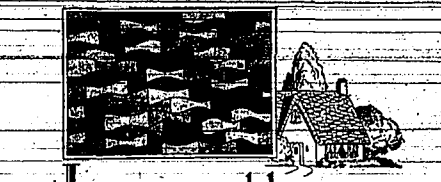
Motion pictures of the stock judging team, which have not been shown previously in Idaho, were purchased by Twin Falls merchants.

VENERABLE MEN OF CIVIL WAR ARMIES LEAD IN MEMORIAL

Veterans of Three Wars to Play Part With National Guards and Auxiliaries in Observance of Day

In the forefront of the parade and at the ceremonies with which memorial tribute will be paid in Twin Falls tomorrow to fallen soldiers and sailors of American wars, there will be found the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic which, 61 years ago, organized and observed the first Memorial day.

There will be only four or five of these venerable veterans—"Their own estimates" last evening put the maximum number at six or seven. But certain it is that every Civil War veteran who is physically able to attend, will be on hand to play his part in the annual tribute to the memory of his departed comrades.

There will be, also, a major proportion of the membership of General Lawton post, Spanish War Veterans, numbering nearly 50.

And there will be, perhaps, a greater number of the veterans of the World

War.

Kimberly American Legion post will join in the march here and attend the exercises to follow the parade at the cemetery. Dr. J. N. Davis, commander of the Kimberly post, told members of the Legion here yesterday.

Twin Falls units of Idaho national guard engineers will march as an escort to the Civil War veterans who will lead the parade, and the guardsmen will file the salute at the conclusion of the exercises at the cemetery.

Twin Falls municipal band will precede the veterans and their escort in the march, and will play two numbers during the exercises.

Other organizations that will have a place in the march include the Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, American War Mothers, American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of Veterans, Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and Boy Scouts.

HOLLISTER BATTLES FOR WATER SUPPLY

Salmon River Project Center in Court to Stop Operation of Pumping Plant

Hollister, center of the Salmon River irrigation project, went to court Tuesday to stop operation of a pump on an artesian well which, it is alleged, reduces flow from two other wells owned by the village so that both other wells supply is seriously impaired.

In a complaint filed for Hollister trustees by Bothwell and Chapman, attorneys for the village, the court was asked for court order granting exclusive right to Hollister to use of waters "flowing from or located in" Hollister town wells, a temporary order was asked to restrain Frank Jewett from operating a pump on his well located near site of the Hollister wells.

The two wells, one known as the "town" well and the other as the A. F. Craven well, afford Hollister's only source of water for municipal and domestic use and for fire protection, it is asserted.

Jewett, according to the complaint, did not begin to operate a pump on his well until last May 21. As a result of the pumping, flow of water from the town well ceased entirely. It is asserted, and the flow from the town well alone was inadequate for Hollister's requirements.

Upon request of Hollister trustees, the complaint recites, Jewett stopped his pump for three days beginning May 24, and during that period, it is stated, Hollister received its usual and ordinary water supply. Thereafter, it is stated, Jewett resumed operation of the pump and declared to decide.

Hollister's trustees, who are plaintiffs in this action are E. E. Lawrence, Harry H. Coffin, Hal Wallington, Joe Abbott and A. F. Craven.


