FIERY SOLONS HEAR COOPERATION UPON MEASURE ON TARIFF

"Forked Tongue of Hypocrisy Hisses Through Every Paragraph" Charges Mississippi Senator

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Viviparation was heaped upon the tariff bill in the senate today by two of its most fiery speakers, Harrison, Mississippi, and Brookhart, Iowa.

The Southern Democrat and the Republican Independent from the Mid-West agreed that the measure was designed for special privileges. The opposite view was taken tonight, however, by Senator Watson, that Republican leader in a radio address which marked his first public statement since the house bill was voted by the senate finance committee last night.

Facing the silent Republicans, Harrison termed the measure "a piece of deception, lying, and sniping." The forked tongue of hypocrisy hisses through every paragraph.

The major Brookhart objection was that "the bill fails to give the farmer what he really needs."

AUTHOR OF DIAMOND DICK STORIES DIES

George Charles Jenks, 79, Succumbs After Short Illness in Quiet Hamlet.

AUBURN, N. Y., Sept. 13 (AP)—In an atmosphere of quietude that enveloped the small town of Auburn, the author of the "Diamond Dick" and "John Carter" stories, George Charles Jenks, died at his home at 10:15 p. m. today after a short illness.

Jenks was born in Auburn, N. Y., April 13, 1850. He began his newspaper work in Pittsburgh in 1882. Later, for six years, he was editorial writer for the Pittsburgh Press. Then he went to New York in 1887, where he became a dramatic critic and started writing short stories.

Jenks' fame as a writer came from his series on "Diamond Dick," which continued for several years. At times he was forced to write as much as 10,000 words a day to keep pace with his publishers and even with that tremendous output his financial remuneration was comparatively small.

Following upon the death of the originator of the "Nick Carter" series, Jenks died in Auburn, N. Y., Sept. 13, 1920.

GOLD PRODUCTION IN GEN STATE SLUMPS

Five Mines Still Operate in Idaho One Time Competitor of California

BOISE, September 13 (AP)—Idaho, which once vied with California as the gold producing state of the country, today has only five gold mines in operation, and but three of these are operating at present, it was disclosed by a mining inspector, said today.

All these mines, including two operating, are in the southern part of the state, where considerable gold is produced in some of the larger mines, but these have all closed down recently.

The once fabulously rich Boise basin, in the southeastern corner of the state, has only five mines, and but three of these are operating at present, it was disclosed by a mining inspector, said today.

The first of these, the Southwest Owyhee county, 15 miles south of Blaine, is operated by the American Drilling company.

Other mines which have recently closed down during the summer because of lack of water, a condition which has now closed down the placer mine just north of the Boise basin.

Prospectors have been combing the Boise basin with a view to finding the gold, but no one has been able to find any.

"Those Who Opposed Plan," Doubtless Never Smelled Gun Powder," Observes Commander of Veterans

"Interspersing a few 'suns' in emphatic fashion, Sneed, who is 84, said the Southern organization would not urge any further action other than endorsement of a reunion of the blue and gray. Sneed, who lives at Oklahoma City, came here to visit his daughter, Mrs. Fred Snyder.

"Those who opposed it, apparently, are the grandsons of the gray," he said. "The men who designed it in the ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic, doubtless never smelled gun powder in the Civil War," he said.

Comely and stately, the commander of the diminishing gray ranks said he held no ill feeling toward the veterans of the Northern Army.

32 Students to Attend Schoolhouse Henry Ford Studied in 50 Years Ago

DETROIT, Sept. 13 (AP)—The old brick schoolhouse which Henry Ford attended more than half a century ago, located on the farm of the old Ford in Dearborn, is to be reopened next Monday.

Thirty-two boys and girls selected at random from the Dearborn Southwestern grammar school will comprise the enrollment. Although they will study the same texts as other pupils in the Dearborn school they will find that otherwise conditions as they existed when the school was built have been reproduced.

The school room will be heated with a wood fire stove and six kerosene lamps will provide light and ventilation.

The pupils at the "double seat" patterned after those used in the Dearborn experiment—school—Ford attended as a boy.

There will be four grades represented in the school, with sixth graders in the front, seventh in the second, tenth in the third and eight in the fourth.

Idaho has suffered the greatest fire losses of the Internationals states, the report said. Arizona, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming lost over 100,000 acres.

World Powers To Discuss Naval Reduction In Washington

JAPAN, FRANCE AND ITALY TO JOIN IN BROAD CONFERENCE

Calling of Meeting Result of Agreement in Principle Between Americans and British On Cruiser Parity

By The Associated Press.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—A general naval conference to consider the possibility of limiting the building of fighting craft from the battle-ship to the submarine is proposed for early in December as possible. The United States conference has been made possible by an agreement in principle between the United States and Great Britain and Italy, the other powers signatory to the Washington treaty, will be invited to the conference at which the American government will propose that the 10-year holiday in the construction of capital ships be extended from 1931 to 1936.

The new treaty, which is the result of the agreement of the Washington treaty, these should be all approved. The United States conference will be held in Washington, D. C., and should be possible in early September. COUNTY'S FINANCES IN BOARD'S HANDS FOR FINAL ACTION

Commissioners Meet to Fix Levies to Satisfy Claims for \$340,000 Tax Money

During Coming 12 Months

Twin Falls county commissioners will meet today to make 1929 tax levies to meet the county's requirements for approximately \$340,000 during the coming year.

Estimates made by the county auditor's office indicate that levies totaling \$124,000 for the coming year are required to meet the county's needs. The levies are to be distributed as follows: \$40,000 for general purposes, \$40,000 for fire protection, \$40,000 for health and hospital, and \$44,000 for other special services.

Regarded As Progress
