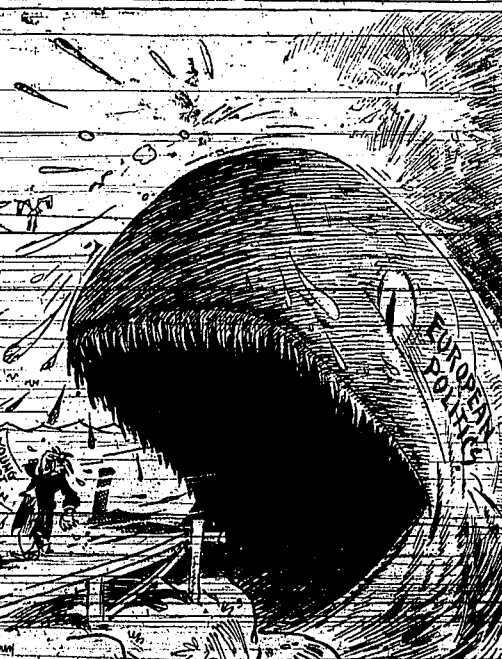

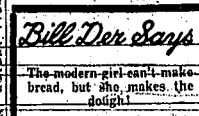
PHILADELPHIA 44 GRANTS 11-3

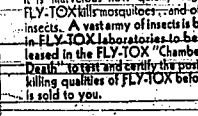
