REVISED REPUBLICAN MEASURE ON TARIFF GOES BEFORE SENATE

Initial Clashes Between Opponents and Advocates of Bill Fail to Materialize During Brief Session

By D. HAROLD OLIVER, Associated Press Writer. WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—The revised Republican tariff bill was placed before the senate today by initial cloture. The measure and amendments were deferred after less than a half-hour session.

Coming back to start the first general tariff revision since 1890, the way to final enactment of the measure was to first call in June the summer recess was taken in June to permit the finance committee to draw up amendments to the bill passed May 28 by the house.

Final resolutions and amendments, the latter including those of the farm board, were offered and referred to appropriate committees. Chairman Charles McNary, of the finance committee, submitting along with the exhaustive majority report of the finance committee.

Reck Agreement. An agreement was reached to make the bill the unfinished business of the senate tomorrow. If no agreement is reached by the end of the day, the senate adjournment would be taken until Monday.

Many conferees of the minority and Western Republicans were in evidence on the floor during today's session.

Officers of the fair expressed gratification last evening over the second day's attendance record, but without accounting urgency of demand for immediate attention in hazard of wheat and seed crops, they were inclined to look forward to a larger crowd on the forthcoming today, which is Thursday and Grande day.

Today also will be a postponed general day. Governor L. C. Bradburn of Idaho was unable to visit the fair Wednesday, when he was expected, but has assured directors of the fair that he will attend today.

A sensational parachute leap to be made by White Noville, Los Angeles, California, will be the feature of the program for Friday afternoon. Judging of exhibits in all departments had been completed last evening. The program for a second successive year had been awarded first prize.

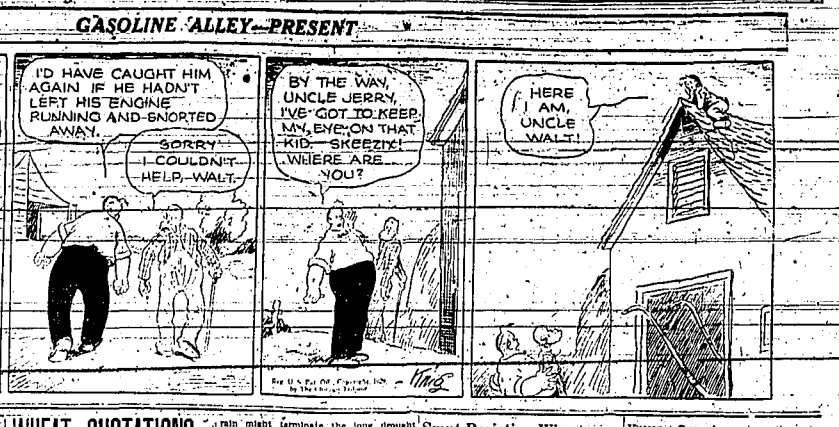

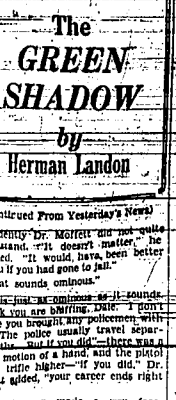

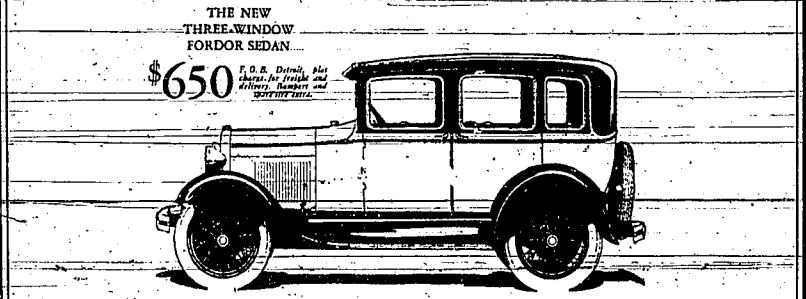

The report indicates that while a few cases of influenza are being reported by illness or death in the family of the pastor, the church has, even there, maintained its attendance.
