APRONISTS RECOUNT EXPERIENCE DURING DAYS OF WANDERING

Entrants in National Balloon Race Bring Stories of Hardship to Mountain Village in Empire State

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, N. Y., May 7.—Two apronists recounting the missing balloon entered by the Detroit Times in the national elimination balloon race, came from the woods into this mountain village three days after they soared into the air from Pittsburgh, starting from the race.

The balloons, E. J. Hill and Arthur G. Schlosser, brought with them a story of two days of wandering in the forest where they wandered, cold and hungry. They landed near Moore Pond, 15 miles northwest of the race, and were rescued Sunday. They had drifted approximately 300 miles.

These clouds had although carried through fog, sleet and snow, they drifted from the comparatively warm air of a few thousand feet into the bitter forest. Mr. Schlosser related his experience to the Associated Press.

His account followed: "We landed Sunday morning at 7:15 o'clock in a heavy rain. "The balloon came down out of the clouds so fast that we had time to see the lay of the land under us. We did notice the country was heavily wooded, however, so we were overboard our food and some equipment, hoping to get out of that section and into the open country. We were unable to find again, however, and landed near a lake.

"Monday morning we started out, intending to get to a habitation, but with no food, no clothing, we wandered through the woods for some hours, getting hungrier all the time. We had no compass, and the temperature about 10 degrees above zero. When we went down to the lower part of the mountain, we found rain and snow, and when we went up the dolines froze stiff.

"At 11:30 Saturday night we were about 60 miles east of Pittsburgh and figured we were being carried eastward by the wind. "Here we were accompanied by lightning, and to avoid this hazard and the eastward drift, we ascended to 30,000 feet. At 4 A. M. Sunday we came down a mile and got a glimpse of the ground, but the clouds closed in and shut off this view. We were unable to see the ground when we came down here.

The balloons intended trying to go back to their craft tonight to study the best method of bringing it from the woods tomorrow. The men carried their food, but they abandoned them when they left the balloon but its weight interfered with their progress and they abandoned it.

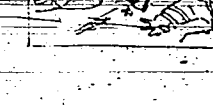
300 IDAHO MUSICIANS TO VIE FOR HONOR AT BOISE

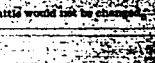

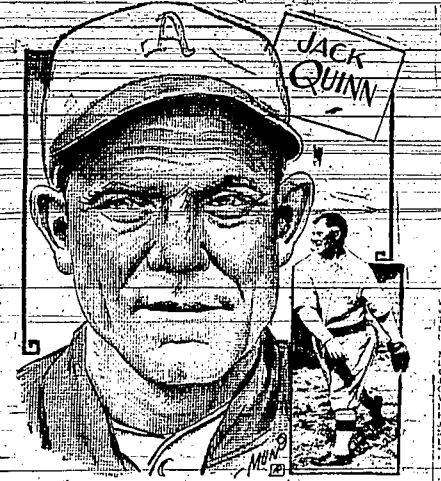

# Age Proves no Handicap to Pitching of "Old Jack" Quinn

## Athletic Veteran Continues Starring After Long Service

## Famous Player Unable to Answer Question of Age Limit For Hurlers; Remains in Game 26 Years

**NEW YORK, May 7**—Who does a baseball pitcher become too old to pitch?  
John Pleus Quinn, whose real name is John Quinn Pleus, was asked the question. He did not know. The substance of his reply was that inquirers would have to seek out pitchers much older than he.  
According to the record book, Quinn will be 44 years of age (the day after the Fourth of July, which is a more important date in baseball than July 4) today. He is one of the Athletics stars.  
26 Years in Game.  
Some baseball players think he is older. He started his career in professional baseball 26 years ago when Grege and Walters of the Athletics were minors. Such good pitchers as Irving Hadley of the Senators and Tommy Bond of the Yankees, who were born and Walter Hoyt of the Yankees did not know baseball when he was born.  
"Old Jack" as the players affectionately call him, got his first major league chance with the New York Americans in 1903, although they were the Highlanders instead of the Yankees then, and remained until 1912, when he went to Rochester. He was with Boston in the National league in 1913 for a while, but joined Baltimore of the Federal league, going to the Pacific coast with Vernon when the baseball war was over.  
The Pacific Coast league suspended on account of the World War in 1918 and Quinn pitched for the Portland team in the White Sox, winning five of the six games he pitched. He was claimed by the Chicago and New York in 1919, but his services were wanted in New York and he was with the Yankees for three seasons, finally being traded to the Boston Braves in 1922. Boston asked waivers on him and the Athletics claimed him.  
Wins 18 Games.  
Last year "Old Jack" won 18 games and lost seven and had an earned run average against him of less than three runs for each nine innings pitched.  
He is one of the few spitball pitchers left and is no worry of the opposition batmen, who see few spitballs, he has two. In addition to the conventional full, overhand spitball, Jack has a half speed spitball which acts as a change of pace.  
Earl Mack, Athletic coach and son of the famous manager, is the authority for the starting strategy that Quinn when his fast ball should be taking its place with the rare and yellow-brown-half-leaver, is really faster than ever. "He actually has a better fast one now," said the alert Earl. "No kid's stuff, it comes zipping up like a bullet, and he will knock your glove off if you don't keep your head up."

### TWO OUT OF EIGHT ACCUSED MEN PLEAD GUILTY TO CRIMES

### Quartet Charged With Wool Theft Spilt On Arraignment and Court Orders Trial Jury For New Term

Out of eight defendants in four criminal actions arraigned before Judge Babcock in district court here Tuesday to be pleaded guilty, three pleaded not guilty, and three reserved their pleas until today.

A jury of 30 was ordered by Judge Babcock to be in attendance on the court next Monday when actions on the criminal calendar will be brought to trial.

Winifred Carroll and Earl Gardner, who pleaded guilty to grand larceny charge of theft of 300 pounds of wool from Walter Colner last March 28, were charged, jointly with Guy Tibbels and Alfred E. Lary of that alleged offense, until today. Carroll and Gardner will be sentenced at 10 A. M. Friday.

Resist Polity Brand Tules Pleas of not guilty were entered in behalf of Otto Steinberg and J. H. Kimball, defendants in three criminal actions which is expected to start validity of the new state polity grade regulations. They are charged with offering for shipment polities in misbranded sacks.

Manfred G. Hollman charged with selling hay mortgaged to Joseph Abbott, pleaded not guilty. He is charged with selling to Orville H. Morgan, known also as Robert B. Stone, who is to answer in probate court here Thursday in a charge of larceny, received the same amount in district court Tuesday on a felony charge of obtaining a team of horses, wagon and harness from R. W. Qualls, Twin Falls, on false pretenses.

Surgical Suspense Released Holgar E. Peterson, prisoner in the county jail here for some weeks past, was released from custody when a writ of habeas corpus was granted by the court, relieving him of necessity of filing information charging Peterson with conspiracy at the Oregon Short Line depot here last January 24. The prosecutor asked this permission because of "improbability of obtaining a conviction on the evidence in the possession of the state."

The only evidence, the prosecutor explained, to connect Peterson with the burglary was his possession of a revolver taken by the burglars at the depot. There was no evidence that he was in the quarry at that time, where he was employed as a helper in the Twin Falls quarry district. Peterson, it was stated, contends that the gun was given to him by two persons, "Sunday" and "Monday," who are now being sought by the prosecuting attorney's office. Mr. Larson stated, will take no further action before Thursday in relation to cases of a number of young men held to answer to charges of burglary in episodes in and about Twin Falls during the last few months.

### EGYPTIAN ENGINEER DECLARES AMERICAN METHODS STANDARD

Assistant Director of Reclamation for Government  
Visiting Twin Falls On Way to American Falls

"We Egyptians are studying American systems of irrigation and reclamation because they are the standard," said I. M. Zaki, Cairo, Egypt, director of irrigation and reclamation for the Egyptian government who arrived here last evening on his way from Owyhee dam to American Falls dam to study the operation of the irrigation system about 14 miles in the country on that mission for 14 months, and will remain for some time longer.

The historical overflow of the "mystic Nile" are no more Mr. Zaki said, as the great river is now controlled by levees. Under the old overflow system about 7,000 acres of land were irrigated, today since the construction of the great Assouan dam, 500 miles from the Egyptian capital of Cairo, the irrigated area has been increased about 200,000 acres.

Plans are being formed to build another great dam across the White Nile, principal feeder of the main river, at a point 700 miles farther south and within 100 miles of the Egyptian capital. In the British general Gordon said his army were destroyed by the Arab hordes nearly half a century ago. Nothing can be grown in Egypt without irrigation, the rainfall is but 5 inches per year.


The reclamation service is in charge of Egyptian officials, Mr. Zaki said. The system of education is patterned after the Swiss system, that is five years preparatory, two years preparatory, and four years college for those entering professions, with five years for those entering the medical profession. English and French is studied as well as Egyptian in higher colleges, and German is added in the case of doctors. Mr. Zaki also said that the Egyptian man, is a native Egyptian and speaks excellent English.

### Court Grants New Trial In Dispute Over Autos

A new trial in district court here was granted by Judge W. A. Babcock Tuesday in the case of the General Motors Acceptance Company against George Carrico and A. C. Wilson, involving claims of five automobiles valued at \$3,000, which was tried last April.

The court, on motion of the defendants, set aside the verdict which had awarded possession of the cars to the defendants, Carrico and Wilson, and fixed the value of the cars at \$500. Motion for new trial was granted on grounds that there had been insufficient evidence to justify the verdict; that damages awarded was inadequate and that the verdict was against law.
