SOUTHWEST WIND IN GROWN STATE FORESTS FANS FIERCE FLAMES

Situation Worse in Region of Sandpoint Despite Desperate Effort of Battleers to Control Blazes

(By The Associated Press) LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 15.—With two great forest fires raging inside the state and a third racing westward toward the line in Montana, Central Idaho tonight was facing the most serious forest fire situation since 1919.

The three weeks' old Bald Mountain fire in Selway forest, whipped by wind winds, leaped across Lochsa river on a quarter-mile from and tonight was only three-quarters of a mile from the Clearwater boundary.

Old Man Creek fire, also in Selway forest, was sent racing through heavy timber by winds tonight and spread over 1500 acres.

New Pine forest, free from spruce until now, was menaced by a fire in Blitter Root reserve, Montana. The fire has crept six miles to a two-mile front in Selway forest.

Both farmers and stockmen are fearful that the flames will sweep over the rolling country and destroy their herds.

WIND FANNING FLAMES SMOULDERING IN THE Pacific Northwest was praying for general rains tonight without much encouragement from the weather bureau, as armies of fighters patrolled in a smoldering and blackened lands.

The fire situation was worse at Sandpoint in northern Idaho, where a section of the Salmon and Clearwater river fire spread four sections of timber.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Republican members of the Senate committee today cleared the way for a vote tomorrow on a sugar tariff, and the indications were that the house duty on refined sugar would be reduced to 17 cents under existing law would be lifted.

THE HAGUE MEETING ON YOUNG PROPOSAL CONFRONTS FAILURE

Laborite, Chancellor Demands Increased Percentage of Reparations and Sets Date for Decision

(By The Associated Press) THE HAGUE, Aug. 15.—The conference to liquidate the last of the World War problems by putting into effect the Young plan for reparations, opened near complete breakdown tonight after French, British and Japanese delegates consulted, and Louis Loucheur of the French delegation announced continued opposition to British demands.

The situation seemed more grave than last week-end when Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, threatened disruption of the negotiations.

The Laborite demands, which demand an increased percentage of reparations, amounting to the share apportioned Great Britain under the Dawes plan, but fixed Saturday at the latest date for a decision of the fate of the present conference.

The British delegation also has made known that its attitude is unchanged respecting its second demand, the abolition of the distinction between conditional and unconditional annuities, and its determination that deliveries in kind must be abolished.

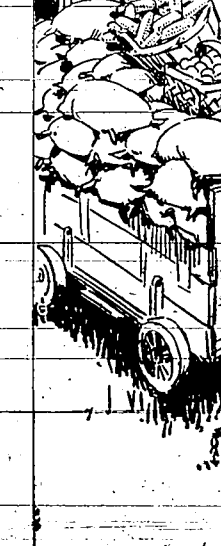

CHINESE AND SOVIET TROOPERS ENGAGE IN BATTLE ON BOUNDARY

Dispatch Tells of Russians' Withdrawal on Transport Following Hours of Severe Struggle on River

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, Aug. 15.—Reports of severe fighting with Soviet troops on Chinese soil came tonight from Nanking, where the Chinese government was informed from Harbin that Soviet troops at Linkiangshan, Siberia, at the confluence of the Amur and Sungari rivers, had attacked Chinese troops on the south and Chinese bank of the Amur.

The dispatch said "after several hours of severe fighting the Soviets withdrew on board a transport." The government was also informed that Russia was moving troops along the Amur toward the Sungari and that Soviet gunboats had appeared on the latter river which runs entirely through Manchuria territory.

The agency had no confirmation, however, of fighting reported in progress by the vicinity of Manchuria near the western border of the province.

### MOSCOW-HOLSTEINS ADVANCING TO ELITE

#### Two Cows of University of Idaho Herd Complete Outstanding Test Records

MOSCOW, Aug. 15 (Special to The News)—Two cows in the Holstein herd maintained by the University of Idaho college of agriculture have completed yearly test records that advance them to the elite of Idaho dairy aristocracy. These achievements have been announced by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

With an official test of 17,761.5 pounds of milk and 616.57 pounds of butterfat for the year, "Idaho V. O. Arnold" became the new junior two-year-old Holstein champion of the state. She produced, in addition, university-of-Idaho records whose record has stood for eight years. The new champion is a daughter of "Idaho Violet Pieb," the big black bull that approximately 25,000 Idaho dairymen own the dairy demonstration trail last summer.

The other university cow is "Idaho Matador Fancy" whose yearly production was 25,591.1 pounds of milk and 743.9 pounds of fat as an head cow. Only two other cows in the state have ever exceeded this milk record and both were developed by the University. Only 12 Holsteins in Idaho have ever exceeded the butterfat production of "Fancy." The other three Holsteins in Idaho have produced 700 pounds of fat and 14 of them have been bred and tested on the university farm, reports the college of agriculture dairy division.

Achieving such records is a tribute to the breeding program which has given the University of Idaho one of the pre-eminent Holstein herds in the nation.

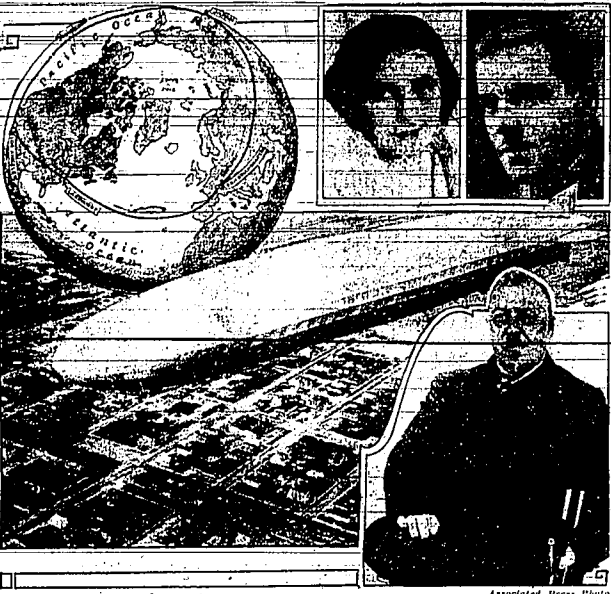

WET WEATHER AIDING IDAHO'S HARVESTERS

Clear Skies With High Temperatures Assists Agriculture in Gem State

BOISE, Aug. 15. (Special to The News)—Clear skies of summer weather with high temperatures and no rain for the week ending August 15 have Idaho farmers and fruit growers rejoicing. The best of grain-hay-fruits and other crops are growing according to the weather and crop summary issued by Clinton E. Norton, meteorologist of the United States weather bureau here.

Reports of conditions are included in the summary as follows: NORTH IDAHO: Pleasant summer weather obtained all week. Temperatures were well up in the nineties in the late afternoon and down to the fifties at night. Weather conditions for wheat, hay and the gathering and dispatch of soft fruits. There was no rain. At the present stage of farm, orchard and garden crops, rain in any considerable quantity would be more detrimental than beneficial.

SOUTHWEST IDAHO: A week of clear skies, intense sunshine, and high temperatures, with occasional showers, occasionally favorable for the growth and maturing of all crops and for all seasonal farm work. Harvesting and marketing of grain made rapid progress and the second cutting of alfalfa is being secured in excellent condition.

SOUTHEAST IDAHO: The week has been dry with hot days and cool nights, and is nearing completion. Oats harvest is beginning. Second-cutting alfalfa is being secured in excellent condition.

ARCO BUTTE COUNTY: Hot and dry; cattle and sheep on summer range, doing well. MACKAY, CUSTER COUNTY: Good crop growing weather, but cool nights, sunning idleness. SODA SPRINGS, CANNON COUNTY: Harvesting winter wheat; cutting hay; grain doing good; cattle and sheep in good condition.
