

YOU THE FILIPINO DELIVERS PLEA FOR FREEDOM OF ISLANDS

Manuel Roxas—With Tears in Eyes—Pleads for Independence Before Senate Committee in Washington

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, July 15—Statistical and technical data were made available to members of the senate finance committee at its first hearings today on a youthful Filipino—Manuel Roxas—who pleaded for freedom of the Philippines.

Roxas objected particularly to testimony by John M. Switzer, New York, representing the Philippine noterman Chamber of Commerce, that the Philippines wanted independence as a principle but were praying they would not get it.

While we are grateful for what the United States has done for us and we love this country, we love our country more and we love freedom more," he said.

Roxas asked that congress authorize a plebiscite in the islands on the independence question and declared it 90 per cent of the Philippine noterman freedom, he would abandon his efforts in that direction. He predicted also that the law was curbed by the senate.

Two other members of the special commission will be heard tomorrow. Greater H. Gray, Washington representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, and Charles W. Holman, representing the National Cottonseed Producers Federation, respectively.

Gray contended high rates of duty on wheat would be a disaster.

At the head of the parade rode General Gouraud, leading the veterans, for "under his command that they broke the German line. When the head of the column reached the reviewing stand, the general joined the president and stood at attention as part of his war time command award, his left hand raised and falling in salute, his smiling right sleeve swinging in the breeze.

From the time General Gouraud, heading the long procession appeared, the hands clapped the olive drab uniforms of the American Expeditionary Force.

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BOARD ORGANIZES TO FIND SOLUTION FOR AGRICULTURE'S ILLS

"We Are Going to Work Long and Hard," Says Alexander H. Legge, Chicago, Chairman of Body

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, July 16—The federal farm board created by congress after years of dispute, assembled today and was charged by President Hoover with responsibility for a solution of the American farming and vexatious agricultural problem.

At the end of the first day's conferences, begun at a meeting with Mr. Hoover, the chairman of the board, Alexander H. Legge—a Chicago business man—announced that "we are going to work long and hard" saying there were no promises, he expressed hope that the board could organize agriculture to permit application of its work to this year's crops.

Most of the day was occupied with the organization of the board. The chairman of the department of agriculture was selected as secretary to the board.

The chairman said the board would meet tomorrow and indicated night sessions were being held today of important new announcements was held out, however. The board members were invited to dinner tonight at the White House.

In his prepared statement to the board, the president defined its fundamental purpose as "to determine the best and final solution to a multiplicity of agricultural problems."

Several board members and Secretary Hurd of the department of agriculture, also a member assembled early at the White House. An eighth man is to be selected to represent the vast wheat industry, but lack of unanimity among the wheat growers and other factors are delaying a selection.

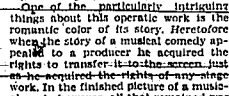
Odd Fellows' Committees Preparing to Entertain Visitors at Encampment

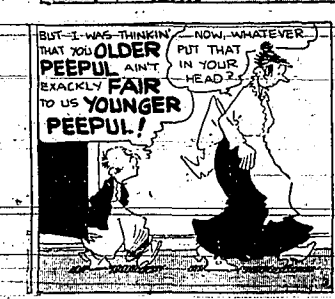
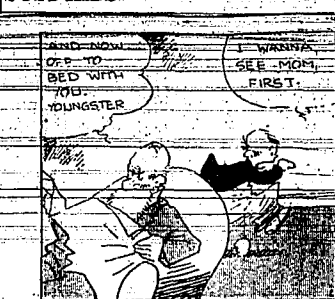

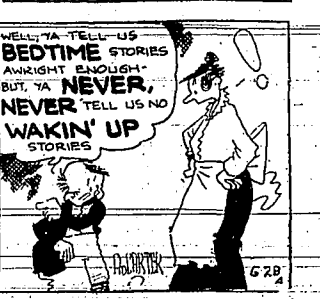

LUTHERANS DEDICATE NEW CHURCH EDIFICE

Impressive Services and Able Sermons—Mark of Success Largely Attended

In the presence of a congregation which filled the edifice and overflowed into the street and park, the new building of the Lutheran church at the corner of Second street and Fourth avenue east, was dedicated Sunday morning. The church, formerly occupied by the Christian congregation, was purchased recently and has undergone extensive repair and alterations.

The keys of the new church were delivered to the pastor, Rev. Martin H. Ziegel, at 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning, by Martin Meyer and Peter Ehlers, two remaining members of the last board of the church. On the platform during three services of the day a wreath hung from a vacant chair in memory of the ill and recently deceased Fred D. Wegener, whose death occurred shortly after the new church home was dedicated.

Portland Man Speaks

Dr. E. Brandt, Portland, head of the department of ancient languages of Concordia college, delivered the forenoon dedicatory sermon, an address which revealed the speaker as a profound student of theology and of ancient history and a master of oratory.

The substance of the sermon was to the effect that God provides for the spread of His doctrines. It was based on the text, Acts V, 33-42, wherein the apostles, brought before the council of the Jewish rulers, who were about to slay them, escaped death through the advice of the Pharisee, Gamaliel, a doctor of the law and member of the council, who said if their work were of men it would come to naught, but if of God it could not be overthrown, and the council might be found fighting against God. The council agreed, and having beaten them, commanded that they should not speak in the name of Jesus and let them go. Dr. Brandt declared that Gamaliel, who believed that men could not do anything, nevertheless, in consistency from his viewpoint, and from that of a man, successfully argued that they be allowed to go. He said that the activities of the Pagan Romans, enemies of Christianity, by concentrating their energies on the utmost parts of the civilized world permitted and aided in the spread of religion.

Later, the printing press invention, allowing rapid dissemination of literature and scriptures, and the development of the renaissance, with increasing intercourse between nations, permitted the spread of the doctrines of the reformation at the time of Dr. Martin Luther, who believed that "God will see that His word is done."

At the afternoon service, Rev. Ziegel, the pastor, spoke on "The Building of the Church," and developed the thought that the church is built on Christ and on the scriptures which contain the inspired writings of the apostles, and emphasized the church's sole basis—saving souls.

Musical Program Feature

At the morning service of the musical program was a duet by Miss Gertrude Becher and Miss Betty Viehwert, a solo by Mrs. N. C. Thorntson, with accompaniment by Edward Wegener at the console of the organ. In the afternoon a duet was rendered by "Becher and Wegener" with Mrs. Margaret "Butcher," Miss Viola Viehwert, Miss Marguerite Viehwert, Albert Becher and I. Chamber.

The interior of the church has been completely altered, and is beautifully finished. The central feature in the altar is a large and expensive statue of Christ, with elaborate carvings on either side. The altar is the work of N. C. Thorntson, and shows artistic talent of an unusual degree. At the evening service, Dr. Brandt reported on the proceedings of the thirty-eighth triennial convention of the Missouri Synod of the Lutheran church, which he attended at River Forest, Illinois, this month.

BROTHER AND SISTER BROWN IN RESERVOIR

Charlie McNeal, 13, Meets Death in Attempt to Rescue 11-Year-Old Child

Charlie McNeal, 13, son of Fred and Dorothy McNeal, Piler, died in an unusual manner in an attempt to rescue a child from a reservoir. The boy, who had slipped into a deep pool in the Roseworth reservoir, 50 miles southwest of here Sunday afternoon, F. E. Drake, county coroner, last evening declared his investigation indicated.

No one witnessed the tragedy. The bodies were recovered some time later in the reservoir. Marks on the boy's face and arms, the coroner said, indicate that the little girl clutched at him. He could swim only a little.

On Fishing Excursion

The boy and girl, with their parents and two younger children, Ortho, 8, and Marie, 7, were at the reservoir on an all-day picnic and fishing excursion. The children had been wading at the edge of the water, and about mid-afternoon the two older children were missed. The father started in search. He found their clothing except the boy's shirt and the girl's blouse, which they were wearing when they were found, and discovered their footprints in the mud leading to the water's edge. There was no other track of them and there was no response to calls.

There were no other picnickers or fishing parties in the vicinity, and the father started for help, driving his car through scruboak to a farmhouse, where he found no one at home, and continuing his quest on foot when the car a little later entered down an irrigation ditch.

Summons Officials

The sheriff and coroner were summoned from the house at Roseworth dam and volunteers returned with the father to search for the children's bodies. They were recovered by C. E. Jennings, Bill, at 7 P. M., shortly before the sheriff and coroner arrived.

The bodies were brought here to the Drake funeral parlor. It has been arranged that the bodies shall rest in a double grave in Twin Falls cemetery beside the grave of the grandfather, Henry McNeal, who died 13 years ago; but no other arrangements for funeral services have been made pending word from relatives elsewhere.

Mrs. C. C. Williams, Twin Falls, is an aunt, and Mrs. Henry McNeal, grandmother, lives in Long Beach, California.

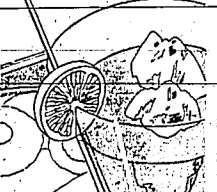
Some of the protesters appeared in district court here Monday, and, on their request, hearing on the appeal was continued to the September court term.
