A Washington Bystander

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—The senate has been called many things at times. It is used to be known, jealously, and as an element of the campaign to change to a popularly elected body, as the "millionaires' club," for instance.

Yet there is another name that might be applied to the senate after survey of the political origin of a good sized handful of its members. It justly could be styled the ex-governors' club. There are a score or so of former state chief executives now on the senate rolls.

Governors' Brigade. Look upon the list, Johnson, California; Trammell, Illinois; Townsend, Delaware; Robinson, Arkansas; Capper and Allen, Kansas; Goldsborough, Maryland; Ward, Massachusetts; Odell, Nevada; Keyes, New Hampshire; Eager, New Jersey; Crazell, North Dakota; Blease, South Carolina; Norbeck and McCallister, South Dakota; Slayton, Virginia; Warren and Kendrick, Wyoming; Blaine, Wisconsin.

By contrast, the house has just a handful of men who have once been governors. It contains a few, like Yates, Illinois; Morehead, Nebraska, and Montague, South Dakota.

For the most part, however, politicians who have reached the top of the heap at home are looking about for larger worlds to conquer seem to look first at senate opportunities. That is, of course, unless they have such outstanding state careers that their own political nomination timber.

Two of the senate's ex-governor members have been brief service in that office before they joined up with the legislators in the north wing of the capitol in Washington. One is William H. Taft, former governor of Ohio, and the other is Charles McNary, former governor of Oregon.

Dean of Everything. Warren, Wyoming, is the dean of the senate ex-governor group, as he is of most other things in that body. He has had the added distinction of having been a territorial governor twice in Wyoming by presidential appointments under President Arthur and Harrison.

Clearly the nation seems to have found a use to make of former governors aside from putting up their names as favorite sons for presidential honors. Their peak-governorship employment in the senate should increase the intimate knowledge in that body of conditions in the several states.

CONGRESSMAN POINTS TO COMMON INTEREST OF WESTERN SECTION

California Representative Discusses Benefits to Be Derived From Boulder Dam When Finished

"The western states are united in common interests and what benefits one benefits the rest," said Congressman Albert E. Carter, Oakland, who arrived in Twin Falls yesterday, accompanied by Mrs. Carter on his way home after a convalescent trip including the Pacific coast and along the St. Lawrence river. Mr. Carter is a member of the rivers and harbors committee of the house of representatives, which is investigating the feasibility of the enlargement of the locks on the canal connecting the Great Lakes with the St. Lawrence.

"Regarding the common interests of western states," he continued, "California and Idaho will both be benefited by the construction of Boulder dam, and in this connection all California feels grateful to Congressman Addison T. Smith for the able and successful efforts he conducted for the passage of the bill. Oakland is not directly interested in the building of the dam, but it is glad that Arizona has just signed the seven state pact, the construction seems assured."

Gain Six Seats

"We, of California, gain six seats in the house of representatives by the new apportionment bill. This increases our influence and, likewise, the influence of the western states as a whole. "It is impossible, of course, to know at this time in what shape the tariff bill will eventually be enacted. It will doubtless be changed in some respects by the senate committee and in other respects on the floor of the senate, and finally, probably again in conference. I trust, however, that as enacted it will meet the real needs of the farmer. "While some members of the senate and some members of the house would be glad to see the debenture plan incorporated into the tariff bill, I do not believe that it will be. Since the chief executive is opposed to the plan it would be unfortunate to incorporate it into the measure and invite a veto which would prevent tariff revision."

Hoover Favors Canal

"The St. Lawrence canal is of less interest to the people here than to the people of the East. It will require a treaty between the United States and Canada to permit its construction and the United States is notably the Montreal Star, fighting against it. President Hoover was at one time head of the canal committee, but looked favorably on the plan, but we are still unprepared to draft a report on it. "We did not arrive in your community until this afternoon when we drove out to see your high bridge and the falls and later drove around town for a time. We were impressed with the similarity of many of the fields to those of California, especially the alfalfa fields. You grow many things here which we use and need in California and trade between the two states should be of mutual benefit. Mrs. Carter and I visited Congressman and Mrs. Smith this evening."

TESTS ON SCHEDULE FOR COUNTY'S HERDS

State and Federal Veterinarians to Conduct Campaign for Area Rating

State and federal veterinarians will test Twin Falls cattle for tuberculosis beginning next Monday, according to arrangements worked out with the county commissioners and the county agent, Priddy. The tests are to be made at this time in order to continue Twin Falls county on the list of government accredited tuberculosis free counties, of which there are 717 in the United States and 29 in Idaho.

Not all of the cattle in Twin Falls county will be tested at this time, but new tests will be made in herds where tuberculosis was found three years ago when the county was placed on the accredited list. Herds that have been increased by addition of cattle from other states, also will be tested at this time, and owners of cattle in other herds may arrange through the county agent's office for testing.

In the original tests in Twin Falls county three years ago 22,000 animals were examined and infection was reduced to less than one-half of one per cent. Economically, as well as from the standpoint of health of consumers of meat and dairy products in this county, it is important that the county be kept on the accredited list. Dr. W. A. Sullivan, Boise, director of federal bureau of animal industry activities in Idaho, declared here last evening. The testing campaign in this county will be headed by Dr. B. M. Turner, state veterinarian and Dr. J. E. Ellis, Dr. William C. Nye and Dr. F. H. McEvin, federal veterinarians, assisted by accredited veterinarians of this county.

Damage caused by the break was reported to be negligible. Approximately 60 second feet of water was pouring through the break when it was discovered early in the morning. Cause of the break was attributed to work of muskrats.

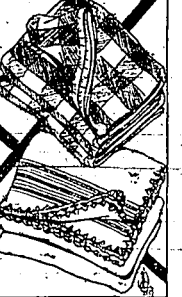

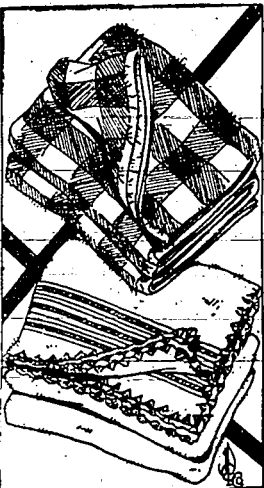
