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REVISED REPUBLICAN MEASURE ON TARIFF GOES BEFORE SENATE

Initial Clashes Between Opponents and Advocates of Bill Fail to Materialize During Brief Session

By D. HAROLD OLIVER. WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The revised Republican tariff bill was placed before the senate today by initial clash between advocates and opponents were deferred after less than a half-hour session.

Coming back to start the first general session of the senate in the way to final enactment, 45 senators answered to the first roll call since the summer recess was taken in June to permit the finance committee to draw up amendments to the bill passed May 28 by the house.

Final resolutions and amendments, the latter including those of the farm board, were offered and referred to appropriate committees. Chairman of the finance committee, submitting along with the exhaustive majority report of the finance committee.

Re-Attack Agreement. An agreement was reached to make the bill the unfinished business of the senate tomorrow. If no agreement is reached by the end of the day, the senate adjournment would be taken until Monday.

Meanwhile, the Democrats and Republicans independently will give further study to parliamentary procedure to determine the best way to proceed with a resolution to limit revision of agricultural tariffs. Many conferees of the minority and Western Republicans were in evidence on the floor during today's brief session.

Should the resolution of Senator Thomas, Democrat, Oklahoma, to strike out all but the agrarian schedule of the bill without a vote, it was indicated that the Republican Independents would move to recommit the bill to the committee on tariff revision.

Notice of Opposition. The first notice of opposition to the bill on the floor was given by Senator Simmons, North Carolina, who said at the Democratic helm for the tariff debate. He said the measure would not mean the end of the tariff, but it would mean the end of the tariff as it is now.

FAMOUS THEATRICAL MANAGER SUCCEEDS Frederick F. Proctor; Once Dean of Vaudeville Directors, Dies in New York

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—Frederick F. Proctor, whose theatrical career spanned half a century and led from circus aerial to one of America's most widely known vaudeville theatre chains, died at his home in Larchmont, N. Y., today at the age of 78.

Proctor, who had been suffering from an illness of several months, caused his death.

M. Proctor retired from active work a few months ago when he sold his chain of theatres in New York and New Jersey to Radio-Keith-Orpheum corporation and stepped down from his acknowledged place as dean of vaudeville managers.

Began As Tumbler. The veteran vaudeville manager in the field of refined vaudeville, began his theatrical career as a boy. The barrel-rolling and handspinning which he performed at New York and other cities during working hours as a manager boy, he traced the situation of a circus performer who offered him a job in following years.

When young Proctor toured the United States and Europe under the name of Fawcett, he made a name for himself as a tumbler.

Determined to manage his own theater, he straped together necessary capital to own a small theatre in New York and followed by a few years later with the famous Proctor's Twenty-third Street theatre in New York. Gradually he extended his chain to throughout New York and New Jersey.

GERMANY ACCLAIMS OFFICERS AND CREW OF GIANT DIRIGIBLE

Two Women and Score of Men Passengers On Graf Zeppelin Share in Tribute at Friedrichshafen

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Sept. 4.—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin, reported in its home harbor tonight after having set a new record for world circumnavigation by air means and then setting up an even better mark of 20 days 4 hours and 18 minutes.

The officers and crew, 100 of a tremendous crew, were warmly welcomed by the German people, who had followed much needed rest after a month of blazing new air trails without a single serious damage to their ship or injury to passengers. The 23 passengers, including two women, who made a stop-trip from Lakehurst, shared in the festivities, to which the city and in lesser measure all Germany, gave itself up.

Only Captain Hugo Eckener, the commander who guided the dirigible ship around the world from Lakehurst to Lakehurst, returned to his home, his first assistant, Captain Ernst Lehmann, was missing. He had remained in America to discuss plans for avoiding dirigible-aided importation in the world.
