## Young Star Suffers Defeat But Proves Ability at Tourney

Tilden, Hunter, Wills and Cross Triumph and Reach Quarter-Finals of International Championships

Coen's whiter spin on the French tennis and in Italy appears to have had the expected effect in that while it generally has on other American players as he showed tremendous improvement since his appearance last year in these same championships.

# Battling Bon-bon of Bantamweights Beats LaBarba Badly

### 18,000 Customers Crowd Boxing Barn To Watch Fighters

#### Negro's Record of 147 Battles Without Defeat Unbroken at End of Hectic Bout Ending in Decision

 NEW YORK, May 22.—Smiling "Keed" Chocolate, the battling bon-bon of the bantamweights, waged a furious struggle tonight to stamp himself as the outstanding gladiator of a championless division, but failed to convince entirely a crowd of 18,000 jammed in Jess McMahon's big boxing barn that he is the master of Fidel LaBarba.

The curly-headed little Italian from Los Angeles, a former flyweight champion and student at Stanford university, lost the decision to the dazzling negro after a hellish fest that swirled and eddied to rising volleys of cheers through the Coliseum ring for 10 hectic rounds, when the battle was over, and the colorful negro's record of 147 battles without defeat still was unbroken, the cheers still were for the courageous, rushing slugger from the Pacific coast.

The voice of the crowd and the opinion of a majority of ring-sider critics awarded Fidel at least a draw and possibly the decision because of aggressiveness that never faltered, courage and a busy punching attack that was never entirely stilled by the negro's heavy weapons.

The Associated Press score sheet gave Chocolate four rounds, LaBarba four and two even. One judge voted the match a draw, the other and the referee awarded the decision to Chocolate.

### WEED-FIGHTERS GET CAMPAIGN SUPPLIES

First of Five Carloads of Chemical to Be Used in Coming Season Arrives

A carload of sodium chlorate containing 40,000 pounds of the chemical and costing \$7110 more than \$3000 delivered here Wednesday for use during the first month or six weeks of this season's campaign against noxious weeds in Twin Falls county, which is to be started about the middle of June.

The shipment was the first of the coming season during which five carloads of the chemical will be consumed in the weed war. A similar quantity of the chemical was used in the campaign last season to cover approximately 600 acres of weed infested lands.

A survey made this spring, according to M. E. Brady, Twin Falls county weed department commissioner, indicates that satisfactory results were obtained by use of the chemical last season, and that the proportion of killed weeds is very high.

Weeds on approximately 50 per cent of the infested area of the county were destroyed during the last two years. Mr. Brady estimated last evening.

With continuing good fortune, a different proportion of the weed war, during the next two or three years, the county should be almost entirely free from noxious weeds.

The chemical delivered here Wednesday was shipped from Portland and is to be stored in the weed department warehouse on Sixth avenue west until required for use in the coming campaign.

# Disabled Officers to Celebrate Year of Retirement Pay

**AFTER 10 YEARS ON HOSPITAL BEDS WAR VICTIMS WILL MEET**

**Event Will Mark First Anniversary of Signing of Tyson-Fitzgerald Bill to Aid Nation's Ex-Fighters**

(By The Associated Press)  
**NEW YORK, May 23**—Though wounded five times while crossing an open field, he kept command of his company until he fell unconscious.  
 Ten years ago Captain Frank Jervey received that commendation in a relation for the distinguished service cross.  
 May 25 in New York he will celebrate with several hundred other disabled emergency officers of the World War the enactment of legislation which gave them financial compensation for their hurts.  
 The event will mark the first anniversary of the signing of the Tyson-Fitzgerald bill which placed emergency officers on the same retirement pay basis as regular army officers.

**Falls to Be Re-United**  
 Men who have not seen each other since they lay side by side in a muddy trench will be re-united. Across a 10-year interim of pain-wracked hospital beds they again will clasp hands. Men who were passed are leaving the healing air of high altitudes long enough to take part in the two-day convention. Men who spent three and four years in Walter Reed hospital, Washington, will be there.  
 Both Senator Lawrence D. Tyson and Representative Roy G. Fitzgerald, who fathered the relief legislation, will be there. Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, director of the United States Veterans' bureau, and Colonel Paul V. McNutt, national commander of the American Legion, also will attend.

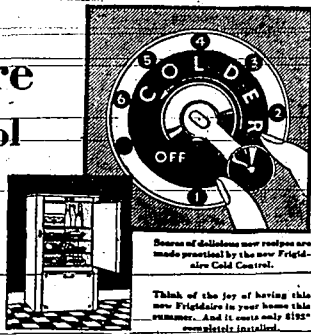

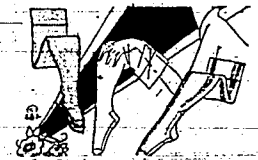

# Oklahomans Will Try to Wrest Dairy Cup From England

## THREE CLUB BOYS TO COMPETE IN CONTEST WITH LEADING TEAMS

### Trio Wins Right to Represent United States By Placing First in Memphis Dairy Exhibitions

(By The Associated Press)  
 STILLWATER, Okla., May 23.—On the shores of the Oklahoma 4-H club boys rest the responsibility of winning the famous Northcliffe cup from the British at the international dairy judging contest, in England this summer.

They are: Holland Williams, 18, Warrick; Forrest K. Burns, 17, Hillsdale; and Harold Woodson, 17, Altus. All are high school students. They won the right to represent the United States by placing first in a team in the national dairy show at Memphis, Tennessee, last fall. They were coached by B. A. Pratt, Oklahoma club agent, and A. W. Booth, extension chairman of Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical college, who likely will accompany the team to England.

The farming experience of each boy, in production as well as in judging, dates back several years. All have placed high at state and county fairs.

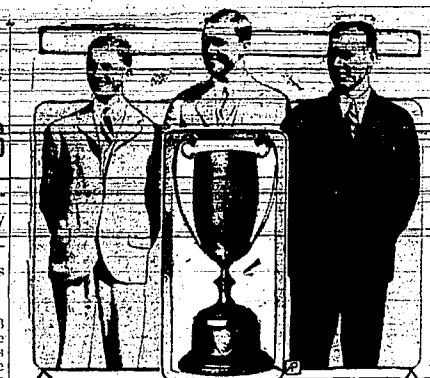
Burns fourth in the Memphis contest; Woodson fourth as an individual, while Woodson and Williams tied for fifth against 26 competitors from 26 states. Officials said the Oklahoma boys made the most consistent showing of any team ever entered in the national competition.

This is the first time Oklahoma has entered the annual contest, which started in 1922 when a Maryland team represented the United States and won the cup offered by the late Lord Northcliffe.

Another Maryland team reported in 1923. An Illinois team won the next year and a team from Iowa in 1926. Since then the British have held the cup in winning against a Maryland team in 1926 and successfully defending the cup against a team from Iowa in 1927 and a team from Nebraska in 1928.

The contest, which is held each year in conjunction with the Royal Agricultural Show, is inspired by Lord Northcliffe as a result of observation made during a visit to the United States in 1919.

He was impressed with the 4-H club movement, which has enrolled a membership of more than 600,000 farm boys and girls in this country, and in offering the championship cup sought to stimulate British interest in the international federation of young farmers' clubs.

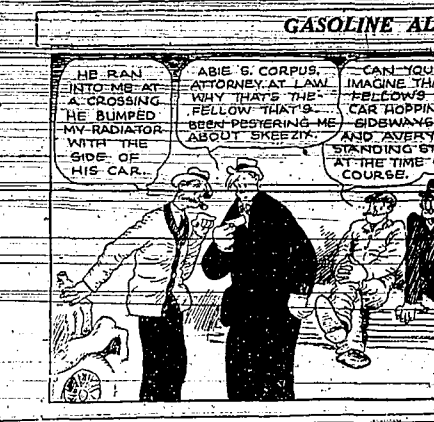

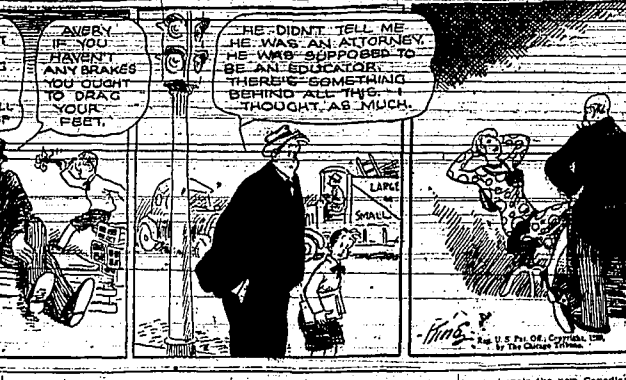

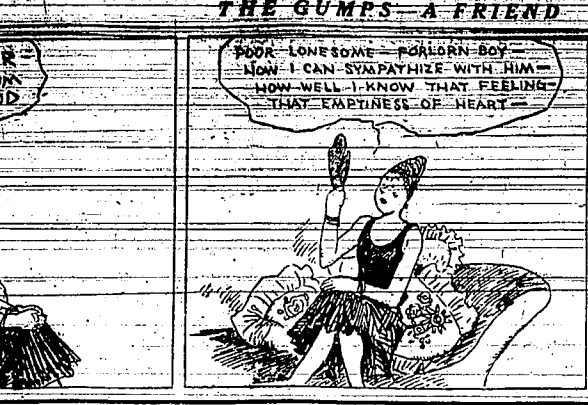
