ADMIRERS ACCLAIM TOO WEAK TO ROUSE CLEVELAND AVIATORS

Airmen Resting in Hotel Suite Undisturbed While Offers and Felicitations Pour Into Headquarters

(By The Associated Press.) CLEVELAND, July 6 (AP)—Nerves frayed and bodies exhausted, pilots Roy L. Mitchell and Byron E. Newcomb rested today while their fellow aviators received congratulatory messages poured in to the nearest conquerors of the air.

Mitchell and Newcomb brought their Simon-Dix motor plane to the city of Cleveland amid the frenzied acclaim of 75,000 spectators at Cleveland airport at 10:30:50 A. M. today, after remaining in the air 17 hours and seconds—a new world's sustained record for planes refueled in flight.

Deluge of Offers

A deluge of valentines and exhibition offers and a stack of telegrams and cards from all parts of the country and Europe mounted while the fliers, with their suites guarded from disturbance, recovered from the tiring racking strain of more than eight days battling against time, fog and storms.

The hats were by postmen of that day dyed very much like the headgear worn by the policemen of London."

IMPROVEMENTS KEEP PERRINE HOTEL IN LINE WITH PROGRESS

Completion of Remodeling and Betterment Work Provides New and Bigger Quarters For Restaurant

With completion of extensive remodeling and improvement operations under way for six weeks past, the Perrine Hotel, corner of Main avenue and Shoshone street west, has assurance of maintaining the commanding position among southern Idaho hotels that it has occupied since it was built in the early days in Twin Falls.

Remodeling has been most extensive on the first floor of the building where 150 new dining room tables for the cafe operated by V. C. Wray, restaurateur of large experience who came here some months ago from Casper, Wyo., he conducted one of Wyoming's principal cafes.

In the new quarters, accommodations have been provided at a long low counter and 10 or 1200 new bar stools for the cafe seating 100 persons at one time. The whole area is covered with a tile floor, and a unique and attractive decorative scheme has been worked out in painting of walls, ceiling and furniture.

At an outlay of considerable expense, the kitchen has been brought close to the patrons, but a system of electric ventilating fans keeps the room cool and free from odors at all times.

Double French doors afford entrances to the hotel, while the main entrance is through the Main avenue front.

Artistic New Stairway Stairways at either end of the rear lobby have been changed in the course of the remodeling operations, and there has been constructed instead one wide stairway at the back of the lobby, which is surmounted by a large stained glass window, the whole arrangement contributing to increased light, ventilation and artistic effects.

Large windows have been built at the rear of the new stairway.

Fifty-five guest-rooms on the second and third floors have been redecorated, and the halls and woodwork have been refinished in an unusual and artistic style. Doors and woodwork have been painted in old ivory and mahogany walls are elaborately stencilled above a space covered with Italian travertine that resembles stone.

Within the next few weeks heavy padded carpets are to be laid in all of the halls completely covering the floor space. The hotel continues under management of W. W. Wight, who has been manager for five years past.

Decorative scheme The new decorative scheme in the hotel lobby, stairway and halls as well as in the cafe has been worked out by T. C. Bemiller.

The stairway at the back of the lobby is finished in white enamel and mahogany. The stairway at the front end is painted in washable paint of ivory shade with a stencil band in French panel effect on drop ceiling. Walls are finished in Tiffany blend browns, greens and rose colors in panel settings. The lower wall is finished in plastic Italian travertine with block hand finish at the top. Woodwork is done in ivory enamel with doors and baseboard finished in mahogany.

Furniture and woodwork in the cafe are finished in two shades of golden tan stipple with ivory striping. The ceiling is enameled in light gloss ivory with high light blend on the angle cornice. Walls are done in French can

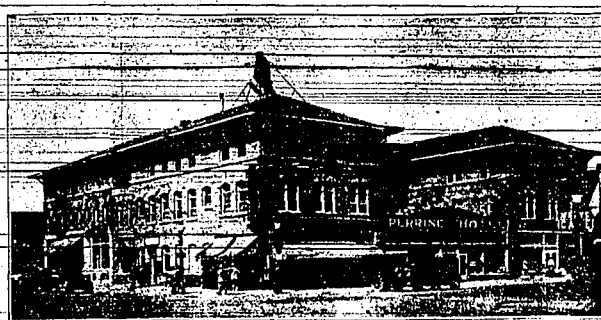

NEW RAILROAD TAPPING RICH REGION ON BORDER

PRESDIDA, Tex., July 6 (AP)—Presdida is to become the United States terminus of a railway extension that will link the Mexican border directly with mid-western routes.

The construction of a 50-mile road by the Orient system, a subsidiary of the Santa Fe, will connect this border town with Alpine, Texas, thus allowing a direct haul of Rio Grande valley products to metropolitan markets.

Approval of the interstate commerce commission and directors of the Orient road has been granted. Nearly \$1,000,000 will be spent for this extension.

The new line will give Presdida its first rail outlet and will make it an American gateway for products of northern Mexico. It may be the preliminary step toward placing Presdida on what may become eventually the shortest rail route from the middle west to the Pacific coast.

The Orient line of Mexico already operates 175 miles to Chihuahua, Mexico, from Ojinaga, across the river from Presdida. Completion of a rail line from Presdida to Topolobampo on the Pacific would cut nearly 1,500 miles from present routes to the coast.

An outlet for numerous minerals produced in the Presdida area likewise is seen in the new extension. The largest silver lead mine in Texas is located just north of the town.

World War Memorials Will Pershing's Office

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—General John J. Pershing's office is full of sculptors' reminders of the world war. A bronze paper weight in the form of a tank holds down important documents on his desk in the war department here.

When he stands up from his work, he sees a remarkable bronze group of soldiers in fighting pose. On the general's other side is a beautiful model of one of the proposed chapels to be erected in France as part of the memorials to America's war dead.

General Pershing is chairman of the American Battle Monuments commission. His work requires his presence in France several months of the year. When he returns to Washington he spends long hours in his office.

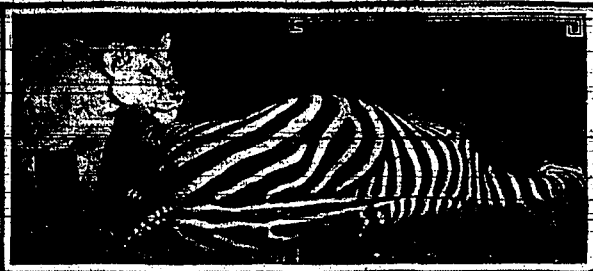

GIANT LEAK SPRINGS ROOF OF TUNNEL IN CANAL DRAINAGE

Blast Near South Park Adds Larger Water Flow From Fissures Beneath Surface and Stops Work

Nine conditions of water flowing from a fissure which developed from the roof of the drainage tunnel, which is being driven by the Twin Falls Canal company near South Park. The fissure developed near the top of the tunnel, a quarter of a mile from the opening, following the flow of water. It is about 100 feet long and 14 feet wide. The water from other fissures in the same tunnel totals 14 cubic feet in a depth of one foot every 24 hours. It was stated last evening by John Hayes, manager of the canal company.

After a blast had been fired at the end of the tunnel, a great deal of water felt below the surface. The leak developed near the point where the blast was put in.

Work Stops

The water had been flowing through a fissure between the tunnel and the surface. It completely stopped work and presents a problem to Manager Hayes in regard to the best method of proceeding. Mr. Hayes said that the opening of the new fissure should help materially in solving the drainage problem on the other side of Rock creek near Twin Falls. Several large fissures had been struck in the tunnel.

The South Park tunnel had a run of five second-feet from one to three and smaller fissures before the fissure opened in the past. The effect of the opening yesterday was instantaneous on a test well which was completed last week. The water in the well began to subside at once and had dropped to its normal level in two days.

There are a total of 200 tunnels and drains in operation on the Twin Falls project. Manager Hayes said, and they total "mean flow" indicated that they carry off a total of 146,000 acre-feet every year. The flow from the South Park tunnel is the largest in the system, Manager Hayes said.

By GLENN ALLAN (Associated Press Sports Writer) DETROIT, July 6.—A presidential candidate with 26 states in his pocket might be permitted a tiny strut—but not Jackie Fields, Los Angeles welterweight and champion of his class within the boundaries of 26 states which make up the National Boxing Association. 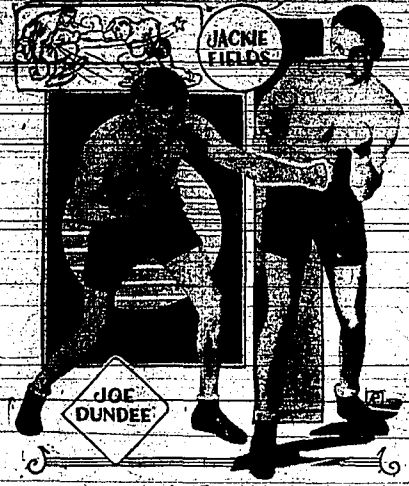

BLAZING THE SPORTS TRAIL

It has taken time to remove the somewhat common Eastern tendency to be skeptical of the performance of Western sprinters. It goes back to the days of Dan Kelly, who in 1898 registered what is listed on the books as the first official amateur record of 9.8 seconds for the 100-yard dash. In more recent years, the performances of Charley Paddock aroused many debates. The Eastern critics consider their judgment strengthened when Paddock, in several Eastern appearances, failed to show anything to compare with the startling times that were put to his credit in southern California. In fact, they weren't convinced until after the 1924 Olympics, when Paddock, then nearing the end of his great career, equalled his own world's record for both the 100- and 220-yard dashes in the national championships at Newark, New Jersey. 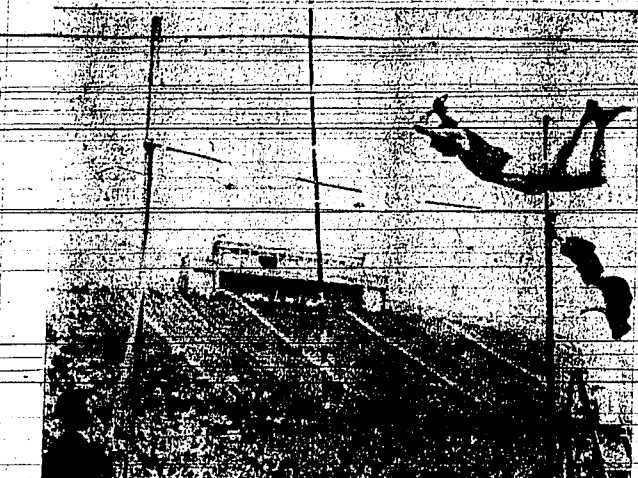

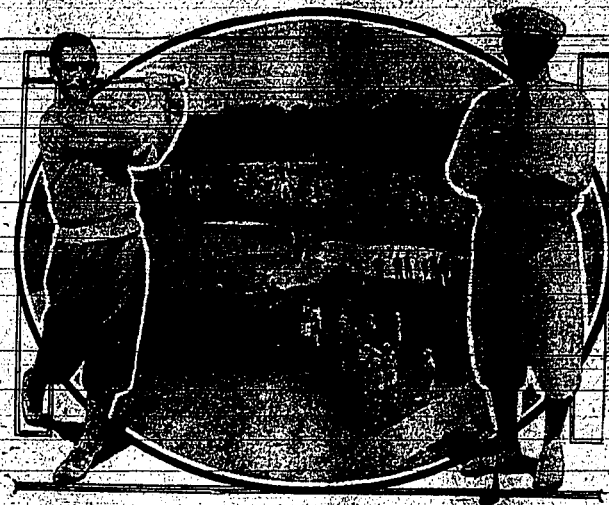

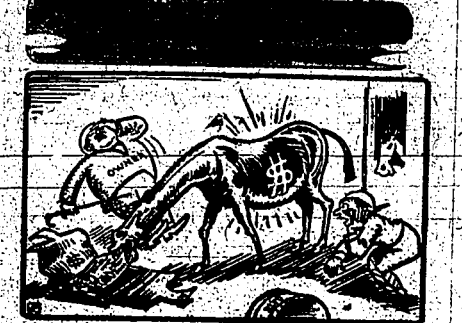

Ancient Will Proves Cervantes' Dulcinea Taken From Life

DOCUMENT FOUND IN OLD CHURCH SHEDS LIGHT ON CHARACTER

Noted Figure of Fiction Not Fictitious Person, Evidence Discovered by Diligent Padre Reveals

(By Associated Press)

TOBOSCO, Spain, July 6.—An old will discovered in the archives of the church here by Father Julio Garcia reveals that the Dulcinea made famous by Miguel De Cervantes Saavedra, was not the fictitious person she heretofore has been believed.

According to the last testament of Don Esteban Zarco, dated February 20, 1608, and other documents brought to light from the municipal archives by the diligent padre, she was the sister of Don Esteban and her full name was Donna Ana Martinca Zarco de Morales.

That Dulcinea really existed here in the district of La Mancha, where the sorrowful Don Quixote of literature tilted at windmills, many of which exist to this day, seems no longer in doubt if the documents are authentic.

Beloved of Cervantes Moreover, they seem to show that Dulcinea was the beloved of Cervantes, and that his passion for her, apparently hopeless, caused the great writer to paint her ideal in glowing colors that live forever on a page with Dante's Beatrice and Justinian's Theodora.

He died April 23, 1616—the same day that his great contemporary, William Shakespeare, died in England.

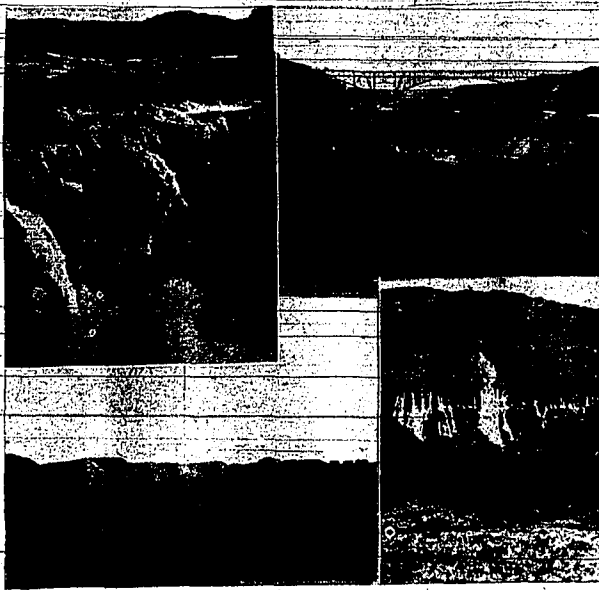
Few tourists ever come to La Mancha, but there is to be seen in the ancient town the church where Father Julio, a close student of Spanish literature, found the new document relating to Dulcinea, the house in which Cervantes lived and died, and, near by, the house in which Dulcinea lived.

Farmer Hikes 25 Miles During Day While Chorus Girl Walks Four Plus

BOSTON, July 6 (AP)—Automobiles may have put a crimp in national walking habits but, according to Dr. Joseph Lelyveld, Boston, a lot of walking still is being done.

Dr. Lelyveld, who is director of research for the National Association of Chiropractors-Pediatricists, says that tests made with pedometers on persons in Boston, New York, Chicago and other cities showed an average daily distance of 7-8 miles.

A farmer plowing had an edge even on the mail carrier, for the farmer walked 24 1/2 miles in a day and the mail carrier averaged 22 miles. Stepping on the heels of this pair was a doctor in a hospital, who walked 18 miles, although using his car when out of doors.

A shopping tour by a woman gives her just about as much walking as her husband gets in a round of golf. The trip through the stores on an average day carried the woman 8 1/2 miles, while the golfer, doing 18 holes, covered 8 1/2 miles. During the Boston Christmas season a woman walked 11 miles.

A schoolboy at school and at play covered, on an average, more ground than a policeman—15 miles to 14. A school girl averaged 11 1/2 miles.

A salesgirl walked 8 miles in a day, but a steward in a grill room, from 11 A. M. until 9 P. M. covered 12 1/2 miles. A railroad conductor walked farther between Boston and Cleveland than another on a train from Boston to Chicago. The first walked 7 miles and the second 5. Pester stops on the Chicago run meant fewer ticket collections.

At one of Henry Ford's balls a dancer, from 8 until midnight, covered 5 1/2 miles. A theatre dancer registered a mile an hour, while a chorus girl registered 4 1/2 miles in a day.

A stenographer who rode to and from work walked 4 1/2 miles in a week. A girl in a business office walked 5 1/2 miles in a week. A salesman covered 75 miles in a week.

A store manager who spent most of his time at his desk walked 6 1/2 miles in a day, while a department store buyer

did 7. Dr. Lelyveld estimates that a housekeeper, without leaving the home, walks every year a distance equal to that from Boston to San Francisco. And every three or four weeks a business man walks a distance which is especially valuable for the silk producing sections of central Japan.

Twin Falls Offers Array of Natural And Artificial Wonders to Motorist

Old Oregon Trail, Traversing Idaho From East to West, Leads to Number of Interesting Sight

Special to The News-BOISE, July 6.—The Old Oregon Trail traverses Idaho from east to west and along its way as it crosses the state are many interesting and unusual sights for the motorist if he but knows of them and is willing to deviate just a little from the beaten path.

In the vicinity of Twin Falls in the southern end of the state are many artificial and natural

wonders. Just two miles north of the city of Twin Falls is the Twin Falls-Jerome inter-county bridge, the world's highest traffic-carrying bridge.

Marvelous views up and down the canyon are afforded from this bridge which has given farmers an easy outlet to shipping points for their crops. Twin Falls county is noted the county over for the agricultural products raised—potatoes, fruit, sugar beets, dairy products, livestock—all prosper on the Twin Falls tract.

Just above the "Big Bridge," as it is called, is the Hansen bridge, highest

superior in the world, and between the two bridges is Shoshone falls, 115 feet higher than Niagara and often referred to as the "Niagara of the West." At night they are illuminated and under the rays of many thousands of candle power they present a beautiful spectacle.

Nature has played many pranks in Idaho but one of the odder is found near Jagerman on the Old Oregon Trail. At night, big in this part of the state, flows from east to west. And springs pour millions of gallons of sparkling, pure water into the stream from its north shore, which is lava. They are known as Thousand Springs because of their number. Their source still appears to be a mystery. One plausible explanation has been given. More than 100 miles to the north two rivers, the Snake and the Lemhi, flow along through fertile Idaho valleys but suddenly they disappear from view. Year after year these rivers continue to pour water into these "links," as they are known, but no one knows where it comes out. It is all "gone." The water emerges at Thousand Springs more than 100 miles to the southward.

President Hoover in the past, although deluged with invitations, have accepted very few of them. Mrs. Hoover is lending her presence impartially.

Entry Always Obedient
There is a flurry when word comes that she will be a guest. But her entry always is so quiet and informal, although her reception is so formal. White House aides and secret service men, who do not know she has arrived.

It has been years since a president's wife has attended an army polo game. Mrs. Hoover decided she wanted to see the last of the infantry association's tournament in Potomac park. Word was sent that she probably would remain for only two periods. Instead she saw all eight.

The polo games, participated in by some of the army's crack players, are open to the public. When the committee learned that the President's wife had accepted the invitation to a small striped tent was hastily erected and dacked with flags for her reception.

But Mrs. Hoover stepped the tent. She walked right up to the side boards from Port Benning, Georgia, and Fort Myer, Virginia, were drawn up at attention.

Please Crowd
At her request General Charles P. Sumner, chief of staff of the army, introduced the players. Mrs. Hoover made some laughing remark which sent them flying down the field smiling broadly. Men in Algeria May Gain Divorce By Simple Repudiation of Spouse

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—A world-wide check on women's juridical rights has revealed that in at least one sector of the globe their privileges are notable for their absence.

The Kabyle wife of the picturesque mountain region east of Algiers may be repudiated by her husband at any time but if she desires to call quits she must obtain the consent of her father and declare herself "in a state of insurrection."

The husband puts on her head a sum of money "what he requires his wife and she thus is automatically withdrawn from circulation."

That information has been received by the Inter-American Commission for Women from the American consul at Algiers. The commission, carrying out a charge by the last Pan-American conference has mailed inquiries on the status of women's nationality and their judicial rights in remote lands where time-honored customs prevail in the absence of written law.

The commission has asked for information on any language or character. Linguists of the Congressional library have agreed to translate the responses.

First hand information on the status of women in far lands will be brought back by explorers. The Field Museum in Chicago has agreed to stock expeditions with questionnaires which will be filled out by the explorers' progress.

The Kabyle women belong to the Mohammedan faith and are governed by "haram" rules under which the approximately 500,000 souls of the region live.

If a married man dies his wife forms a part of his succession and can bequeathed. She remains "hanged to her dead."

Girls Growing Taller Because of Exercise

CHICAGO, June 7 (AP)—Little girls are growing taller. The reason is that they forget all about it. Exercise is making tall girls out of stubby ones.

This is the word of Dr. Katharine B. Clark of the University of Chicago, president-elect of Connecticut college, who cites figures from assorted colleges to show that girls have added two inches to their stature in the last 30 years. Exercise, chiefly diet and "sensible" clothes have done it, she says.

SUMMER COURSES DEAL WITH FAMILY PROBLEMS

PHILADELPHIA, July 6 (AP)—Keeping abreast of modern practical problems, courses in "Contemporary Economic Thought" and in "The Family" are among 33 new courses added to the curriculum for the University of Pennsylvania's summer school.
