BORAH TRAINS GUNS ON-FLEXIBLE-TARIFF PROPOSAL OF HOUSE

Idaho Senior Senator Declares Present Provisions "In Utter Violation of Constitution"

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—An attorney for the flexible provision of the house tariff bill by Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, was circulated tonight by the publicity bureau of the Democratic national committee.

In it, the Idaho senator expressed the opinions that there "is no better illustration of the growth of bureaucracy to be had than the story of the flexible tariff, and that the present proposals in utter violation of the constitution."

Subsequently at his home Borah said his views on the tariff bill were public property and had been stated often, adding:

"If the Democratic national committee distributes them, that is business."

"Congress started out," said the Borah attack made today and circulated by the Democratic publicity bureau, "by authorizing the president, upon the recommendation of the cabinet, to pass the passage of a law in a foreign country to put into effect certain rates."

LADY ASTOR ENTERS INTO BITTER DEBATE

Male Member of Parliament Terms American-Born Woman "Liar"

LONDON, July 23 (AP)—Lady Astor, Virginia-born member of parliament, tonight was told by the presiding officer of the house of commons that he would be glad "if the honorable lady would kindly keep quiet."

IN DISCUSSION OF THE QUESTION OF THE REMOVAL OF EXTRAVAGANT BOARDS OF GUARDIANS, LADY ASTOR HAD MENTIONED THE WORD "CORRUPTION." THREE MEMBERS IMMEDIATELY PROCEEDED TO NAME A SINGLE INSTANCE, AND ON RECEIVING ONLY A GENERAL ANSWER, ASKED HER TO WITHDRAW THE ALLEGATION. SHE DECLINED TO DO SO AND JACK JONES SAID IT WAS PERHAPS BECAUSE SHE CAME FROM A COUNTRY WHERE THEY KNEW SOMETHING ABOUT CORRUPTION THAT LADY ASTOR WAS SO Glib.

WITHDRAWS WORDS

IN THE HEAT OF HIS EXCITEMENT, MR. JONES WENT SO FAR AS TO CALL THE FEMININE OPPONENT A "DIRTY LIAR." ON THE URGINGS OF FELLOW MEMBERS, HE WITHDREW THESE WORDS, ALTHOUGH WITH THE REMARK, "BUT THEY ARE QUITE BIBLICAL."

DEPUTY SPEAKER DONNICHO ATTEMPTED TO MAKE PEACE, WHEREUPON MR. JONES REPLIED: "I HAD TO HAVE SOME INSULTS FROM THE LADY THAT I AM RESEMBLING HER EVERY DAY." 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PRESIDENT ACTS TO CURTAIL OUTLAY FOR MILITARY PURPOSES

Chief Magistrate Regards Army and Navy Costs as Greatest Obstacles to Reduction in Taxation

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—With American expenditures for purely military purposes exceeding those of any nation in the world, President Hoover today announced a general program for curtailing these outlays—to the last point that will produce an adequate national defense.

AS AN IMMINENT RESULT, THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE HOPES A REDUCTION IN TAXES CAN BE EFFECTED. "THE ESTIMATED MILITARY DISBURSEMENTS OF THE NEXT FOUR YEARS HE REGARDS AS THE GREATEST OBSTACLE IN THE WAY OF A CUT IN THE FEDERAL TAX SCHEDULES."

THROUGH A NEW INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENT, PRESIDENT HOOPER HOPES TO REDUCE THE COST OF MAINTAINING AMERICAN sea forces, and as a means of slashing army costs he plans to establish a committee of leading army officers with the general staff to determine where savings can be made.

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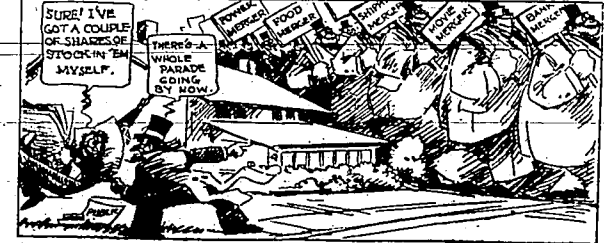

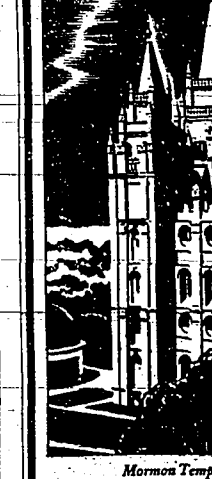

New York Commission Rules Against Plans for Schmeling

State Body Takes

Determined Stand To Prevent Battle

Bout Between German and Jack Sharkey to Result in "Drastic Measures," Big Bill Carey Learns

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, July 23.—The New York state athletic commission today laid down the boxing law as concerns Max Schmeling to all parties interested in the young German heavyweight. First the commission told Big Bill Carey, president of the Madison Square Garden corporation, just what would happen to him and his organization if he negotiated with Schmeling; or attempted to stage a match between the Teuton and Jack Sharkey; for the vacant heavy-weight title outside of New York. Schmeling is under indefinite suspension by the commission for refusal to recognize his legal manager, Arthur Beblow, and a contract to fight Phil Scott here for August 1, 1929.

Carey was informed that "drastic measures" would be taken, that he could expect indefinite suspension and the shutting down of the Garden for three months if he went ahead with plans to bring Schmeling and Sharkey together anywhere while the controversy of Paulino Uzcudun is outlived here. He was told that he had better "help keep boxing on an even keel in New York, respect the commission ruling for the good of all concerned, and forget all about a Sharkey-Schmeling fight for the time being." Carey told the fathers he would "go home and think it over."

Officially the commission announced only that the situation as respects Schmeling and his multiple controversies with managers and promoters was unchanged, but feeling in the matter was deep and bitter once the meeting was over.

Boy Scouts End Season's Program of Work and Play at Camp Independence

BURLEY, July 23 (Special to The News)—Boy Scouts have finished a season of activity at Camp Independence, which was held complete at their camp near Burley. The most interesting piece of handicraft is the totem pole. It took 40 boys to make the totem pole down to camp. The boys had to work hard days to carve the thing into shape.

The completed totem now stands facing the trail that leads across the rustic auto bridge into camp. It is carved into fantastic semblance of queer animals and painted every tint of the rainbow.

At top there stands a phyllopor bird—its claws are firmly fastened into a squatty pine cone and its long curved neck is made out of a twisted quaking asp, ends in head and back with beads eyes surveying the camp lodge.

Below the bird and scaly person, there's a fish, a crow, a coyote's head, and then a lame-crooked snake. This rattler's coiled around the pole, its head thrown into the air, as though it is about to strike its mouth open with a most benign expression for a rattler.

Within sight of the totem pole is the new camp shower. Water used in this shower comes from some distance upstream in the running brook which passes camp, where it is drawn into a pipe that leads into the shower. Here it is cooled through a series of coiled pipe before ending in the shower nozzle. When used, long poles are thrust into the

coiled pipe and set afloat and water pushing through the spray nozzle comes out warm and steaming. Below this, the boys' imaginations take their turns at the camp.

The parade ground has been extended this season, and lined with rocks from the mountains. The camp is located at the foot of the bald knob of Mount Independence, in a small forest grove, and at the end of a good mountain road maintained for forest rangers. It is believed to be the world's highest Boy Scout camp, the altitude being 7000 feet. Two miles south is the chain of Mt. Independence, where the boys take overnight hikes. Two miles to the north is the forest rangers camp. The nearest farmhouse is six miles toward Cayley. Interesting natural curiosities are to be found close to camp, such as the "pot holes," which are three great deep holes given into the solid rock, as though crushed down by a giant bursting boiler with water at the bottom. There are also many sorts of wild animals. Blue grouse are seen, and sage hens, and now and then a deer.

J. H. Jamme, scout executive, had personal charge of this camp during the season. He was assisted by Pascal Adams, president of the Snake River council, and director of the camp. Boys came from many camps, the most from Minidoka counties. About 80 campers of the season; which lasted two weeks.

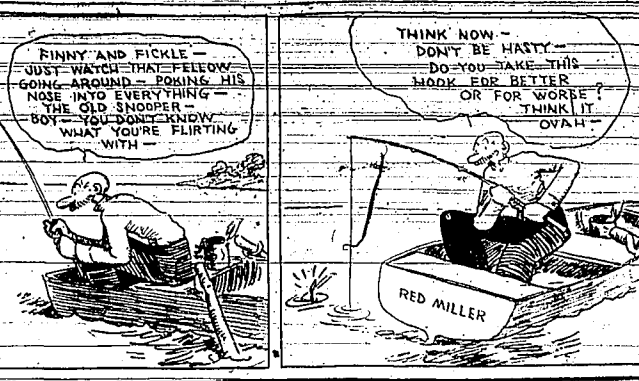

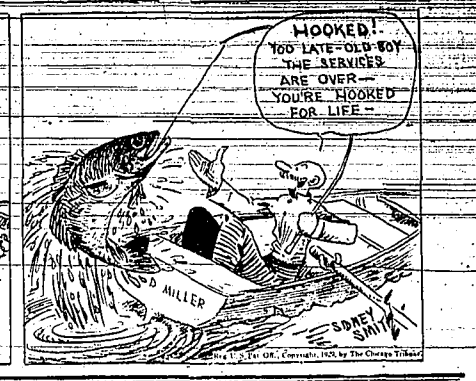

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BASIS FOR SHARING MILNER DAM COSTS WORK FOR LAWYERS

Twin Falls and North Side Canal Companies Move Toward Agreement With American Falls District

A tentative basis for sharing of Milner dam maintenance and operation costs is to be worked out by attorneys, according to a decision reached by officials and directors of the Twin Falls Canal company and American Falls-Tasoway district No. 2, at a joint meeting at Coeur d'Alene, Tuesday afternoon.

The dam, which was built in 1907 to divert waters of Snake river to the original Twin Falls project and a portion of the North Side project, now is used for diversion of 3600 cubic feet of water to the Twin Falls Canal company, 3300 cubic feet of water to the North Side Canal company, and with the completion of the reservoir district's Milner-Shoshone canal, will be used in diversion of 2700 cubic feet of water to lands under the new canal.

These figures, it was indicated, may serve as basis for division of maintenance and operation costs in the tentative contract that is to be drawn by attorneys for the three participating organizations.

It has always been the purpose of the new reservoir district to pay a fair and reasonable price for water rights.

Milner dam, United States Senator John Thomas, Gooding, who is president of the district, told the joint meeting Tuesday.

Twin Falls Canal company was represented by its directors and John P. Hayes, general manager, and Judge James R. Bothwell, attorney.
