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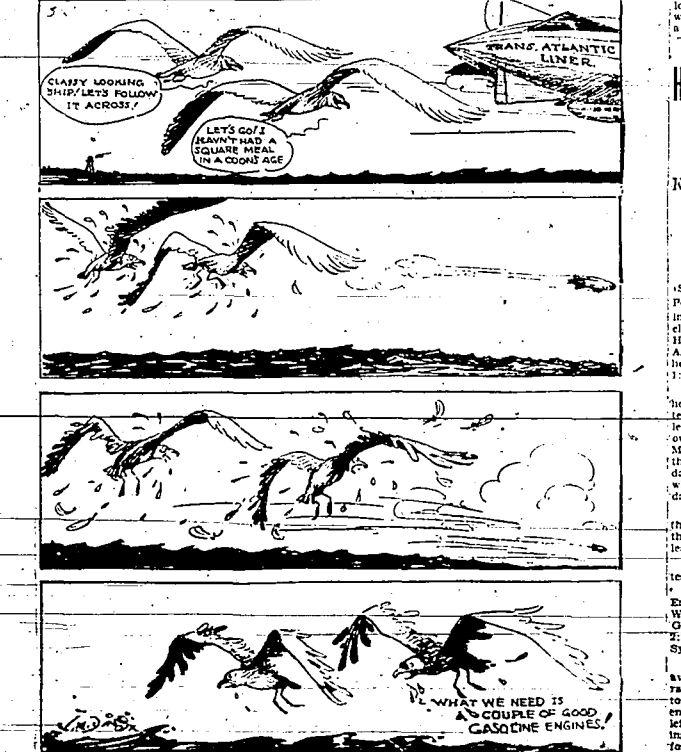
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### Buhl Prepares for Opening of Schools

Buhl, Aug. 23.—Buhl schools will open September 11, according to Superintendent M. M. Van Patton who has recently returned from Berkeley, California, where he attended summer school for several months. All three buildings of the city schools have been repaired during the summer and are in readiness for the opening date. The auditorium and gymnasium at the Lincoln building have been re-tiled and painted and concrete steps have been placed at both entrances. Outside wood work at the Frank H. Buhl building was painted and sanitary conditions in the basement improved. A new boiler was installed at the high school and the grounds improved under the direction of Mrs. Louise McCluskey.

The state department of public investment purchased \$100,000 in bonds of the Buhl independent school district in July and \$50,000 in bonds were paid by the district.

BORROWED LIVES

Maybe the real trouble with the movies is that they are doing work too well. It seems so when you read the words of a critical minister of Albany, New York. He brings this indictment against film dramas:

"We don't have to use the mind to understand them. We make—action pictures. The story is interpreted for us, every quip and turn, with action. People often inject their own personalities into those of the characters they see in motion pictures, and pattern their lives after them. They are living a part of their lives by proxy."

"The same criticism might be made of the 'legitimate' drama, or of fiction, or of written history. It is natural for susceptible minds, tinged with hero worship, to imitate characters they see on the stage or read about."

The real evil goes farther, and is chargeable against human nature in general. "Our trouble is," adds the critic, "that we take things really made. We are prone to use the old forms. We subscribe to the political opinions of parties without knowing what they are. They are not really our own convictions. We do the same thing with religion. The only religious convictions that mean anything are our own convictions."

It becomes harder and harder, in a standardized and conforming world, to be an individual. And yet individuality is the one thing most worth while—a person thinking his own thoughts, making his own choices, being his own best self as he sees it, building his own life by his own effort.

COTTON

The Department of Agriculture predicts a bumper crop of cotton, fifteen million five hundred forty-three thousand bales. This has exceeded only twice in the past. It is so big that prices immediately sag.

The boll weevil is said to have done no damage as usual, destroying perhaps eight or ten per cent of the possible crop. Some cotton men say that this ravage is wholesome. Intrinsically it cannot be a good thing to destroy property created by human labor. Yet if every weevil this season had taken a vacation, leaving a full crop of about eighteen million bales, the world market would have been glutted and the cotton growers might get less for their total crop than they will get as matters stand.

There is less worry about the boll weevil than there used to be. Farmers are worrying now about the corn borer and Mediterranean fruit fly and other insect novelties. Scientists seem to be worrying about insects in general, fearing that they may conquer mankind by eating up his food and clothing. But man has a knack of finding how to deal with his natural enemies, and Nature herself has a kindly way of helping.

PAJAMAS ON THE VOLGA

The pajama fad is spreading. And Americans are spreading it. The men and women of the delegation now touring Russia for business and professional observation, finding the heat intolerable in the Volga region, first donned bathing suits for day wear, and then turned to pajamas for the whole day wearing. They wear 'em in the dining cars and in special trains. They wear 'em when sight-seeing in automobiles. The natives are amazed and rather scandalized. Clothing in large quantities is the rule in Russia. In the Far East, natural home of the pajama, the natives might be still more amazed. They are changing their own comfortable apparel for the stuffy and incongruous garments that Americans are now discarding.

APPLE GROWERS FIX PRICE FOR PICKING

Orchard Owners Will Pay 5 Cents Per Bushel for Harvesting of Product

PHILIP, Aug. 23 (Special to The News)—Resolutions recommending payment of a uniform price of 5 cents a bushel for picking apples in orchards throughout the state department of agriculture to provide ample facilities for prompt testing of fruit, were adopted at a meeting of Twin Falls horticultural society, held in the fairgrounds here this afternoon and attended by 30 growers representing approximately one half of the acreage of Twin Falls county and adjacent territory.

A poll of growers present, with a view of informing the federal employment agency how many extra pickers and packers would be required to take care of the crop this year, showed that 800 persons would be needed in orchards on both angles, and at least as many more in other orchards in this vicinity.

The merits of early as contrasted with late marketing were discussed from both angles, but no resolution touching this subject was passed.

Illinois Man Speaker: The meeting was presided over by William Waukling, Ill. president of the society. William Diefenthaler, Decatur, Ill., president of the Decatur Orchard company, declared that growers should control the market for their products as completely as manufacturers control their own.

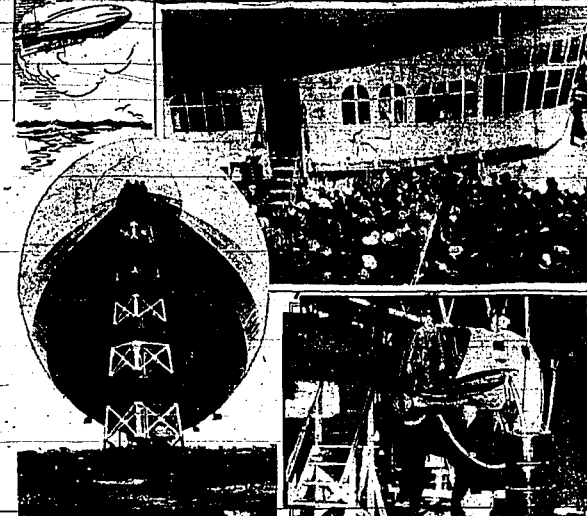

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### DEATH CALLS VISITOR FOLLOWING OPERATION

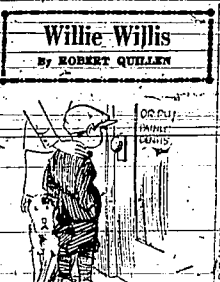
Acute Thyroiditis—Fatal to Brother of Mrs. J. R. Trolinger, Twin Falls
