25,000 Fans See Walker Win Decision From Leo Lomski

Battler of Jersey Turns in Brilliant Boxing Exhibition

Middleweight Champion Out to Gain Recognition as Logical Successor to Loughran on Retirement

 PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 19.—Mickey Walker, hard fighting middleweight champion, stepped into the light heavyweight division again tonight and won the decision over Leo Lomski. Aberdeen "Assassin," in a furious 10-round battle before 25,000 fans.
 Fighting for recognition as the logical successor to Tommy Loughran when the light heavyweight king retires to mix with the heavyweights, Walker turned in one of the finest efforts of his career.
 Barely Weathers Storm
 Three times in the fourth, seventh and ninth rounds, Lomski barely weathered the storm of his furious attack. There were no knockdowns.
 Rhinoceros strikes gave Walker an edge in six rounds, with three for Lomski and one, the last, even. Walker scaled 160 pounds, conceding a handicap in weight, height and reach to Lomski, who weighed 172 1/2.
 Sealing six points over the middleweight limit, the man tonight raged all over the ring as he battered and mauled Lomski. The man who twice floored Loughran in a title fight, almost two years ago. Occasionally he ran into the whiffing right hand that dumped the champion, but each time, like the bulldog from which he draws his nickname, Mickey gritted his teeth, satled in and belted Lomski from one end of the ring to the other.
 Walker Clearly Master
 Although Walker, too, is numbered among the heavyweights, he was clearly master tonight of the blonde blusher who all but knocked out the delectable Loughran. In the third, seventh and ninth rounds, Mickey's furious attack, studded with left hooks, sent Lomski stumbling. The latter was hit in the Pacific Coast and in the verge of a knockout. But each time Lomski came back, fought through the storm and managed to keep his feet throughout.

COUNCIL AUTHORIZES PAYMENT OF \$24,400

City Officials Provide For Paving Bonds Interest and Semi-Monthly Bills

The city council authorized payment of a total sum of \$24,400 at its meeting last night, \$10,700 of the amount to be applied on paving bonds, \$7,700 for interest on the bonds, and the remainder to meet semi-monthly labor bills and other operating expenses.

Seeking to eliminate traffic congestion in the city, the council ordered that the bus companies be notified of an ordinance against the parking of autos over 18 feet long on Main avenue and Shoshone street in the business district. Members agreed that the long passenger coaches, parked at an angle of 45 degrees during stops in the business area, created a serious traffic problem that required immediate attention.

In response to a request from E. Douglas, park commissioner, the council authorized purchase of three new street lights, two of which are to be installed in the city park and one in Harmon park.

GOVERNMENT TO REPAIR OFFICES OF COLLECTOR

In compliance with a vicarious protest from Congressman Addison T. Smith, to the supervising architect of the treasury department against the last ventilation in the office of the deputy collector of internal revenue in the post office building here, coupled with the request that windows should be placed, at least on the east and west sides, a construction engineer has been detailed to visit the building to make drawings and specifications, according to a letter received yesterday from Washington by Congressman Smith, from James A. Weimore, acting supervising architect. Assurance was given that the matter should have prompt attention as soon as the report should be received.

Congressman Smith pointed out that on a visit to the room he found the temperature to be over 100 degrees and the collector and his wife, suffering from heat. Windows on the south side, when open allow smoke and soot to blow in. It is stated by Congressman Smith, who says that his indignation when the structure was designed, it was not intended to be used as an office, for which it is unfit in its present condition.

"We expect to have the largest crop in history this year in this part of the country, and are getting ready to take care of it," said E. C. "It will be necessary to put on extra crews as the occasion demands and we want to keep in touch so as to put them on as required." No announcement in detail can be made at this time, he stated.

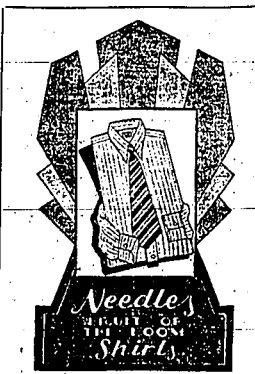
