

MINISTER CONCLUDES WORK IN TWIN FALLS

Rev. Arthur G. Pearson,
Pastor of Presbyterian
Church Goes to Oregon

Closing eight years service here, the Rev. Arthur G. Pearson, Presbyterian minister of the Twin Falls presbytery, has accepted the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Madras, Oregon, effective next October 1.

Mr. Pearson's resignation was read over church services yesterday morning and church services were held at the meeting of the congregation called for next Tuesday.

September 10. According to Presbyterians, the congregation must join the pastor in petition to the presbytery for acceptance of his resignation and until then the pastor at the fall stated meeting of the Twin Falls presbytery to be held at Hollister on September 11.

Mr. Pearson will have completed his eight years of service as pastor of the Twin Falls church next September 11. He was called to the pulpit here from the First Presbyterian church of Independence, Missouri.
