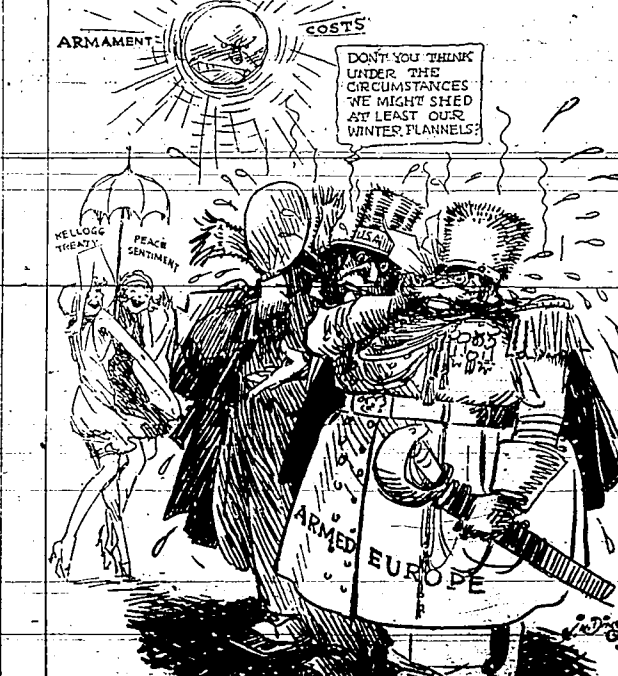

DETROIT, July 26 (AP)—Joe Dundee, Baltimore, who was suspended from membership in Jackie Fields here last night on a foul, was suspended today by the Michigan athletic board in control.

The suspension, which was made indefinite, is effective in 22 states. Dundee will lose nothing financially by the suspension, however. He collected \$50,000 the full amount of his purse, before entering the ring last night.

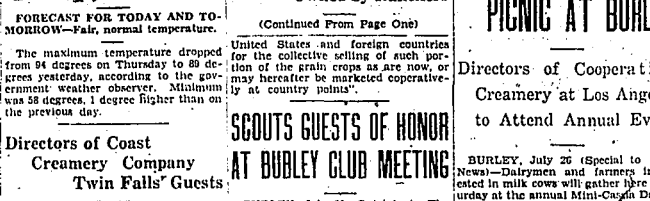

Henri Cochet Whips Tilden Badly in Straight Sets

French Master of Racquet Super in Championship Play

American's Bid to Regain Symbol of World Tennis Supremacy Breaks When Fading Ace Meets Defeat

LANSING, July 26—America's bid to regain the Davis cup, symbol of world tennis supremacy, went down today before the perfect defenses of France.

Superb in his execution of every stroke, the French master, Henri Cochet, whipped Bill Tilden, fading American ace, in straight sets, Jean Borotra, veteran from the Hague last year, young Chicagoan, George Lott, with the loss of his one set in the opening stages of the challenge. What the doubles schedule for tomorrow and another part of Sunday, France needs but on more victory to retain the famous cup for another year.

That one victory should be anything more than a mere yesterday's play, Opening America's challenge this afternoon, the best the 25-year-old Lott could do was to keep Borotra from opening and bounding as much as he is wont to do. He could not keep him from winning with scores of 6-1, 2-6, 6-2.

In the second match, Cochet, the world champion, played with the accuracy of a true artist inspired to his best efforts and gave the once invincible Tilden the worst beating America's master of the racquet ever has suffered in international play. Cochet won with the loss of only half a dozen games. The scores were 6-3, 6-2.

If Cochet can even approach on Sunday the unsurpassable form he had in the first match, he will have no fears for her hold upon the Davis cup. Cochet and Borotra will represent France against Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn in the Davis cup challenge round tomorrow. It was announced by French tennis authorities tonight.

Selection of Cochet and Borotra to play the doubles indicated that France was determined to clinch the series tomorrow if possible.

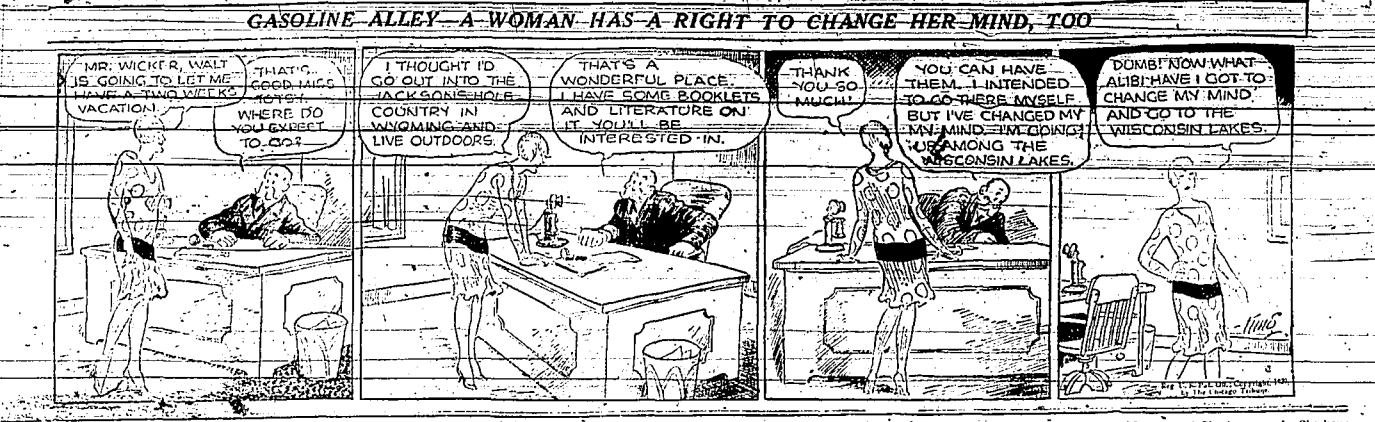

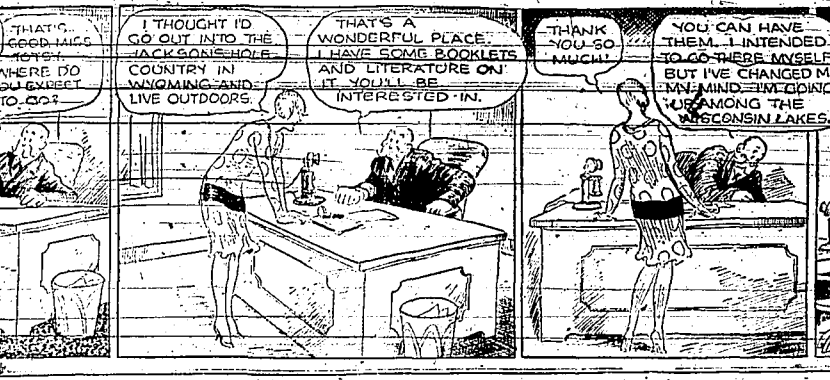

GROWERS IN COURT LAUNCH ATTACK ON GRADE REGULATION

H. T. West and 24 Others in Behalf of All Similarly Situated, Out to Block Enforcement of Rules

Attacking the validity of Idaho potato grade and shipping regulations adopted by the last session of the legislature, Harry T. West, Kimberly, and 24 other potato growers and shippers instituted suit in district court here Friday to enjoin the state department of agriculture, and John S. Welch, state commissioner of agriculture, and W. H. Wicks, chief agricultural inspector, from attempting to enforce these regulations.

These regulations, the growers assert in their complaint, are repugnant and in violation of provisions of the federal and state constitutions. It is alleged further that the regulations are unnecessary, expensive and discriminatory, operating to the advantage of buyers and to the disadvantage of growers, and penalizing growers of the late potato crop as compared with growers of the early crop. It is contended, also, that those who market their crop in unbranded containers.

There is nothing immoral, unwholesome or unsafe in growing, packing and selling potatoes, the growers' complaint in this action, which was filed by Hodgins and Hodgins, Twin Falls attorneys, Friday recites. "Sorting, packing and branding as required" the complaint continues, "does not create a market, or increase the price, or aid in the sale of Idaho potatoes, but the requirements operate to the great disadvantage of the growers and to the decided advantage of the buyers of Idaho potatoes."

Refers to Production
Under conditions where the potato grower must produce a greater quantity per acre of a higher quality of potatoes and pack them at a less cost than growers in competing regions, the complaint recites, potato growing has been developed as one of the principal industries of Twin Falls county which produces 17,000,000 to 19,000,000 bushels of the crop and markets it in 30 states throughout the entire country. The reputation of the Idaho potato, the complaint asserts, was established in the period from 1912 to 1918, prior to any state regulation.

Under the new law, the complaint recites, sale of Idaho potatoes outside the state is prohibited unless graded and marked "United States Fancy Idaho," "United States No. 2 Idaho," "United States No. 3 Idaho," "Idaho," or "cull" potatoes. "This grading and marking, it is contended in the complaint, involves a cost of 20 cents a bush, which is so great that it is impossible to produce, pack and ship United States No. 2 grade potatoes and those of inferior quality at a profit.

No Provision in Law
There is no provision in the law, the complaint points out, for appeal from the decision of the inspectors in determination of grades. Charge of discrimination in the law is based on its provision for packing and shipping in plain bags of potatoes marketed in July, August and September in limited regions about King Hill, Boise Valley, Caldwell and Wilder. This, it is argued, constitutes discrimination against the later crop which is not ready to market before October.

The complaint refers to an instance where inspectors, under the new law, refused to permit shipment of 19 out of 20 carloads of clean, sound and merchantable potatoes on the trucks between Murtagh and Buhl one day last March, but required the shippers to re-

sort potatoes in the 10 cars that the inspectors decided did not meet grade requirements. "This," it is stated, "involved an extra cost of 23 cents a bush. The inspector, it is charged, refused to inspect the potatoes before they were loaded on cars."

Brand Law Repugnant
The regulations under attack, it is contended are repugnant to and in violation of provisions of the federal constitution that gives to congress the power to regulate interstate commerce and manufacture, that provides that there shall be no deprivation of life, liberty or property without due process of law, and that there shall be no denial to any person of equal protection under the laws.

Similar provisions in the Idaho constitution also are violated by the regulations, it is asserted. There is conflict also, it is contended, between the regulations and the federal pure food law and another act of congress in 1927 authorizing the secretary of agriculture to promulgate rules for certification of the condition of farm products.

The action is brought in behalf of all other persons similarly situated by Harry T. West and the other growers and shippers named as plaintiffs. W. B.
