CONTRACTOR SPEEDS TO COMPLETION OF TWIN FALLS AIRPORT

Road Building Outfit in Action to Clear and Level Local Landing Field in Time For Dedication

Road building equipment is being used by William Hurling, contractor to complete Twin Falls airport, five miles south of town, by the end of next week to receive the biggest planes now in use.

Effort is directed toward putting the landing field in shape for reception of some planes next Thursday, when it is to be dedicated by Major General Hubert L. Bullard during his visit here on a trip through Idaho.

Using 24 head of horses on two sagebrush mowers and a heavy road roller, the contractor, since last Monday when the contract was awarded, has cleared the main runway, 400 feet long. He has engaged for this week a heavy tractor and six plow for use in grading and leveling.

Continuous sprinkling also will be started Monday to assist in compacting the earth and setting all dirt.

It is confidently expected that it was stated at Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce last evening that sufficient machinery will be received at the middle of the week to receive all medium sized planes, and that all construction will be completed by the end of the week.

Hanger locations have been provided for, and hangers heretofore located along Decoy field east of Twin Falls, will be moved to the new location this week.

Four large airplane cabins, each capable of from four to 14 passengers each, already have been chartered for use on the new field. It was announced in the chamber of commerce meeting of these planes, it was stated, could have landed at Twin Falls except for adequate facilities that are now being provided.

Russian Government Offers Bargains for Births and Deaths of People

DYING PERSONS MAY CHOOSE ONE OF TWO KINDS OF FUNERALS

Despite Easy Marriage and Divorce Laws Number of New Born Children Abandoned Shows Decline

By J. EDWARD ANGLY (Associated Press Staff Writer)

MOSCOW, June 8.—The bustle of buying horns and of dying is different in Russia from that elsewhere.

Childbirth is one of the things to which the Soviet government gives more attention than governments in capitalist countries. Every working woman who is going to have a child goes six weeks off at full pay. The state provides 3250 institutions for confinements, and 6000 nurseries to care for new-born babies. In fact, the government makes for these services are quite small in the case of communists or women who belong to trade unions. For the most part, organizations in Russia outside of the Communist party itself—charges come to but a few dollars, sometimes only a few cents.

Birth Rate High

Russia has a birth rate higher than any European country. Last year it was 44 per 1000 of population, more than twice that of England or France. The number of new-born children who are abandoned, once a great problem, steadily declines in spite of easy marriage and easier divorces. One can get married and divorced several times a day. If one marries, but the government will not let the parents escape the responsibility of supporting their children. If the parenthood can be established.

Abandoned waifs are sent to institutions. An organization is conducted by the government to find shelter for the homeless for children let loose on their own. Those who adopt them receive a complete outfit of clothing for their charges, and from \$10 to \$15 a month towards the support of the child.

Two Kinds of Funerals

And when one comes to die in Russia, one has a choice of two kinds of funerals—red and white.

Old-fashioned folk, with perhaps some "bourgeois prejudices" are still attached to their church, have white funerals. The coffin, the hearse, the robes of the chief mourners and the flowers over the horse are all of white. Black enclosed hearses, common in most countries—never are seen. The Russian hearse is an open affair, not unlike a gun caisson.

Communists have red funerals, the coffin and the flowers always being of that color. Often there is a band, military or civilian. Chanting by priests and chorists, who, in the old days invariably walked at the head of the funeral cortege, now is forbidden.

Supposedly no place exists for sentiment and tears in the Communist scheme of things. It is not uncommon to see those who walk to cemeteries in funeral processions chatting and laughing as they go along the road. Sometimes one observes the minor reading newspapers on their way to the cemetery.

Two Discoveries May be Aid in Tuberculosis War

RAILROAD ANNOUNCES NEW JEROME TRAIN SCHEDULE

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Staff Editor)

ATLANTIC CITY, June 8.—A new achievement in tuberculosis research is announced in a bulletin from the National Tuberculosis association today.

The treatment, based on substances until recently unknown, is the work of Rockefeller Institute with chemists discovered at Yale university.

Another great scientific advance was announced from the University of Chicago. It is a purification of tuberculin, intended to get rid of impurities that were claimed to have been the cause of past uncertainties in this widely used test.

Both achievements are steps in a national joint research by 17 universities or other large institutions.

It is literally taking apart the bodies of tuberculosis germs, to discover which section causes the disease, and then to get an antidote.

Today's announcements indicate that the scientists have proceeded far on their long trail. For seven years they have been quietly at it, directed by a

UNCLE SAM TO TAKE CARE OF 700 WOMEN FEDERAL EMPLOYEES

Although Some of Government Hotels Will Give Way to New Structures Condition Will Be Same

By SUE McNAMARA (Associated Press Feature Writer)
WASHINGTON, June 8.—Although some of the government hotels for women are to be torn down to make room for senate garages, the 700 women living in them still will be taken care of by Uncle Sam.

What is known as the plaza group of government hotels, built of hollow tile and vinyl covered, still is standing, and into this group the women are moving bag and baggage.

Here they will continue to find a combination of hotel and home environment for the low cost of \$50 a month. Some of the women have been in government hotels since they were built in 1919.

There have been weddings in the grey buildings with the green shutters. The rooms are decorated gaily and the other women cluster round as guests at a huge wedding cake is baked in the big airy kitchen which provides meals for 400 each day.

Mrs. Sarah E. Sumner, who formerly had charge of tourist headquarters in Yellowstone Park, is general manager of the government hostels. She has been running them ever since the war. To her come girls and women ranging in age from 18 to 70 seeking buildings of advice.

A tour of the buildings discloses why some of the women have preferred government owned hotels for 10 years to private homes or rooming houses. The kitchen dining room is light and airy. In the kitchen were 120 loaves of fresh baked bread—the daily average baked and consumed in the various hotels. Refreshments were making crisp salads to be put in the ice box for the evening meal. There was a savory odor of baked beans.

Pictures of Lindbergh adorned the walls of one of the cozy bedrooms. Easy to see was secured by one of the younger government clerks. Bouquets of flowers and a sewing basket identified another room as belonging to a woman named Marie Crave. Each room contained a desk, several chairs, single bed, clothes chest and tin and cold running water. In addition to her room Miss Crave had a day each guest for 450 a month, is entitled to the use of laundry, shower baths, hotel service and care in the infirmary if she is ill.

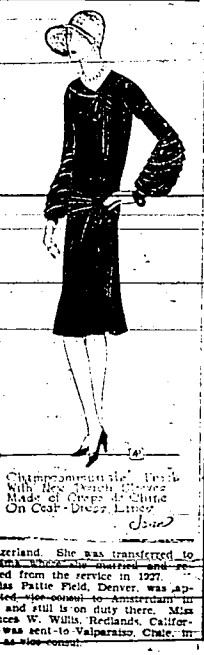

Clothing for Women Gains in Production

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Manufacture of women's clothing has increased 195 per cent since 1923, according to data collected by the department of commerce.

The establishments engaged primarily in the manufacture of women's clothing in 1927 reported products valued at \$1,494,601,944. This represents an increase of 155 per cent as compared with \$1,293,705,291 reported for 1925, the last preceding census.

The "largest" firm manufactured there were 47,933,718 of these, representing a cost of \$509,544,944. Coats come next, representing a value of \$294,420,469.

The women's clothing industry is concentrated to a large extent in eight cities—New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Boston, St. Louis, Los Angeles and Baltimore.

The nation's former chief citizen was Calvin Coolidge, a product of the rural schools of Vermont. Today her leading citizen is a country boy, Herbert Hoover, from the rural schools of Iowa.

In less prominent places like the character of the citizenship of our large towns and cities is influenced—if not determined, by the character of the country young men and women who become its bank presidents, managers of industrial enterprise, school board members and regular law-paying citizens.

It is of greatest importance to the nation that a high standard of instruction and teaching personnel be maintained in the rural schools, since these products are to have these important places in the business and political life of the world.

Because the child is both a rural citizen and a northern Maine is no less a citizen of the United States.

Therefore, it is not enough for Los Angeles that her own city have million dollar schoolhouses and an unwarmed corps of teachers. She has reason to be interested that this child who goes to school in northern Maine may become a part of the citizenship, that also an opportunity for an adequate education.

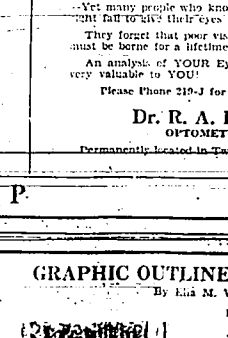
While waiting for their assignments they are learning about their new duties. Foreign service officers of high standing and long experience serve as instructors in the school.

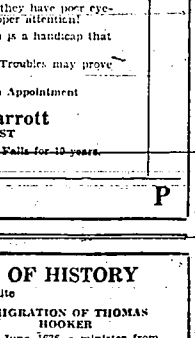

FEATURE FLASHES FROM FAR-FLUNG FOREIGN FIELDS

Japan Forms New Ministry to Aid In Empire's Expansion Overseas; Organization Cabinet's Thirteenth

Oriental Nation's Interests Outside of Original Islands of Nippon Take Many Forms and New Body Will Be Divided Into Several Sections to Handle Government Administration

(Associated Press Correspondent)

TOKYO, June 8.—To coordinate the varied forms of Japanese expansion overseas, a new ministry is being added to the government. It is the thirteenth portfolio in the imperial cabinet. Although large questions of policy are reserved for higher authority, the new department is charged with the application of all the remedies prescribed by high imperial policy for alleviating the Empire's growing pains. It combines widely diversified functions hitherto scattered among several ministries. The department is commonly referred to as the ministry of colonies, but, another name is eagerly sought. Korea, once a proud and independent empire, objects to being considered a colony on the same footing as Formosa and Sachalin. Overseas emigration comes within the ministry's province, and it is feared Brazil and other countries in which Japanese are settling may be sensitive if this activity is directed by a "colonial ministry." Other objections refer to the ministry's projected control over Japanese interests in Manchuria, where Chinese sovereignty is recognized.

Many New Forms
Japanese expansion outside the original islands of Nippon has taken many forms, and the new ministry is to be divided into several sections. First is the large overseas dependencies of Korea, with a population of 20,000,000, annexed in 1910 by treaty between the Emperor of Japan and the Emperor of Korea. Second, there are Formosa and Southern Sachalin, gained by war from China and Russia, respectively. Third come the Manchuria railway zone, held under 99-year leases which recognize the sovereignty of China, and fourth, the former German islands in the equatorial Pacific, held by Japan under a League of Nations mandate.

French General Bans Memory of Massacre

FEZ, Morocco, June 8 (AP)—In June 1912, a thousand Arab horsemen swooped down upon the European city here and slaughtered 61 Frenchmen.

In June 1929, Frenchmen here wanted to commemorate the "sacrifice" and organized a ceremony. But General Count de Chambrun, descendant of Lafayette, ruled that the ceremony should not take place. "I don't see why we should want to commemorate a thing like that. I rather think we should forget it," the governor said.

COSTS EXCESSIVE

KOERLIN, Germany, June 8 (AP)—This municipality of 3300 population has found the cost of city administration too high. Consequently the city council has applied for legal sanction to surrender the city charter and reincorporate as a village.

Special bureaus in the ministry deal with the finances of the overseas dependencies, supervise their budgets and coordinate their efforts at commercial and industrial expansion. Governors general of Korea, Formosa, Sachalin and the Kwantung leased territory, who formerly reported direct to the premier, under the new plan report to "his" minister.

Korea's protest against being placed under the new department has been vigorous and ardent. More anti-Japanese feeling there than has been manifest at any time since civilian government was substituted for the military regime in 1919. Influential Korean public bodies have sent strong protests to Tokyo, while the central council at Seoul, composed of Korean leaders, who act as a privy council to the gov-

Miss Auto-Dore is a shiny new slot machine with her name painted defiantly across her brow. By inserting a sixpence or a shilling, late shoppers can obtain all sorts of the forbidden fruits on Dora's taboo.

Selling such articles in a shop after 8 P. M. is punished by severe fines. There is no law covering slot machines, however, and pounds and pounds worth of dainties found ready purchasers within the first hour of Miss Auto-Dore's appearance.

It is said that thousands of these machines are to be on duty throughout the country. The long-suffering public, recently roused by the Home Secretary, Sir William Joyson-Hicks's defiant defiance of Dora, is laughing up its sleeve. "What can she do now?" says Mr. Joyson-Hicks. "She gives the glad eye to Miss Auto-Dore."

ITALY ORDERS HATS FOR ALL STUDENTS

Fascist Government Moves to Aid One of Largest Industries in Country

ROME, June 8 (AP)—Straw hats will be practically obligatory for all Italian university students this summer, by the terms of a circular issued by Deputy Turati, secretary of the Fascist party, who has been designated by Mussolini as chief of the Fascist university groups.

The headpieces will be decorated with wide ribbons of the colors of the wearer's "faculty" or department—law, letters, medicine, engineering and the like. In addition there will be a smaller band of the colors of the particular university—Rome, Naples, Padua or Bologna. Once the scheme is worked out it will permit of close identification of each student.

Desire to boost the Italian straw hat industry is frankly avowed to be behind the plan. Until a couple of years ago, the bare-headed fad was prevalent among Italian youth, and many claimed that the hardening of their heads to the rays of the summer sun was healthful. This assertion however provoked outrage from the makers of hats, who constitute an important branch of Italian industry, and whose products are famous all over Europe. "The sailor straw," says Secretary Turati, "besides being an economic sort of headgear, gives the university student an air of academic elegance. Varsity men will thus be able to make their contribution to the prosperity of the nation."
