Dixon Track Team Wins 33 Points in Eden Meet



TWO MEN ACCORDED COMMUTATION UNDER TERMS OF NEW LAW

Court Sentences Self-Confessed Wool Thief to Prison and Then Reduces Penalty to Three Months

Under the provisions of a new state law, Judge W. A. Babcock in district court here Friday sentenced Guy Tibbets and Alfred E. Larr to serve 1 to 14 years in the state prison for admitted theft of 300 pounds of wool from Walter Colner last March and then commuted sentence to three months' term in Twin Falls county jail.

Winfred Carroll, 19, and Earl Gardner, 29, self-admitted accomplices in the wool theft, also were sentenced to 1 to 14 years prison terms and then paroled to county probation officers. Under terms of new law, they will be required to submit a written report each year to the district court.

Petitions signed by a number of residents of Twin Falls and Murfreesboro, setting Carroll and Gardner, had not been in trouble previously, were considered by the court in pronouncing judgment.

Jack Wilson pleaded guilty Friday to a felony charge of forcing a fine check to defraud C. A. Boss last February 15. Judge Babcock will impose sentence at 9:30 A. M. next Tuesday.




