RECRUITS JOIN ARMY—RETREATING BEFORE FLAMES IN FORESTS

Low Humidity Favors Fires in Valuable Timber Land of Pacific, Northwest and Haze of Smoke Hides Sun

(By The Associated Press.) SPOKANE, Aug. 9.—Forest officials late tonight appealed for more men and pack trails were the only means to help them battle the forest fires which are eating through western Montana, northern Idaho and eastern Washington.

Lightning last night started 42 new fires in Northwest Montana and northern Idaho.

Forest officials today said the situation was becoming increasingly alarming, and sent out new calls for every available man to join crews that have been under fire for two weeks.

THOUSANDS OF MEN IN BATTLE AGAINST FLAMES—SPOKANE, Aug. 9.—The fire situation in the Northwest forest had not improved today and many more men were recruited to join the thousands toiling to save the timber.

In eastern Washington, the Lone Lake fire has been blown down, but the Spokane forestry office reported a worse blaze on Bald Mountain and new fires in the Kootenai region.

### EXPERTS TESTIFY IN SNOOK MURDER TRIAL

#### Defense Attempts to Discredit Charge Client Premeditated Girl's Slaying

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 9 (AP)—Four medical experts were introduced by attorneys for Dr. James H. Snook in his third degree murder trial today to discredit the charge that he premeditated the killing of Thelma K. Hill. When Dr. Snook had brought to a close his testimony, the court ruled that the defense should be permitted to call the four experts to testify in which he denied any remembrance of slaying the girl's throat after hearing her with a hammer on the night she was killed, last June 13, the expert witnesses were called to the stand.

Each of them testified as to a description of the hammer wounds on the girl's head and the knife wound on her throat. They said they could not tell which of the wounds had caused her death. Their opinions were an attempt to show that Dr. Snook had deliberately severed the jugular vein of his young mistress to put her out of her misery. The witnesses were Dr. Jonathan Ferencik, Dr. J. B. Harris, Dr. L. H. Vanbuskirk and Dr. Eugene McCampbell, all Columbus pathologists.

#### VALUABLE SETTER VICTIM OF "HIT-AND-RUN" DRIVER

A "hit-and-run" driver, piloting an old Ford sedan carrying a 1928 Illinois license, struck and instantly killed a valuable young Irish setter dog owned by Mrs. W. J. Wadsworth, 418 1/2 First avenue north, last evening, at 8:22 p.m. Twin Falls police magistrate, A. Nelson, reported the incident to police headquarters. The license number was not learned, and the car had disappeared when police officers arrived at the scene.

#### Receiver in Suit Over Estate Files Accounts

A final accounting by Stuart H. Nye, receiver in the estate of Benjamin Nye, against her brothers, Charles A. Stein and George W. Stein, was allowed and settled under an order issued by Judge W. A. Babcock in district court here Friday.

The suit, which was noticed by Judge last spring in favor of the brothers, involved dispute over administration of the father's estate, and Mrs. Nye sought to have her brothers removed as trustees for her portion of the estate. The receiver was appointed upon the death of the father, and was removed later when the court sustained the brothers' contentions.

# Illinois Governor Names New State Athletic Commission

## Prominent Chicago Sportsmen Succeed Resigned Members

Millionaire Coal Operator, Regimental Commander in World War and Banker to Assume Work of Body

By CHARLES W. DUNKLEY (Associated Press Sports Writer) CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—A millionaire coal operator, a regimental commander in the World war, and a banker, all Chicagoans, are the new members of the Illinois state athletic commission. Governor Louis L. Emerson at Springfield today named General John V. Clinin, lawyer, soldier and ardent devotee of athletics as chairman of the commission. George F. Getz, wealthy coal operator, big game hunter, who was associated with the late Tex Rickard in the promotion of the Dempsey-Carpentier fight two years ago, and Fred Erick Gardner, vice president of the Illinois Central Bank and Trust company, were appointed the other two members of the commission.

New Era in Boxing Governor-Emerison's appointments were hailed as the beginning of a new era in boxing. The new commissioners represent the highest type of sportsman and business man in the state. General Clinin, with an insight into the intricacies of boxing and wrestling, has a reputation of being a strict disciplinarian and has depended upon his friends early to rule with an iron hand. Mr. Gardner is a follower of amateur athletics a sport (part of the warmest kind, and a proffer of considerable ability.

General Clinin served in both the Spanish-American and World wars. As commander of a regiment, he was awarded the distinguished service medal after having been twice cited for bravery by General Pershing, and has held the middleweight and heavyweight boxing title in the Central American Athletic union.

Change Follows "Ticket Grab" The new commissioners assume control Monday. Mandell will succeed Paul Prehn, Al Mann and Samuel Luzzo. Their resignations were requested by Governor Emerson. ### RUDE VAULT YIELDS MYSTERIOUS BONES

Coroner and Sheriff Uncover Skeleton in Canyon Grave Near Clear-Lakes

A rude vault in Snake river canyon north of Buhl, opened yesterday by Twin Falls county sheriff and coroner, gave up bones that were brought here for further investigation to determine whether they were those of a child or of an animal. Dr. C. C. Halley, deputy county coroner and former county physician, who assisted in the investigation, expressed belief last evening that the bones were those of a small animal, probably a porcupine.

The vault was situated on top of a steep knoll, near the foot of an old roadway known as the Chualar. The burial place was about a mile east of the highway at Clear-Lakes. A big boulder formed two sides of the vault, the other two sides being built of small stones and lava rocks and mud to form a square space that was covered with a big flat rock. Fragments of a heavy sack that may have been used to cover the body, were found with the bones, many of which lay on top of the vault.

The vault was discovered last spring by A. E. Hilmer, ranchman, north of Buhl, while surveying for location of ditches for a vineyard in the canyon. The investigation made yesterday was determined upon when officers here learned of the discovery a few days ago. It was reported that the vault contained a child's bones.

The Charles C. Bybee grade is one of the pioneer roads of this region and in the early days led to a ferry crossing the Snake river.

Near the foot of this grade, a stage coach robber buried a cache of several thousand dollars in gold, and although extensive search has been made for the buried treasure, no trace ever has been found of it.

### PISTOL WOUND FATAL TO PIONEER OF BUHL

James Machacek, 47, Dies of Self-Inflicted Injury, Investigation Reveals

James Machacek, 47, farmer and real estate dealer at Buhl for nearly 20 years, died at his residence, three miles south of Buhl, at 1:30 A. M. Friday, an hour and a half later he was found at midnight on the lawn in front of his house with a bullet wound in his head. A .32 caliber revolver, identical to one that Machacek had owned for many years, was found at his side. It contained two cartridges, one of which had been fired.

The fatal wound was self-inflicted, according to conclusions reached after the investigation disclosed that Machacek's health had been failing for some months, and that he had been hurt last Tuesday when a load of hay from a stack in a neighbor's field, and that he had become dependent over the night.

The wounded man was found on the lawn by his wife, who heard the shot. She summoned the elder son, Adolph Machacek, 24, who was asleep in the house, and together they carried the wounded man into the house and summoned first aid men from Buhl and then two neighbors. The younger son, Frank Machacek, 29, had spent the evening at Elmer and returned shortly before his father died.

Machacek died while preparations were under way to take him to the hospital at Tree Falls. The bullet's course was traced from the point of entry almost two inches above the right ear, straight through the skull to a point above the left ear, where the ball was removed. Machacek was prone upon his back when he was found, and it is believed that he was in that position when the shot was fired.

Besides his widow and two sons, Machacek is survived by his father, Anton Machacek, two brothers, Anton Machacek and Anton Machacek, Jr., and one sister, Mrs. Anton Herzinger, all of Buhl. He was born in Bohemia, and lived as a young man in Nebraska, where he was employed as a salaried foreman on the railroad for 20 years ago.

Funeral services, it was announced last evening, will be held at the graveyard in the Buhl cemetery at 2 P. M. Sunday.
