Spraying with lime-sulphur, when the buds are in the pink, one gallon to fifty, is the first step for control. In order to insure the best control, the russet should be removed by spraying with lime-sulphur, one pound of FLUXIT should be added to each 100 gallons. Oil sprays should not follow lime-sulphur spray for a period of about three weeks. Those having mildew should get information through the Federal Bulletin on how best to control it.

What Is Summer Oil?

The term summer oil is used to designate the winter or dormant sprays. The summer oils are more highly refined, so as to prevent toxic elements from causing injury to foliage.

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Effect of Numerous Oil Applications to Residue Removal

Where FLUXIT is used in all the oil spray combinations at the rate of one pound FLUXIT to 100 gallons, no difficulty has been encountered in residue removal, regardless of the number of oil applications applied. However, if months' time elapses between the last application of oil and the harvesting of the fruit, the number of oil sprays used regulates the type or viscosity of the oil used. Where several applications are used, the more viscous oils are applied.

Don't Do Causes Residue

Because of what many fruit growers DON'T DO, the residue problem is intensified. This article is given to point out some of the late modern methods the fruit grower CAN USE to help him solve the residue problem.

When to Use Summer Oil for Residue Removal

The summer oil for residue removal only, had best be applied about a month before harvesting the apples. This application will be usually at the egg laying peak of the second brood of codling moth and hence will serve a dual role, for both residue removal and acting as an ovicide. The date of application will border on August 1st, varying with the season. This application of oil causes the residue to become invisible and transparent to the sun, thus affording better coloring of the apples. The amount of oil to use is one gallon to 100 gallons and one pound of FLUXIT to one hundred gallons previously dissolved and put into the spray tank before adding the oil. Oil of medium viscosity is perhaps the best to use.

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Contributing Causes for Difficult Residue Removal

If we link residue with honey-dew, Mildew, and what growers don't do, we will find contributing causes for difficult residue removal.

Honeydew and Mildew Residue Removal Theory

When oil and FLUXIT spray is applied to remove the lead residue, as previously described, it also releases the lead residue from the honey-dew and mildew. The oil softens and absorbs the honey-dew, thus releasing the lead. The oil also surrounds the lead particles imbedded in the mildew indentations, and as the oil dries, incrustation dries it lifts the lead particles with it, and which takes oil as previously described.

How Oil Prevents Feudalism

As oil is used to prevent friction and wearing of machinery, so oil can also be used to prevent the friction of feudalism between the apple grower and the residue inspection officials. Hereafter it is thought that the mechanical washing of fruit was the only means whereby residue removal could be accomplished. Also it was thought that the use of oil sprays contributed towards difficult residue removal, and oil sprays were condemned.

What Is Summer Oil?

As each application of spray is applied, another layer of lead is formed over the preceding one. This forms jagged layers, one above another, depending on the number of sprays applied. At the end of the season the fruit is enclosed in a thin, uniform incrustation of practically insoluble spray particles. When the summer oil is applied over this incrustation it penetrates between the microscopic particles and surrounds each lead particle with a film of oil. This brings the particles into a unified mass, as the oil acts as a check against cracking of this dried incrustation. As the apple expands, the growth of the fruit breaks up the film into divisions, which loosen by the action of the wind and the waxiness of the apple, and finally fall off in small flakes before the harvesting of the fruit.

Honeydew Causes Residue

The honey-dew is slightly caused by leaf hoppers, which suck the juice from the apple leaf tissue. It is also caused by aphids. However, the hopper is the chief cause, and its excrement, the honey-dew, causes the lead to stick to this gummy deposit.

Other Values of Residue Removal Spray

The residue removal of spray results beyond the amount of residue to be removed by the washing or the dry wiping process thus contributing to the economy and greater efficiency of such operation. It will also prove to be a great help to those desirous to pack their own fruit, especially in the basket, bucket, crates, where much of the fruit is packed in the orchard, thus saving the cost and damage of an extra handling of the apples. Besides cleaning the apples, the residue removal spray is essential in many places, while dry wiping will suffice in others. No washing or wiping may soon be in vogue in certain districts, because the oil spray that removes the residue also gives the apples a clean appearance without wiping.

WHAT NOT TO DO

Don't add lime to your lead sprays; it greatly lessens the lead deposit and therefore reduces, according to the results shown by the Washington State Experiment Station, when using 10 leading brands of lead in their 1928 experiments. Growers are fast learning to use safe, standard spray materials. When they use a spreader they buy the best. THEN USE THE RIGHT AMOUNT for a specific purpose, and not a limited amount looked up in brands of lead to defeat one's purpose. Spreader in lead is fundamentally a wrong principle. This is why practically all lead manufacturers have ceased to incorporate lime in their lead.

Fish Oil as a Spreader Is Damaging

The results of the Washington State Experiment Station show that the use of fish-oil makes the residue too difficult to remove. Experiments in Wenatchee in 1927 also show that the use of fish-oil combined with nicotine caused injury to the foliage, turning it yellow.

Soap Spreader Damages Soaps are too Expensive

Soap contains certain alkalis that develop free arsenic when used with lead sprays. This causes injury to foliage. Soap also reacts in hard water and caustics, also curdling the lead. Soap puts on too thin a film and deposits about half the amount of lead as compared with FLUXIT, and which removes it easier. Rains also cause the soap and arsenic to drip from the upper part of the tree to the fruit on the lower limbs, causing such fruit to retain excess residue. Rains have no effect on FLUXIT.

When a spreader is to be combined with a summer oil together with a standard brand of lead arsenate, it is imperative that the right formula, and exact amount of spreader be used so as to prevent the curdling of the lead in the oil, also to prevent the curdling of the fruit and its difficult residue removal. As lime must be added to some brands of lead to form a so-called calcium spray, such brands are being discontinued. Dealers buying a mixed car of building materials, including lime, do not know how long the lime has been incorporated in the lead. It is best not to use it for spray, because of recarbonation.

How Spray Material Causes Damage

The concentration of any kind of spray material in drops, always holds excess spray material, which, when dry, forms spray spots. Thus the concentration of such spray materials in spots as oil, nicotine, lime-sulphur, lead, or their combinations, always causes damage to the skin of the fruit. JUST KIDS LET THAT BE A LESSON



GEODIST SUPPORTS THEORY OF MOON BEING SLICE OF EARTH

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Tidal action like a gigantic hand which wrenches away a portion of earth from the moon, caused the world's oceans and continents.

That is the opinion held by William Bowie, chief of the division of geology, United States coast and geodetic survey, in backing the hypothesis advanced by General Plagiar.

Plagiar contended that the disruptive force was either a violent explosion or a tidal action. Bowie, with his research, discounts the explanation, stating that there is some doubt whether the scattered pieces could have assembled and formed the moon, while tidal action aided by bodily oscillations of the earth is locally creditable.

The hypothesis, according to Bowie, is the best explanation of why granite rocks are pushed or pulled into pits they are on the earth. Under the planistic theory, there is no accounting for the collection of such granites in certain spots.

Lifting, in the vein of the past, the earth is seen as a dense, molten mass slowly being covered with a shell as lighter material rose to the surface and cooled. The coating was of granite, while the inner part was made up of basaltic material-like lava.

The vast force which disrupted the crust, tipped off the shell where the Pacific ocean is located. The large granite blocks forming Europe and Africa on one side, North and South America on the other, gradually drifted away. Between them, like a huge river, the Atlantic ocean formed.

The disrupted crust, cast into space, formed the moon. To support this formation of the moon, it is pointed out that the density there is just about the density of the outer portion of the earth down to a depth of 60 miles.

The crust of the earth must have been 30 to 40 miles thick in order to have supplied material enough to have made the moon. This volume of the moon is

approximately the volume of the outer shell of the earth now covered by the oceans.

Without the gigantic hand reaching down to strip off a piece of crust, the earth would have a shell of granite and an underlayer of basaltic material. The continents under sediment laid in a billion years are composed of this granite, while the oceans are underlaid with basalt.

SCIENTISTS STUDYING MACKEREL TO FORECAST CATCHES FOR YEAR

Since that there has been a decline from that mark, but unusually large hauls nevertheless have been made. Increase has been due to the large 1923 brood, followed by heavy catches the next season, and considerable losses occur. This year's prediction, made by Oscar Sette, who is in charge of the work, indicates that if the brood of 1927 proves to be as large as the 1925 brood, the catch will jump to new heights.

The mackerel, long known to follow the forecast, but, as usual, facts on its behavior are accumulated year after year. These predictions may be made.

This year, the season's run will depend on a fair abundance of large size year-old mackerel of the 1927 brood and on an unusually low mortality of small two-year-old important quantity of the fish.

More complete forecasts in years to come must be founded on measurement of vast catches and determination of the ages of the fish.

With such data, scientists believe that they may show the fishermen what size fish to catch they may expect and establish a basis for reckoning whether small or large fish should be tried for.

The forecast also will be a guide in letting how much fish should be frozen as a "balance object" in the market. If a large amount of fish is frozen one year, followed by heavy catches the next season, considerable losses occur.
