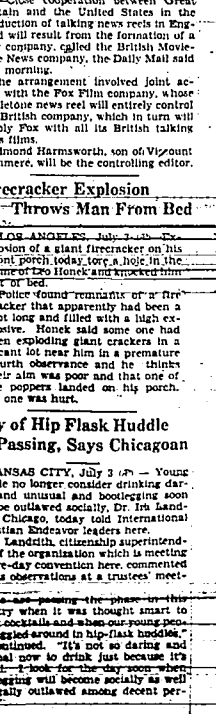

American Suffers Worst Defeat Ever Taken From French

Elimination of New World Representative Puts Definite End to Last of Hopes in Singles Event

(By The Associated Press) WIMBLEDON, July 3.—Bill Tilden blazed away in victory against the shining tennis artist of Henri Cochet in the semi-finals of the British championships today and suffered the Frenchman his ever inflicted upon him. The scores were 6-1, 6-1, 7-5.

Tilden's elimination put a definite end to the last of the American hopes so far as Wimbledon's classic singles event is concerned while Henry's victory by Jean Borotra over England's "Bunny" Austin in the other semi-final assured an all-French battle for the championship on Saturday.

The women's singles which reached the semi-final stage is an Anglo-American affair with two Helens—Wills and Goldsack and Joan Ridley, respectively. Tomorrow, Miss Ridley gained a place among the last surviving four today by defeating the veteran American player, Mrs. May Sutton Bundy, champion of five children and winner of the championship here 24 years ago, by scores of 6-3, 6-1.

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Five Records Fall in Junior Competition on Denver Track

220, Javelin, High Jump and Hurdles Marks Fall in Day

Observers Agree Showing Indicates Several New Champions Will Reign Following Senior Events

FRAWLEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) DENVER, July 3.—The opening barrier of Amateur Athletic Union track and field records was productive of five sensational new marks in the junior division of the annual championship games today, with old record holders dethroned in the 220-yard dash, the high jump, javelin throw, pole vault and the 120-yard hurdles.

Cy Leland, Texas Christian university's crack sprinter, equaled the Junior Amateur Athletic Union record in the 100-yard dash in 9.8 seconds in spite of a strong head wind that swept up the course.

New Junior Record

Ray Alf, Deane college, Crete, Nebraska, running under the Denver Athletic club's banner, established a new junior record of 21.50 seconds for the 220-yard dash. Bourgoin was first in the hop, step and jump with 40 feet, 11 inches.

Probably the outstanding performance of the day was L. D. Weldon's throw of 164 feet in the javelin. The University of Iowa athlete was 24 feet over the former mark made in 1926 by Cretti B. Hines of the Chicago Athletic association.

SUGAR BEETS LEAD IN CROP INCREASES

Minidoka South Side Project Figures Show Planting On 3000 Acres

BURLEY, July 3 (Special to The News)—Estimates of the plantings this year on the South Side Minidoka project show that sugar beets have made the greatest increase of any crop about this year. There have been 3000 acres of beets planted, as against 2700 acres harvested last year. More acres are in hay than in any other crop—There are 14,000 acres planted in alfalfa this year in comparison with 14,334 cut for hay last year. Clover shows an estimated area of 6000 acres this season. Last year there were 5001 acres clover cut for hay, 4800 acres harvested for clover seed, and 2840 acres were used for both hay and clover seed. Wheat takes up 5600 acres on the tract this season in alfalfa this year in comparison with 5600 acres of alfalfa last year. Most of the wheat is used as a nurse crop for alfalfa or clover. There are 1800 acres of barley this year, about the same as last year. There are only 450 acres of oats and 2500 acres of beans, both slightly decreased from last season. All crops look good, except that there will be a slight shortage of alfalfa hay. C. G. Farro, Farmer's Store, Phone 111, has 85-W or 450, and alfalfa and red clover fields.

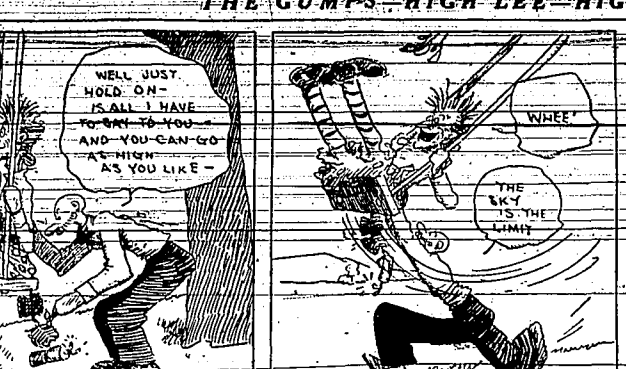
