Senate Committee Approves Reduction Of Tariff On Sugar

Following the meeting of the majority committee Chairman Smoot issued a statement declaring the sugar duties agreed upon would mean an increase in consumer costs of about 22 cents per person per year and asserting they would permit the sugar industry of the United States to live with a small profit.

Stephen H. Love, president of the United States Beet Sugar association, in a statement, however, said rejection of the house rates meant that the domestic industry would be "gravely retarded."

The sugar schedule as now written would be with a rate of 1.5425 cents a pound on sugar testing not over 75 sugar degrees and add an additional 575 ten-thousandths of a cent on each additional sugar degree up to 100 degrees.

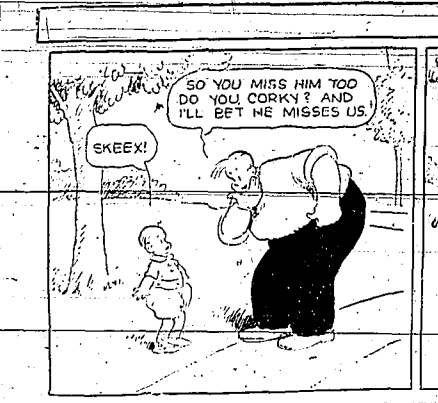

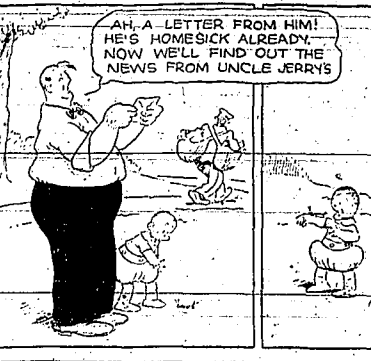
