BILL MAKES HOUSE REAPPORTIONMENTS AUTOMATIC PROCESS

Senate Passes Bill Approved by Administration, by Vote of 57 to 26 and Finishes Important Task

By RAYMOND Z. HENLE (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, May 29.—Automatic reapportionment of the house of representatives on the basis of census taken every 10 years would be provided in a bill passed by the senate today, 57 to 26, and sent to the house.

A similar proposal, which has stirred up nearly 10 years of controversy, was approved by the house last week. The measure has been decided upon for the summer recess.

In connection with the reapportionment of persons living in the United States, the census would embrace a survey of unemployment. It would be taken by the census takers, and experts employed under civil service regulations.

The bill, which had administration approval, would direct the president to submit to congress next December a bill to reapportion congress on the basis of the census taken every 10 years.

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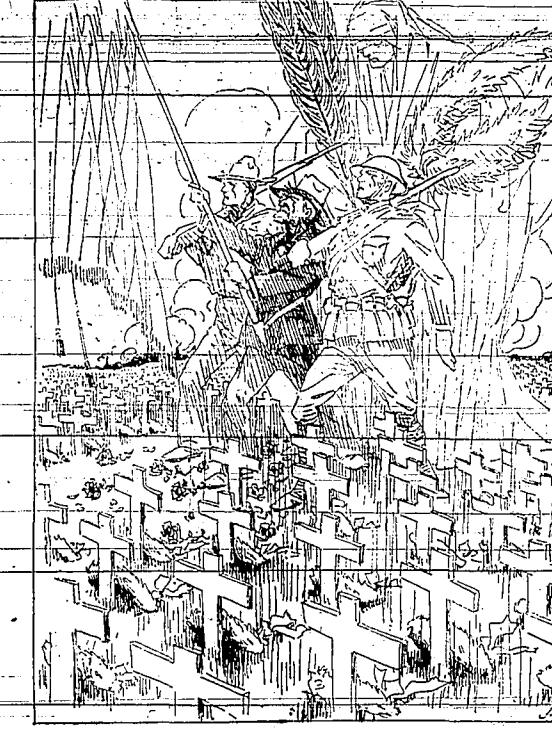

BUSINESS SUSPENDS DURING TRIBUTE TO NATION'S WAR DEAD Arrangements Complete For Observance of Memorial Day; Flags Float Over Graves of 75 Veterans

Business and all ordinary vocations will be suspended in Twin Falls through out today while fitting tribute is paid to the memory of the nation's war dead. Flags of the nation they pledged their lives to defend floated last evening over the graves in Twin Falls cemetery of 75 veterans of American wars.

Early this morning women of the Grand Army of the Republic, the American War Mothers and American Auxiliary will place upon three graves the garlands and wreaths of flowers that they fashioned last evening out of an abundant floral offering given for the purpose by patriotic women.

Order of March The parade will form under direction of Captain P. W. McRoberts, officer of the day, and in the march, led by Twin Falls municipal band there will be a company of the Civil war, with Twin Falls unit of Idaho national guard engineers as an escort, Spanish war veterans, World War veterans, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, American War Mothers, American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of Veterans, Girl Scouts, and the G. D. R. G. D. R. will be together with such other organizations as may accept a general invitation that has been extended.

During assembly of the marching organizations, wreaths will be laid at the Memorial monument by representatives of veterans and auxiliary organizations, and this ceremony will be repeated at the Memorial monument in the cemetery.

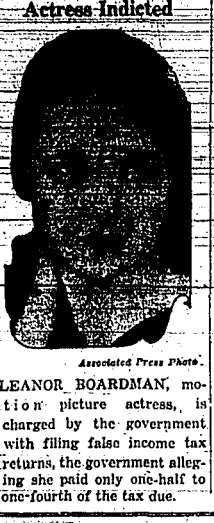

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In Honor: Observance of Memorial day is by no means to be regarded in any sense as a glorification of war.

It is, on the contrary, primarily a time set apart for expression of reverence for those qualities of self-sacrifice and devotion to a cause they believed to be right, that have been demonstrated by individuals who have been called into the armed service of the nation.

Let us then at the appointed time gather around their sacred remains and give to their names the prominence above them with the choicest flowers of Springtime; let us raise above them the dear flag that they saved from dishonor; let us in this solemn presence renew our pledges to all that we see in these days of the left among us, a sacred charge upon a Nation's gratitude—the soldiers and sailors' widows and orphans.

There was need for Memorial day when it was given a place on the Nation's calendar. Twice since that day the nation has passed triumphantly through the stress of armed conflict.

Significance of Memorial day has been extended to include not only the fallen of the great Civil conflict, but its tribute embraces the soldier and sailor dead of all American wars. While the men whose hearts and brains conceived the first Memorial day are passing swiftly from the scene of action, the day itself is observed from year to year on a broadening scale.

It will continue to be observed so long as there shall remain any spark of appreciation of the heroic virtues of the nation's fighting sons, and of their contribution to the building of this nation.

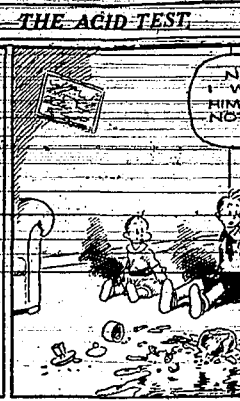

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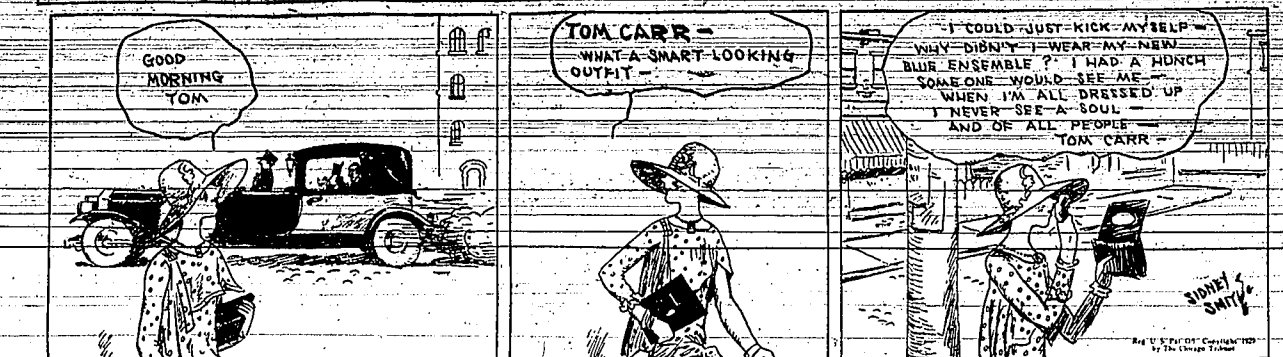

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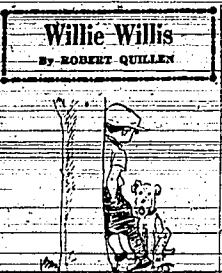
