'They Might as Well Report Bill Now—Because Senate Will Write It,' Declares Senior Senator of Idaho

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The steel industry won an important victory today in the approval of the tariff committee Republicans of an amendment to the house tariff bill to permit the free entry into the United States of manganese ore.

Present Duty Enacted in 1922
The present duty of 1 cent a pound on manganese ore containing in excess of 20 per cent metallic manganese was enacted in 1922 and was retained in the house bill.

Graf Zeppelin Passes Over Bavarian City During Early Morning on Flight to Tokyo

Great German Dirigible With Heavy Cargo and 60 Persons on Board, Departs From Hangar As New Day Dawns, on Most Perilous Part of 6000-Mile Leg of Round-the-World Journey

NUREMBERG, Bavaria, (Thursday morning) Aug. 15.—Graf Zeppelin passed near Nuremberg at 6:15 A. M. today. Nuremberg is about 160 miles north and east of Friedrichshafen on the direct course to Berlin.

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, (Thursday morning) Aug. 15.—The air liner Graf Zeppelin left her home port at 4:34 A. M. today for Tokyo, the second stop on her epoch-making flight around the world.

Graf Zeppelin Passes Over Bavarian City In Morning On Way East

(Continued From Page One)

120 hours under the most favorable circumstances. The Graf's greatest test previously was 111 hours on his first transatlantic voyage.

The Zeppelin will be in Tokyo, barring accidents, on Monday night at the very earliest, after crossing the European Russia, over some of the wildest territory existing on the earth, the straits of Siberia.

Dr. Eckener's immediate course lay northeast of Friedrichshafen, to Berlin, Danzig and Moscow. Everything in the latter part of the course will depend on the weather, the Zeppelin encounters.

No attempt to get aboard was made by any stowaways on this departure, Dr. Eckener said. Even the runway along the top of the hangar was strictly guarded.

The only difficulty experienced was with Nelson Morris, Chicago, who had bought a ticket round the world from the Hamburg-American tourists' agency, but had been forbidden to go on board by the Zeppelin company.

Mr. Morris appeared with the other passengers and walked up the gangway, but was stopped by Captain von Schiller, who explained that when Mr. Morris bought his tickets at Lakehurst he had been told they were only valid if there was space available beyond Friedrichshafen.

As usual, before the flight, the Graf Zeppelin's commander requested the passengers and newspaper men to meet him at ten at the Unterarten hotel, where he made his last-minute announcements. In a confident and happy mood, he stated that the weather conditions were such that he could fill various wishes as to the route which had been suggested, namely, to fly over Berlin, Danzig, Koeln, Hamburg and Moscow, "provided, of course, they do their part and see that they do not throw a blanket of rain over their respective cities."

He also expected to comply with the Russian wish that he enter that country by the usual route of airplanes, namely, by way of Latvia and Duenaburg.

Dr. Eckener expected to reach Tokyo in 120 hours, or five days, and there was even the possibility, in view of reports of favorable winds, that he might complete the second lap of his round-the-world flight in from four to four and one-half days of flying.

"We expect, so long as we have the wind in our backs, to run with only four stops, thereby giving one a rest," he said.

Dr. Eckener warned the public not to be alarmed if for 12 hours at a time nothing was heard of the dirigible. "Nobody should get uneasy," he said. "It simply means we cannot be reached nor can we reach any station."

of the journey was the most difficult he had ever undertaken, especially from the viewpoint of navigation, and the more so as map material over parts of Asia is scant and incomplete. The hop over the Pacific, he said, should be much easier.

Although no freight in the ordinary sense will be carried on this trip, except for 20,000 pounds of letters and 20,000 received in Friedrichshafen, Dr. Eckener agreed to take two things for morale: a drop in Siberia, a wreath of laurels from the Federation of Former Soldiers imprisoned in Russia, which he agreed to drop in Siberia, if possible over the graveyard of German soldiers who perished there, and the other is a bust of Baron von Hindenburg, addressed to the German embassy in Tokyo, by the Japanese emperor. The bust, it will be recalled, flew to Tokyo after the transatlantic flight of the Bremen in 1928.

Whether Dr. Eckener will return to Friedrichshafen in the Graf Zeppelin after reaching Lakehurst is somewhat doubtful, as business may keep him in the United States at that time.

One of the problems of the ship's company is to create, with the lack of languages, for among the 20 passengers, six languages are spoken, Spanish, English, German, Japanese, French and Russian.

When the Graf reaches Japan, presumably five days hence, it will, by a strange irony of fate, be pulled into a hangar that was once German. On the military field near Kasumia, Uru, there is a hangar which, during the war housed dirigibles. Under the terms of the treaty of Versailles, this was dismantled and delivered to the Japanese, who re-erected it near Tokyo.

Several thousand Japanese marines will be at the disposal of the German dirigible to assist at the landing.

Rifle Fitted With Silencer Part of Equipment of Men Taken at Milner

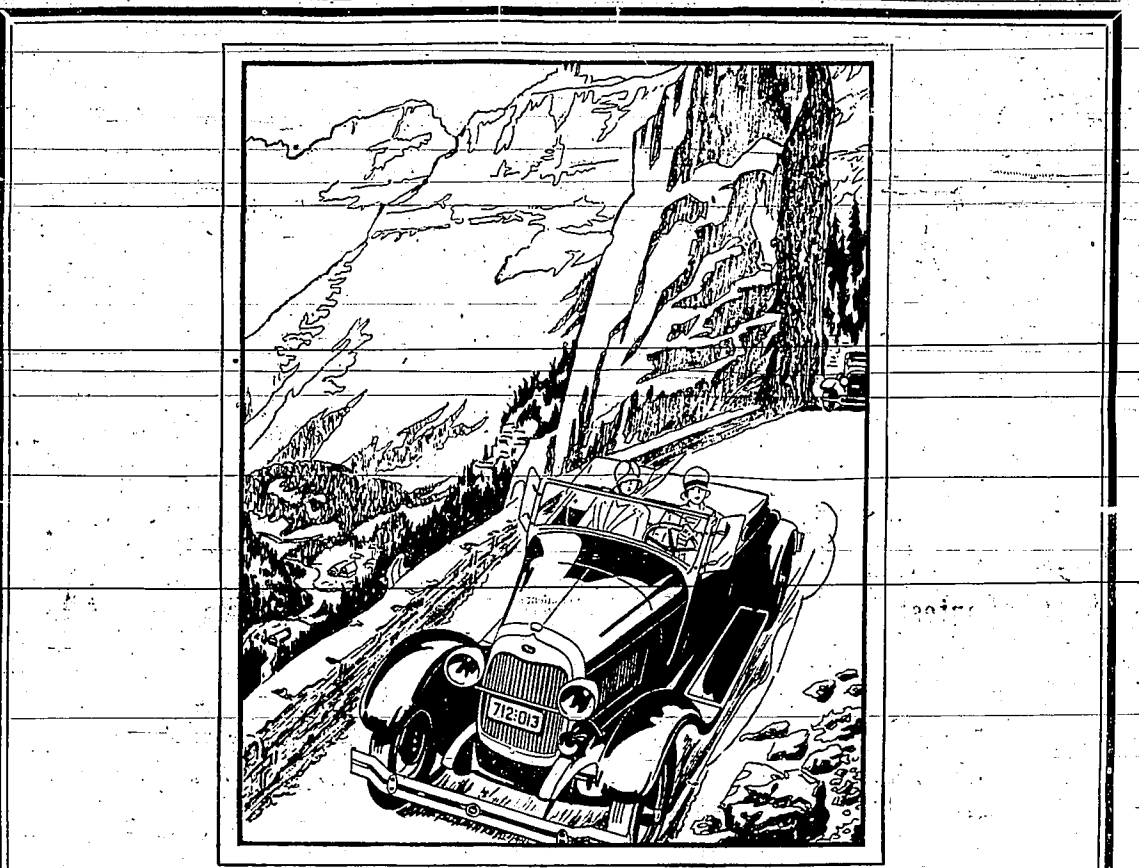

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Henry Wilfred (Bunny) Austin, England's singles star, today assumed the position of favorite to meet William T. Tilden in the finals of the Eastern grass-court tennis championship by his defeat of Frank Shields, 6-3, 6-2.

The British ace had returned to his almost faultless form, which slipped away from him momentarily last week when he was defeated at Southampton—rather easily, by Gregory Manning in straight sets.

Against Shields Austin was invincible—in each set he ran into a 4-6 game but dropped two and took the next two to determine each quarter.

Austin gained the quarter-final bracket, which was filled today when five others joined him there. Of the eight men who will fight tomorrow for places in the semi-final round, five are on the seeded list, one is a member of the first ten, but not seeded, and the remaining two are earnest aspirants for first honors.

In the women's division the quarter-final brackets were filled today also, but in this instance all eight are seeded players.

Gregory Manning, Newark, eastern big-league pitcher, today won when he defeated J. S. Duff, London, champion of England, and placed second in the foreign seeding list by scores of 4-6, 6-4, 6-4.

Harold MacGuffin, Philadelphia, accounted for the Philadelphia ace when he won a well-earned victory over Gilbert Nimms, Toronto, third in the Canadian ranking, 7-5, 6-4.

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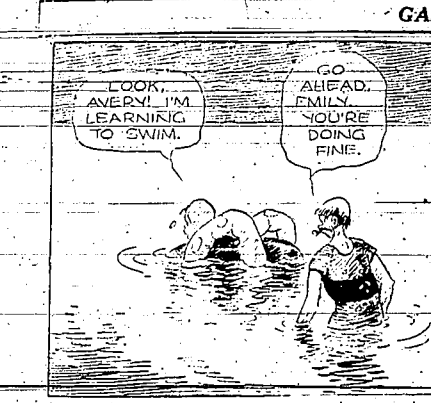

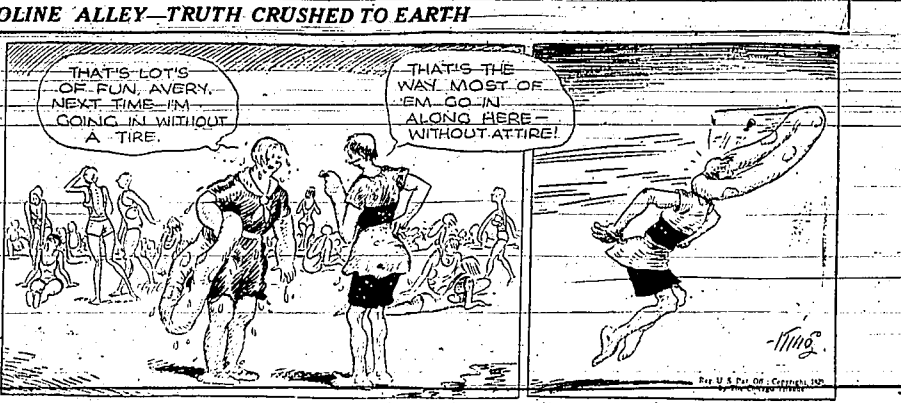

BEAN ASSOCIATIONS PROTEST RESHIPMENT

C. P. Bowles Gives Outline of Issue at Hearing Before Federal Commission

The abuses of the storage and transit system were described yesterday at the weekly meeting of the Twin Falls Rotary club at 7:30 p. m. by C. P. Bowles, head of the board of directors of the Southern Idaho Wholesale Growers' association, who stated that C. H. Dewler is now in Chicago to present a protest for the Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association at a hearing which will be held in Chicago next week.

As stated by Mr. Bowles, a contract of beans is shipped from Twin Falls to St. Louis to be packed into 40-lb. cans. The same beans are then shipped to the Atlantic coast with storage and re-shipment privileges. The car is unloaded and contents sold at St. Louis. Later the shipper loads a car with other beans and ships them to a destination on the Atlantic coast, by payment of three cents per hundred bushels. The work is fairly here, he stated. "If beans," he said, "are shipped from Michigan to St. Louis at an average rate of approximately 37 1/2 cents, adding three cents in transit, or a total of 40 cents, the beans at Atlanta, Georgia, or any other point which carries the 2 1/2 rate from Idaho. A shipper of beans on the Atlantic coast, therefore, has down beans at any given point at considerably less cost than he can be shipped from Michigan direct to that point. This is clearly a case of discrimination, against Idaho in favor of Michigan.

The request for discontinuance of the present storage and transit system was originally made by the California Lima Bean Growers' association, with headquarters at Chicago. The California company is represented at Chicago today by R. L. Churchill, Oxnard. The Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association and the Southern Idaho Wholesale Growers' company have intervened in the hearing and are cooperating with the California association.

Petit Larceny Charged For Automobile Theft

A petit larceny charge of theft of an automobile valued at \$400 stood on the books in the probate court here yesterday against Paul Bradshaw, 20 Cassfield. Effort was being made to settle the case out of court. The automobile in question, it was stated at the sheriff's office, had been taken from Bradshaw by George J. Clement, deputy sheriff at Cassfield, under a writ of attachment. Regarding the deputy's warning, Bradshaw repossessed himself of the car and drove it one night, returning it the next morning with a badly damaged tire. The deputy then signed the complaint accusing Bradshaw of theft of the car.
