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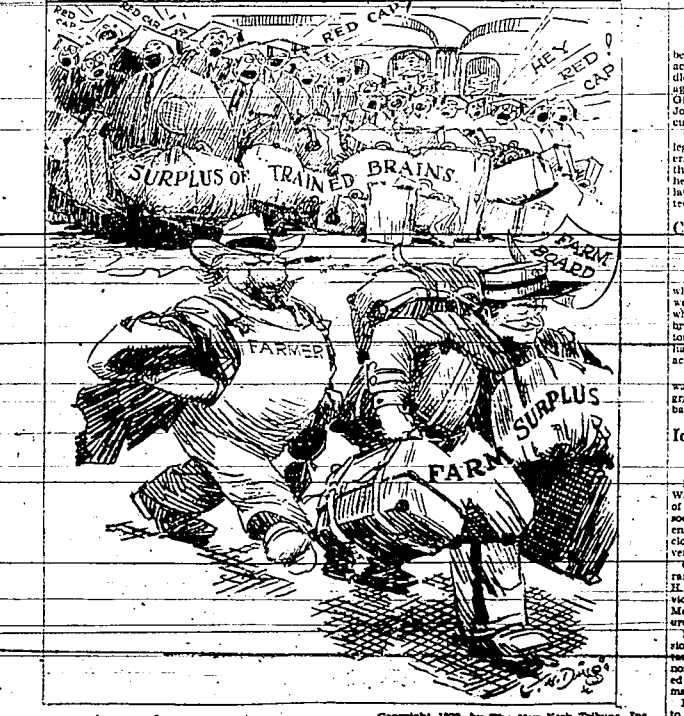

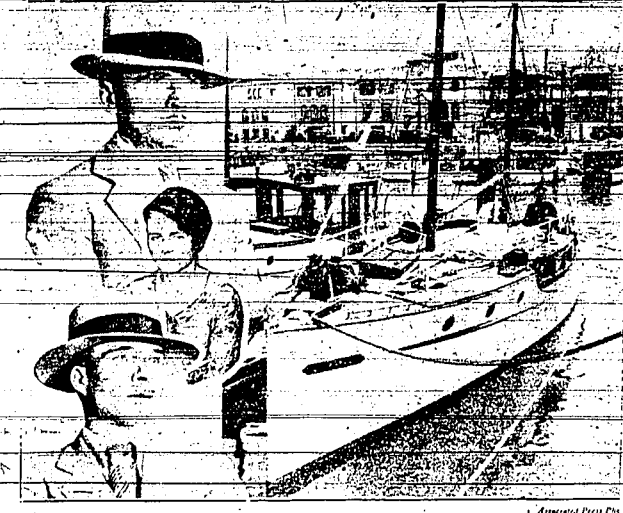
Austin Wins in Straight Sets, Bill Tilden and Helen Wills Victorious

While the courier did not mind telling the Indians and the Indian black chiefs, traded along trails and fought battles and animals until his tongue hung out.

These men were products of the fur trade, and trading companies of Great Britain, France and later, the United States, and their mission was to be the contact man with the Indians for their goods.

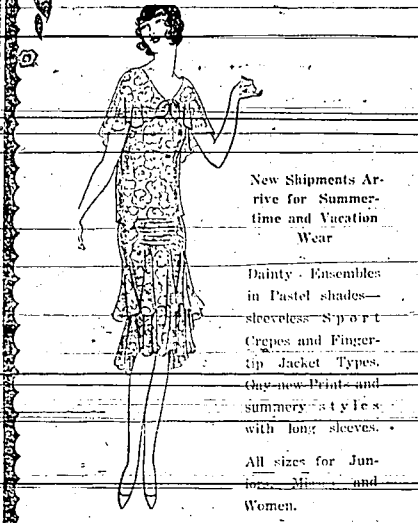

FORESTRY EXHIBIT IN GEM STATE CAPITOL

Map of Idaho One of Features Attracting Interest of Visiting Groups

BOISE, June 26 (Special to the news) Since the completion a few days ago of Idaho's forestry and timber exhibit in the statehouse, groups of persons may be seen most any time of the day standing before the large showcases intensely interested in what they contain. News and people are coming to the capitol to see it. The exhibit lines the two sides of the first floor corridor.

The first things to attract the eye are many beautifully colored, illuminated pictures each of which is more than a foot square. Each picture is fitted and set in a mahogany box frame with the lights behind it. There are 34 of these and they depict the beauties of Idaho's forests, the value of the resources there, the fire danger, the supply, the recreational advantages they offer, the destructiveness of forest fires among timber and the milling operations which reduce their rough logs to the grained timbers.

State Map Attracts
But the little groups of people who are constantly viewing the exhibit may usually be found studying the very interesting state map prepared in connection with the exhibit. It is under glass and is more than six feet long. The state boundaries are outlined in black about one and one-half inches wide and beyond the black there is a red border about one inch in width. All forest land in the state is shown in two shades of green. National forests are a blue green and other forest lands are in a yellowish green. The map also indicates water storage, roads, railroads, villages under 500 with a green pin, towns of 500 to 2000 with a red pin and all cities with a black pin.

Important statistics of which the map shows 44, are in the shape of a small map in relief. Forty-seven paper plants are shown in a similar manner. There are two colored charts one on either side of the map. One shows the character of forest land as follows:

Merchandise: 9,503,000 acres; protection forests used chiefly as protection against fires: 2,870,000 acres; forest growth which is preproductive: 7,041,000 acres and other lands within the forest area: 7,409,000 acres.

The other colored chart shows the ownership of the forest as follows: National forests, 15,373,000 acres; state forests, 990,000 acres; private forests, 4,321,000 acres and other federal lands, 1,470,000 acres.

Forest Service Cooperates
The exhibit is made possible through the cooperation of the United States forest service, the state board of publicity, the lumbermen of the state and the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce. Credit for actual preparation of the exhibit and setting it up goes to George L. Nichols of the United States forest service office at Odeon and K. A. Swan, assistant district forester of the Missoula forest office. Mr. Nichols has been working steadily on the exhibit for four months and the drawing of the map alone required 200 hours of work.

There are four large cases and three racks in addition to the map and 24 colored pictures. The entire front of each case is plate glass. In one of the various stages in the manufacture of material from Idaho white pine is shown. This same case shows miniature apple, lettuce, onion, prune, and beehive boxes all of which are made from Idaho forest products.

Another case shows miniature stacks of lumber as it is piled in yards, also piles of miniature fence posts, railroad ties, cedar poles, lath, mine timber and cord wood. In another case are various products of Idaho's lumber mill, including many kinds of millboards, siding, flooring and other products.

There is also a miniature forest lookout and pack train carrying supplies to fire fighters.

Two of the open racks contain samples of various woods found in Idaho forests. The majority of the samples are 1 x 12 inches and about six feet long. White pine, yellow pine, Douglas fir, white fir, cedar, larch and spruce are exhibited. The samples are most clearly grained and are varnished to obtain polish. Wood samples in the cases are also varnished.

The third rack has not yet been filled but it will contain sections cut from trees to show growth rings. These will be smoothed, polished and exhibited under strong lights. All the cases, as well as the boxes holding the pictures, are illuminated by invisible lights.

Civil War Veteran Tells of Thrilling Experiences Abroad

AGED MAN IN BOISE TELLS DETAILS OF BATTLE WITH SNAKE

B. B. Giles, Resident of Idaho 45 Years, May Be 107 Years Old; Wanderings Cover Remote Points

(By Associated Press) BOISE, June 26—Whether B. B. Giles is 99 or 107 years old many always remain a matter of conjecture but that he has had a record of experiences with setlings in a half dozen countries is definitely claimed by the judge-himself as he lies abed in the veterans' hospital in Boise with an infected foot.

He named the ill-of-judge by some as "Judge of the Peace" in Clayton, in Central Idaho. That was after he had already fought all the way through the Civil War, and several years before the mast, and lived through experiences in South America and Africa where he went as a youth to "try to make a man out of myself."

His record as a Civil War trooper would make him 40 years out of present age, but he insists he had to tell them that age to come within the age limit. Whether he was above the age limit or below it he will not tell, but acquiescence conveys the known from explorer records that he is now 107 years old.

Outwits Alligators
The story he likes best is the one about how he outwitted some Alligator natives and a hungry python to whom he had been offered as hors d'oeuvre.

Says he:
"The natives caught 12 of us and locked us in a cave. Each day they took one of us out and he didn't come back. Finally they were all gone but me. My turn came and they led me to another cave and I smelled right away what was in there—a snake and a big one. They blocked the door and left us in there to get acquainted, as it is called, with our competitors that had done before me. As soon as my eyes got used to the dark I saw a big hole in the side of the cave."

"When I looked in there I saw the glazy eyes of the snake. He didn't rush at me, because he seemed to know I wouldn't go away. There was a large and three-legged stool in the cave

and I jumped on the table with the stool in my hand and waited for the snake to come out. He slid out of the hole and down to the ground. I climbed right into the hole and pulled the stool in after me to block the hole."

Battles Abroad
The snake crawled around for several minutes trying to get to me but I held the stool against him. Finally he gave up and went back. It was then that the black doctor, carrying a large snake under his arm, came to see a bloated snake lying in a tortoise on the floor of the cave. The big python—the black doctor gobbled him down in place of me."

Giles came to the Wood River country 45 years ago from his home in New York and he says after he went to the Salmon country. Two years ago he came to the Old settlers home here on a return visit to Salem. It is the nephew of his old partner gave a dinner for his birthday on October 12, in the evening of the event the Salmon Recorder said:

"The cake was loaded down with 50 many candles that they almost set the house afire. The number of candles is not stated, but the press is authorized to state that Judge Giles is the oldest man living in Idaho. He has ever seen. 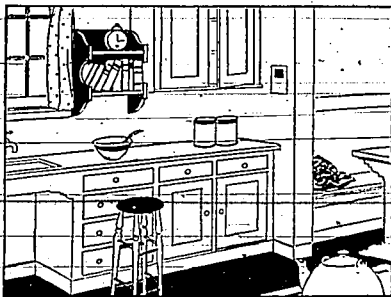
Gooding College Names Director of Dramatics

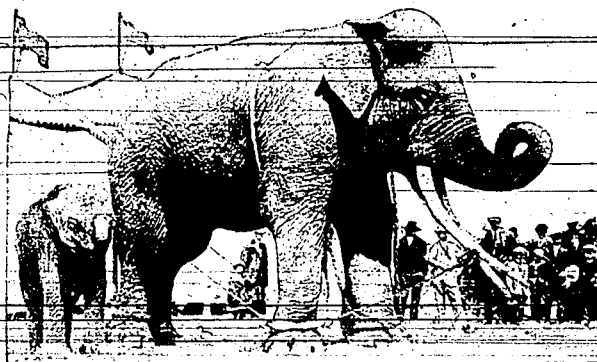

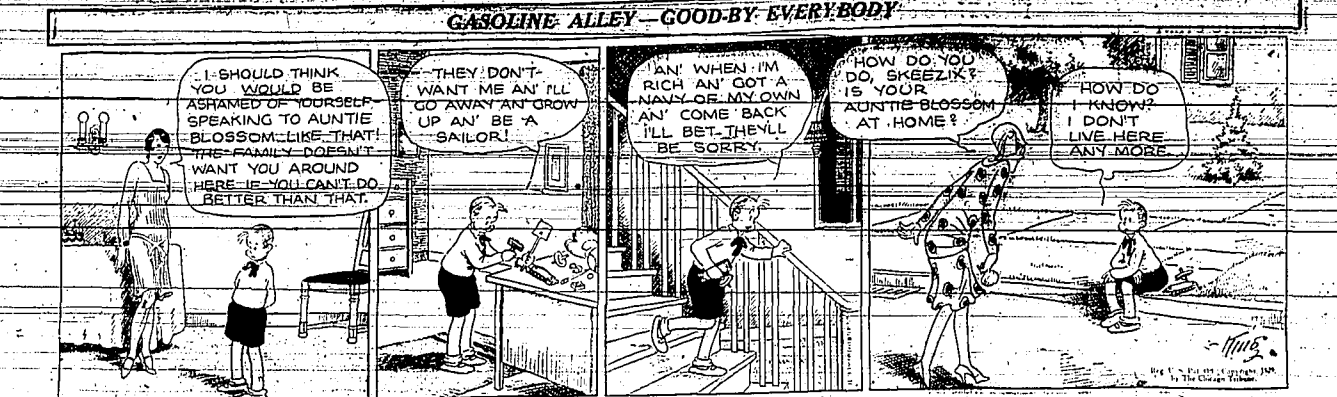

"A settlement," Victor Porle murmured, "which is a good many years overdue."

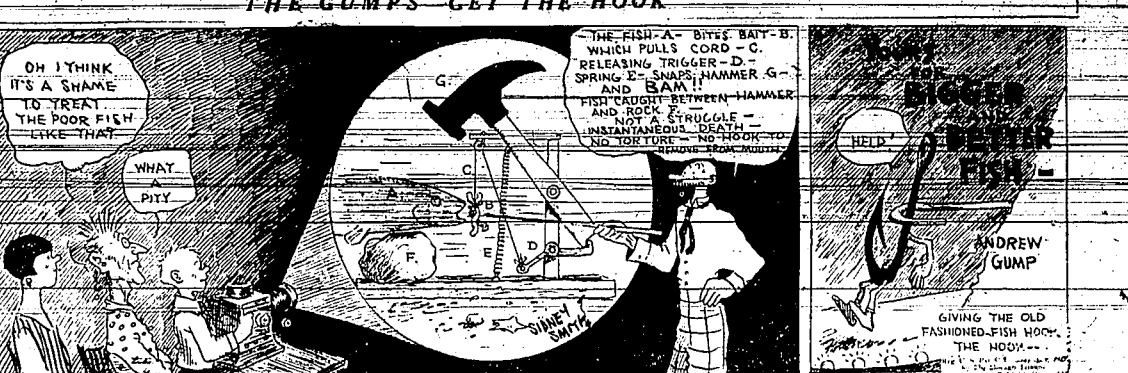
"If your remark is intended to relate to finance," Lord Ardington said coldly. "You do not seem to be in need of it. You are in better times than when you left us in San Paulo."

MANY TABOOS ON LIST OF BRITAIN'S CENSORS

LONDON, June 26 (AP)—Companionate marriage—between people's heads, and references to the Prince of Wales are considered impious—these are the taboos listed by the British Board of Film Censors in its report for 1928. It revealed that eight films out of 1947 submitted were completely banned, and 1,000 were amended or directed.

These reasons for censorship were listed: libelous reflections on royal dynasties; police firing on defenceless squires; reference to the Prince of Wales; handling, realistic and comic; methods of crime open to imitation; breaking bottles on a man's head; girls and women breathing; companionate marriage and excessive and sustained brutality.

Bavarian Custom Goes Into Discard by Order

MEUNCHEN-LAND, BAVARIA, June 22 (AP)—Strange customs among the country undertakers of upper Bavaria were disclosed when the "corpse waltzer" of the village of St. Wolfgang was arrested for having appropriated the almost new boots, socks, leggings and shirt of a mechanic killed in an accident.

With a show of offended innocence, the arrested told the court that, according to time honored custom, the wearing apparel of anyone killed in an accident became the property of the undertaker. He felt he was only 10 marks, which, he declared, was such a pittance sum that it had always been understood he might have the clothing.

The court with utter disregard for traditional custom sentenced the grasping undertaker to two months in jail.

FAKING-OF-PREHISTORIC RELICS-FRENCH PROBLEM

MOULINS, France, June 25 (AP)—What article in the *Parisian* last week covers the faking of prehistoric relics is the problem which has been puzzling the police here following the report of Professor Bovey, a Paris expert, that the famous Cro-Magnon discoveries were spurious.

Emile Fraulin, owner of the field where the "relics" were located, has been charged with faking the tools and alphabetic tablets with strange hieroglyphs, the Prehistoric society of Paris laying the charge. The trouble arose when the clerk of the court attempted to draw it up—Nothing in the eyes covered the "crime."

Clothes Of Waiters Problem-In-Manila

MANILA, June 26 (AP)—A spell of universal harmony on the part of the new laws of the municipal board during the hot season, was broken recently by a lively debate over whether waiters in Manila restaurants should be required to wear a uniform when serving patrons.

Councilor Jose Dominic Nuncio proposed an ordinance which would make obligatory for all waiters to wear shirts and pants and to appear "decently groomed" on the grounds that it was "discriminatory." The ordinance was not passed.

Two Political Parties In Iceland Join Hands


REYKJAVIK, Iceland, June 26 (AP)—The Conservative and Liberal political parties of Iceland have decided to unite under the title of "The Independent party."

The chief points in the program of the merged groups is advocacy of "Iceland" taking over the full administration of its own foreign affairs when the Danish-Icelandic Act of Union is open for revision or its annulment. The independent party's domestic policy will follow liberal national lines with regard to personal initiative and trade freedom.
