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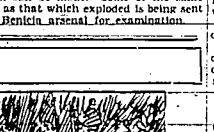
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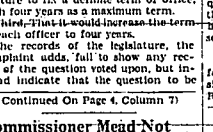
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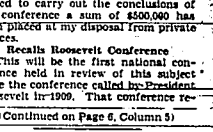
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Chicago Maintains Lead in Hot Fight In National League

4. Counters must be covered with oilcloth or other non-absorbent material.

5. All drinks must be served from spigot and not dipped.

6. All food must be kept in a clean and wholesome condition.

7. Use of the cans or containers for cooking is prohibited.

8. All perishable foods must be kept in ice boxes or refrigerators, and milk, cream and butter must be kept in a separate compartment.

9. Operators and employees must not smoke on the premises and spitting of the floor is prohibited.

10. All operators and employees must have health certificates.
