JERUSALEM RACKED BY FEAR OF ARABS' THREAT OF ATTACK

Danger to Peace in Palestine Lies in North where Moslems are Reported Massing on Syrian Frontier

(By The Associated Press.)
JERUSALEM, Aug. 31.—(Special Telegrams.)—The British government today said the total number of casualties in the killing of Saturday killed Moslems, Jews, Christians and seriously wounded Moslems 112, Jews 100, Christians 10.

JERUSALEM, Aug. 31.—The chief anxiety of all circles in Jerusalem tonight was the menace of an Arab descent upon the British mandate in Palestine. British airplanes have been seen in the north. British troops situated in the Palestine, seem to have well in hand today after more than a week of fighting between Arabs and Jews over a strip of territory on the Syrian frontier.

Question of Hour
Just how serious the threat from the north may prove is the question of the hour engaging the whole Arab-Jewish situation in Palestine.

But the general situation facing Great Britain in the Near East will present a far more serious aspect if a sympathetic movement of Arabs from the desert plains outside of Palestine should gather force and become general.

Reports today indicated that constant British air patrol over various Palestine districts where trouble has been feared was having a remarkably pacifying influence.

Shooting was heard in various directions last night, but inquiry today showed that it was connected only with the firing of small arms and looting bands.

Fears for the safety for a party of 30 high school Jewish students from Haifa, including 14 Americans mostly from New York and Philadelphia, who have been on a cycle tour of Chalce, ended today when they returned safely to Haifa.

THIRTY JEWS WOUNDED IN KILLING AT WARSAW
WARSAW, Poland, Aug. 31.—(Special Telegrams.)—Thirty Jews were wounded at a mass meeting today called by the National Jewish Committee to protest against the Palestine massacre.

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TORRENT RELEASED BY BREAK IN DAM RAZES SETTLEMENT

One Killed and Three Injured When Colorado Springs Reservoir Gives Way and Destroys College Colony

(By The Associated Press.)
COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 31.—One person was killed and three injured, one fatally, when the Ute Pass Joint Club dam gave way early today under a torrent of water, sweeping away the Colorado college settlement below the dam.

The dead: Mrs. Bertha F. Emery, Colorado Springs. The injured: Charles E. Emery, Colorado Springs; William Lennox, Newton Center, Mass.; William Newton Center, Mass.

A score of persons, most of them Colorado college professors and students, were in the cabins at the time. A warning given by Mr. and Mrs. Emery probably saved the lives of many.

At dawn this morning Mr. and Mrs. Emery were awakened by a loud sound, like an approaching train. They listened for a minute and then realized that the sound was that of rushing water coming down the valley.

Without waiting to don occupants of the cabins made what they over-roughly to high points and others that it had been here and the cabin of Mrs. Emery was found one mile down the valley, some believed also about that the dam had broken.






NORTHWEST TRADES AND LABOR DRAFTING NEW TARIFF BILL Oregon-Republican National Committee Announces Plan to Rewrite Measure to Meet Region's Needs

(By The Associated Press) PORTLAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Ralph E. Williams, chairman of the Oregon-Republican National Committee, announced today that accompanied by Committee of Washington and Idaho, he will leave for Washington, D. C., tonight to assist the Pacific Northwest delegation in framing a new tariff bill that would afford protection to Northwest products.

Williams said that for the first time in history, the Pacific Northwest was being given the tariff which would be drafted in the district "out in the field." What the Pacific Northwest desires, Williams said, is protection on lumber, fruit, logs and shingles. These are all on the free list and are entitled to the same protection extended in the east and middle west.

Republican national committee, Williams continued, will remain in Washington until the tariff bill is settled in a way that suits Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Williams declared he would be a candidate for the Republican national committee chairmanship at the meeting of the organization in Washington September 10.

DEMOCRATS DIVIDE OPINIONS ON TARIFF FIGHT WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The possibility of Democrats putting up a solid party front in favor of limiting tariff revision to agricultural products and wool, the Democrats in Washington, Massachusetts, who said he would advocate that relief be given to industry "to give the fullest consideration."

Refer to the resolution of Senator Thomas, Democrat, Ohio, which would limit tariff revision to wool and all rate sections except that relating to agriculture, the Massachusetts senator said that while he favored the revision, he did not advocate the revision to the industry of other than farmers.

Both senators are members of the finance committee. Chairman Smoot, senator will have the bill on the floor for the Republican caucus, expressed doubt whether a majority would vote against the measure. Thomas resolution would have a majority in the Senate. The measure failed to pass last year by one vote.



RELATIVITY THEORIST FINDS RECREATION IN QUIET HOME-LIVING

Grand Piano, Fiddle, Art, and Musical Spouse Provide Mental Balance for World-Famous Savant

BERLIN, Aug. 31.—Grand piano, a fiddle and a practice wheel-to-the-intricate-mechanism of Albert Einstein; physicist and mathematician.

Relativity, infinity, field equations and other scientific instructions are forgotten when the genius savant holds the steady chords of Bach's well tempered clavier, or when he sits down with other men of science to a schach or a Beethoven string quartet.

And when Elie Einstein, his wife and cousin, reminds him that it is time to eat—that a poposa-arkle-for-come liberally paying publication must be completed at once—he merrily returns to earth from the speculative regions in which he has been flying and does her bidding.

As for the grand piano, this is located in the living room, a modestly artistically appointed fourth floor dwelling on Haberlandstrasse, a quiet side street on the west side of Berlin. In the attic a flight above the convenient-living room with sound-proof doors in which he thinks out the spinning formulae that overthrow existing conceptions of physics and mathematics.

It forms a companion piece to his brass table in another corner of the room. Where another Epperson-style street has an outlet to rest from concentrated labors, Einstein finds recreation in fiddling with the keys of this piano, improving as he goes along.





FACULTY ADVISER FOR EACH STUDENT AT MOSCOW SCHOOL

Aid During Freshman Year to Be Carried Into Field of Vocational Guidance in Junior College Division

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Aug. 31.—Close cooperation between students and faculty than has ever been known before will be possible at the University of Idaho through the institution of the faculty adviser system in the new junior college division, according to Dean J. O. McGowan, chairman of the administrative council.

For each student in the university junior college an adviser will be appointed from a list of 20 faculty members especially designated for this purpose. This adviser will give such assistance as possible at registration time, not only in choosing courses but also with reference to a final aim. These advisers will work in cooperation with the student personal bureau, which will furnish information concerning each student through use of tests and questionnaires at registration time. The adviser will be responsible for guidance and aid to his student group through the two junior college years.

Maximum of Personal Contact.—A feature of the plan will give a maximum of personal contact between students and faculty members, university officials point out. It has usually been assumed that small colleges are better than large ones for this reason—personal contact and individual attention. The adviser system will give more contact and guidance to students than would be possible under normal conditions in a small college.

The advisers will be assigned for their duties, and the students will be assigned to them according to the department and courses in which they are taking which they show a preference. No adviser will have a list of freshmen during the registration period, but it will be operative throughout the year, and will carry even further into the field of vocational guidance. Tests and questionnaires will be given to the students to determine their ability and preferences, and will then be used as a basis the advisers will be enabled to cut down materially the group of possible studies to which they themselves in fields in which they are less likely to succeed.



GROUND BROKEN FOR POTATO MEAL MILL

First Unit of Plant at Burley to Cost \$100,000 to be Completed This Year

BURLEY, Aug. 31.—Preliminary work is being done on the grounds purchased by the Idaho corporation in preparation for the erection of a potato meal factory. The building and storage cellars will occupy space 475 feet in length along the street, 100 feet wide and 100 feet in width. 



High School Leads Foin Pool to Market Lambs From Combined Flock of Ewes

BOISE, Aug. 31.—It remained for boys of the Emmett high school to lead the way into cooperative marketing of sheep in their valley.  SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 31—Honors to the memory of the Frenchman who started the prune industry in America will be paid here this fall by the erection of a monument in tribute to Louis Peller.

It was Peller who, 75 years ago, brought from France the seeds and cuttings of a "husky" plum tree, the "Frang Agnes," who sowed the California hills for roots of wild species on which his scions came to graze, and whose seeds, as a consequence, are said to be a \$1,000,000,000 fruit industry.

Homebred in title

Traced back to California

Grafts Gattings
 Peller hunted the hills for roots upon which the scions could be grafted and they thrived.

After orchard was set out
 with trees grafted from Peller stock until today in the Santa Clara valley alone there are 2,000,000 apple trees, all descended from this handful of graftings.

Additional millions of trees are in bearing in other states of the union and the shivered but succulent plant has been skyrocketed into a position of profitable prominence.



MICHIGAN ORCHARDISTS USE "APPLE COSMETICS" TO SELL FRUIT AT GREATER PROFITS



Applying "apple cosmetics" to give apples ready sale in their orchards—The Edgewood Orchard has returned their owners \$25,000 in the three years they have been in soil.

They produce large, luscious fruit with ruddy cheeks by surrounding their trees with a heavy straw mulch. In addition to coloring the apples, the mulch conserves ground moisture and has given Edgewood apples great fame for their rich color and high quality.

While other orchardists are having difficulty selling their 1928 apples at \$1 a bushel, Mason and Lackey are selling theirs in Battle Creek and Kalamazoo, Mich. at \$2.10 a bushel.

The race for profits from beautified fruit is marked by soil culture, a practice that is getting new converts in Michigan as the cost of producing fruit steadily mounts with the invasion of new pests and Tuleus diseases.

White soil culture has its disadvantages: production costs have been lower and returns per acre have averaged higher than in orchards where clean cultivation is practiced. On soil, the size of apples is smaller in dry seasons, but orchardists say the better color of the fruit more than offsets the shrinkage in size.

Whether it is practical to fall fertilize orchards in soil is being determined in tests at the state's horticultural experiment station. In the past it has been discouraged on the theory that it might unduly stimulate growth and weaken the tree's resistance to winter injury. Fall fertilized trees have made a larger growth, set a heavier crop and have a richer color of foliage than trees receiving spring applications.

Pomologists, however, are not recommending fall applications at this time, preferring to reserve conclusions until the experiment has run five or 10 years.






