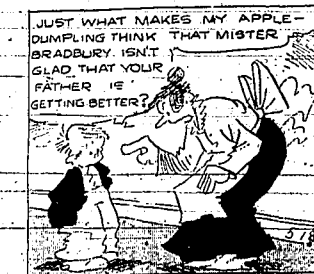
Twin Falls Team Loses to North Side Club, 12 to 9 in Hard-Fought Contest

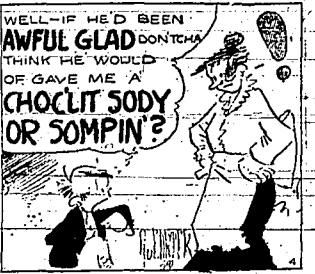
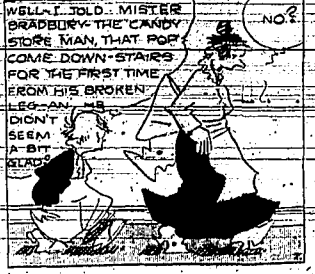

6000 Fans See Net Favorites Perform in French Tourney

Hard Courts Championships Open With Triumphant Appearance of Tilden and Hunter in Doubles Play

ANGLY (Associated Press Sports Writer) PARIS, May 20—With only doubles on display for the early customers, the French hard courts tennis championships opened today with the triumphant appearance of favorites before a holiday crowd of 6000, a third of them vacationists from England and tourists from America.

Paired with Francis Hunter he quickly eliminated two Nordic blondes from Denmark, Adamussen and Nielsen, by scores of 6-4, 6-1, 6-0. An hour later, he teamed Helen Wills stepped upon the center court where 20 photographers heralded her appearance, then paired with Hunter to win in straight-sets from the French pair, Mademoiselle Doris Metaxa and S. Jack Dempsey Forcefully Declares Fighting Days Over

Ring Fails to Lure Former Champion Of Heavyweights

"There Have Been No Million-Dollar Offers and I Don't Expect Any" Is Mauler's Firm Assertion

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, May 20.—Stretched out in a barber's chair with a razor fought with his "blackie" barber, the mauler just clipped his nails. Jack Dempsey wiped the lather from his lips today and declared without reservation that he is farther away than ever from another ring comeback.

As forcefully as a man could say it, the former heavyweight king declared that the retirement he announced after Gehe Tunney whipped him for the second time in Chicago still stands more or less than ever. The ring just his lure, fighting days are behind him, and a new career stretches ahead.

Working out at a gymnasium here last week to keep my "clothes fitting," Dempsey damaged a vertebrae in his neck, the neck is stiff and painful. "What a fine job it'd be to ever fight again," he said. "Almost every day I receive offers of one kind or another to fight again. 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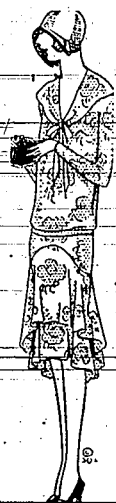

Lone Watchman Guards Mining Camp Tucked Into Central Idaho Canyon

FORDS ABANDON BIG UNDERTAKING AFTER SPENDING HUGE SUM

Discoveries in Myriad of Holes Bored By Diamond Drills Not Known Except By Eastern Engineers

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, May 20—Tucked into a narrow canyon in Custer county in Central Idaho, lies a pretentious "little" mining camp, complete as to buildings and elaborately furnished as to appliances, and it has only one workman—the watchman.

The plant belongs to Henry Ford. Report of the property is contained in a dossier in the annual report of Stewart Campbell, state mining inspector, accompanied by a picture of the site.

The capital of the holding concern is 1,000,000 shares of \$100 par value which rounds out at \$100,000,000. Work on the project was started in 1924 and pressed both extensively and expensively for about 18 months when it was abruptly stopped, the four tunnels sealed, all workmen discharged and the city turned over to the lone watchman.

Keep Secrets
What was discovered by the myriad of holes bored by diamond drills is not known out West. The Ford interests conducted all their work through Eastern engineers and kept their secrets to themselves. The only evidence of value to the plant are: several thousand tons of lead carbonate ore on the dump, the air-tight fittings made on the property by the Ford interests, the careful watch kept over it—and the fact that the Fords are still holding to it.

No satisfactory process has yet been found of reducing carbonate ore but progress is being made by the Duncker Hill and Sullivan in experimenting with circuitous.

Ford probably can afford to watch and wait. In the meantime his mine goes on record each year in the review as follows: OFFICE: Highland Park, Michigan. OFFICERS: Edsey P. Ford, president; H. J.
