GERMAN ZEPPELIN'S SKIPPER MAY AVOID FLYING OVER FRANCE

Dr. Hugo Eckener Receives Permission to Pass Over French Soil On Specified Hours On Way to America

(By The Associated Press, FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 15)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin will start its flight early Thursday morning and not tomorrow and whether it attempts a two-hour dash across France depends on the weather.

Announcement was made last night that permission of the French government to fly over France had not been granted, although it was expected that it would be given by the French government.

Since weather reports indicated that there was blowing over the English channel, Dr. Eckener deemed it essential that he cross northern France and avoid the necessity of any French permission.

TEXAS FLOOD WATER TAKES FIVE LIVES

Rescuers Push Into Inundated Area in Effort to Reach Marooned Persons. LIVINGSTON, Texas, May 14 (AP)—Rescue workers had recovered the bodies of five persons who had been marooned in the waters of creeks in this vicinity and hoped tonight that no other lives had been lost in the flood which swept this vicinity yesterday.

Communication in the flooded districts was demoralized. Automobiles with licenses as far away as New York and Illinois were stranded along highway 35. At one place a huge mammoth tree in full leaf had been blown down.

Telephone crews swam out and repaired lines, which in places were broken by floating logs. A. L. Young, Livingston, who was in the vicinity, said that the bodies of persons could be heard along the river banks. Rescuers were proceeding to aid until shifts were found.

STRIKE DISORDER IN TENNESSEE ATTAINS CLIMAX IN ARRESTS

National Guardsmen and Special Officers Redouble Vigilance to Prevent Recurrence of Near Riots. (By The Associated Press, ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., May 14)—Discorders in connection with the strike reached a climax today with the arrest of more than 400 strikers on charges of intimidating employers returning to work in the two affected plants and tonight talk of martial law was heard.

National guardsmen and special officers redoubled their vigilance to prevent a recurrence of the near riot in which several fist fights figured and there was frequent use of rocks by general strikers and loyal workers. Threatening placards were flung by the strikers.

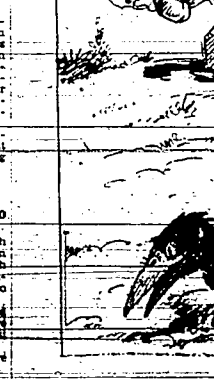
Bill Fair, special policeman, sworn in secretly with many other officers recently, arrested 150 of the strikers this morning after he said they had stopped buses filled with workers riding to the plants. The crowd began shouting and threatening him and a company of guardsmen rushed to his aid.

A woman, Laura Johnson, was out about the plants when she climbed upon an automobile filled with strike breakers. The strikers, herded into tightly jammed groups, shouted, cursed and threatened their captors. Some one hurled a rock and the riot started. Guard officers ordered their men to hold the law by training a gun upon those who arrested.

SOVIET MAY CHANGE LAWS ON RELIGION

Removal of Constitutional Restrictions Soon Will Be Proposed to Congress. MOSCOW, May 14 (AP)—Removal of constitutional restrictions on religious practices is soon to be proposed to the Soviet Congress. "Alexei I. Tykoff," president of the union of religious commissars, today told delegates to the congress they would soon be invited to vote on such an amendment to the constitution.

The decrees fighting religion had proved to bring harm as well as benefit, he said. President Tykoff added that congress would be called upon to ratify a constitutional amendment providing for separation of church and state, church and schools, and granting all citizens the right to religious practice as well as anti-religious propaganda.

THEOLOGIAN STRIKES AT CHURCH AGENCIES IN POLITICAL FIELD

Dictation of Laws Utterly Foreign to Right Conception of Institution's Function, Says His Hop. (By The Associated Press, WASHINGTON, May 14)—Attempt by church agencies to exert pressure in legislative affairs was denounced tonight by the Right Rev. James P. Freeman, bishop of Washington, in denouncing the annual convocation of the Protestant Episcopal division of Washington. "The utterance of an organized institution designed to correct legislators to dictate legislation, state or national," he said, "is utterly foreign to a right conception of the church's function. We have condemned an utterly unjust influence brought by organized churches to bear upon the legislative interest of certain corporate bodies that are seeking a self-interest. It is equally reprehensible for the church any of its chosen agencies to use like methods."

The bishop said the church had "lost prestige and dignity" because of its influence whenever it had attempted through organized effort to direct and control political action. "Place Undisputed. Its place as the conservator of things ethical and spiritual is undisputed. It has to do with principles rather than politics. If it lowers its standards to become an automatic dictator in the concerns of legislative action or the choice of political candidates it loses the respect and confidence of right-thinking men. Not infrequently in recent years has it indulged in the discussion of matters religious and political, and its conclusions that were unsound, uncorrected." (Continued On Page 2, Column 2)

SENATE, BY VOTE OF 54 TO 33, APPROVES BILL TO AID FARMER

Measure Containing Export-Debture, Unacceptable to Chief Executive, Passes After Month's Labor. By RAYMOND Z. HENLE (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, May 14—A farm relief bill unacceptable to President Hoover because it contained the export-debture plan, was passed today by the senate, 54 to 33, after a full month's labor.

Both branches of congress now have acted upon agricultural relief legislation, but the greatest uncertainty surrounds its final enactment because of the sharp difference between the senate and the house on the debture action. The president early in the session strongly objected to that method of farm relief.

"Moral Reform Not From Without, But From Within," Declares Speaker. ST. LOUIS, May 14 (AP)—Maintaining "moral reform" is not from without, but from within, the Rev. George Gilmore, D. D., minister of the Unitarian church of Denver, criticized "volstead prohibition" before the senate today. He declared "prohibition is making a large number of its advocates narrow and intolerant and is making a world of hypocrites."

"I was greatly surprised recently," Dr. Gilmore said, "that seven prominent Denver ministers who believe in moral temperance and self-control, but not in volstead prohibition, all but one did not care for the public to know their views on the law." "The prohibitionists have assumed an artificial character and its real enforcement in many large centers was doomed from the outset."

"The weakness of the prohibition campaign in the United States is its resort to coercion instead of education and persuasion to establish the reforms it desires. Business and industrial efficiency were already working out their natural solution toward habits of temperance when the prohibition law was passed." (Continued On Page 2, Column 2)

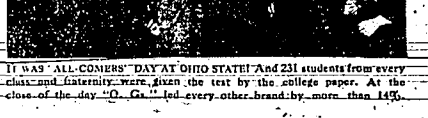

It is the only investment in which the investor has sole control." Here, then, is the last stand of individualism in property-owning. Real estate values may be affected by the perils mentioned, but not destroyed. The land will still be there. And all the constructive work in the community will be steadily building value into it. The landowner has all the control.

Guiding Your Child

WAGONS The stores are full of all sorts of wagons. Wagons are an important part of wagons, splendid and shining. The very small child-size equipment. The large, well made ones, however, usually use them for the sheer pleasure of it—rarely for any other purpose. The bright, quick, colorful, follows smoothly after without dripping paint, now on sale everywhere, will make the home-made product as attractive as any that can be bought.

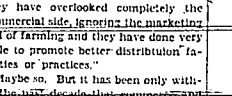

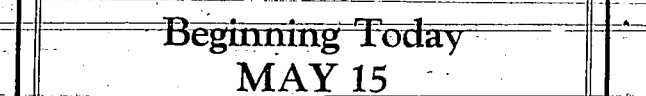

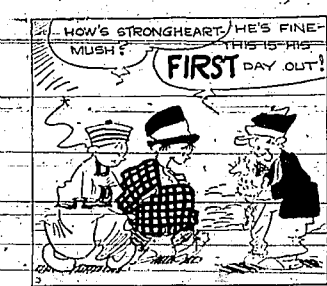
