UNREST SMOLDERING AMONG CONVICTS AT LEAVENWORTH PRISON

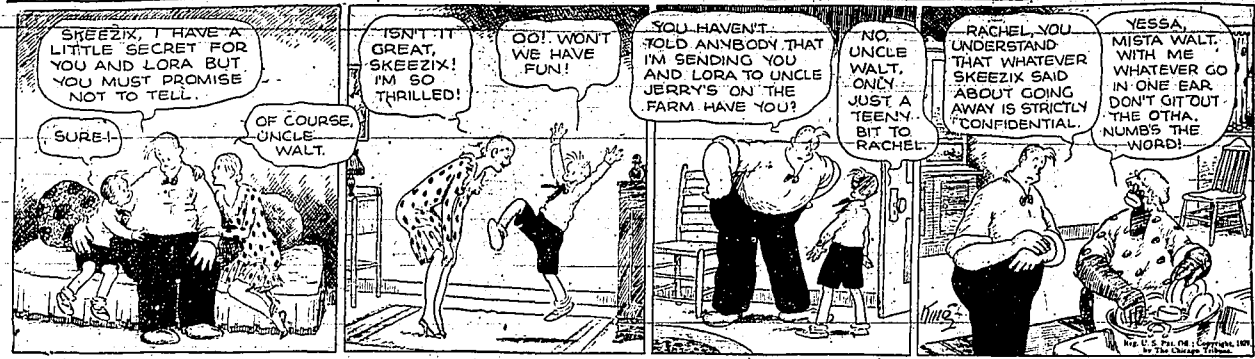

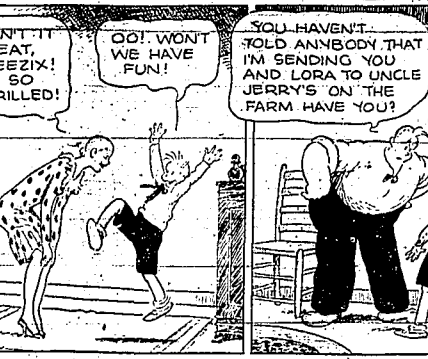

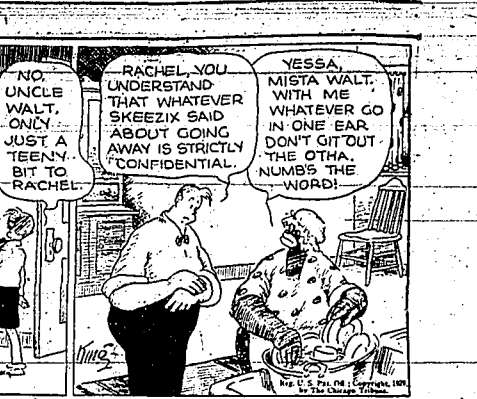

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SEVEN PERSONS HURT IN ACCIDENTS NEAR TWIN FALLS IN DAY

Mrs. Jack Empey and Miss LaRene Robinson received cuts and bruises in Auto Crash On State Highway

Mrs. Jack Empey, 563 Main avenue east, and Miss LaRene Robinson, 463 Third avenue north, were cut and bruised in an auto crash on the highway two miles south of Twin Falls last night at 9:30 o'clock, and five other persons were injured in a series of accidents in or near Twin Falls during the afternoon yesterday.

Go To Airport Mrs. Robinson left Twin Falls in a car driven by Wesley Mench about 7:30 o'clock in the evening, it was reported. Miss Robinson and Mr. Mench, both employed by a Twin Falls electrical supply company, were, it was said, going to the Twin Falls airport in response to an invitation extended by employees of that company to a picnic on a plain on the field, to accompany him for brief flights during the evening.

On their way homeward their machine collided with a touring car driven by Jack Empey, who was turning from the highway to the left. Mrs. Empey received three cuts on the head, one fracture of the right leg and a number of minor bruises.

Bodily Crushed Arm Miss Robinson's injuries consisted of a badly crushed right arm which she shouldered to the rear of her car about four inches long above the right arm, a laceration of the palm of the right hand. The cuts were all caused by the glass in the windshield, through which, it is stated, she was thrown by the impact.

Empey, an officer of the Twin Falls police department and Mrs. Tom Hyranda, Idaho Falls, the other passenger in the Miss Robinson car, and Mr. Mench, driver of the other car involved, escaped with minor injuries.

Occupants of the two cars were brought to Twin Falls by Frank Smith. Mrs. Empey was brought to the county hospital. Miss Robinson received treatment in the office of a physician.

TWIN FALLS SHOWS EXCELLENT GROWTH DURING YEAR 1929

Many New Enterprises Get Under Way; Improvements and Expansions Mark Numerous Others

Ten new industries and business enterprises have started in Twin Falls since January 1, according to the monthly report for August 1, of Newell B. Wight, secretary of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, made public yesterday. It is noted in the report, calls attention to 22 business expansions and to 15 improvements made in the same period, not including the number of new service stations.

Six community meetings were held during the period covered by the report. The district meeting of county commissioners will be held here this month. The organization is participating in the same period, not including freight rates and was active in the movement to secure daily train service to and from Wells.

The Chamber of Commerce was especially identified with the introduction of several new activities and industries. This was especially true in regard to the establishment of the county health unit, the landing fish unit and the establishment here of the H. W. Jacobs cold pack cannery plant, the concrete pipe plant and the purchase of the Lincoln Produce and Refrigerating company plant by the Jerome Cooperative Creamery.

Bank clearings for the first six months of 1929 show an increase of 70 per cent over the average for the last five years. During this time the new Christian church building has been nearly completed, the tabernacle of the Latter Day Saints church, finished, the government experiment station completed, the new airport established, the fish-rearing plant of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association enlarged and the Twin Falls Country club golf course purchased and improved, the report points out.

Throughout the night his dog "Tramp" remained by his side barking loudly when several coyotes appeared. It was his sister who led the search, he said. Thursday morning about 10 o'clock she found him, and using a fence post as a lever, removed the boulder.

Grant's physician last night declared the boy's condition was improved, and expressed hope that the injured leg could be saved. He indicated that the greatest danger lies in the possibility of gangrene-infection.

MINIDOKA DIRECTORS VIEW AUGUR FALLS POWER SITE

W. C. Paul, Rupert, president of the Minidoka irrigation district, accompanied by C. W. Brannan, and A. A. Brockman, directors, Ray Willis, manager, and Albert H. Lee, publisher of the Minidoka County News, all of Rupert, and Barry Dibble, Redlands, California, electrical engineer, were in Twin Falls yesterday following a visit to the Augur falls power site.

They declared to state whether the visit had any special significance in connection with the disagreement with the Burley Irrigation district over division of power plant profits and with possible further developments of the plant jointly. The Minidoka district has indicated that it will not consent to joint improvement of the plant unless there is a readjustment of the division of profits.

Mr. Dibble has been engaged by the Minidoka district to make complete estimates of the profits on the power site operated jointly with the Burley Irrigation district. In regard to the division of which petition for rehearing has been filed with the secretary of interior, Mr. Paul said that the total profits during the 15 year operation amounted to about \$1,200,000. Secretary Work ruled that this should be divided 95 per cent for Burley and 4 per cent for the Burley district on the basis of the percentage of investment of the districts in the power plant alone. The Minidoka district contends that it should be based on the total cost of the irrigation district operated jointly, which is claimed to be \$1,200,000. The Burley district 60 per cent and the Burley district 40 per cent.

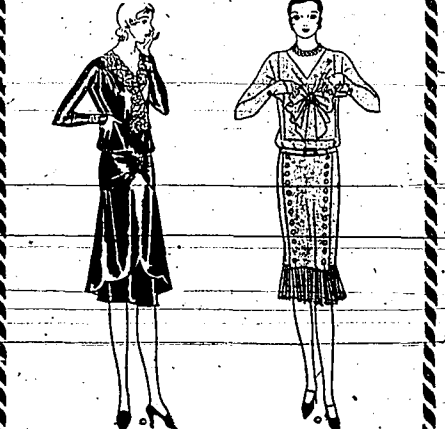
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
