TARIFE-VIEWPOINTS OF ADMINISTRATION PREVAIL IN SENATE

By 40-to-32 vote Committee Amendment Passes Requiring-Conspicuous Marks On Imported Goods

By D. HAROLD OLIVER (Associated Press Writer) WASHINGTON, Sept. 17—The viewpoints of the administration group in the senate prevailed today in the first voting on the tariff bill.

By a 40-to-32 vote a committee amendment was adopted requiring that imported articles be marked conspicuously with the country of origin except in certain instances.

The bill was taken on reconsideration of a previous rejection vote of 38 to 28. Eight Republicans joined 30 Democrats on the first roll call against the amendment.

On the second roll call, 48 Republicans combined with 26 Democrats against the amendment, while five Democrats joined 30 Republicans in favor.

Adopt. Other Changes The vote on the marking amendment was taken by adoption of another committee change making it unlawful to import goods from any country.

JURY UNABLE TO FIX RESPONSIBILITY FOR G. PERRINE'S DEATH

Witnesses at Inquest Include Roy E. Wells, DeLoe Driver in Auto in Crash With Car Carrying Victim

An inquest last evening was unable to fix responsibility for an automobile collision here at 2 P. M. yesterday in which George Perrine, 26-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Perrine, pioneer Twin Falls residents, received injuries from which he died two days later at a county general hospital, without regaining consciousness.

The verdict stated: "We were unable to find upon viewing the body that the deceased person is George Perrine."

The fatal crash came to its tragic end through an automobile accident at the intersection of Second street and Second avenue south, Twin Falls, on the evening of Sept. 17, at about 2 P. M.

"That from the evidence produced we are unable to fix the responsibility," it was signed by all members of the coroner's jury—T. P. Warner, J. E. White, C. L. H. Stowell, Harry E. Smock, G. V. Telford, George Tels, A. Magee, Oliver Harstad and J. E. Roberts.

Truck Driver Witness Witnesses at the inquest included Dr. Blackley, Twin Falls doctor of the Perrine family, who was called to attend for Mr. Perrine, who was riding in the cab with the driver, when the fatal crash occurred.

Another witness who volunteered his testimony was Roy E. Wells, DeLoe automobile driver, driver of a light coach that struck the left rear fender of the truck and caused it to overturn against the curb at the south corner of the intersection of Second and Second avenues.

Each driver testified that he had passed the middle of the intersection when the collision occurred.

Dr. Blackley, who was called to attend for the injured man and conducted a post-mortem examination, was asked to testify to the condition of the Perrine family.

Other witnesses were J. G. Thorp, owner of a service station at the corner of Second and Second avenues, who overturned truck; G. M. Keven, who stated that he was following the truck at the time of the crash; and Ben Peterson, Twin Falls traffic officer, who witnessed the collision from a distance of a block.

Testimony Agrees Testimony agreed that the truck was traveling eastward on the avenue and the other car was moving southward on the street, and the two machines were traveling at a moderate rate of speed.

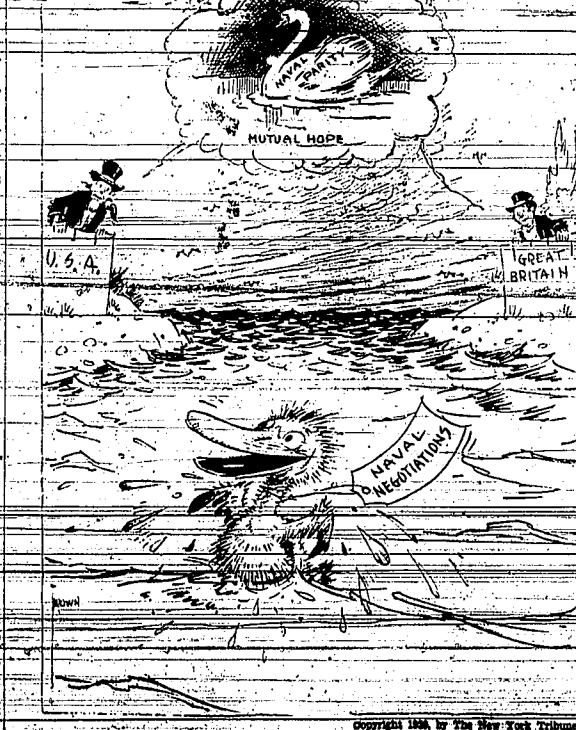

National Boxing Association Deprives Mickey Walker of Title

World's Champion Loses Fight Crown Without One Punch

Failure to Comply With Governing Body's Ruling Requiring Defense Every Six Months Costs Heavily

By CHARLES W. DUNKLEY (Associated Press Staff Writer) CHICAGO, Sept. 17—Mickey Walker, world middleweight champion since 1926, lost his title today without throwing a punch.

The National Boxing association, covering the sport in 21 states, declared Walker's title vacated because of his failure to defend it in compliance with the association's ruling requiring a champion to defend his crown at least once every six months. He was charged with repeatedly failing to obey the extension given him, according to Edward C. Foster, Rhode Island, chairman of the championship committee.

Foster and other members of the committee were emphatic in their declaration that Walker no longer is a worthy champion. The members of the committee recommended that the Jersey bulldog be no longer recognized as the holder of the middleweight division title.

Sammy Mandell, world lightweight champion, said he "knew" the king of the featherweights, who was relieved of his title by having his title removed. Both were approved by the championship committee. Eddie Kane, manager of Mandell, reported before the championship committee and explained there is no challenger at this time who will fight for the middleweight title.

The delegates also decided to recognize the Andre Route-Battalio bout at Hartford, Connecticut, September 23, as a championship affair, inasmuch as Battalio is rated as a terrific puncher. It will be opened with the competitors scrambling for championship status. The committee listed a number of challengers, naming Ace Trucking, the Nebraska club, as the leading contender, in addition with Gene Beves, and Harry Ebelson, ranking second and third respectively.
