DEMONSTRATIONS IN GERMANY STRIKE AT VERSAILLES TREATY

Flares of Thousands of Torches Light Great Stadium While 50,000 Persons Stand in Silence

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, June 28.—Germany's "day of mourning" was observed throughout the republic today, and culminated in a vast public demonstration today in the stadium and the Reichstag hall against the peace treaty framed at Versailles and the "war guilt" law.

The public meeting in the Reichstag building adopted a long resolution charging the German nation with suffering from the consequences of the Versailles treaty which remains the greatest obstacle to international understanding.

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BYRD DISCOVERS NEW LAND AT SOUTH POLE

Mountains Appear to Be Struggling to Keep Heads Above Snows, Says Report

WASHINGTON, June 28.—A report from Commander Richard E. Byrd, made public today by Secretary Adams, related the discovery of a new land in his South Pole expedition had discovered approximately 20,000 square miles of hitherto unknown land in the antarctic.

The flight, according to the report to the secretary of the navy, were made during the period of the long polar night which has forced suspension of exploration. The major part of the report described the discovery and part survey of the Rockefeller mountain range which one of his airplane parties discovered in January and was surveyed principally from the air in the two months following.

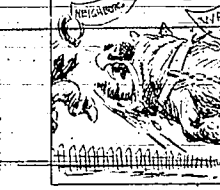

FORD GIVES IDEAL AGE FOR EMPLOYEES

Manufacturer, If Possible, Would Have Laborers From 35 to 60 Years Old

PHILADELPHIA, June 28.—Henry Ford in the July issue of the Ladies' Home Journal, says that he should prefer, if he could make the choice, to have his employees between 35 and 50 years of age.

"For them," the automobile manufacturer adds, "we would have a stable and experienced force. We would not care how much over 60 the men were so long as they could do their work."

Under no circumstances would we have a working force made up of only young men," Ford says. "It is absolutely necessary, in order to get the best through out, to have a solid frame of work of older and more experienced men who know exactly what they are doing."

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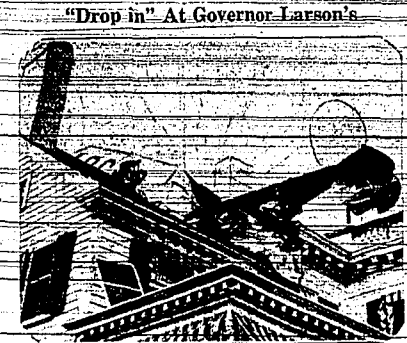
Body of E. D. Benjamin to Rest at Siltma, Colorado
