Bill Tilden Fights Way To Semi-Finals At Wimbledon

George Lott Falls Victim of Racquet In Hands of Basque

Cochet Favored Over Tilden and Borotra Logical Choice Over H. W. Austlin, Young Briton

BY FRANK H. KING Associated Press Sports Writer. Wimbledon, England, July 1.—Bill Tilden fought his way into the semi-finals of the Wimbledon tennis tournament today but a younger American, George Lott, fell victim to a tri-color racket.

In an even break for the French in an American forenoon Jean Borotra, the aging but still agile "bounding basque," eliminated Lott in a quarter-final match by scores of 6-2, 6-3, 6-4 shortly after he had defeated Pierre Langer, one of the lesser lights of France, 6-4, 2-6, 6-3, 7-5. The current battle with the French is just beginning for Tilden, he meets his old rival, Henri Cochet, in a semi-final duel tentatively set for Wednesday.

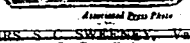

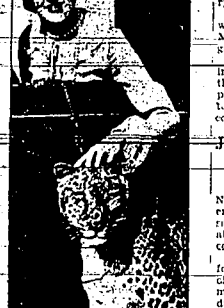

FAUSETT WILL RIDE SHOSHONE CATARACT

Spokane Daredevil Signs Contract to Navigate Falls, 212 Feet High

AT FAUSETT, Spokane, will in about eight great starts in Washington and Oregon during the next three years, will endeavor to pilot a canoe of his own design over Shoshone Falls, 212 feet high, five miles northwest of here.

After spending several days here investigating the hazardous undertaking, Fausett Monday indicated his purpose to make the attempt and signed a contract with Twin Falls American Legion post to make the "ride" Sunday, July 28. Under the contract Fausett releases all persons except himself of responsibility in event of mishap. His son is named to receive Fausett's share of any receipts if Fausett does not claim it himself.

Long Record
Fausett's record includes riding Shoshone falls, Oregon, 104 feet, Twin Falls, Oregon, 184 feet, Staquatic Falls, Washington, 186 feet.

In preparation for the "ride" Fausett will at once establish a training camp here and will engage in a period of physical training comparable to that of a boxer or other athlete.

LAW SUIT GROWS OUT OF TRADE FOR OREGON LAND

Any Gapel Wood and Loring A. Wood, husband and wife, who last April, traded nine lots in Sylvester Newton's subdivision of the Murrain addition, Twin Falls, for 29.6 acres of land in Douglas county, Oregon, that they had never seen, have filed suit in district court here to require Charles H. Lowe and his wife, Margaree Lowe, return the deed for the Twin Falls lots and to "back their deed" for the Oregon property.

In their complaint, filed Monday by E. L. Ashton, attorney, the Woods declare that the Oregon property was misrepresented to them, and that it is not worth \$3500 as represented, but not more than \$50. It is an inside subdivision, the Woods contend, situated on a highway and two and a half miles from the Pacific highway. Only about four acres is cleared, and most of the land is on steep, unmountainous, the Woods allege. They declare that they did not ascertain this state of affairs until last May 14, when they saw the Oregon land for the first time.

Earl Hutchinson and his wife, Florence Hutchinson, alleged to have some interest in the property, also are named defendants in the action.

"Brer Rabbit" Tales Live as Memorial to Beloved Creator

MARBLE LIBRARY TO HOUSE MANUSCRIPTS OF FAMOUS WRITER

Memory of Man Who Gave More Joy to Children Than Any Other Inspires Establishment of Shrine

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, July 1.—"Brer Rabbit" and "Brer Wolf" will live forever in a shrine established in the Asa G. Chandler library on the campus of Emory university here.

The shrine is a memorial to Joel Chandler Harris, who brought joy to thousands of readers with the simple artistry of his Uncle Remus tales.

The manuscripts of Harris stories have been given to the university by his family, and they are encased in a little room—a wing-of-the-magnificent-marble library.

Before his death in 1908, Harris became known internationally as the author of "Uncle Remus" stories for they were translated in many languages and made a universal appeal. In 1927 a trunk bearing the manuscripts, which were packed away after Harris' death, was brought to Emory and since that time the library staff has been arranging them for exhibit.

Children's benefactor.

One of the librarians says of Harris as the man "who has brought more joy to children than any man who has ever lived, the man who preserved forever the treasures of the simple tales of the negro. Through Uncle Remus and other characters he has reconstructed for us the life of the plantation, the suffering of fugitive slaves, the tragedy of mixed blood, the separ-

Pictures on walls.

Around the walls of the memorial room are pictures of Harris and four framed sketches by Arthur Burdett Frost, who did the drawings for the "Uncle Remus" book. Frost had

caught the spirit of the Uncle Remus tales in the sketches that the two talents are inextricably mingled.

An unpublished long story—"Quin," a "Romance of the Revolution"—was discovered among the manuscripts, and its publication is planned at an early date. The earliest work represented is a manuscript of "The Romance of the Rockville," published in the Atlanta

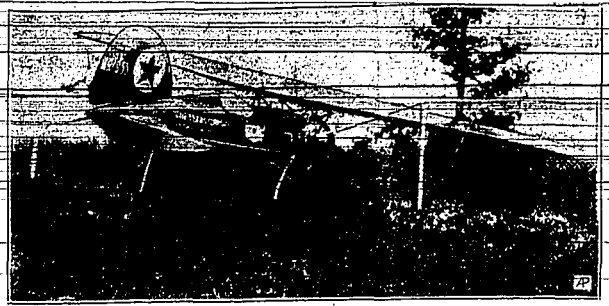

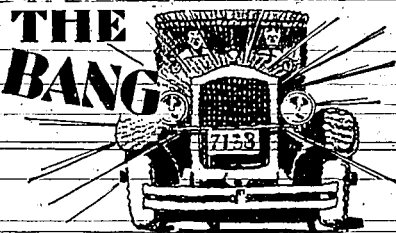
