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IDAHO PENITENTIARY WARDEN REPLIES TO CRITICS OF METHODS

Heated Answer to Attack on "Medieval" Practices of Discipline Reveals Clash Between Officials

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, July 30.—An attack on "medieval methods" of prison discipline in the Idaho penitentiary today drew a heated answer from Warden J. W. Wheeler, which incidentally revealed a clash between the warden and Fred E. Lukens, secretary of state and member of the state prison commission.

The attack was contained in a statement published soon in the "handbook of American prisons," in which a reply by Warden Wheeler will also be published.

A copy of the article, written by an investigator of the National Society of Penal Information, which was sent to Warden Wheeler along with his reply. The article charged that the "punishment meted out in the Idaho penitentiary is practically all that has been learned about the handling of criminals in the last 1600 years."

Refers to Cells. It made particular reference to the punishment cells. "They have solid walls," it said, "with narrow slit and a few holes, and are enclosed in a solid concrete building, ventilated by a small intake fan which is not running at all times. There is a small ventilator in the roof of each cell. Men have been kept in the punishment section for as long as 10 months. Other prisoners find it sufficient to have isolation cells for chronic offenders that are neither dark nor badly ventilated."

Warden Replies. In reply, Warden Wheeler declared that "the punishment ward is far from being a medieval cell. It is well ventilated and kept clean. Of course we did not build it to rival in comfort the population of the nation's leading hospitals. It is built with the thought in mind of punishing and bettering the population of the state of criminals and scoundrels as ever infested the western part of the United States. PRESIDENT ANSWERS LEGIONNAIRE CRITIC OF NAVAL PROGRAM

Chief Magistrate Fears Paul V. McNutt Has Been Misinformed As to Actual, Intricate Problems. WASHINGTON, July 30.—President Hoover said today in a letter to Paul V. McNutt, national commander of the American Legion, that parity with Great Britain is guaranteed by our naval authorities as a complete defense of the United States in any contingency.

Defense, the president added, is all that America is seeking. Mr. Hoover said he would apply to a communication from the Legion commander in which the latter criticized the chief executive's position in postponing the building three cruises as tending toward disparity with England. At the same time McNutt suggested that the policy of the United States in construction, America should build a fleet of vessels of this kind.

That the president is following the naval developments and the President's relations in London between the United States and Great Britain, McNutt said, was a matter of course. He said that he was glad to have the assurance that the American Legion supported the policy of parity and went on to say that "the first step of the re-heard consideration of reduction of the excessive world naval armament has been taken in the form of a preliminary to discussion between Great Britain and the United States."

It is better, the president continued, that the chief executive should be made to resign ourselves to continue attempts to establish it by steel and other industries. 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BUILDING PROJECTS TOTALING \$31,000 RECORD OF ONE DAY

Three Applicants Disclose Plans For Construction to Get Under Way in Various Parts of City

Three building projects, involving estimated investment totaling \$31,000, are under way, or will be started at various points in Twin Falls, according to applications for municipal builders' permits filed here Tuesday.

A modern apple packing plant and warehouse will be established by Alvira Harbort, produce dealer, in a structure of frame and corrugated iron, 110 by 140 feet, that will be built on six lots on Fourth avenue south between Third and Fourth streets, which he purchased recently. Estimated cost of the building is \$8,000. All electrically operated, will call for an additional outlay of not less than \$5,000. The plant will have capacity for sorting and packing 100 cartons of apples a day. It is to be a "drive-in" plant, situated on a trackway sufficient for four cars at one time.

Clearing of the dumpsite is begun Tuesday and the construction is to be pushed to completion under contract awarded to P. R. Thompson.

Will Build Addition

Jerome Cooperative creamery, which recently purchased the Lincoln product line, will build a new building, 100 by 60 feet, at a cost of \$7,000, to permit of improvement and expansion. This plant is to be used principally for manufacture of ice cream.

Pattern Building Company, Emmet, Idaho, will build at the corner of Main avenue and Third street north, a brick and concrete structure, 75 by 125 feet, costing \$10,000, to house a modern garage and super service station. The site, formerly owned by the Great State Oil company, is being cleared now preparatory to beginning construction which is to be completed in two days.

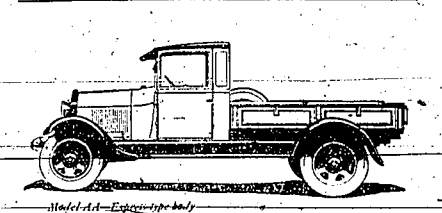

He does not slump down behind the wheel nor sit with his feet over the edge of the car door. The driver's position will interfere with his freedom of action in handling the wheel should it be necessary to meet some sudden emergency. The driver who slumps down behind the wheel will stir him more quickly than he will in addition to this, the position interferes with proper vision of the road and also, by its very awkwardness, delays his reactions in meeting an emergency.

"As for holding the wheel, consider the diameter of the wheel as a clock face, with 12 at the top, 6 at the bottom. The most comfortable way to grasp the wheel, and at the same time the best to allow for fast maneuvering with the left hand at 9 and the right hand at 3 o'clock.

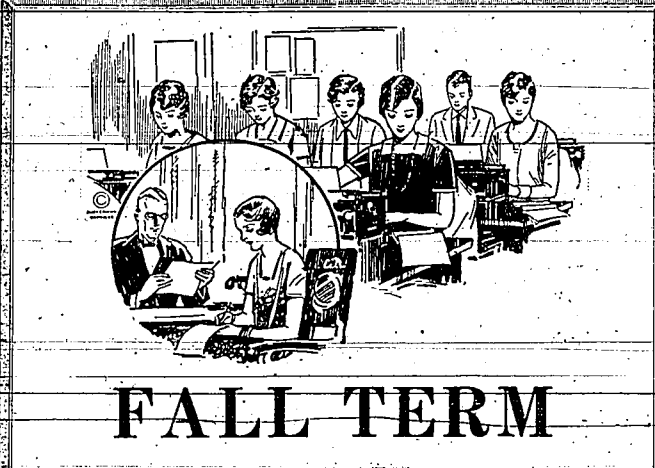
