Time for 100-Yard Dash Twice Tied in Meet at Windy City

332 Contestants From 28 States Finish Assault in Preliminaries of National Affair at Stagg Field

CHICAGO, June 7.—A world record was set today as the record for the 100-yard dash was tied twice and a record for the meet was smashed as 332 athletes from 29 universities and colleges in 28 states finished their assault in the preliminaries of the national collegiate track and field championships on Stagg field today.

Pete Pismus of Ohio State university set a new world's record for the discus today. He tossed the missile 150 feet 17 3/8 inches leading the qualifiers for the finals tomorrow. This performance bested the former record of 148 feet 10 inches, made by Gus Houser of the University of Southern California in 1926.

NEW YORK, June 7 (AP)—Half a dozen times a year Jack Ottman is at breakfast dinners in an upper room of a "slaughter house" near the Hudson waterfront.

He has been holding the dinners for almost 10 years now, and although fewer than 200 New Yorkers are at the combined guest lists, the feasts are becoming something of a town tradition.

"Slaughter house" is rather a libelous nickname for the building in which the dinners are held. It is a meat export plant which is supplied to steakhouses and to hotels and clubs.

"Another slight leads to the banquet hall—a refrigerated work room by day—where three inches of sawdust cover the floor and table tops are set on sawhorses.

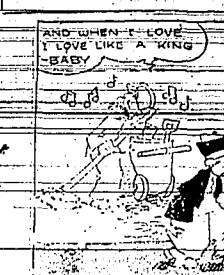

Washington, June 7 (AP)—One in every five members of house or senate of the seventy-first congress is some sort of a war veteran.

World-war veterans are represented as well as the Boxer rebellion in China and the Philippine insurrection. There also are veterans of the Mexican border mobilization of 1910 and many, many ex-national guardsmen.

Even the feminine membership of the house has its war veterans. Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen of Florida was a nurse with British forces in the Egypt-Palestine campaign, and Mrs. Edith Rogers of Massachusetts a Red Cross worker.

Proud Records... You can find in the official biographies, also men who note service on wartime draft boards as volunteers on the staff of war-time agencies like the food administration, state, county or city defense committee, veterans, and even one to see the fighting men off to France at the dock is recorded.

Nineteen senators disclose war records. Warren, Wyoming, of course, heads the list with his service in a Massachusetts foot regiment in the Civil war. The house also has its Civil war

Double Heroes... Seven members, three in the senate and four in the house, are two-war men. They served in both the war with Spain and the World war.

Spanish and World war veterans are in about equal proportions in the senate, but in the house, with a score or so of war with Spain men, the World war service group is more than three times as large.

There are more ex-infantrymen, of course, than anything else, but cavalry, artillery, air corps, tank corps and even gas warfare and the army medical corps are included, besides military lawyers, intelligence officers and other forms of "brass hat" staff service.

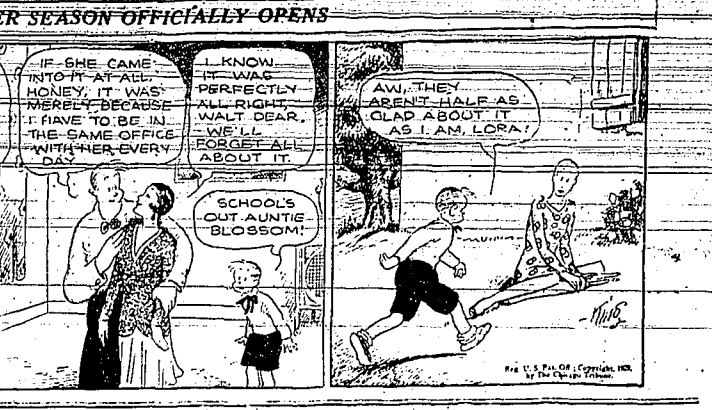

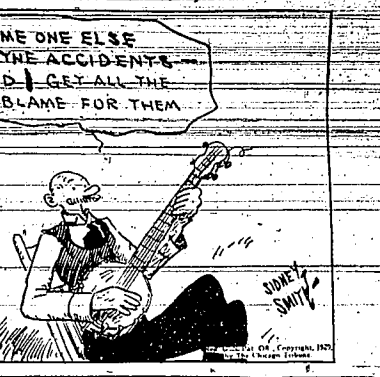

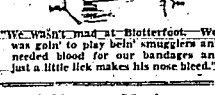
