GRAFF'S DEPARTURE DELAYED BY WIND

Cross-Hanger Breeze Keeps Giant Dirigible From Start Across Atlantic

LAKEHURST, N. J., (Sunday) Sept. 1.—Departure of the Graf-Zeppelin for Germany was postponed for the time being at 1:45 Eastern standard time today because of a cross hanger wind.

The ground crew, which had been waiting for hours, was released.

VIVID PICTURE OF
DISASTER HORRORS

Shrill Cries of Dying Men and Women Pierced Air in Wake of San Juan Collision; Sink in Oily Waters

SEN PEDRO, Calif., Aug. 31—A sea of dying faces, fear-struck men and women gasping out pitiful cries or "save me! save me!" as they thrashed about in oily water, all of us in a mad, mad way.

The sea veteran's face was strained as he related a picture of confusion and agony.

We arrived first on the scene after the crash, the relief crew of the San Juan and Murrelet left the golden gate about the same time.

Some strange things had happened—"We got on all steam and in 15 minutes I laid my eyes on a scene I never shall want to see again."

Abdard the Murrelet, the survivors were given clothing, Captain Hill said in a dispatch to chief engineer C. T. Illmer, who acted as an emergency doctor and dressed many amputees.

WANT TO DRAFTING
NEW TARIFF BILL
Oregon-Republican National
Committee Announces
Plan to Rewrite Measure
to Meet Region's Need

(By The Associated Press)
PORTLAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Ralph E. Williams, chairman of the Oregon-Republican National Committee, announced today that accompanied by Committee of Washington and Idaho, he will leave for Washington, D. C., tonight to assist the Pacific Northwest delegation in framing a new tariff bill to afford protection to Northwest products.

Williams said that for the first time in history, the Pacific Northwest was being given the tariff which it wanted in the district "out in the cold."

What the Pacific Northwest wants is protection on lumber, fruit, logs and shingles. These are all on the free list and are entitled to the same protection extended in the east and middle west.

Williams continued—will remain in Washington until the tariff bill is passed in a way that suits Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Williams declared he would be a candidate for the Republican national committee chairmanship at the meeting of the organization in Washington September 6-7-8.

DEMOCRATS DIVIDE OVER
TACTICS IN TARIFF FIGHT
WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The possibility of Democrats putting up a split party front in favor of limiting tariff revision to agricultural products and wool, was the subject of a meeting of the Democratic, Massachusetts, who said he would advocate that relief be given to industry "to give the fullest consideration."

Refer to the resolution of Senator Thomas, Democrat, Ohio, which would eliminate from the tariff bill all rate sections except that relating to agriculture, the Massachusetts senator said that while he favored the bill, he did not advocate the restriction to the industry of other than farmers.

Both senators are members of the finance committee.

Chairman Smoot, senator will have the bill on the floor for the Republican majority, expressed doubt whether a majority would pass a major change in the tariff bill, which he said he would support.

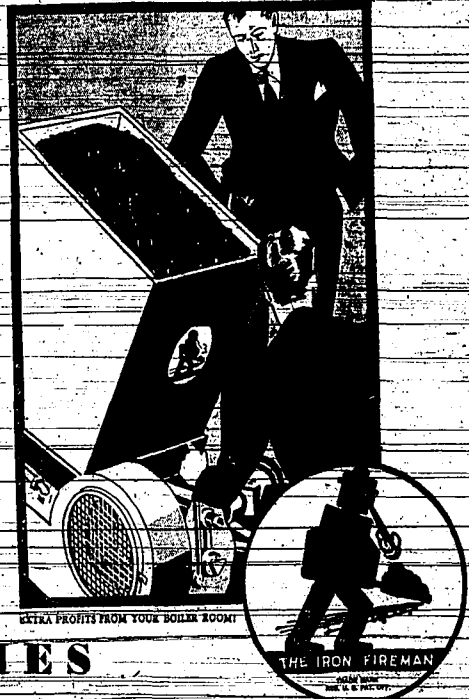

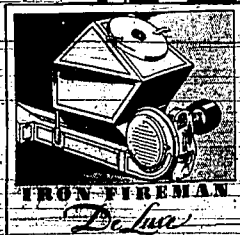

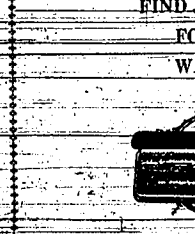
Order Settles Action Over Hollister Wells

The other points out that an athlete, who attends a school in Pocatello for his first year and also plans to try out for positions on the team at Pocatello are one-year of varsity competition left in the transfer to the Moscow school.

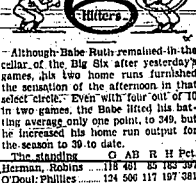

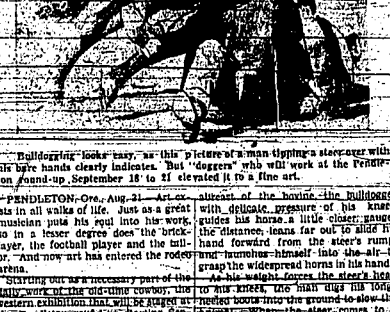

RELATIVITY THEORIST FINDS RECREATION IN QUIET HOME-LIVING

Grand Piano, Fiddle, Art, and Musical Spouse Provide Mental Balance for World-Famous Savant

By LOUIS F. LOCHNER (Associated Press Staff Writer)
BERLIN, Aug. 31.—Grand piano, a fiddle and a practice wheel-to-the-intricate mechanism of Albert Einstein's physical and mathematical.

Relativity, infinity, field equations and other scientific instructions are forgotten when the genius savant holds the steady chords of Bach's well tempered clavier, or when he sits down with other men of science to a schach or a Brethren writing club.

And when Elie Einstein, his wife and cousin, reminds him that it is time to eat—that a poposa-arkle-for-come liberally paying publication must be completed at once—he merrily returns to earth from the speculative regions in which he has been flying and does her bidding.

As for the grand piano, this is located in the living room of the modestly furnished apartment which he occupies at Haberlandstrasse, a quiet side street on the west side of Berlin. It is the title a flight above the conventional room with sound-proof doors in which he thinks out the spinning formulae that overthrow existing conceptions of physics and mathematics.

It forms a companion piece to his brass table in another corner of the room. Where another Epperson-style street has an outlet to rest on concentrated floors, Einstein finds recreation in fiddling with the keys of this piano, improving as he goes along.

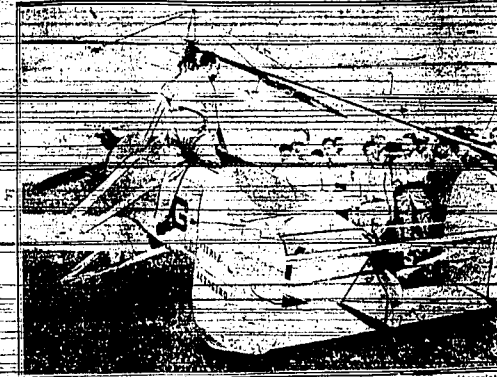

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Wall street business yesterday, but Wall street in a sense remains a male citadel and a male stronghold.

Although half of the workers in the financial district are women and many hold high-ranking executive positions, the business of buying and selling securities continues fundamentally a masculine profession.

RADIO-FITTED SHIPS SAFEGUARD VOYAGERS

Life Boats Will Utilize Wireless Communication in Directing Rescuers

BOSTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Bringing new standards of safety to sea, beyond the means of mariners of the previous generation, radio is being utilized increasingly by the maritime nations to safeguard those who sail on oceanic vessels.

In addition to the wireless apparatus which is required on oceanic vessels, life boats of the big liners are to carry radio sets which will provide communication with rescue ships. A rescue ship with a radio compass can determine the position of a life boat which has a transmitting set.

Radio Required
The repeat conference on the safety of life at sea in London adopted the provision that certain vessels equipped with motor-driven life boats be required to install radio on these boats. The 12-nation conference on other vessels now have made a transmitting set.

To Have Radio Compass
The new convention requires radio equipment on all passenger ships, and on all cargo ships of 100 tons or more. Vessels also are required to install radio compasses. It is believed that life boats in the future will likewise be fitted with radio compasses to expedite rescue by fixing the position of the relief vessels.

FACULTY ADVISER FOR EACH STUDENT AT MOSCOW SCHOOL

Aid During Freshman Year to Be Carried Into Field of Vocational Guidance in Junior College Division

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Aug. 31.—Close cooperation between students and faculty than has ever been known before will be possible at the University of Idaho through the institution of the faculty adviser system in the new junior college division, according to Dean J. O. McGowan, chairman of the administrative council.

For each student in the university junior college an adviser will be appointed from a list of 20 faculty members especially designated for this purpose. This adviser will give such assistance as possible at registration time, not only in choosing courses but also with reference to a final aim. These advisers will work in cooperation with the student personal bureau, which will furnish information concerning each student through use of tests and questionnaires at registration time. The adviser will be responsible for guidance and aid to his student group through the two junior college years.

Maximum of Personal Contact
 Adoption of the plan will give a maximum of personal contact between students and faculty members, university officials point out. It has usually been assumed that small colleges are better than large ones for this reason—personal contact and individual attention. The adviser system will give more contact and guidance to students than would be possible under normal conditions in a small college.

The advisers will be assigned for their duties, and the students will be assigned to them according to the department and courses in which they are taking which they show a preference. No adviser will have a list of freshmen during the registration period, but it will be operative throughout the year, and will carry even further into the field of vocational guidance. Tests and questionnaires will be administered at the student's ability and preferences, and will then be a basis the advisers will be enabled to cut down materially the group of possible studies to which they themselves in fields in which they are less likely to succeed.

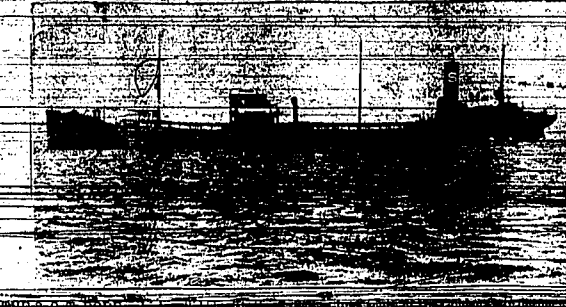

GROUND BROKEN FOR POTATO MEAL MILL

First Unit of Plant at Burley to Cost \$100,000 to be Completed This Year

BURLEY, Aug. 31.—Preliminary work is being done on the grounds purchased by the Idaho corporation in preparation for the erection of a potato meal factory. The building and storage cellars will occupy space 475 feet in length along the street, 100 feet wide and 100 feet in width. The estimated cost of that portion of the plant to be erected this year will be approximately \$100,000.

R. M. Draper Construction company, Salt Lake City, has the contract for erecting the building and constructing storage cellars. The construction will be reinforced concrete and structural steel. There are to be one or two towers, of structural steel, the contract for which has been awarded to an eastern engineering company.

According to H. B. Bremerminger, general manager for the corporation, the plant is being designed as capacity—as to have a run of at least nine months during the season. Each tower will have a capacity of 250,000 pounds of potatoes a month. The plant will be expanded, as occasion requires, to such a point as to be able to use all the soil and unmarketable potatoes grown in the district.

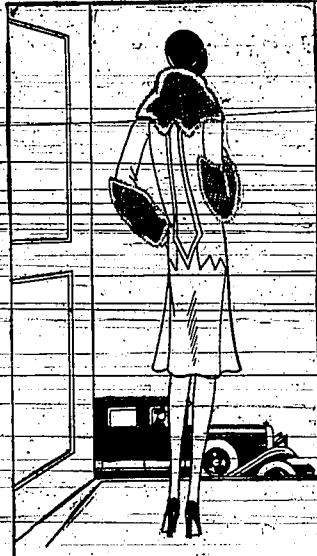

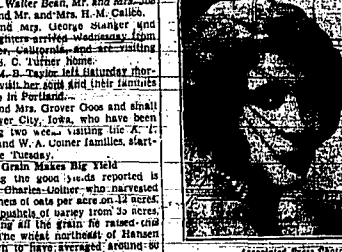

High School Leads Foin Pool to Market Lambs From Combined Flock of Ewes

It was Peller who, 75 years ago, brought from France the seeds and cuttings of a "husky" plum tree, the King of France, which he named the California plum for roots of wild species on which his scores could be grafted, and which was sold as a superior variety.

It was Peller who, in 1854, started a grafting nursery in California, and who, in 1856, started the first prune orchard in California.

Need More Spraying

It has become necessary to spray trees seven to 10 times, compared with four to six times a decade ago. Soil fertility, humidity and orchardists' knowledge that nitrogen crops no longer can be produced without the use of fertilizers.

Forced to search their village practices for corners to cut, many growers are inclined to new soil culture as one of the more promising leads toward lowering the cost per bushel.

A few of the more prosperous growers in Michigan are orchardists who have cut their production costs by ceasing cultivation and allowing soil to form.

Whether it is practical to fall fertilize orchards in soil is being determined in tests at the state's horticultural experiment station. In the past it has been discouraged on the theory that it might unduly stimulate growth and weaken the tree's resistance to winter injury. Tests have not borne out the belief. Fall fertilized trees have made a larger growth, set a heavier crop and have a richer color of foliage than trees receiving spring applications.

The telephone line, the Lemhi Telephone company's property, is a compact client and is around Montana for a little more business. Fortunately the difficulties in negotiating the line over the Beaverhead mountains are not as great as those of the railroad. But Blitcher keeps them both "perking."

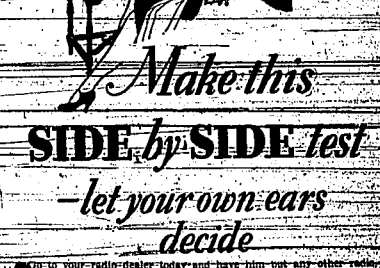

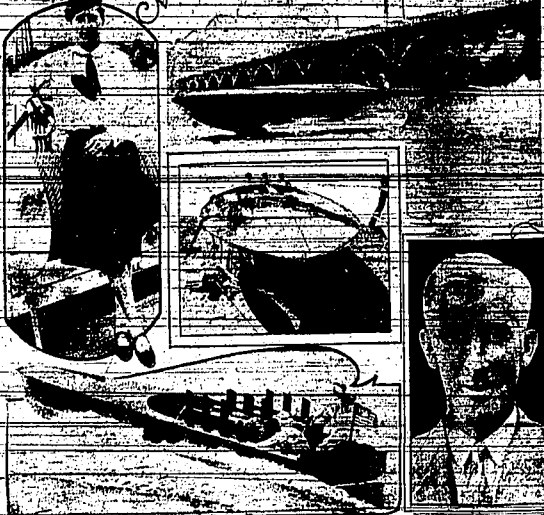
