

IDAHO'S BUTTERFAT PRODUCTION SOARS OVER PREVIOUS YEAR

Value of Product in First Quarter of 1929 \$2,788,615
615 Against \$2,620,920 For Same Period in 1928

(By The Associated Press)
BOISE, May 11.—Butterfat in Idaho for the first three months of this year increased 9 per cent in volume with an increase of 10 per cent in value over the same period of last year, a preliminary report of the quarter given out today by George Tucker, director of dairying, revealed.

The report showed production of 5,827,000 pounds of butterfat this year compared with 5,334,300 while the value was \$2,788,615 this year compared with \$2,529,920 in the first quarter of last year. Part of the increase in value was due to an increase in the average price received which was 47.8 cents a pound compared with 47.2 cents last year. The total increase in revenue was \$567,695.

Figures Not Complete
The figures for this year were not complete, containing an estimate of a few hundred pounds for the last days of March. In addition to the butterfat increases, gains were also shown in the production of evaporated milk and cream. Decreases were shown in the production of cheese and ice cream, which was attributed by Tucker to the inclement winter and spring which affected not only the market but made milk deliveries impossible in many instances.

Production of 1,027,532 pounds compared with 4,800,020 last year; evaporated milk 4,042,215 pounds this year compared with 3,192,115 last year, and 183,000 pounds compared with 153,171 last year.

Cheddar production was 1,077,629 pounds this year compared with 1,754,823 in 1928, a decrease of 37.65 per cent. Cream production this year was 66,220 gallons compared with 66,863 gallons last year, a decrease of 530 gallons.

The increase of 499,100 pounds in evaporated milk amounted to 26 1/2 per cent.

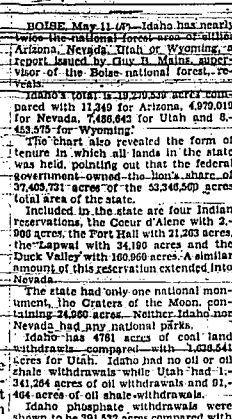

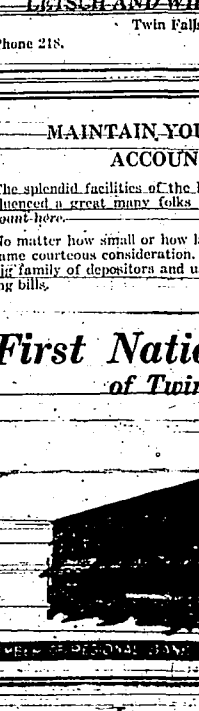

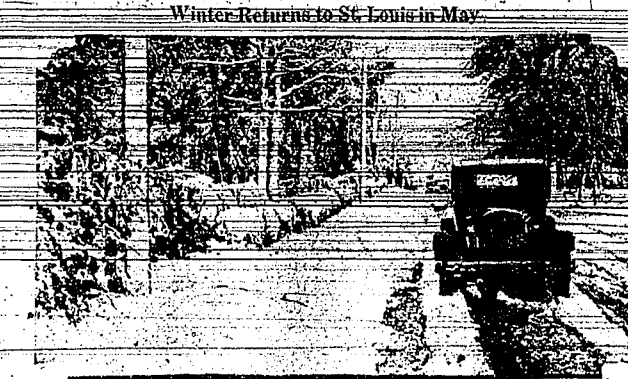

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 11.—Idaho fishermen will have no trouble finding where the fish are biting when the season opens next Thursday, even at this stage of the game, William Keil, state fish commissioner, said today.

He spotted out a dozen good places over the state where many fishermen could be expected to "go state" because of known quantities and then said vaguely that "the old boys" knew a lot more about the best places to go than he.

With the approach of the open season on fishing, the state game warden announced a list of 13 trout streams. Most of the appointments are those continued in effect from former years.

Interest will center largely upon the showing of three universities which collectively captured the national titles—seven-times in the last eight years. Stanford and Southern California, two-time winners of Intercollegiate America Amateur Athletic association honors, and California, a three-time winner of the 1921, 1922 and 1923 titles, will enter the largest and strongest delegations.

Loom as Favorites
The stalwarts of Stanford, Pacific Coast champions and national winners of the Intercollegiate American Athletic association crown, loom as favorites in the California meet and to regulate national honors for a consecutive year. However, Southern California's trophies, although once benched by the Cardinals this season, promise to challenge the rights of Stanford to repeat.

Coach Dean Cromwell's Southern California team largely is responsible for it, furnished the greatest obstacle in Stanford's drive to the conference championship this season. "Bill" Coleman triumphed over the Trojans by a 74 to 57 score. Dink Templeton's Stanford team won from California 24-23 to 1-3, while Southern California's rebounder Walt Christie's Golden Bears won an even more decisive margin—10 to 0.

President Hoover believes that the debenture plan for farm relief "would bring disaster to the American farmer." Here as set forth in a letter to Chairman McNary of the Senate Agriculture Committee, are his reasons which he bases that conclusion. "The principle of this plan, as set forth in the bill, is to issue a government debenture to merchants exporting agricultural products in amount of one-half of the tariff on such products—such debentures to be redeemed by production for payment of import duties.

It is not proposed to pay the debentures or subsidies to the farmers, but to the export merchants, and it seems certain that a large part of the cost will be reflected back to the farmer. It offers opportunity for manipulation in the export market, some of which would be to the disadvantage of the farmer. The conditions of competitive marketing at home and abroad and the increased risks would absorb a considerable part of its benefit and the distribution and manufacturing.

Moreover, the theoretical benefits would be further diminished by the fact that debentures would be obtained at a discount, for the reason that persons paying duties upon imports would not be able to obtain them. The debentures and lose interest upon them, unless obtainable at a discount.

1. The issue of debentures to export merchants and their redemption in payment of import duties amounts to a direct subsidy from the United States treasury. If the plan proposed be generally applied, it could cost in excess of \$200,000,000 a year as it would decrease the treasury receipts by such an amount. 2. The first result of the plan, if put into operation, would be a signal gift from the government aid the public to the dealers and manufacturers and speculators in these commodities. For instance, in the principal export commodities the value of the present volume of stocks in possession of these dealers would be increased from \$200,000,000 to \$400,000,000, according to different calculations, with out a cent return to the farmer or consumer. Every speculator for a while in our public markets would receive enormous profits.

3. If the increase in price did reflect to the farmer, the plan would stimulate overproduction and thereby increase world supply which would in turn precipitate world prices and consequently decrease the price which the farmer would receive, and thereby defeat the plan. 4. The stimulation of production of certain commodities would disturb the whole basis of diversification in American agriculture, particularly in the cotton and wheat sections, where great progress is now being made toward a more liberal basis of production. Although it is proposed that the debenture should only be installed at the discretion of the farm board, yet the tendency of all boards is to use the whole of their authority and not a part of it in this case in view of the pressure from those who would not understand its possible harm and danger to farmers from the interested dealers in the commodity.

He is aware of the arguments put forward in favor of the plan by some of our organizations; and the presence of other farm organizations in opposition to it. The proposers advance it in utmost good faith and earnest desire to assist in the solution of a great problem, and I deeply regret that I cannot assure that this provision would bring the results expected. On the contrary, it would bring counter results, as set forth in the accompanying letter to the American farmer.

LIBRARY PATRONAGE HAS LARGE INCREASE
Over 3000 More Books in Circulation During Last Year Than Total in 1928

Public interest in general patronage of the Twin Falls public library during the year ending April 30, 1929, was noted by members of the library board at a meeting held in the auditorium Tuesday afternoon. There was a growth almost every month over a similar month in 1928 except during months affected by quarantine and the average daily circulation for the year which just closed was 273 books against 268 books of the previous year. A total increase in volumes for the year of 3083 was recorded.

The yearly report shows a circulation of 81,723 volumes, compared with 78,640 last year. This is in spite of interruptions on account of quarantine regulations, and curtailment of school and club work on account of sickness. No count has been taken of the visitors to the reading rooms since the change of reference work done at the library.

PROSECUTOR DROPS BURGLARY CHARGES AGAINST 10 YOUTHS

Punishment For Misdemeanor Decried But Pleas to Bring Home Realization of Offense's Gravity

Ten out of 13 Twin Falls young men accused of breaking into homes where they say they went to get alcoholic beverages, will not be prosecuted on charges of burglary, it was determined Saturday when Judge W. A. Babcock in district court, after a protracted attorney for permission not to file information on these cases.

In the interests of each of the 10 young men named, and the other boys involved, as well as for the community at large, the prosecuting attorney stated, it has been deemed best to substitute misdemeanor charges for the burglary charges, and each of the 10 young men pleaded guilty to the misdemeanor charge. It was indicated that the three other young men who declined to plead guilty to the burglary charge will be prosecuted on the burglary charge.

Under sentence imposed by Judge Babcock, the 10 young men who pleaded guilty to the misdemeanor charge, they are enjoined from entering any billiard room or operating automobiles for 90 days, and must be at home at 10 P. M. each night during that period. They are required "to go to bed" at 10 P. M. each night.

The prosecuting attorney has carefully investigated the facts in connection with the crime alleged to have been committed and for which the defendant has heretofore, by the probate court, been bound over to answer in the district court.

That from such investigation, he has ascertained that there are a number of boys involved in the offense, and although the offense alleged might have been committed, it was so unaccomplished that the defendant would be a prolix defendant from realizing the full import of his act; that this offense, and other offenses of a like nature, have been committed by the defendant and other boys, more from a spirit of adventure than with any idea of committing the crime.

That there is in his mind a serious question as to whether or not a conviction could be had in the event an information should be filed and the case tried and properly defended.

Believes Lesson Learned
That from his investigation of the circumstances, he is of the opinion that the actions that have been taken so far have had the effect of forcibly bringing home to the defendant and other boys involved in this offense, the seriousness of their acts, and also have brought to the attention of the other boys in the community the serious consequences that may result from a like course on their part in the future.

That he has deemed it for the best interest of the defendant and the other boys involved, as well as for the community at large, and that justice would be better served by filing a complaint against the defendant and such other boys with a misdemeanor; that thereupon he did file a misdemeanor charge against the defendants in the probate court of Twin Falls county, Idaho, to which charge the defendants have entered pleas that they were guilty and have been by the probate court, sentenced in this court.

Turkey's Alphabet Reform Causes Nationwide Disturbance

INFLUENTIAL DEPUTY DEMANDS CHANGE IN GOVERNMENT SYSTEM

Yacoub Cadri Bey Predicts Sharp Intellectual Decline of People Unless Improvement is Effected

ANGORA, Turkey, May 11.—The new Turkey is having a bad attack of mental indigestion. She has tried to swallow at one gulp the titanic mouthful of a brand-new alphabet and the result is nationwide mental dyspepsia.

Even spokesmen of the government are admitting the crisis. Yacoub Cadri Bey, influential deputy and member of the Ghazi's entourage, has thrown a bomb into the atmosphere of perfect jubilation which has until now officially marked the ABC reform, with an editorial which has just appeared in the semi-official press.

Intellect To Decline

"Unless the government immediately takes radical measures," he writes, "the alphabet reform will ruin the Turkish nation's intellect. It will go to the depths of an abyss deeper than it touched in even the darkest days of its history. We are approaching that black doom with the strides of a giant."

The deputy develops his gloomy thesis with some startling figures, showing that the nation's intellectual capacity, as evidenced by its appetite for reading was small enough when the old Arabic alphabet was in vogue, but has faded to almost nothing with the sudden change to the Latin characters. The ten magazines published in Constantinople had a circulation of 20,000 to 30,000 just prior to the lightning transformation from the old to the new ABCs. Now, forced to appear entirely in the new letters, these magazines have seen their circulation drop to 2,000, 1,000, and even to 500 copies. The majority of them, thus ruined financially, have quit.

Circulation Drops

The average circulation of daily newspapers has likewise fallen more than 60 per cent. The government has expended millions of liras in teaching 1,500,000 of its people the new ABCs, but these kindergartens for adults have not turned out a 1,500,000 readers.

The only remedy which Cadri Bey offers in his article is for the government to subsidize publishing houses so that works of authors who cannot at present find a publisher may see the light. The government must see that books once published are advertised so that they do not, as at present, remain on the publisher's shelves.

But where the government, hard up as it is, is to find the funds for this book-selling campaign the writer does not point out. Nor does he follow the first part of his argument to its natural conclusion, namely that even if books are cheap, those who are not readers, even though they may know their ABCs, will not buy them.

The British government has recently sent to the League a reworded instrument of ratification of India.

The total number of ratifications and accessions previously registered was eight. The states which have ratified are Ecuador, Egypt, Finland, Italy and Roumania; those acceding are Great Britain, Sweden and New Zealand.

To come into force the convention must be ratified by least twelve states, with a total of 600 shares. These shares, which are of 700 Swiss francs each, are to constitute a capital fund of 84,000 francs. The number of shares to be subscribed by each state-party to the convention is equivalent to the number of units which it pays to the League budget, or which it would contribute if it were a member of the League.

PREBYTERIANS SEEK WOMEN'S ORDINATION

General Assembly Delegates View With Misgivings Proposal For Change

ST. PAUL, May 11 (AP)—Delegates to the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, May 23 to 29, next, with some opposition to the proposal to ordain women in the church as full-time ministers.

A majority report of the general council will be introduced favoring their ordination, but in view of the necessity of amending the constitution, if approved, its opponents expect passage to be difficult.

The proponents, however, led by Robert E. Spurr, secretary of the Presbyterian board of foreign missions, have support of the general council and anticlerical support of a women's committee of 100, which will meet May 20 and 21 to discuss women's relations with the church.

Should the committee favor the plan its action will be referred to the 200 presbytery of the church for ratification or rejection.

The presbyteries have completed voting on two other questions of primary interest to the church—first, in the case of the church, constitutes grounds for divorce; and whether a church which could should be created.

The Presbyterian church now recognizes adultery and willful desertion as the only grounds for divorce. Incomplete or declining support indicates the plan to abolish willful desertion as a cause will be lost.

The proposal to create a church "supreme court" seems also lost, its supporters think, although the result may be close. The plan contemplates recognition of the church judicial commission and its recognition as final arbiter of church law.

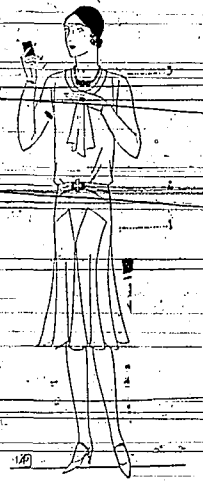

(By The Associated Press) BENNINGTON, Vt., May 11.—A new college for women which is expected to depart from established college teaching methods will open its doors, according to plans now formulated, in the fall of 1930.

The plans for the first group of buildings of Bennington college, to be erected at Old Bennington, are being carried out, a member of the architectural committee, announces.

Subjects that apply to life, and especially to women's life, will be taught. Courses will be arranged for individual interests and capabilities of the students and instruction will emphasize "learning by living."

Individual research and study in very small groups are to be emphasized. General courses may be chosen in any field that interests the student.

A well-rounded education is planned for physique as well as intellect. A system of training in physical skill, arts, emotional habits and character is to be an important part of the curriculum.

During the first two years the work will be general. Specialization, according to the individual student's choice, will begin in the third year.

Professor Robert Devore Leitch, who was Hopkins professor of government at Williams college, was chosen president of Bennington college last year.

During the next two years four floor dwelling halls will be built, according to present plans. In this period the build-

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FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

Chinese Will Dedicate \$3,000,000 Purple Mountain Memorial to Hero, Sun Yat-Sen, Near Nation's Capital

Tomb and Eight-Mile Road Costing \$2,000,000 Will Constitute Monument to Doctrine Which Late Political Leader Taught and Contributed Toward Basis of Existing Form of Government

SHANGHAI, May 11.—Sun Yat Sen, national hero of Republican China, is to be enshrined and embued June 1 in a \$3,000,000 memorial on the Purple Mountain near Nanking, capital of the government for which he, more than any other man, furnished the inspiration.

The tomb and an eight-mile memorial road costing \$2,000,000, over which it is approached, will constitute a monument to the doctrine he preached and on which the nation is being built. The elaborate three days' program will give occasion, too, for the Chinese people to show approval of the new regime.

In his lifetime, Dr. Sun asked nothing for himself, emphasizing the desirability of frugal and simple ways. But the ceremonies with which he is to be honored will be the first resting place will rival the elaborateness and richness of the pagantry practiced by the Manchū emperors, whom he fought to overthrow. The memorial road itself runs through property confiscated from common people, a class to whom his life work was dedicated.

Tours Europe. Mme. Sun Yat Sen, who has been in Europe much of the time since the death of her distinguished husband in 1925, has journeyed to China for the occasion. Mr. Sun's father-in-law, who helped to set up, will also participate in the ceremonies. In attendance will be official representatives of the United States, Great Britain, France, Japan, Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Portugal, Belgium, Brazil, Mexico, Cuba, Holland, Czecho-Slovakia, Spain and Denmark, all of which maintain diplomatic relations with the new China.

All members of the Kuomintang, or Peoples party, are to wear mourning bands throughout the three days. On the day of interment, flags of all nations will be banned in all parts of the country, flags will be flown at half-mast and for mourning. The funeral will be held in Nanking, the body will be placed in the train bearing the elaborate bronze cauldron being preceded by other trains carrying special guards and attendants. At Nanking the body will be displayed in the auditorium of the Kuomintang headquarters.

For the final rites a hearse made in America at a cost of \$10,000 will be used. It will be guarded by infantry and cavalry, preceded by a band carrying the blue and white flags of the Kuomintang. The hearse will be followed by a band of 33 cannons at intervals of five minutes. Dr. Sun's body has rested in a temporary tomb in the western hills near Peking for four years. Three special funeral trains will be used to carry the body to Nanking, the train bearing the elaborate bronze cauldron being preceded by other trains carrying special guards and attendants. At Nanking the body will be displayed in the auditorium of the Kuomintang headquarters.

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REACTION ON MARKET ENDS SOUTHERN BOOM

Long-Expected Development Occurs After Several Years of Progress

PANAMA CITY, Panama, May 11.—A long expected economic reaction in Colombia has set in, after several years of rapid development, declared H. W. Hebard, head of a large New York construction company which has contracts for carrying out important public work in various parts of South and Central America.

Mr. Hebard had just returned from Colombia where he spent four months inspecting the work of his company which is constructing highways and railways for the Colombian government. He believed this reaction was the "breathing" that could have happened to the country because in his opinion it was long in the air and was rapidly approaching.

"The government was trying to do too many things at once, and was nearly bankrupt for the task," said Mr. Hebard. "More than \$100,000,000 has been expended on railways and public works in four years by the national government alone, while the various departments or provinces of the country have spent another \$20,000,000."

Basically Colombia is in excellent condition. A large coffee crop has been harvested and is being sold at satisfactory prices. The Colombian banks are in the strongest position in their history, and the credit of the country is good and will be maintained. Fortunately the government is alive to the present situation and has already put into effect certain measures which will bring about important economic changes.

The inability of the Colombian government to make a satisfactory foreign loan early this year has slowed up the entire railway and public works program and a number of minor projects, principally highways, have been suspended.

MANILA, May 11.—The boycott of Japanese goods which Chinese have sought to make effective in other countries as well as in China, has proved a boomerang in the Philippines, says go Yonegaki, Japanese consul here.

The boycott has given Japanese merchants an opening wedge in the retail business of the islands, a field where 80 per cent Chinese controlled, and at the same time has not hurt Japanese wholesale business. A number of new Japanese retail stores have been opened in the principal cities.

Million-Fist Fights In Russia Each Year

MOSCOW, May 11.—(AP)—Russia has one million fist fights each year in which, with naturally at least one million persons take part, according to the statistics of the Moscow Institute of Criminology.

Official statistics show that in Moscow alone there were 1044 serious hurt fist fights during March, 1928, and 1201 in April. The increase in the latter was due to Easter holidays vodka.

The statisticians even gave social correlation to the fighters. They said that 35 per cent were neighbors, 15 per cent husbands, 6 per cent former husbands, 7 per cent relatives, 27 per cent "friends," 5 per cent acquaintances and 26 per cent perfect strangers.

ELECTION CAMPAIGNS IN IRELAND BRING ORATORY

DUBLIN, May 11.—Northern Ireland is being subjected to a double flood of political oratory, said a business election campaigner here in progress.

COMMUNISTS PLAN SPRING CLEANING

Aherent of Faction Under Joseph Stalin Acting to Eject Undesirable Group

MOSCOW, May 11.—Developments at the All-Union conference of the Communist party have convinced many of the adherents of the dominant faction under Joseph Stalin that the time has come for another thorough "cleaning" of the party membership lists. Their view was raised especially by the attempt of the right wing to substitute a three-year policy of farm relief for the five-year industrialization program offered by Stalin.

The last general party "cleaning" took place in 1921 when 174,000 names were erased from the lists. Since then the membership membership cards has tripled.

In those years, also two divergent political tendencies developed. The left wing, headed by the tsarist Leon Trotsky, faded away when he and his enter followers were exiled, but the right wing has grown steadily. The Stalin faction says that the rightists are mostly lukewarm as Communists, that they purring from Social and Social-Democratic groups and that they think entirely too much of the welfare of the "rich" or wealthy peasants, who form the village bourgeoisie.

The oppositionary leaders answer that the struggle against the "rich" is cause for pride and that they argue that proper treatment would cause them to fall in with the government's ideas and aid in working out the entire communist program.

The right wing also argues that the best way to unite the nation is to lay aside the attempt to make Russia over into an industrial giant.

"Let us first perfect our light industry so that we can immediately satisfy the pressing demands of the farmers and of agriculture in general," they say.

The Stalin faction denounces this line of reasoning as retrogressive and a repudiation of communism. Collective farming on a huge scale, and the development of great steel, iron, coal and manufacturing centers, is the path of salvation for Russia, in their view.

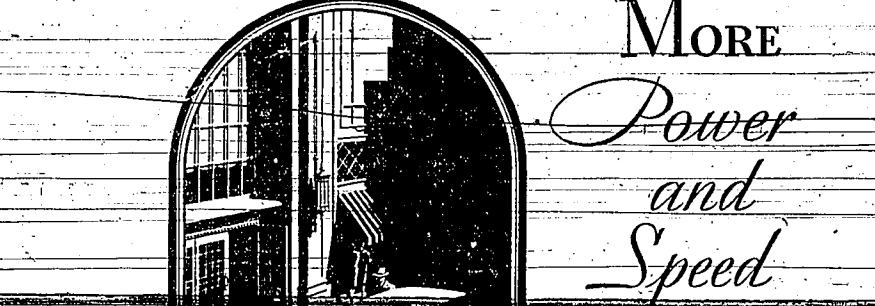

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Neglect of "Sink Holes" and Use of Canals in Winter Cause Grief In Southern Idaho, Says Engineer

Capitalization of Annual Investment in Drainage Operations, J. E. Hayes, Twin Falls Company Manager, Suggests As One Way of Bringing Home Magnitude of Financial Side of Problem.

Neglect of "sink holes" and winter operation of the canal system, according to J. E. Hayes, general manager of Twin Falls Canal company, are two outstanding factors causing a large loss of ground water levels causing a lot of trouble for people of the Twin Falls country.

Capitalization of the annual investment in drainage operations, Mr. Hayes suggests, is one way of bringing home the magnitude of the financial side of the problem.

"An expenditure of \$150,000," he says, "is 8 per cent on a \$2,500,000 investment. Add to this the loss of the use of the land affected, together with its market value, improvements and the attention decrease in the value of contiguous areas. We can then justly demand that the government should bear the far reaching effect of our persistent efforts to defeat the laws of nature."

As a first step in meeting this situation the canal manager urges cooperation on the part of every water user in a campaign to prevent water entering the ground by means of the sink hole.

He declared further that winter operations may be eliminated, but that it is both practical and economical, without in any way creating a hardship for dwellers upon this project, and he promised to utilize his recommendation on this subject a little later.

Uses Original Map. In his study of the ground water situation, Mr. Hayes has superimposed upon a contour map of surface elevations a map of the contours of the ground water level. The first map of surface elevations he made 20 years ago when he led Twin Falls Land and Water company engineers through this region. It was used by him in connection with study of ground waters after he returned to Twin Falls to become manager of the canal company.

Mr. Hayes has put into a memorandum some of the results of his study and recommendations on the subject.

He says: "Because the soil of this project are the lava sheets with sedimentary or other deposits between. These sheets are more or less fissured and porous and thus provide easy access for any water which is not used or otherwise absorbed."

How Sink Holes Occur. An examination of exposed-lava surfaces shows the characteristics and extent of the fissures. When the soil over a lava fissure or crack becomes saturated it is liable to slump away, dropping into the crack. The extent of the sluffing depends wholly upon the quantity of water which is applied to the area surrounding the fissure. The land drops and thus a "sink hole" is created.

At times the small round animals will burrow in the vicinity of fissures, water entering these burrows will eventually reach the lava cracks and create "sink holes."

The surface topography is generally indicative of the lava sheet contour. The lava sheet surface is usually so rough if we are to judge by the high exposed area in Snake river valley. The exposed areas in the lava fields show that fissuring is predominant along the top central area of the lava flows, that is along the ridges. Known sink holes indicate lava condition to hold good in the soil covered areas.

Depth of soil over the lava sheets varies. Where the soil is deep the presence of fissures is seldom indicated by a sink hole; the reason is obvious and need not be detailed.

When the soil is shallow and an abundance of soil covering a fissure with gradually changing surface conditions, the sink holes are of various sizes, varying in size from a six-inch diameter to more than 25 feet.

Data collected over a period of years shows that the ground water is at the minimum elevation in April and is at the maximum elevation about September. Operation of the canal system during the winter months does not permit the water under the ground water level to rise.

Remedy at Hand. A very large percentage of the sink holes may be remedied by the land owner or irrigator. If attacked when first discovered.

The common method of stoppage is by "padding."

"Padding" may be accomplished by spading around the "hole" to a depth of two feet or more, covering a sufficient area to assure a good job—then water upon the spaded area and work it up by tramping and padding.

"Shooting" sink holes is simply another method of loosening the area around the hole, to a considerable depth for padding purposes. This process consists of driving holes with a bar or steel drill to the required depth, (two to four feet) over an area about six feet in diameter for the smaller type sink holes.

The holes are loaded with giant powder and nitric glycerine for shooting. Water is saturated upon the drilled area and the whole surface thoroughly spaded and saturated. With the water still flowing over the spaded area, the shots are fired.

The shooting opens up the area, permitting saturation for padding purposes. Spading and tramping the shot saturated area completes the operation. No doubt the shooting forces earth into the small fissures.

Shooting in Time. While the shooting method has proven to be quite effective it is also possible that the irrigator may obtain satisfactory results by spading and padding when a hole is first observed and by so doing will have co-operation in reducing the necessity for extracting the sink hole water by means of expensive drainage construction and operation.

The Twin Falls canal company through its organization will co-operate to the fullest extent toward eradication of sink holes, and it is urged that all water users and irrigators report to the various drains on the project, both the discovery and location of all sink holes which they may observe.

Perhaps the best and most practical demonstration for the benefit of those who do not appreciate the danger from permitting the entry of water into sink holes would be a trip of inspection to the various drains on the project, both the discovery and location of all sink holes which they may observe.

Beside the sink holes as a contributing factor for seepage problems, there is the "winter operation" of the canal system. 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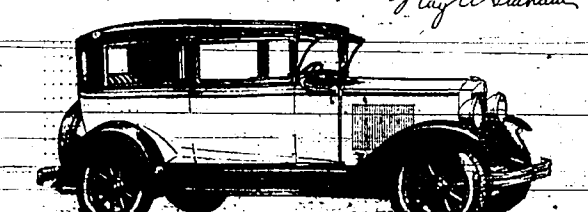

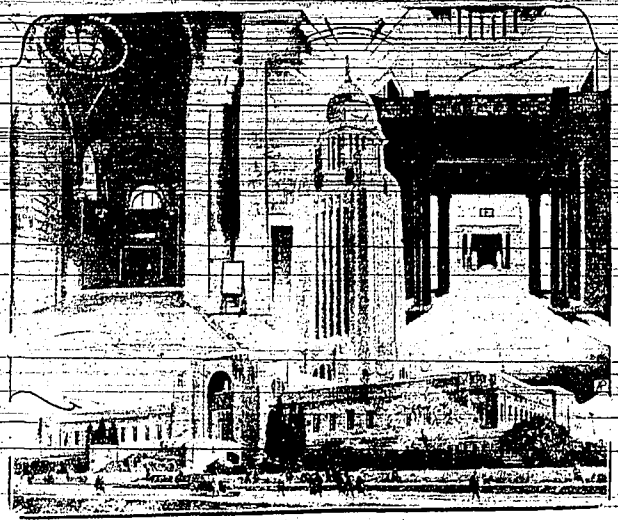
New Structure, Described as Outstanding Example of Modern Architecture Arouses Wide Comment

(By The Associated Press) LINCOLN, Neb., May 11—A new assault upon Nebraska's magnificent new capitol has left the "Parthenon of the Prairies" virtually unscathed, but such criticism is blamed for the death of its creator, Bertrand G. Goodhue, famous architect.

Except for a very few minor blemishes, which precipitated a bitter attack upon its builders, experts employed by the legislature's body found fault for an important and unbiased opinion have completely vindicated the \$9,500,000 state house, still under construction. It had been charged that the structure was crumbling.

Target for Criticism Since its inception the building has been a target for some sort of criticism. Goodhue's general design, earlier attacks deeply hurt Goodhue's testimony at the hearing, and he died in 1927.

LIBERAL AND LABOR CANDIDATES PROMISE BETTER CONDITIONS

Problem of Finding Place to Live Proves Proper Subject in Discussions By Campaign Speakers

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, May 8.—House hunting in England is more than a mere rent-payer's aggregation. It is a political issue. In the present parliamentary campaign the difficulty of finding a place to live is a problem no stump speaker need apologize for mentioning—particularly in an audience of women voters. Liberal and labor candidates assure the housewife that the small flat in which her family lives is an uncomfortable crowded existence is the fault of the conservative government, and the conservative billboard advertisements report that "200,000 houses have been built by the conservatives since 1925."

Cause of Unemployment

At a national rent conference attended here by representatives of trades councils, cooperative societies, tenants' associations and women's organizations, speakers characterized the non-solution of the housing problem as one of the greatest contributing causes of British unemployment. "It was pointed out that while hundreds of thousands of working men clamored in vain for decent shelter—reasonable rentals, other hundreds of thousands of carpenters, bricklayers, plasterers and electricians were out of work, waiting for employment on house-building jobs. Unemployment in the building trade was declared to have increased from 107,411 in 1926 to 202,784 in 1928."

Conditions Unsatisfactory

A recent survey of the situation in England and Wales revealed more than 1,000,000 houses in an "unsatisfactory state" and 2,000,000 others "seriously crowded. This in spite of the fact that more than 1,000,000 houses have been built since 1919."

Among the measures advocated as solutions of the housing problem are a national program of housing subsidies providing for the construction of at least 150,000 subsidized working-class houses annually, an act forbidding the conversion of dwellings into workshops and an act forbidding the eviction of tenants until other and suitable quarters are available for them.

Takes Novel Oath

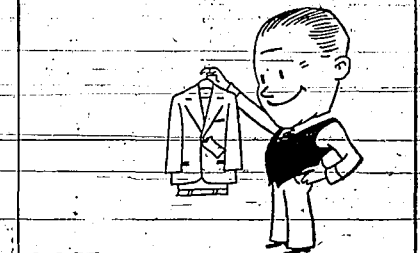
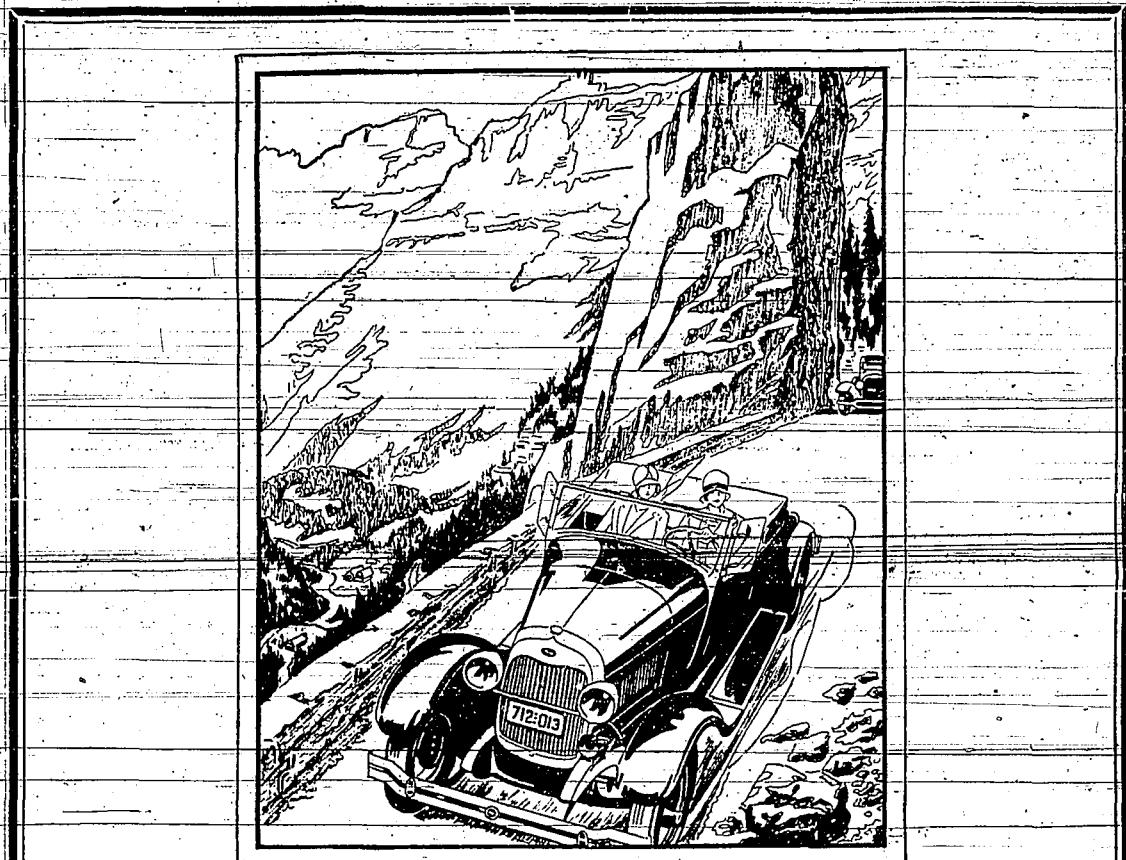

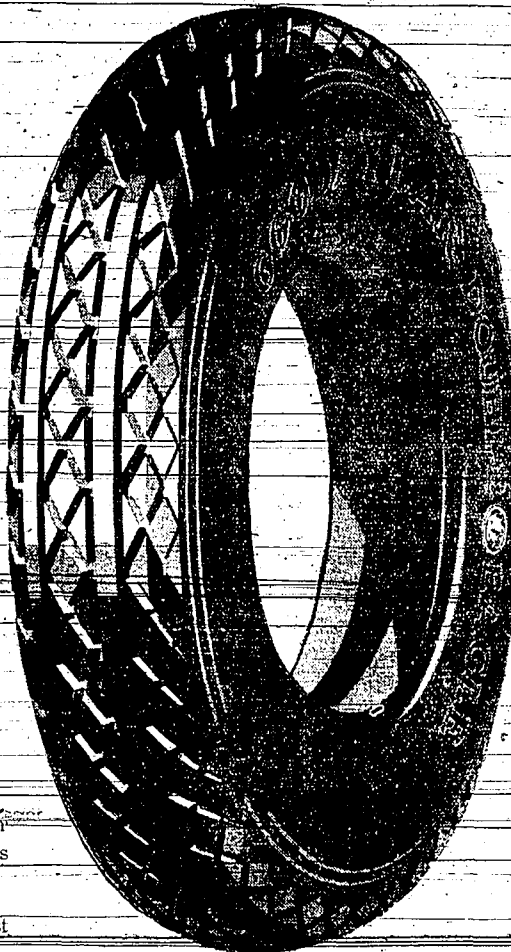

Schism in Republicans' Ranks Draws Attention of Hoover

PRESIDENT AND IDAHO SENIOR SENATOR WILL DISCUSS MAIN ISSUES

Intimations at Capitol Indicate Party Chieftains Contemplate Action to Unite Fighting Factions

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON, Associated Press Staff Writer, WASHINGTON, May 11.—The schism in the Republican majority ranks, evidenced by a break between the Eastern and West in the senate on farm relief, and threatening along similar lines in the house on the tariff, drew the attention of President Hoover today as congress idled along on its dual program of agricultural and tariff legislation.

Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican leader, was at the White House for a breakfast conference at which the legislative situation was thoroughly discussed.

The Indiana senator was optimistic over the outlook and declared the party break was confined solely to farm relief. Intimations were heard at the capitol that Republican chieftains were contemplating some action which might serve to unite the party on a new issue and against the Democrats, involving a new legislative proposal for the relief of farmers.

A cooling-off period, Senator Watson would not comment on the rumors. The senate took the day off, preparatory to the meeting Monday when a final vote on the farm bill is anticipated and to await the promised discussion on the floor on Monday of the statement of Senator Fess, Republican Ohio, condemning Borah, and the other senatorial attacks on the farm relief president of the farm relief contest.

In the senate were heard had much of the recent anti-tariff Western Republican against the tariff bill just reported to the house. Members reported telegrams of protest flooding in from the agricultural states.

The situation appeared most disconcerting to the party leaders and the House members who are expected to bring the party rift up for a rest during Senator Borah's Iowa, has announced that he will not support the tariff bill.

There were intimations that Senator Fess may respond.

President Hoover and the veteran party leaders are not going to take any part in the open discussion of the party rift. The president has invited Senator and Mr. Borah to the White House tomorrow night for dinner.

Senator Borah, in replying to Senator Fess' condemnation of his vote against the Hoover program, also voiced a warning against the tariff bill as it was reported to the house. In this the Republican leader sees the possibility of another Democratic-Republican independent coalition which may predominate in consideration of the tariff measure in the senate as it has during consideration of the pending farm bill.

Chairman McNary of the senate agriculture committee, is hopeful that the farm bill may be passed by Tuesday night.

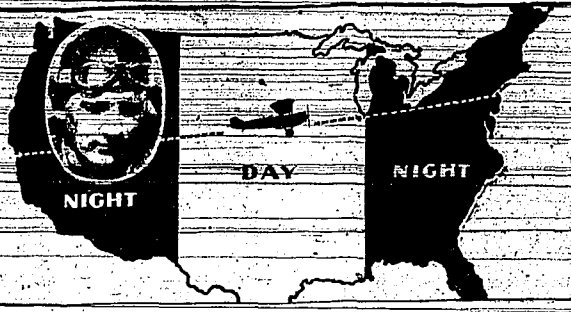
