(By The Associated Press) LONDON, May 9.—Eight American young women took part among those presented at the first court of the season and the first court in 20 years which a queen of England has had since the single girl in 1910 was conspicuous but the knowledge that King George was fully recovered from his illness, although a strong enough to attend a ceremony, gave the scene an atmosphere of peace and joy.

VIGOROUS FIGHT ON TARIFF BILL LOOMS IN LOWER CHAMBER

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 9.—A revolt against the tariff revision bill announced by a large group of Republicans from the agricultural West, who are joined by at least one Eastern Republican and an apparently solid Democratic membership, intensified today as the house began general debate on the measure.

The opposition indicated that a significant portion of the bill was directed against certain proposed increased duties on manufactured commodities and particularly on leather and shoes on the free list.

Republicans from 10 central states, it was declared, insist on the expected Democratic opposition to the bill. In a conference before the house today, they expressed dissatisfaction with the proposed duties on building materials and with failure of the ways and means committee to affirm "freer" protection to certain farm commodities and to take others from the free list.

Joyce Wethered and Glenna Collett to Vie for Golf Title

American Champion Again Seeks Glory On British Course

Two Poker-Faced Girls to Compete in Scotland in Match That Will Decide Highest Honors of Game

(By The Associated Press) ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 9.—Two poker-faced girl golfers, one American, the other English, who swing their clubs like men—only better—hold Scotland-breathless as May 13 and the British ladies' championship approach.

Glenna Collett, who will be 26 years old next month, three times American champion, and three times seeker of the British title which so permanently and provokingly eludes American girls, has made her fourth trip to Britain to win the only British golf title the old country can boast never yet been across the water to the United States.

Three Times Champion Joyce Wethered, 27, three times British champion, and generally credited with being the finest woman player this or any other country has ever produced, has come out of her retirement just before the championship is to be played here in historic St. Andrews, her day of reckoning. And, because she hopes again to frustrate the American challenge, she will when she defeats Miss Collett in the third round of the championship at Troon in 1929.

The St. Andrews tournament is by no means a two girl affair. There are 120 or more others in the running, including Marion Hollis, American champion in 1921, Marion Turpin, southern star from New Orleans, and other overseas players.

But until the brackets bring Glenna Collett and Joyce Wethered together and one of them falls, the big policies that pivot from the Swilken burn to the Eden river and home again will trail their

high-luck and misfortune have dogged Glenna Collett's quest for the British championship in 1925 she ran into Miss Wethered, then in her prime, in an early round. College of Idaho Stars Beat Gooding Net Team

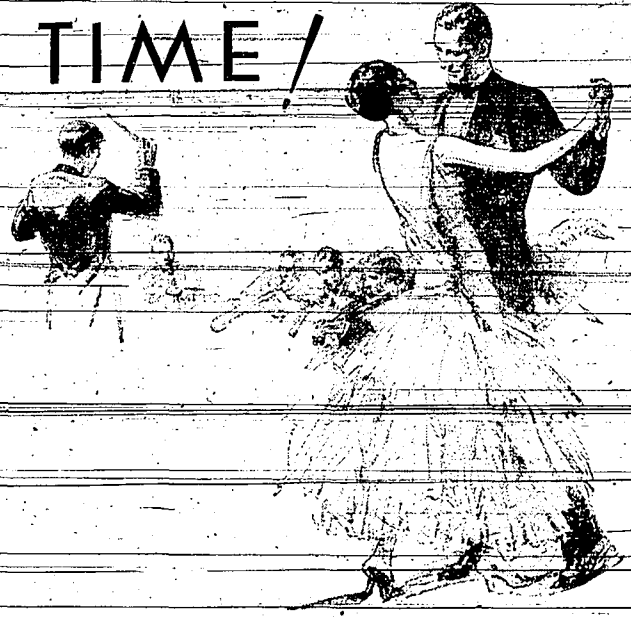

Navigation Company Will Extend Pan-American Air Lines

JOSEPH P. GRACE TO LAUNCH FAST FLEET OF "AIR CLIPPERS"

Economic World Statesman Prepares to Make Allies of Neptune and Mercury in West Hemisphere

By WILLIAM K. KUIJNS (Associated Press Feature Writer) NEW YORK, May 9.—Joseph P. Grace, a statesman of the economic world whose country is the western hemisphere, is preparing to make permanent allies out of Neptune and Mercury by extending his combination air-steamship service all the way to Buenos Aires.

Proprietor of 28 liners carrying passengers between North and South America, Mr. Grace now is getting ready to launch a fleet of swift "air clippers."

His vision

An economic United States of the Americas is the vision that he has conceived since he took over the management of W. R. Grace and Company after the death of his famous father.

The firm, which the statesman grew from a comparatively small shipping organization into a combination of enterprises with branches in almost 100 cities of the two American continents.

In addition to its steamship fleet, the company operates intricate plantations, cotton mills, factories, import and export houses, woolen mills, sugar plantations and chain stores.

The Pan-American Grace Airways, Inc., is the company which has been formed to operate airplane service from Cristobal, the southern terminus of the Pan-American airways system—the first concern in the field—around the rim of South America.

Mollendo, Peru, is the last stop at present, but John D. MacGregor, vice president and general manager of the new undertaking, has just sailed for Peru and Chile to supervise the extension of air transport southward.

Sees Benefit

Mr. Grace believes the business of operating steamships will benefit by any increase in airplane travel. The inauguration of new and faster modes of transportation, he believes, has invariably stimulated traffic in a general way.

The present steamship time from New York to Mollendo is 15 days. By airplane, starting from Miami, Florida, the journey requires only six days.

Grace Line and Pan-American officials believe that when Mr. MacGregor opens the final legs of the system to Chile this summer mail schedules can be cut down by a half or more.

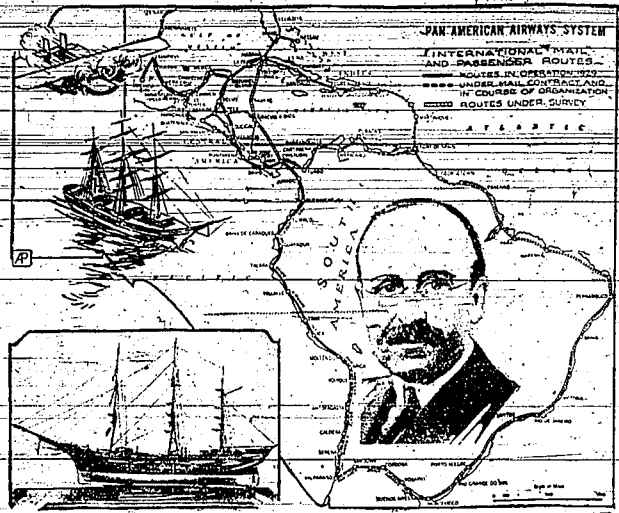

\$150,000 WILL GO INTO WAR ON WEEDS

Twin Falls County Leads All Others in Amount Put Up For Seasonal Battle

DOISE, May 9 (AP)—One hundred and fifty thousand dollars will be spent in Idaho this year in the warfare against noxious weeds, reports to the univer-

ity extension division indicate. The money, appropriated by weed control districts and by counties, is to be spent principally in the chemical warfare against the weeds which the extension division reports as the most effective weapon against them.

Most of the money is to be spent in South Idaho, Latah county being the only one having organized a weed campaign in North Idaho, that county having appropriated \$10,000 for the work. Four other counties set money amounts put up for the fight with an appropriation of \$50,000. Cassia county has put up \$14,000; Blaine county, \$8,000; Bligham county, \$4,000; Bonner county, \$15,000; Jefferson county \$6,000. A number of counties have put up sums varying from \$500 to \$100, while the Boise project board of control has put up \$200.

DOISE, May 9 (AP)—The contract for his first teaching job, nearly 35 years ago has been dug up out of an old trunk by W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education. The contract, somewhat yellowed with age, bore the date of 1895 and provided that Wilber Vincent should teach three months in Washington county, Kansas, for \$25 a month, so long as he proved satisfactory. Apparently the teaching was satisfactory for Vincent was continued at the school during the rest of the year and offered a new contract at the end of the term.

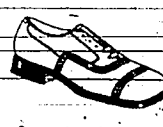

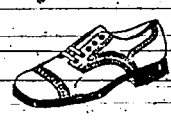

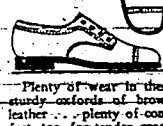

 MOSCOW, May 9.—Winter will sum up the Russian in Russia in crowded theatres, whether it be the great opera in Moscow or a badly flickering movie in a remote rural showhouse.

Even during the wildest days of the revolution, when there was street fighting and then when famine came, the theatres were crowded every night, so people who experienced those days testify.

Warm in Theatres

During the worst of the fuel shortages, when even hospitals were hard put to it to find coal or wood, the opera house was heated, and people who didn't have a bit from a bull's foot went to the performances to get warm.

The theatre, like almost everything else in Russia, is controlled and censored by the state, that is, by the communist party. The bolshoivks prize themselves on a technique they spread to the masses, but there is some art for politics' sake just the same.

One look at the audience at the opera at Moscow will convince you there is no doubt that it is the proletariat who gets the best seats.

The audience wears what it likes, work clothes or street clothes. Women usually wear afternoon frocks. Evening dresses would attract attention. The diplomatic corps wears its colored shirts and diamonds (ladies only at private parties in restaurants and clubs).

Between the acts theatregoers stroll into the buffet drink hot tea from glasses, munch sandwiches, sausages and thicken the air with cigaret smoke. No alcoholic drinks are sold.

The movie is as popular as elsewhere, and there is a growing home industry nurtured and sometimes numbered by state control.

The American movie dominates. In city show-shops moviegoers buy pictures of Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford and the other stars, and everybody still talks about the hilarious hero-squawking crowd gave "Doug and Mary".

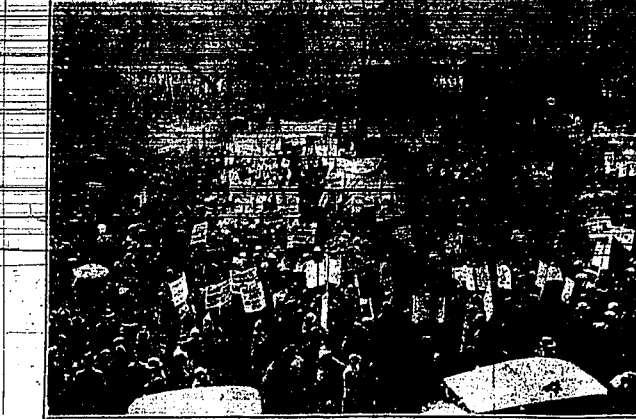

WEATHER CONDITIONS INFLUENTIAL FACTOR IN EARNING RECORDS

Roger W. Babson Cites Relations Between Climate and World of Business

(By Roger W. Babson)

BABSON PARK, Mass., May 9.—Statistics clearly show that favorable or unfavorable weather conditions have an important influence on corporation earnings and securities. Hence, long-range weather forecasting, when it may be developed in accuracy, may be an important help in judging earnings possibilities and security risks.

At first it might appear that there is little connection between weather and investments, but deeper study shows the contrary. The most important factor in the earnings of large groups of corporations is the weather.

Railroads of the great Western and Southwestern railroads depend for a large part of their earnings on crops. If there is a crop failure owing to drought, or from either abnormal weather conditions, the railroads suffer accordingly. To the extent that the meteorological service is able to give reasonable accuracy the general trend of weather for three to nine months ahead, will be able to sell pretty well in advance of the crop. Knowing the probable earnings, investors will have a valuable guide to the purchase or sale of railroad securities.

There are other ways in which weather conditions affect business. A seasonal increase in transportation expense from an extreme cold requires greater fuel consumption, tends to retard freight movement, and increases expenses. In the past winter we have a clear illustration of how abnormal weather increases expenses and cuts down profits. During January and February the middle western and Northwestern sections of the country had extremely cold and stormy weather. The result was that the board the winter was warmer than normal and with less snowfall. In the two months of January and February, the net operating income was down 20 per cent. For example, although the gross business of the Great Northern was \$1,000,000 larger than in the same months of 1928, the operating expenses were \$1,200,000 higher than in 1928, and the net operating income was \$200,000 less than it did in the same period of the year previous.

Thus, in spite of generally active business and heavy freight traffic, the earnings were 21 per cent lower. In sharp contrast to this situation we find the New Haven road on the Eastern seaboard experiencing a comparatively mild winter and low operating costs. While the New Haven's gross business in the two months of January and February was \$54,000 larger than in 1928, the net operating income was \$1,178,000 larger. This was because favorable weather conditions reduced operating expenses. Maintenance of way alone was \$400,000 less in 1929 than in 1928, and other operating expenses correspondingly reduced. The strong position of the New Haven's securities during the past few months has in no small measure been made possible by favorable weather conditions.

Hot Weather and Restaurants

The president of one of the largest chain restaurants in New England attributed the poor earnings of that company in the first quarter to the abnormally hot weather in the third quarter of the year. In a section which is normally cool, the temperature in July and August last year ranged from 7 to 8 per cent above normal. Net profits of this great chain restaurant system in this period fell off 20 per cent compared with the same period in the preceding year. Thus, in spite of a 9 per cent gain in earnings in the first six months of 1929, which were abnormally cool and favorable to restaurant sales, the spell of hot weather in the third quarter offset the gains and caused the company to end the year with a decline in

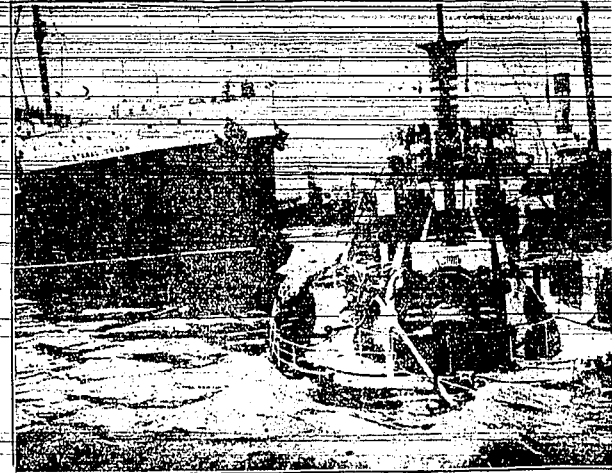

SOUTHWEST IDAHO'S

FROST NOT HARMFUL

Weekly Weather Summary
Reports Temperatures
Far Area Below Normal

BOISE, May 9—Colder than normal weather and some frost, but without damage, is reported as a drawback today in the summary of weather and crop conditions for the week ending May 7, issued by Clinton E. Norquist, meteorologist of the United States department of agriculture, weather bureau. The summary follows:

SOUTHWEST IDAHO: The season continues backward. The weather of the past week was colder than normal and some frost occurred, but without damage. There was much cloudiness and occasional light rain, too light to materially improve soil moisture conditions. Farm work went ahead without interruption, and all seasonal activities are for the most part well in hand. Wheat seems to be making fair progress and alfalfa is looking thrifty, but most vegetation is advancing quite slowly. However, pastures are improving and range feed is coming on and with the improved feed livestock are picking up. FRUITS and berries are nearing full bloom and apple buds are bursting in all the early districts, but in the later districts fruit bloom is greatly delayed.

SOUTHEAST IDAHO: Cool nights were the rule throughout the week with occasional heavy rain. No serious damage resulted as all crops are slow. Plowing is progressing rapidly in the early sections, but is just getting under way in the north. Wheat there is reported in good condition generally. Spring wheat, oats, barley, and beans are being sown. Field peas are being planted in Bonneville county. Alfalfa and grasses are starting well in most sections and are making rapid growth in the early sections. Fruit trees there are doing well on the ranges. Roads are improving.

SHOSHONE: Very few warm days; cold winds; most of grain seedling done alfalfa stood winter fairly well; fine feed for stock, which is mostly out on range; trees not in leaf.

GOODHENO: Weather continues cold and windy; crops are about three weeks later than in average years, due to cold weather; have had much cloudy weather recently.

OAKLEY: Cold backward spring; range poor; bees mostly all sown and majority up looking good; apricots in bloom; all stock on range; lambing fine; need rain and warm weather.

WENDELL: Seasonable weather; trees and crops have come out in rapid manner; alfalfa coming fine; fruit trees in bloom; except apples; winds are rather strong; nights mostly cool with light frost; present looking up; meadows and pastures being irrigated.

POCATELLO: Moderate day temperature with cold nights and heavy to killing frosts which did very little damage as vegetation is backward; plowing progressing rapidly; wheat, oats, and beans being sown; alfalfa and grass starting well; cattle and sheep doing well on ranges.

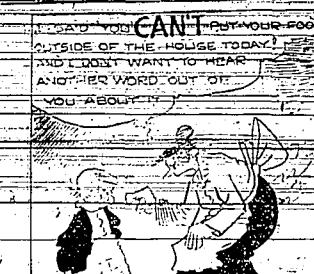
MORE HELIUM FOUND

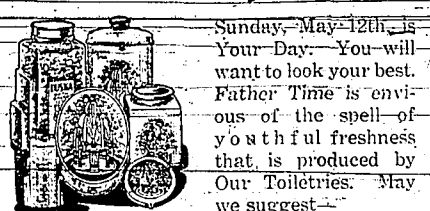
GIRLS OF 4-H CLUB AT
