TWIN FALLS TO PAY ANNUAL TRIBUTE TO NATION'S WAR DEAD

Representatives of Veterans and Patriotic Organizations Plan Observance of National Memorial Day

With decoration of the graves of seventy-four veterans of American wars, a Memorial day procession through Twin Falls streets and public exercises at Twin Falls cemetery, Memorial day will be observed here on Thursday, May 23, according to arrangements worked out by representatives of veterans and patriotic organizations at a meeting last evening.

Captain James W. Porter, Twin Falls, commander of a battery of the 16th Field Artillery regiment overseas during the World war will deliver the Memorial address at exercises at the cemetery. Veterans organizations and auxiliaries will place wreaths upon the cenotaph bearing the names of Twin Falls-county's World war dead. Rev. J. C. Wood, rector of Ascension Episcopal church and a veteran of the second division will offer the invocation and Rev. Cecil F. Flisow of the Methodist Episcopal church, also a veteran of the World war, will read General Logan's order calling for observances of the first Memorial day. Paul Munson, past commander of Twin Falls American Legion, will read Lincoln's Gettysburg address. Twin Falls municipal band will play two numbers, one at the exercises and "The Star Spangled Banner" immediately before the firing of the volleys and the sounding of taps at the close.

Captain E. W. McRoberts, Twin Falls, commander of headquarters company of the 16th Field Artillery regiment and a veteran of both the Spanish and World wars, is to marshal of the day. In charge of the Memorial parade which will move at 10 A. M. to be followed immediately by the exercises at the cemetery. Organizations in the will include veterans of the Civil war, with Company E, 116th Engineers, Twin Falls unit of the Idaho national guard, as an escort; Spanish War Veterans, American Legion, Twin Falls, members of the Grand Army of the Republic, American War Mothers, American Legion Women's Auxiliary, Daughters of the American Revolution, Campfire Girls, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts. Invitation also has been extended to all other organizations which care to participate. Twin Falls Municipal band will lead the march.

Equipment For Gold-Pack Preserving of Fruit in Transit, Says Manager

Within next two weeks Intermountain Produce company, Twin Falls, will have completed installation of a plant here for cold pack preserving of cherries and other fruits, C. J. Cannon, manager, announced last evening.

Out of estimated production of 200,000 pounds of cherries in this district, included the North side, Cannon said his company has contracted for 180,000 pounds this season. The new plant, Cannon said, will be installed in the C. L. Cannon warehouse, 205 Wall street, which has been leased for the purpose.

—Purchase of equipment and first year's operation of the new plant will involve investment of more than \$25,000, it was stated. Equipment, Cannon said, is now in transit from San Diego, California.

The Intermountain company's plant is the second of the kind promised Twin Falls this year, announcement having been made last week by H. W. Jacobs company, Pleasant Grove, Utah, to purchase to install a cold pack plant here this season, with view to enlarging to provide facilities for canning fruits and vegetables.
