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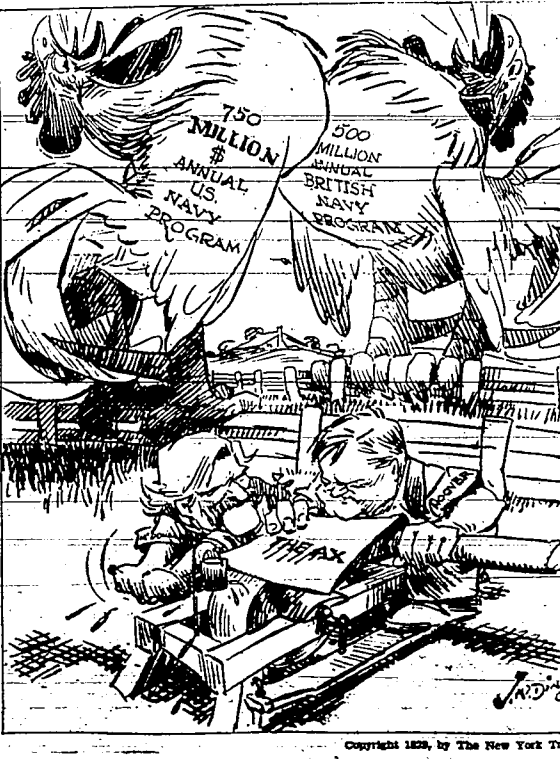
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UTAH-CUBAN SCORES FORCES IN CONTROL OF CUBANS' SUGAR

Senator King Blames Element Recent Increase in Quotations On Product

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 31.—Forces controlling the Cuban sugar crop are blamed today by Senator King, Democrat, Utah, for the recent increase in American sugar prices.

The Utah senator, who is generally regarded as a low tariff legislator, declared control of American prices by the Cuban producers, "justifies Congress in taking this into account in determining the tariff policy which shall govern the Cuban sugar situation."

Senator King's declaration, coming on the eve of the consideration of a tariff by the senate finance committee of which he is a member, gave new impetus to the controversy centered upon the Cuban sugar situation. The tariff increase the sugar rate and a campaign has been conducted either for a reduction of this schedule or the substitution of a sliding scale.

"Cuba and the American sugar refining company," said Senator King, "can and should have a sliding scale tariff in the United States. They can and do depress prices or advance them to levels which permit exploiting the American consumer. It is small consolation to the extent of responsibility for this situation which is to be laid at the doors of the cane sugar refining companies."

He complained also of the formation of a joint combination for control of the sugar prices and declared this situation might leave America at the mercy of the Cuban nation.

"If the Cuban government and the American financial interests in Cuba had always acted fairly and equitably in the Cuban sugar situation," Senator King said, "there would be a stronger basis for appeals for consideration in the United States."

He reported within the last few days, he declared, "indicate that in addition to the control in which Cuba is to be the Cuban sugar situation, Senator King said, "there would be a stronger basis for appeals for consideration in the United States."

There is one phase of the Cuban sugar situation that permits attention. My information is that American interests control from 65 to 70 per cent of the sugar output of Cuba, and own or control by lease or otherwise an important part of all lands devoted to cane production. The National Bank of the Chase National bank and the Guarantee Trust company, New York, own and control the greater part of the interest just referred to. The Cuban Cane company and the Cuban American Sugar company, (owned by Americans) are also large Cuban sugar producers.

(By The Associated Press) Boise, July 31.—William McKeel, Idaho fish commissioner, today handed in his resignation to the state game department following months of differences with local fish and game associations over methods of rearing trout in the local rearing ponds.

In a statement accompanying his resignation he said he was forced to leave partially completed an outlined plan of fishery work which he had been working for the past several years.

He declared Idaho had greater possibilities for fish culture work than any state in the Union and said the department was at present in a fair way to realize many of the possibilities. Warden R. E. Thomas is with the Beecher basin committee in eastern Idaho, until his return, about August 5.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 31.—Sammy Mandell, who will defend his world lightweight boxing championship against Tony Cazanzeri at Chicago stadium Friday night was spirited away from his rural camp tonight under police guard as a precaution against possible violence by members of a purported gambling club.

Mandell was a heavy favorite in the betting, the odds on him having mounted steadily during the last week. According to persons close to the champion, Mandell has been annoyed by anonymous telephone calls and prowlers at his camp, during the last 24 hours. These were believed to have been investigations by a syndicate mounting to stage a betting coup. As a result the police guard was obtained to accompany him to a hotel, and to remain with him until ring time. As he left his camp Mandell said the "funny stuff" had upset him considerably, and while he was not certain that anyone was trying to harm him, had decided to take no chances.

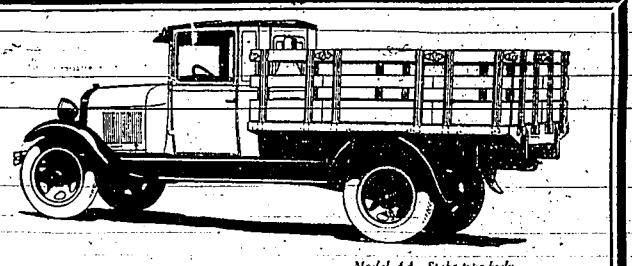
