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REBUTTAL BEGINS IN SNOOK MURDER TRIAL

State Attempting to Prove Ohio Co-Ed's Slayer Falsified On Witness Stand

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 12 (AP)—The closing of direct testimony on behalf of Dr. James H. Snook, confessed slayer of Theora Hix, Ohio state university co-ed, and the launching of the rebuttal intended to prove the defendant falsified while on the witness stand today in the Snook murder trial.

The defense rested this afternoon with a final attack on the autopsy by Dr. Joseph Joseph Murphy, retired state physician, who testified that the victim died from a single wound which severed her jugular vein.

The state immediately began its rebuttal to show that Dr. Snook, contrary to his testimony last week, admitted he cut the girl's throat to relieve her from a maniacal attack which he inflicted during a quarrel.

The rebuttal testimony will continue tomorrow and the final arguments of counsel and Judge Henry L. Sculliff's charge to the jury are expected to be delivered Wednesday. The case will be given to the jury immediately afterward.

Dispense With Testimony

Decision of defense attorney to dispense with the testimony of their two assistants and to leave the plea of insanity supported solely by the evidence submitted brought the end of the trial several days nearer.

The prosecution's attempt to impeach Dr. Snook's witness stand account of the killing of his young mistress centered chiefly around the signed confession which the doctor has flatly disclaimed.

As prosecutor Chester read each statement from the stenographic notes of counsel and Judge Henry L. Sculliff's annunciation of Dr. Snook last week the defendant made a general denial of the contents and declared that most of its statements were dictated by the prosecutor.

Ralph O. Brown, the stenographer who took the notes, went to the stand this afternoon and testified that the confession was made by Dr. Snook, and that the defendant did admit severing Miss Hix's jugular vein with his pocket knife.

With testimony thus in direct conflict, it will be up to the 11 men and one woman who comprise the jury to decide whether Dr. Snook or the state has the more accurate story of what happened at the New York Central rifle range on the night of June 13, when Miss Hix was killed.

Revolver Exhibit
A 21 caliber Remington-Union revolver which Dr. Snook said he believed the girl had concealed in her purse was formally introduced as a defense exhibit. It was introduced in the trigger spring and could be cocked only by depressing the muzzle.

Writer Highshoe, a small-arms expert, took the stand as a defense witness and told the jury that the trigger spring had been removed within the last month by an unskilled person, intimating that some member of the state's staff had tampered with it.

The hammer of the gun was not working properly when Detective Gail McGuth found it in a dresser drawer at the apartment which Miss Hix occupied with two friends, but McGuth managed to cock it.

Highshoe testified that the trigger spring must have been in the weapon at that time.

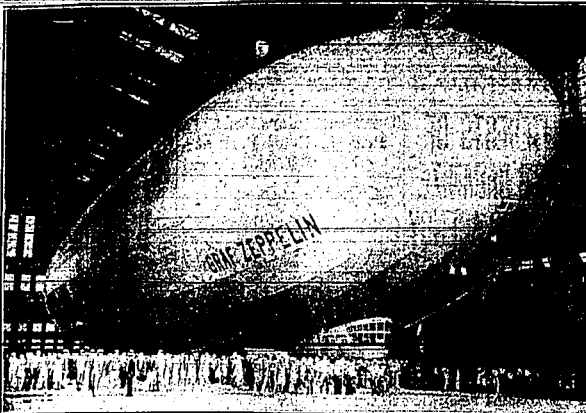

Parachute Jumper Addresses Radioland While Dropping 10,000 Feet To Field

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Aug. 12 (AP)—A parachute jumper today leaped from a plane at an altitude of about 10,000 feet and described to a large radio audience his sensations as he descended.

Officials of the National Broadcasting company said it was the first successful broadcast of its kind.

The feat was performed by H. G. (Buddy) Bushmeyer, parachute expert here. He left his plane at 6:30 P. M. and remained in communications with a radio audience until he was 300 feet above the ground.

His monologue ran somewhat as follows:

"Everything O. K.
"This is 'Buddy' Bushmeyer floating in

a parachute over Roosevelt field. I am having a wonderful time. I see lots of people on the field. I got out at 10,000 feet and as I float down it looks wonderful."

His landing on Mitchell field, one mile south of Roosevelt field. The plane from which he jumped was piloted by Captain J. Nelson Kelly.

Bushmeyer wore a 24-pound transmitter strapped to his chest and a microphone attached to a band around his head.

His broadcast was picked up by a short wave receiver and sent out on a nationwide network of the National Broadcasting company. Two test jumps had been made previously in preparation for that feat.

250,000 FEET OF LUMBER BURN IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

NEW WESTMINSTER, British Columbia, Aug. 12 (AP)—Fire that has engulfed 200 acres of timber land near the camp of the Abernathy Loughed Logging company, 10 miles north of Port Haney, west of Alouette lake, today had destroyed 250,000 feet of fallen and bucked lumber.

One hundred men with two pumps

and 5000 feet of hose were fighting the blaze, which is high up on the mountain side.

A fire near Stead, above the Canadian national railway track, half way between Hope and Boston Bar, was creeping downward from the mountain top and threaten valuable timber near Anderson lake.

"Fire fighters have been driven back from fire breaks by flames fanned by high winds. Lack of water at the altitude has hampered operations there.

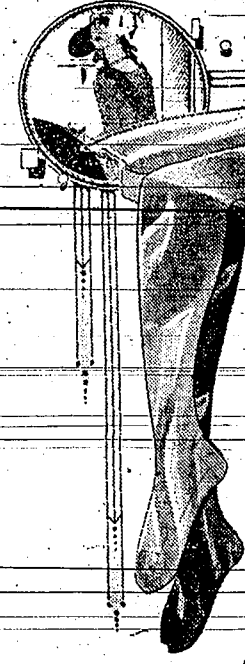

BOARD WHITTLES AT SCHOOLS' DEBT WITH UNCHANGED TAX LEVY

Officials Adopt 2 1/2-Mills Rate For Current Year To Meet Needs of \$270,250 Budget for Period

Twin Falls school board in regular session last evening adopted a \$270,250 budget for the 1929-1930 school year and then approved a 2 1/2-mill school district tax levy. Total of the same for the same period of the year is \$270,250. The total of the tax levy has varied for four years past.

Before adopting the budget and tax levy, the board received and approved the report of a two-year audit submitted by Edwin A. Wilson, auditor of the county, which in his report urged maintenance of the prevailing tax levies.

If the present levy was maintained, the auditor stated, the indebtedness of the district would be wiped out entirely by 1940, and by 1934 it would be reduced to one-half of its present amount.

The auditor approved the financial status of the district in all departments, and especially commended the school tax which has been brought about which does away with necessity that existed for a number of years for payment of large sums of interest on district bonds.

For economies hold levy down. Maturity of bond issues has made necessary increased levies for the district's sinking fund, the auditor advised. This has been accomplished through economies in other departments without increasing the total school tax levy.

An outstanding economic measure has been effected in the cost of transportation of pupils with abandonment of horse-drawn wagons and use of motor buses, which will save \$41,000 in use during the coming year.


The school district's total tax levy for the year is made up of levies of 15 mills for general fund, 4 mills sinking fund, 2 1/2 mills bond interest and 1/2 mill for maintenance.

Distribution of the new year's budget expenditures was listed as follows: General fund, \$112,500; maintenance of plant, \$22,900; maintenance of equipment, \$152,925; operation of plant, \$22,900; maintenance of plant, \$27,500; interest on bonds, \$22,500; fiscal fees, \$100; interest on warrants, \$100; transportation of pupils, \$11,500; library, \$1,250; sundry activities, \$1,025; capital outlays, \$3,500; paying tax, \$2,200.

Board maintains barriers. Twin Falls school board has employed a teacher known to use tobacco or intoxicating liquor, and the board's earnest purpose is to guard against employment of such persons.

Garrett, Ambassador to Rome, Stranded Americans' Succorer

SCORES OF PERSONS WITH GRATITUDE IN HEARTS FOR ENVOY

President Hoover's Latest Appointee for Post in Europe, Special Agent During War On Continent

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—There are many people scattered throughout the United States with gratitude in their hearts for America's newly appointed ambassador to Rome — John Work Garrett.

For he is the man who came to their aid when they needed it most.

After returning to his banking business in Baltimore following long service in the diplomatic service, Mr. Garrett was crossing the Atlantic Ocean to join his wife in Europe when the World War broke out.

He immediately returned to America and was sent back to Europe as special agent of Secretary Bryan to aid stranded Americans.

Burdened with gold, Garrett went straight to Switzerland. There he helped arrange facilities to enable American tourists to return to their homes in the United States.

His work completed, he moved on to Paris, where he remained helping at the American Embassy until the armistice. The French were being rushed in taxless to the defense of the Marne.

In September, 1914, he moved to Bordeaux as the special agent of Ambassador Herrick, remaining three months in charge of American interests. He took charge of German and Austro-Hungarian civilian prisoners until the United States entered the fight.

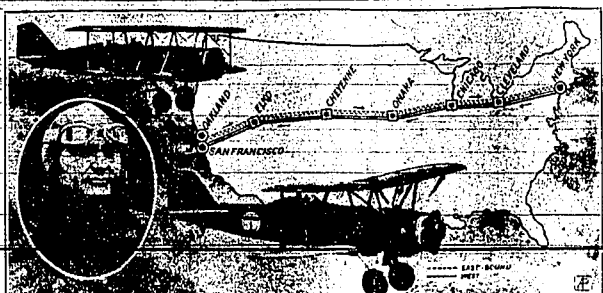
Until the armistice was signed, Garrett was in the thick of war. He not only aided Americans and the German and Austrian governments, but proved a friend of France when he visited prison camps in Germany and obtained some mitigation of conditions affecting French prisoners. He became minister to the Netherlands in 1917 when Dr. Henry Van Dyke resigned.

Toward the end of the war he again went to Switzerland, this time as chairman of a special diplomatic commission to negotiate a treaty with the Germans regarding war prisoners. He was there seven weeks and was able to accomplish a notable coup of forcing the Germans to agree to release all American prisoners in Germany.

In 1918 he retired to unofficial life, resuming his connections with the Baltimore banking firm of Robert Garrett and Sons, but was called back in 1921 to serve as secretary general of the limitations conference in Washington.

In his long service in the diplomatic corps, Garrett's assignments ranged from secretary of embassies to minister to five countries, and he was charged with duties and Berlin numerous times at Luxembourg, Berlin and Rome.

NEW ENGINEERS ON GOODING EXTENSION

Due to Magnitude and Extended Length of Project Supervisor Gets Aids

BURLEY, Aug. 12 (Special to The News)—Due to the magnitude and extended length of the canal work on the Gooding extension, the project supervisor, E. B. Darlington, has placed in charge of construction work with a field office at Shoshone, John K. Rohrer will have charge of the first 44 miles of the canal, to the "big drop" into Wood river valley. Clyde H. Spencer will be in charge of the second section. Operations are under the direction of E. B. Darlington, project superintendent, at Burley.

The canal will be 70 miles in length. Much of the work on the first 20 miles of the canal, which is now under construction, is in solid lava formation. One contracting company is moving 240,000 yards of practically solid lava and 100,000 yards of lava and soil. All the contractors are using the most modern machinery, some of the excavators of extraordinary size.

The capacity of buckets on the drag lines and steam shovels run from one and a quarter up to seven yards. At one point where the canal drops to a depth of about 60 feet, a monitor dragline will be used having a boom 125 feet in length with an extension of an additional 25 feet. One excavating machine, now working on a 28 foot cut, is said to weigh 180 tons. The crew works day and night. The canal here is 50 feet wide on the bottom.

Some of the contracting companies are scheduled to complete their work on this section early next year. Others are to be finished by April 1931. The work has been undertaken for the purpose of conducting irrigation waters to lands on the Gooding tract which now have an insufficient supply, and also for bringing new lands under water. The supply will come from Snake river, with the point of diversion at the Miller dam.

Long spells of heavy, smothering weather are bad for the bees.

This season's crop, Beach estimates, will be 40 per cent below last year's for southern Idaho.

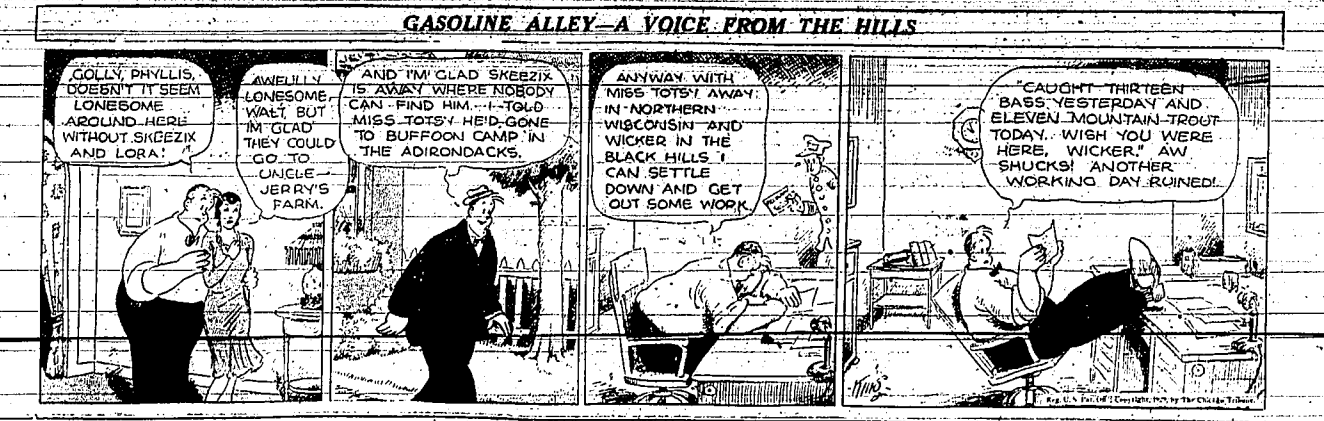

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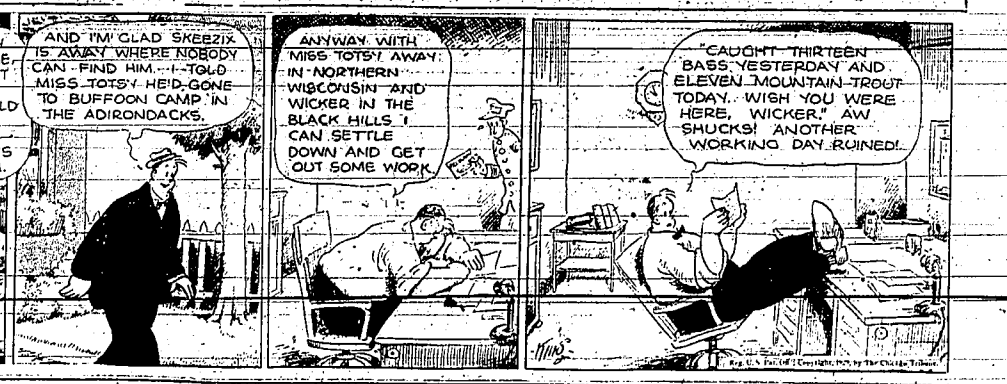

HOT WEATHER CAUSES MANY MOTHS TO FLY

Horticultural Inspector Urges Use of Spray to Combat Menace of Worms

The long hot spell of weather has caused an unusual number of moths to fly, it is stated by E. V. Gipson, district horticultural inspector, who urges that all orchards in the Twin Falls neighborhood and west be sprayed not later than August 16 and orchards in the Kimberly-Hansen district not later than August 20. At least four pounds of lead arsenate to 200 gallons of water, with one pound of the insect powder, should be used so that the spray will not be spotted.

"If a substitute is used a strong nicotine solution is urged, using one ounce of nicotine to 100 gallons of water, or one quart of nicotine (Black Leaf 40), with three-fourths of one per cent summer oil, and one pound of sprayer to 200 gallons. With either spray the fruit clusters must be drenched from all sides in order to coat the apples.

"Growers will find it advisable to protect their fruit, considering the price of apples this year, and should not let the washing question enter in when it can be solved so easily."

Mr. Gipson's statement says, "and growers are faced with a serious loss unless their apples are fully protected by an adequate spray application. Many moths are being caught, even in orchards apparently free from wormy apples caused by the first brood, and it is doubtful if even the cleanest orchards can escape considerable damage if they are not given a thorough spraying at this time."

"The magnitude of the worm menace may be gathered from the number of moths caught in different orchards during the last week. Four traps in orchards at Kimberly caught 303 moths; three traps in Twin Falls orchards caught 231 moths; three traps in Piler orchards caught 225 moths; three traps in Buhl orchards caught 208 moths."

"All orchards around Twin Falls and west should finish a spray application by August 16 and orchards in the Kimberly-Hansen district not later than August 20. At least four pounds of lead arsenate to 200 gallons of water, with one pound of the insect powder, should be used so that the spray will not be spotted."

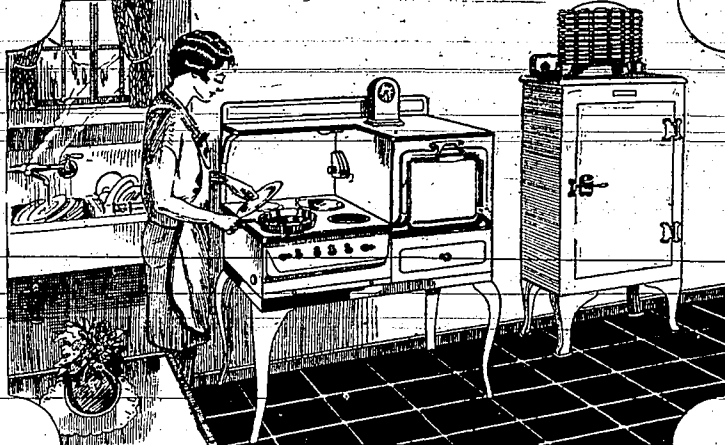


