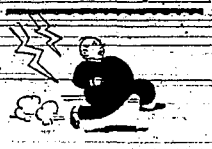

Husky Crew Stroke Helps Foes to Victory in Regattas

Former Washington Oarsmen Play Part in Beating Leader

Publicity and Honor Accruing From Success of Contender Method Welcome But Hard On Old Alma Mater

By FRANK GOHIE, (Associated Press Sports Writer) SEATTLE, May 26—The publicity and honor accruing from the success of the Contender Washington stroke is all very nice, but it certainly is tough on the crew coaches that stay at their alma mater.

The University of Washington crew in years past was able to defeat the Golden Bears of the Pacific almost at will, and the Huskies won several intercollegiate regattas at Poughkeepsie. It is different now that former Washington oarsmen are coaching all over the country.

Using the famous Hiram Conbar stroke, Washington oarsmen occasionally led California boats across the finish line by as much as 10 lengths over a three-mile course.

But in 1929 California decided it had enough punishment, and hired two former Washington coxswains, W. E. Bright as head coach and Russ Nagler as assistant. The new coaches quelled the Bears that year while the new menators were molding their material into shape.

Spelled Defeat That was the last victory for a Washington variety crew against California. The Bears defeated the Huskies on the Oakland, California, course in 1927, and repeated again this year at Oakland.

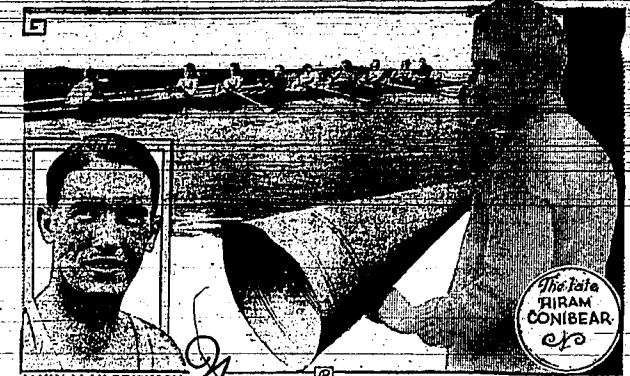
Hiram Conbar was Washington's first crew coach. He never pulled a racing oar in his life, but he evolved the system so extensively used throughout the United States today.

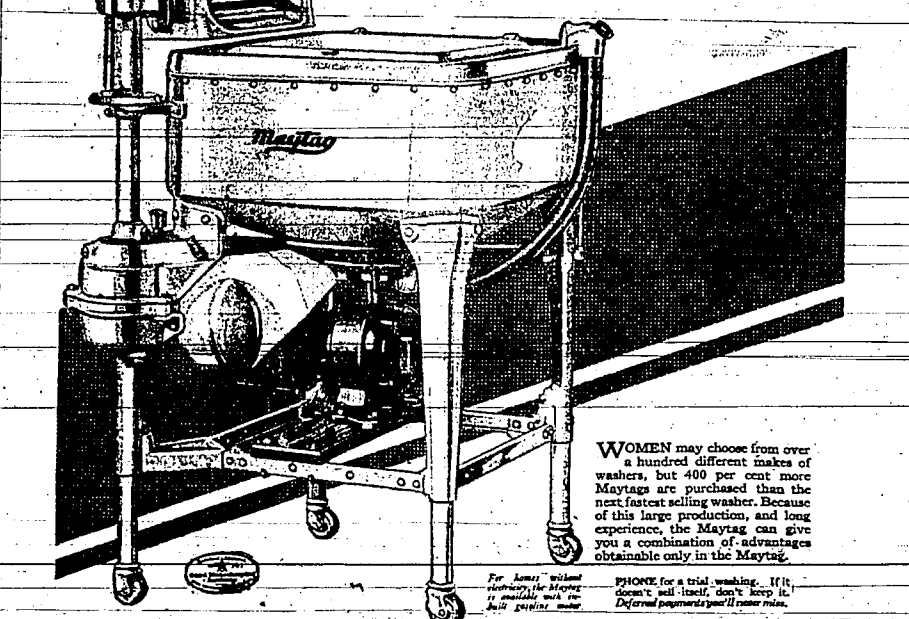

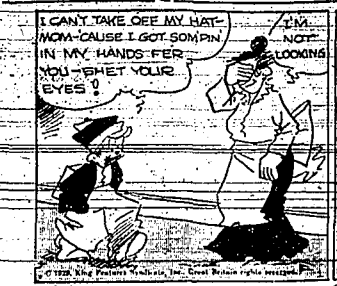

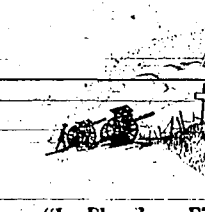

MOUNT OF HOLY CROSS IN COLORADO MAY BE NATIONAL SHRINE

PRESIDENT HOOVER'S SIGNATURE ALONE CAN FINISH MONUMENT

Symbol in Eternal Snows May Continue to Glean For Centuries Free From Blot of Commercialism

(By The Associated Press) DENVER, May 25.—Only the signature of President Hoover is needed to make a national shrine of the Mount of the Holy Cross in Colorado, where eternal snows gleam as they have for centuries.

The cross, made of perpetual snow that has lodged in deep crevices in the sheer granite face of the mountain, has become world famous. In the summer months it shines forth with unusual distinctness, the other snow on the mountain having melted.

It has been the inspiration for a great devotional pilgrimage of all denominations. This summer there will be another on July 8 and lasting for 10 days. With the mountain set aside as a national shrine, it is believed that the place long looked upon with superstitious awe by Mexicans and Indians will become the mecca for thousands from all over the world.

Many Visitors. Last year visitors from 25 states, the District of Columbia and Canada journeyed to the mountain and looked with reverence upon this impressive natural symbol of Christianity.

The Mount of the Holy Cross is 13,896 feet above sea level. The cross itself is 1200 feet tall and 400 feet wide. The United States forestry service is constructing new trails up the mountain, and an automobile road is being built from Minturn, Colorado, to the base camp of the pilgrims at Camp Pigeon, which will be able to care for 5000 visitors this year.

Pushing Project. The forestry service has been pushing the project to make a national shrine of the mountain. Under the antiquities act of 1906 the president has the power to declare by proclamation certain objects or areas having unique scientific or scientific interest as national monuments. The Smithsonian institution has designated the Mount of the Holy Cross as a valuable monument. It had been hoped the president would sign the proclamation before the next pilgrimage. Father J. P. Carrigan, Glenwood Springs, Colorado, has worked zealous-

ly for several years to have the beautiful mountain saved for all time from exploitation or commercial interest and to keep it as a place of devotion.

Associated with him are a number of men of various faiths so that the religious exercises at the mountain will be strictly non-sectarian. Colonel W. S. French, in charge of forestry around the mountain, brought the project to the attention of Washington officials.

As a national monument the mountain will take in three square miles of territory to include the mountain itself and the "Roof of Tears," or natural amphitheatre, at its foot. Notch mountain, one mile from the cross, where the religious services will be held during the pilgrimages, will also be included. From Notch mountain there is a magnificent view of the snowy cross.

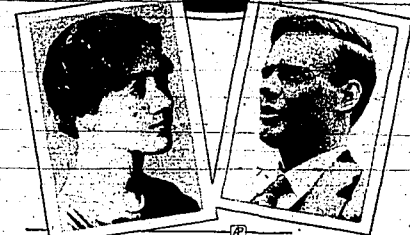
Face Difficulty The curious thousands will find it difficult to attend the wedding if it is held here. A boat ride of an hour is necessary and after one lands on the island there are no motels, no boarding houses, no hotels, and no inns.

The Morrow home is a rambling wood structure of colonial type. It stands on the site of the first cottage built on the island, the chimney of Deacon Brewster's farm house being visible from the living room of the Morrow home.

The Lindberghs may elect to spend their honeymoon on North Haven and the rocky beaches and beautiful views offer a number of retreats where the public mind is not likely to interfere. However, outside the 18-mile stretch of island and beyond the Atlantic surges and retreats in endless answer to the moon's beckoning.

Steamers stop at North Haven twice daily, tying up at an ancient dock to unload mails and supplies. Few passengers except the regular mail trip but many are expected when the date for the wedding is announced.

The town of North Haven is a block long and one block wide. A cluster of white frame buildings, a store or two, no sidewalks, no paved streets and not a great deal of activity. Down Main street the walk is of the wedding, but it is quiet talk. "It will be a great thing for the island."

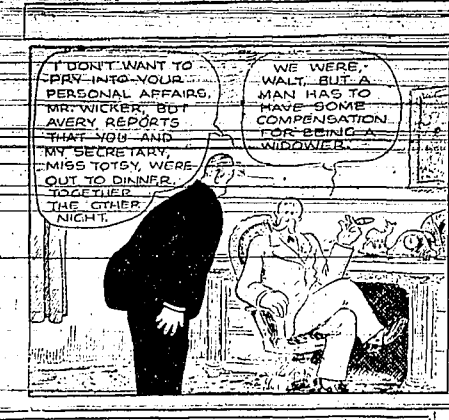

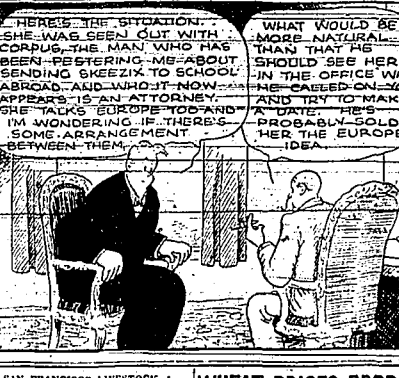

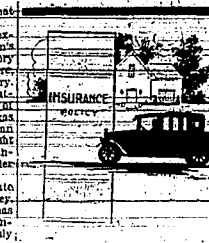

SHEMANOAH CRASH HERO SEES DIRIGIBLE AS SAFE
 PITTSBURGH, May 25 (AP)—Falls in the increasing safety of dirigibles is professed by a survivor and hero of one of the worst dirigible disasters in this country.
 Lieutenant Charles E. Baugh, who successfully maneuvered to safety by one section of the ill-fated Shenandoah when it broke up over Ohio recently expressed his confidence in the safety of dirigible travel.
 Lieutenant Baugh, the official navy representative on the return trip of the Graf-Zeppelin to Germany last year said:
 "We encountered worse squalls in the Graf Zeppelin than the one which broke up the Shenandoah."
 "Just as automobiles have been made safer by improvements in manufacture, so have dirigibles. For instance, the control cabin on the Shenandoah was being built underneath with the ship, as in the Los Angeles and the Graf."

Among Indians who once inhabited what is now Texas.
 The Canadian river valley in the Texas Panhandle will be Dr. W. C. Holden's laboratory. He is head of the history department at Kentucky college here, and an authority on West Texas history. A party led by Dr. Holden has excavated what he claims is the first evidence of pre-pueblo culture to be found in Texas. The find is in the ruins of an Indian village. Now he believes that pueblo and pre-pueblo life among southwestern Indians covered a much wider area than history has recorded.
 This spring Dr. Holden will excavate throughout the Canadian river valley, assisted by archeologists. The area has long been known as a mine rich in ancient Indian artifacts, but has been only slightly studied.

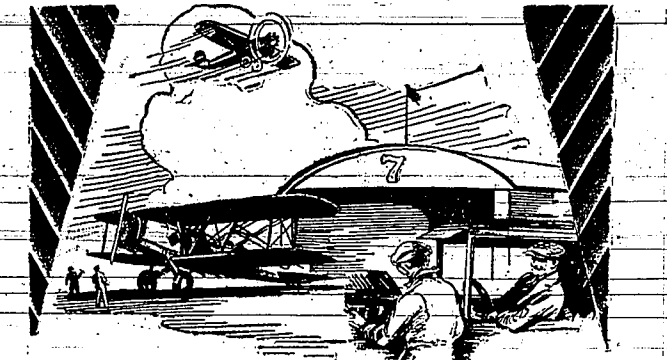
