HOOVER STRIVING TO BRIDGE DISPUTING FACTIONS IN SENATE

Senator Brookhart, Iowa, Replies to Fess On Subject of "Pseudo-Republicanism" in Farm Issue

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 13.—With President Hoover striving to reunite his divided forces in the senate, the differences were brought up for discussion in that branch of congress today by Senator Brookhart, Iowa, one of the leading administration farm program.

Senator Brookhart was one of those recently condemned by Senator Fess, Ohio, the Republican whip, as a "pseudo-Republican" for not standing by the president in his opposition to the export debenture provision of the farm measure.

Brookhart replied today that "this pseudo business" is in the administration farm bill and "not in some of us Republicans."

An ex-amicable membership had awarded Brookhart's promised reply to Senator Fess, but the town turned his speech almost entirely to the agricultural situation.

Defines Word The dictionary defined "pseudo" as meaning "false, counterfeit and spurious." He picked the phrase from a speech by Senator Johnson, Republican, California.

Johnson, who also voted for the debenture plan, said the Ohioan would have done well to adopt "the entire speech of the senator from California as well as a single phrase."

President Hoover yesterday had both Senator Brookhart and Senator Fess in the White House, the former to lunch and the latter to dinner. The Idahoan was invited abruptly after issuance of the two letters last week and this was followed by published reports that it was intended as a rebuke to the Ohio senator.

Senator Fess was invited to Sunday night dinner, along with Secretary and Mrs. O'Connell, Senator Herbert, Rhode Island, Representative C. C. Brannan, New Jersey, and Mrs. Leitch, and C. C. Bassam, Stemp, Republican national committee man for Virginia.

He had first suggested the calling of a special congressional session to Mr. Hoover's attention.

"I talked to him when he was a candidate as far back as July 12," the Iowa said. "I had been down in the South investigating some scandal man."

FLOOD SWEEPS OVER TEXAS DISTRICT AND CLAIMS SEVEN LIVES

Property and Crop Damage Running Into Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars in Region of Polk County

(By The Associated Press) LIVINGSTON, Texas, May 13.—Seven lives reported lost, the fate of several families in doubt and property and crop damage running into hundreds of thousands of dollars was the toll taken in Polk county today by a destructive flood which swept over the district without warning today from several creeks swollen by two days of torrential rain.

Livingston, in the center of the flooded district, was in darkness tonight, its water supply cut off and isolated from the outside world by swirling waters which inundated the railroad and highways.

A record rise was reported in the Trinity river near Goodrich and residents expressed the fear that the waters would break the banks if the rain, which Monday night continued in a steady drizzle, did not stop.

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—All 150 not-precursor in Carbon county over the overalls situation, even yet, is not clear. 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GERMAN REPARATION DELEGATION SCORES BEFORE COMMITTEE

Two or Three Conditions Put Into Report of Commission by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht During Session

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, May 13.—The mouths of the reparations conference were opened tonight as for its news of the expert work was concerned. The best available information was that two of the Germans' three conditions under which they were willing to accept the amended plan proposed by Chairman Owen D. Young were put into the report of the second Dawes committee today by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, chief of the Berlin delegation.

The first demands the right of Germany to call for suspension of transfers of half the projected part of annuities at any time that it may be found too burdensome.

The second demands the right for postponement for two years of even payments in Germany by the reparations agent of half the projected payments, in the same case.

The third condition is Germany's demand for the right to call for reduction of any plan decided upon now when ever it appears that payments under it are no longer possible without upsetting German finances.

The Germans also cling in the hope that the experts will admit another condition, that the last 21 annuities shall be paid out of the profits of an international bank to be created at the present conference.

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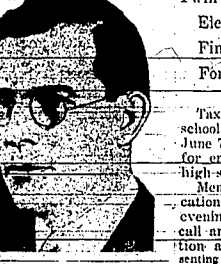

TAXPAYERS TO VOTE ON BOND ISSUE FOR EDUCATION SYSTEM

Twin Falls School District Electors Will Ballot On Financial Proposition For Enlarging Building

Taxpayers of Twin Falls school district will vote Friday, June 7, on a \$20,000 bond issue for enlargement of Twin Falls high school building.

Members of the board of education at a regular meeting last evening, voted unanimously to call an election on the proposition after a committee representing Twin Falls civic organizations presented a resolution declaring existing accommodations for physical education, school assembly and lunch room in the schools are entirely inadequate, and urging completion of the proposed improvement prior to the beginning of the next school year.

A referendum vote of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce members showed 60 for and 2 against the proposition, the board was advised. Other organizations, except Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, were not present.

The proposed construction, by including a court space in connection with the high school building, would provide floor space of 31,411 square feet. The estimated cost of the proposed construction is \$20,000.

In voting to call the election, the board proposed issuance of 10 serial bonds, each in the sum of \$2,000, the first bond to become due in 11 years and one bond to become due each year thereafter until all are paid.

Under the district's financial plan, requirement for four million dollars for bond and interest will be met by the proposed issue of \$20,000 bonds, and the levy for bond interest will be 1.5 percent.

Outlining advantages of the proposed issue, the board stated last evening that it would: 1. Provide accommodations for physical education and sports, for which there is no other provision in Twin Falls.

2. Make available two extra rooms in the high school building, which would solve the problem of providing adequate class rooms in Twin Falls schools.

3. Provide a room sufficiently large to accommodate all high school students at an assembly, and a gymnasium floor equal to the largest and best in this region.

Members of the board expressed confidence that the voters would approve. (Continued On Page 2, Column 2)

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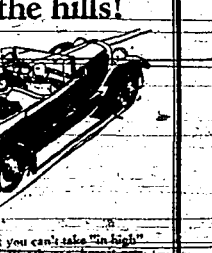

CHANGES IN SYSTEM REGULATING TRAFFIC IN TWIN FALLS LOOM

Tentative Provisions Out-
law Turning of Automob-
iles at Intersection
of Main and Shoshone

Centering at Main avenue and Shos-
hone street, Twin Falls principal inter-
section, a new system of traffic regula-
tion is being worked out by Twin Falls
city council. Members of the council
in regular session last evening reached
an agreement on salient provisions of the
proposed new regulations, as follows:

1. One hour parking limit, two blocks
on Main and one block on Shoshone
from the intersection.

2. One hour parking limit. It was sug-
gested that the city should extend the area
for parking automobiles and relieve com-
pression, and its operation at night would
keep the streets clear for street clean-
ing now being done three nights each
week.

3. Move For Sprinkling
The same streets that were sprinkled
last year will be sprinkled again this
year under provisions of a resolution
presented by S. Sanderson, commis-
sioner of streets and public improve-
ment, and adopted by the council last
evening. The resolution declared the
entire city a sprinkling district for the
present season, and set Monday, May 27,
as the time for hearing protests.

4. Petition for elimination of Barnage
street from the sprinkling district, sign-
ed by 14 residents and owners of prop-
erty on that street was received by the
council last evening.

5. Cost of street sprinkling this year is
estimated at \$12,500, elements of cost
being itemized as follows: Labor \$4,000,
gas and oil \$2100, water \$1000, machine
cost \$450; advertising and collection of
fees \$200.

6. With the approval of the building in-
spector the council voted to grant build-
ing permits to William Wagner, 512
Sixth street east, for construction of a
\$300 garage and to Joe Smith, Har-
rison street, for construction of an addi-
tional connection with remodeling of
his residence.

7. Council approved H. A. Brizez's bond
and request for a plumber's license.

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Amendments to Farm Relief Measure Pass in Upper House

HEFLIN TO ATTEMPT TO INCREASE TOTAL OF REVOLVING FUND

Senator Nye Will Seek Appropriation of \$200,000,000 to Be Used For Wheat For Hungry Chinese

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 13.—Another group of amendments to the farm relief bill were acted upon by the senate today, but a final vote was put off until tomorrow.

At that time approval of the measure, containing the disputed export bounty plan is expected. The house will be called upon to decide whether it will accept the senate measure or return it because it includes the debenture plan. The senate measure would ask that the measure be returned on the theory that the debenture plan constitutes revenue legislation, which the constitution directs the house to initiate. Leaders in the senate, however, have not given up hope of having the bill accepted by the house and sent to a conference between senate and house members for an adjustment of disagreeable provisions. It is usual for the house to accept the bill as considered by a certainty.

Would Use Surplus Prior to tonight's adjournment, Senator Hefflin, Democrat, Alabama, gave notice that he would endeavor to increase the amount of the revolving fund from \$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000 and Senator Nye, Republican, North Dakota, announced he would seek an additional appropriation of \$200,000,000 with which the president would be authorized to direct the buying of wheat for the benefit of "starving people in China." The North Dakota committee on the surplus would be held to have a leading part in the agricultural depression.

Approval of Senator Waterman, Republican, Colorado, which was described by Mr. Hefflin as a substitute attempt to make the export debenture plan a rejected. This amendment would have eliminated a section providing for examinations of the proposed farm loans, including any action of the treasury department in issuing debenture certificates.

Among the amendments accepted was one by Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, providing that the stabilization corporation would be entitled to membership in a stabilization corporation upon fulfilling requirements set forth by the board. The senate also approved another amendment by Senator Walsh which would make cooperative associations eligible to subscribe for stock in stabilization corporations upon applying for membership, a share for each cooperative member. A third amendment providing that the board should direct one of its members to be an ex-officio director for the stabilization corporation, was rejected.

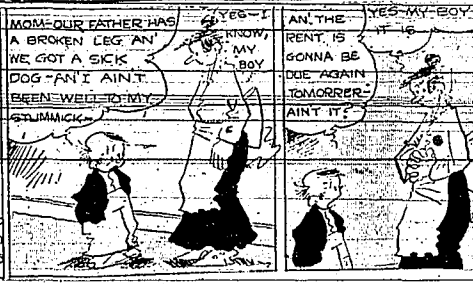
BURNS PROVE FATAL TO NORTH SIDE ELECTRICIAN

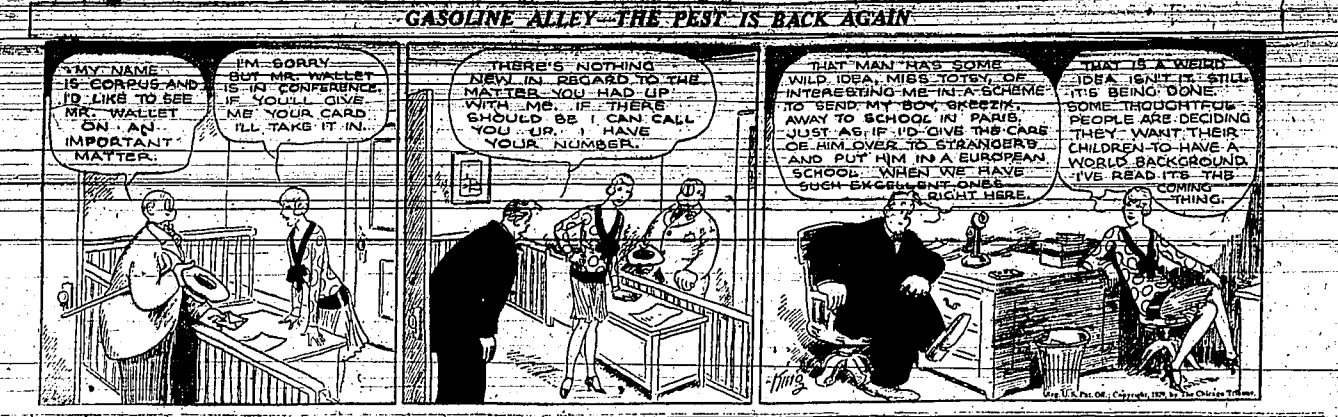

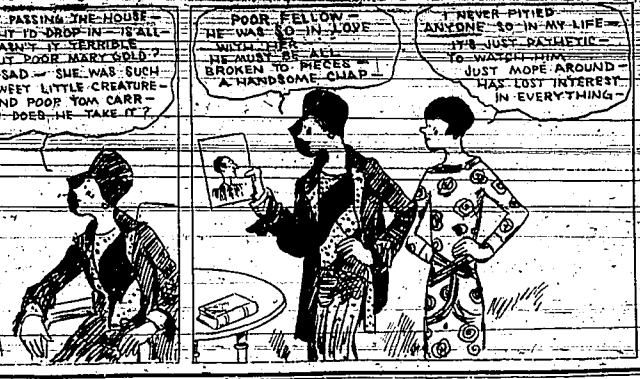

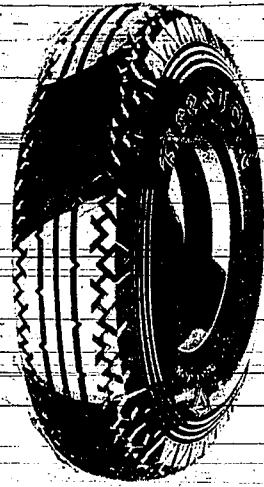
