## Radio Message Asks Permission of French Officials to Cross Soil on Flight to Friedrichshafen

(By The Associated Press)  
Paris, May 16.—The dirigible, LE BOURGET, France, (Friday morning) May 17.—A radio message from the Graf Zeppelin, timed 6:30 A. M., French time, asked permission to cross France on its way back to Friedrichshafen. The message was received by way of Marcellines.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, May 16 (AP)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin tonight sailed from the Mediterranean with two of her five motors crippled and 18 disabled passengers, who had hoped that Lakehurst, New Jersey, would be their first stop. The dirigible left at 11:30 P. M. and had reached a point between the Balearic Islands in the Spanish Mediterranean and Gibraltar. From there she was to have sailed over the Azores, and possibly Bermuda, to America.

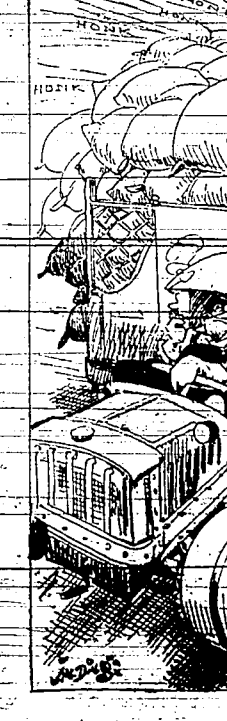

AGRICULTURE MAY BE AFFECTED BY NEW THEORY IN ECONOMICS

ROME, Italy, May 16 (AP)—After months of laborious statistical work, the International Institute of Agriculture has promulgated the theory that world agricultural production, especially of wheat, determines movements of general price levels.

The discovery which is expected to help solve the problem of price fluctuations and stabilization and have a decided effect on agriculture, has been reported to the League of Nations.

It was made by Professor D. Ferguson, sent by Great Britain as a delegate to the institute, working in collaboration with J. K. Montgomery. Ferguson has been congratulated by the British ministry of agriculture.

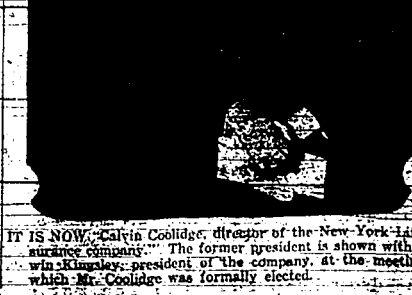
The new theory largely justifies the old medieval custom of basing wages on wheat prices and discards the theory that price movements are regulated by the availability of gold.

The senior class play, "Mary's Mill," will be presented at the high school auditorium Tuesday evening. The play will be well staged and contain many scenes and witty lines.

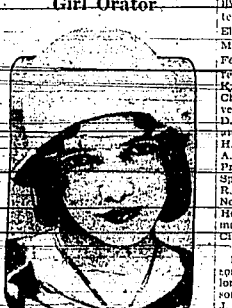

# Advocates of Proposed Higher Tariff on Sugar Have Inning

## UTAH DENIES BEET PRODUCERS OF WEST FAVOR MEXICO LABOR

### Montanan Argues Increased Duty Will Have Tendency to Stabilize Prices to Consumers of Commodity

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 16—Advocates of the proposed higher tariff of 2.40 cents a pound on Cuban sugar had their innings today in the house as the first week of general debate on the Republican tariff-bill ended.

The measure is not expected to be taken up for amendment until next week. Representatives Colton, Utah, and Lewis, Montana, both Republicans, contended the proposed increase of 54 hundredths of a cent in the sugar duty was justified and contended that the principal agitation against it emanated from Cuban interests through their connection with the United States Sugar association.

Charges that the sugar beet growing states, especially Utah, had many Mexican children in the fields were denied by Colton, who declared that foreign labor was hired only as a last resort. Utah was listed only as a just-ice child labor laws as any other state, he said, adding that statistical reports as to the employment of children in the beet fields had been destroyed.

### Would Stabilize Price

Leavitt argued that the increased sugar duty would have a tendency to stabilize prices to the consumer instead of increasing them.

During Colton's appearance, Representative Carter, Texas, the minor leader, declared the high sugar protectionists had better accept a compromise for they did not have the strength to put over the duty carried in the bill. He asserted nothing that if he got the opportunity he would offer an amendment designed to stabilize the price of sugar at around 55 cents a pound throughout the country by making the sugar tariff effective only after the price of Cuban sugar dropped below 45 cents at New York.

### Would Equalize Difference

Whether the price would be below the 45-cent mark, Colton said, his proposal would call for a tariff to equalize the difference between that price and the market price.

The controversial export debenture clause of the senate farm relief bill which house Democrats say they will attempt to incorporate in the tariff measure if it is ultimately eliminated from the farm-bill was argued in the tariff debate by Representative Rogers, Arkansas, a Democratic member of the committee.

"I'm not hot on the debenture plan, the mild, but to make the tariff effective on agriculture, that is a solution. You may call it a bounty, but it will bring relief to the wheat and cotton farmer."

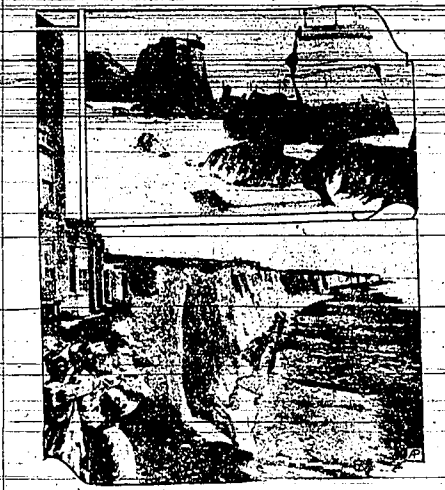
Representative Kearns, Ohio, a Republican member of the committee declared the more the Democrats talked against the bill, the more he was convinced it was a "perfect" measure.

## Angry Sea Waves Devour Towns on Coast of England

PAKEFIELD, England, May 16 (AP)—This and other towns and villages of the Suffolk coast, once famous for its piers during the war, are being subjected to a slower but more relentless sea attack today.

All along the coast, erosion is eating away the cliffs at the rate of from 12 inches to a yard each year. In some places the sea has reached within a few feet of houses.

A street in Pakefield which formerly by common reckoning has been lost 100 feet of them, and one dwelling now is half hanging over the cliff with its roof gone and one wall crumpled.

What year upon year of this can do is illustrated in the case of Dunwich, south of here, which once was the most prosperous port in Suffolk. Of Dunwich only a few houses remain.

Other sections of England face the same problem. In the south the main coastal highway between Brighton and Southampton is an unbroken succession of 1400-ton that-planned being laid for a new road further inland.

Seaside homes in several of the south coast towns have disappeared and huge sums are spent yearly in the safeguarding of buildings which otherwise might go the way of Dunwich.

In many cases, where erosion could have been checked the inhabitants unfortunately have not the money to spend when Nature's retribution comes to collect the rent they simply move away.

It is not a new thing in England, of course, this gradual encroachment of the sea. As far back as the thirteenth century the thriving port of Wisbech was submerged. The town was rebuilt on a near-by height, after which the sea played one of its sardonic tricks and gradually receding, left the new port high and dry.

## CANNING—NO SECRET TO POCKET GOPHERS

### Biological Survey Director Tells of Practices of Destructive Creatures



BOISE, May 16 (AP)—The fine points to canning are no secret to pocket gophers. T. B. Murray, biological survey director for Idaho, said today after making an inspection tour of the gopher areas in southern Idaho.

The gophers pack heen and clover roots, lightly in a hole, and eat them during times of food scarcity or lack of nutrition. There is no set time when all gophers begin eating the roots they have stored up, but generally they store them about the same time—either in the spring or in the early fall. They pack them so tightly into the holes that they seem to be airtight.

Periods of several months without other protection than the thick pack. He said extreme difficulty had been encountered in destroying the gophers. They do not respond to poison baits which catch ground squirrels but in recent years were destroyed to some extent by poisoned alfalfa hay. Traps were also partially effective.

"The principal difficulty was in getting all of them at any particular time. Apparently, lacking uniform habits, Murray said some of them would be working deep in the ground while others would be busy burrowing near the surface or in feeding on top.

They work all winter, using the lowest frost depth as a "ruling" for their activities, thus being found during the winter at levels ranging from a few inches to two feet under ground.

# Chicago Opens War to Wipe Out Slums and Beautify City

## WINDY CITY IN THICK OF CAMPAIGN TO RID METROPOLIS OF HUTS

### Christian Paschen, Building Commissioner, Issues Order to Make Big Town Slumless by End of 1930

CHICAGO, May 16.—America's most self-conscious city has quarantined itself for slums, a virulent metropolitan disease. Painfully aware of its gangsters, this city is giving to its unspectacular slums, sending itself as others do, and hunting in better "front" to present to the world as an antidote for the lurid melodrama of the racketeers. Such a movement Christian P. Paschen, building commissioner, has in order to make Chicago slumless by 1930.

Paschen believes in "front." He wears a pearl in his scarf, a diamond on his finger. He dresses well. But what is more, Paschen also is a building contractor and knows how a city should be run. He knows what could be done with unlighted areas, for Wacker drove a showpiece of the city, was once a most of the slum buildings, including those along the Chicago river.

Power to Condemn  
Under his office Paschen has power to inspect and condemn buildings as unsafe and unfit for habitation. His first move was to organize a militia crew of inspectors and get them to work plastering up the "quarantine" signs.

Already hundreds of property owners have been notified that their buildings have been condemned and told to repair or wreck them—or the city will do it and sue the owner. If the owner spends his funds he loses, the city wrecks do the job at a low cost, sometimes shouldering most of the burden.

There are 15 inspectors working at the job every day. Paschen estimates there are 3000 buildings defective in the slum category. Others, less dangerous to life and health, will be ordered repaired. "I was coming into Chicago on a train from the east," Paschen writes, "and we went miles through a sort of lane of shanties. How that must look to the eyes of the people who live in Chicago. These places were here 40 or 50 years ago. In buildings condemned 15 years ago. Business men are supporting him, having seen the worth of the drive demonstrated. The city health department, the various social agencies and the world-fair committee are supporting him.

The Resenthal Foundation has announced two plans to help home owners improve their places in line with the campaign. It proposes to lend money on easy terms to permit them to fall in line.

## WARM WEATHER AIDS SOUTHWESTERN IDAHO

### Conditions in Area During Week Favorable For Crop Growth, Summary Shows

BOISE, May 16. (Special to The News)—Increasing warmth during the week ending May 14 made conditions more favorable for crop growth in southwestern Idaho, according to the weekly summary of weather and crop conditions in Idaho, issued by the United States department of agriculture weather bureau here, of which Clinton E. Norquist is meteorologist.

The following reports are included in the summary:  
SOUTHWEST IDAHO—Weather conditions of the past week were somewhat more favorable for crop growth, although irrigation is still scarce in places. Rainfall was adequate and although nights were mostly cool with occasional frosts in the evening, the afternoons had a beneficial effect on crop growth. Spring rains, although getting a late start, are backing very well. Pastures and ranges are improving and are now affording sufficient feed to supply livestock that have been turned out to forage for themselves. Drying winds carried away much soil moisture and irrigation is being pushed in many districts. No frost damage of consequence to commercial orchard crops occurred.

SOUTHEAST IDAHO: The first of the week was cool with rain and showers occurred in some districts, but did no damage to crops which, due to cold, had been slow in starting. The latter part of the week was warmer and farming operations moved rapidly. The seeding of grains and beans progressed rapidly and early plantings are coming up well. Winter wheat is doing well in most sections. Alfalfa is getting nicely started and ranges are improving rapidly.

Cattle and sheep are doing well. Ground is being prepared for potatoes and a few have already been planted. Field notes included in the summary:  
TWIN FALLS—Some warm days, but nights continue cold and frosty; alfalfa very good stand in some fields; frosts still coming into bloom.  
BOISE—Cold and dry; winds are taking moisture out of ground, rapidly; frosty mornings are holding vegetation in check; alfalfa barely covers; the ground and ranges are slow coming up; hay is getting scarce; prunes, apples, cherries, peaches, and pears in bloom; field work well advanced.  
BURBETT—Weather cold; frost several nights; planting well along, but crops not progressing well as they should; beets all started; alfalfa well started.  
POCATELLO—Cool first of week with light rains; last of week warmer; plowing resumed; most grains and beets planted and early planting coming up; ground being prepared for potatoes and few planted; alfalfa making good start; alfalfa the improving variety; alfalfa doing well.

MOUNTAIN HOMES—Weather still backward and vegetation showing only slow growth; irrigation now started; grain showing up well although late.  
OLENNS FERRY—Considerable increasing warmth of the afternoon had a beneficial effect on the vegetation, making fine progress.

## AIRWAY OFFICIALS NAME WEATHER MAN AT BURLEY

BURLEY, May 16. (Special to The News)—It is announced that D. A. Christopherson will act as airway weather observer stationed at Burley for the Salt Lake City-Pasco air mail route. ## AVIATION CREATES NEW NEED FOR WEATHER MAN

CLEVELAND, May 16. (AP)—The increased demand for weather forecasts on the airways of the United States is bringing about a shortage of meteorologists.

W. R. Gregg, senior meteorologist of the Department of Commerce weather bureau, said the first annual operation of the airport section of the aeronautical chamber of commerce here today that the need for trained men is becoming acute.

The demand, Mr. Gregg said, is increasing all out of proportion to the supply and there has been no outside source from which to "draw" new material.

There are indications, however, he said, that the condition may change. Some of the colleges are organizing departments in meteorology. The weather bureau, he said, is planning to take the graduates and supplement their education with training in subordinate positions to fit them for leadership in the work.

The importance and problems of the airway weather forecasting work were explained by Mr. Gregg. At least four trained men, and preferably five or six, were needed, at all important airway stations, he asserted, to give pilots 24-hour weather information service.

Eventually, and as rapidly as possible, he said, at least three trained men will be placed at each air station so one may be on duty at all times to obtain and interpret weather information for aviators.

## Airports New Utilities In Kansas and Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 16. (AP)—Two southwest states, Oklahoma and Kansas, have enacted legislation that puts airports in the same group as other municipal utilities. Cities now may issue bonds to establish airports and maintain them by taxation.

Oklahoma claims to be the first state to inaugurate a program, in cooperation with the United States department of commerce, for the establishment of municipal airports. Thirty-three existing fields, to be completed this year, have been financed by Oklahoma cities. A total investment of \$3,000,000 in airports and \$15,000,000 in all phases of aviation is planned. Already \$1,750,000 has been invested in landing fields for the 12 interstate and transcontinental lines that cross the state.

### ELECTRICAL 'GELLO' TO ASSIST IN ORCHESTRA

PHILADELPHIA, May 16 (AP)—The Philadelphia orchestra has acquired a new instrument which will be made by Professor Leon Tietze, creator of "ether-wave music," under the direction of Leopold Stokowski, conductor. The instrument is controlled by electricity and looks like a long, slender black plank about four inches wide. ### 'WEED' RESTORING FERTILITY OF SOIL

#### Sweet Clover, Once Not More Than Roadside Pest, Now Popular Soil-Re-BUILDER

AMES, Iowa, May 16 (AP)—Sweet clover once a roadside pest and now a popular soil-re-builder is restoring fertility to the Middle West.

For years many areas along the Missouri and big Stone rivers have been notoriously unproductive. Farmers in these rough sections of Iowa seed sweet clover early in the spring with no mechanical preparation of the land and obtain good stands. The clover cuts down erosion and in many instances has reclaimed or improved permanent pastures. Sweet clover has played an important part in reclaiming swamp lands in Missouri county, where seed is sown in early spring and the clover allowed to grow up with the swamp grass. Although much of it is lost, wheat planted on ground reclaimed in this manner yields 35 bushels to the acre and corn 65 bushels.

In Logan county, Kansas, one of the border counties between the acid south-east and east and the sandier neutral soils of the west, whole sections are being reclaimed with sweet clover. An Emporia bank seeded to sweet clover three entire farms which came into its possession. A notable example of sweet clover's power of rejuvenation is found in southeastern Logan county. There for several years was a field of soil so rich and unproductive that it became known as "the old bogey" and sweet clover accidentally took root. As it spread the owner saved it all. Soon a mature crop was cut and raked into the ditches. They filled, and sweet clover gradually gained a foothold on the entire field. Now foot crops of corn are harvested on soil that formerly would scarcely grow weeds.

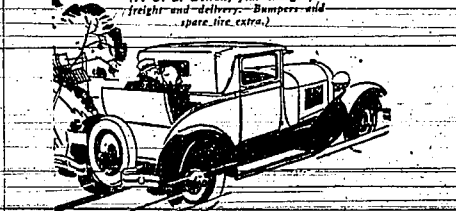

### NEW LINES TO USE LARGE FLEET OF FLYING BOATS

NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—The largest fleet of flying boats and amphibians ever assembled for air transport service will be used on the projected 2000-mile international mail and passenger route between New York and Buenos Aires, Inc. 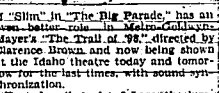
