STARS AND STRIPES WAVE IN LONDON'S STREETS DURING DAY... Ambassador and Mrs. Dawes Receive More Than 1000 Guests at Flower-Decked Home in British Capital

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, July 4.—The independence day celebration in London centered around the American society, in which he said that the projected naval accord between Great Britain and the United States is a practical expression toward the realization of world peace.

Throughout the day the Stars and Stripes were in evidence in the principal streets of London. The ambassador tonight delivered a highly patriotic address delivered by a justice of Idaho's supreme court, and with a varied program of sports and contests including a baseball game between the members of the American League of the inland league, and numerous races and aquatic contests.

"We seek to celebrate our national birthday in the midst of the great British nation among brothers and sisters who share with us the same principles, the same aspirations and inherit the same responsibilities."

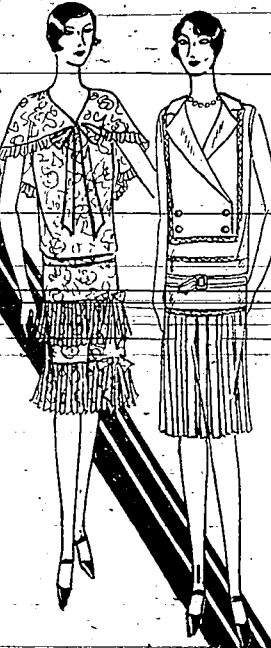
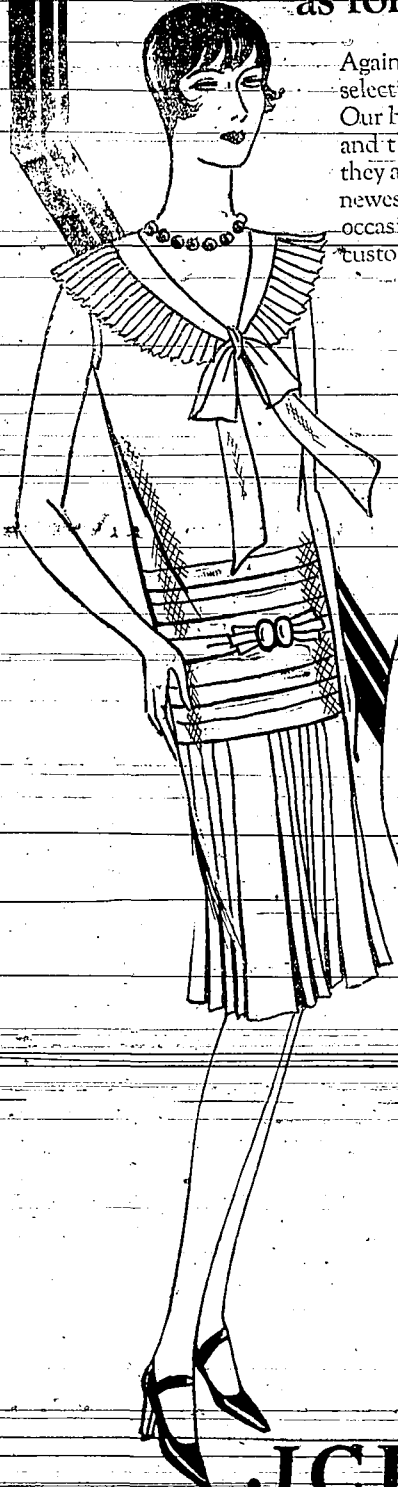

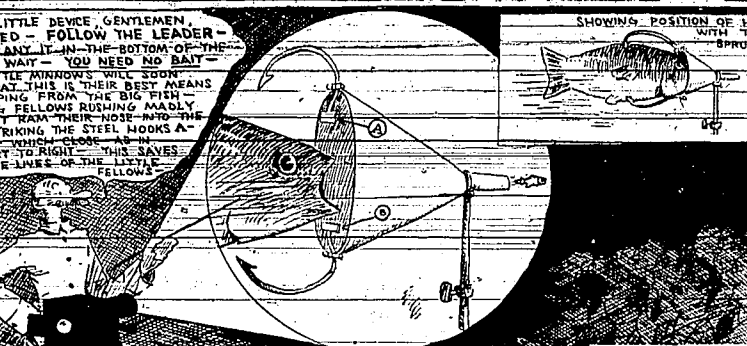

SPIRITUAL IDEALISM SHOULD BE UPHOLD DECLARES SPEAKER

Justice, Givens, of Idaho Supreme Court in Able Address Urges People to Support Cause of Peace

That the mission of the American people is to develop the spiritual as well as the material and to help the rest of the world to maintain peace and high ideals, was the chief theme of the address given at the Fourth of July celebration here by Raymond L. Givens, Justice of the supreme court of Idaho.

The speaker was introduced by Judge W. A. Babcock in a happy address after prayer had been offered by Rev. J. C. Wood, rector of the Ascension Episcopal church.

In substance and in part Justice Givens said:

"Real development of a people takes place in time of peace rather than in time of war. History shows much space in describing the events that take place in war. This is probably largely because war is spectacular, the most hopeful sign of the times is the fact that the American Legion, a body made up of men who served in the World War, is devoted to the cause of peace and to the eradication of war throughout the world.

"Patriotism has been defined as 'intelligent self-interest,' but we cannot ignore the rights of other nations. We must have aiding and abetting of our glance to our own country, and not assume that we are merely citizens of the world. But we must respect the rights of other nations who are loyal to their own countries.

"The principles that apply to individuals in their relations apply to nations. If one individual is prosperous and another is not, the less prosperous cannot grow wealthy by robbing his successful neighbor. He must learn to practice the same thing that his neighbor did. Nations cannot get rich by conquest.

"The United States has never engaged in war except for principles of justice and of permanent importance. The progress of the world has been furthered by revolution against improper restraint. The American colonies revolted against the improper encroachments of a king who sought to deprive them of their rights. The war of 1812 with England grew out of the fact that both England and France refused to recognize our international rights. The Mexican war was to free the people of the United States territory from oppression by the people of another nation. The war in 1898 was in response to the call of the Cuban people, tyrannized by an old, and at that time decrepit, man.

"When the World War after suffering insults of an intolerable character which convinced practically everybody that it was our duty to enter in opposition to a nation which at that time was seeking to establish principles that were the anathema of our ideals.

"There are two dangers growing out of this war. One is that we forget the spiritual and the other is that we invite the envy of other. It is our duty to maintain our ideals and to teach other and less prosperous countries that the way to prosperity for them lies in adopting our ideals and principles. Two thousand years ago, the Man of Galilee laid down the principles which should govern mankind, and become the Redeemer nation of mankind."
