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## LEADERS AT CAPITOL BEGIN CONSIDERING ALL-SUMMER RECESS

### "So Far We Have Accomplished Nothing," Says Senator Borah in Demand for Action On Measure

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON, Associated Press Staff Writer. WASHINGTON, May 24.—The administration leaders at the capitol turned today to serious consideration of an all-summer recess with the understanding that the recess would be followed by a vote on the tariff bill.

Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican leader, incident to the movement for a recess beginning early next month and continuing until September if an agreement of a definite date for the final vote in the senate on the tariff bill.

Admonishes Senate. Senator Watson, in admonishing the senate to act, declared that no adjournment would be taken until the tariff bill is enacted in the house and senate have completed action on the pending re-appeal bills and until the tariff bill is referred to the senate finance committee.

House leaders already have announced they are ready to quit for two months after the tariff measure is passed next week.

Idaho opens her season at Moscow September 20 against Montana State college.

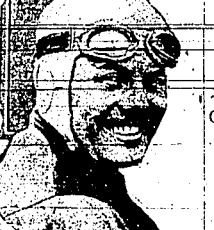

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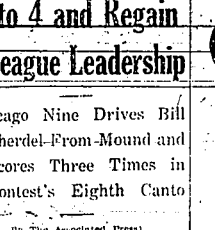
