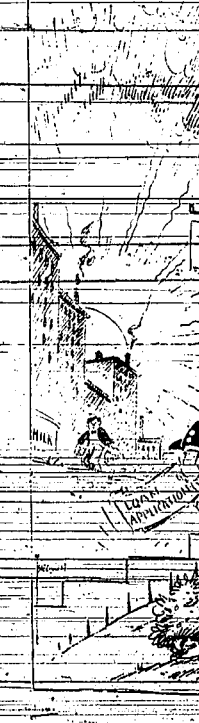

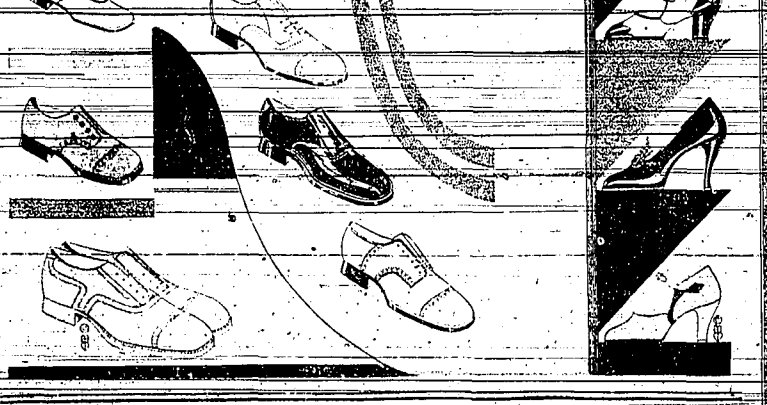

Plastino has Jim Robertson, Twin Falls, voted the most valuable Tiger player in 1928, running the team as quarter, with Wurdie in reserve.

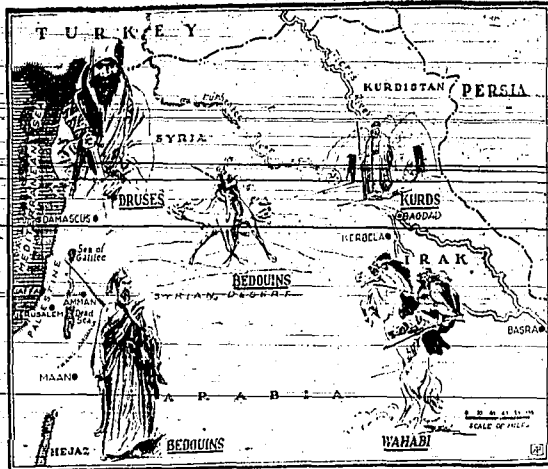

Damascus is filled with French soldiers and the central square is lined with armored cars. The Druses, who inhabit the Beqaa valley, are a warlike tribe and present the possibility that they may rise and unite the Bedouins of the Syrian desert to revolt. This would create a serious situation in the northern area.

Peace in Iraq. Iraq, formerly known as Mesopotamia, is a British mandate. There have been several risings against British rule since the armistice, but the last few years peace and quiet have reigned in the central area. In the southern part of Mesopotamia raids have taken place. Shiaks and tribesmen, loyal to their king, Ibn Saud, have attacked oil-rich Iraq ports and attempted to attack and raze the holy cities of Kerbeland Nejed.

A fanatical tribe, the Wahabi, believes that Allah can be worshipped anywhere and that it is contrary to the divine wish to worship in holy places. The Wahabi threaten to raze here and burst into flames tonight.

There was a serious rising in this region some years ago, but of late there has been no trouble. The only serious danger in the Near and Middle East, would be from a combined Moslem rising. Jordan is at present quiet, but there is always the possible danger of another rising or mutiny.

MOTOR CODE OBJECT OF MASSACHUSETTS OFFICER

BOSTON, Sept. 17 (AP)—Out of the mass of laws and ordinances that now bewilder motorists away from Cambridge, Massachusetts has undertaken to establish a sane uniform system which will protect and control.

A complete survey by Boston has resulted in the creation of a traffic division, a code of regulations and a new signal system. A state survey is in process to unify traffic management and apparatus so that pedestrians and motorists will not be confused. Such uniformity in control, it is hoped, may lessen accidents. The department of public works now has a vote power on apparatus bought by cities and will thus equip them in conformity with state standards.

The "through street" principle, requiring motorists to stop before entering a street with heavy traffic, is to be applied throughout the state. An accident study is in progress to determine the safest type of curves and roadbeds.

Idahoan Urges Scientific Fight Against Tree Mold

MOSCOW, Idaho, Sept. 18 (AP)—Scientific methods of combating the growth of molds on trees would prevent heavy lumber losses due to sap stain, according to Dr. Ernest E. Hubert, professor in charge of the forest products research laboratory of the University of Idaho. Losses due to sap stain aggregate \$25,000,000 a year. While the practical solution of an attack on damaging molds, Dr. Hubert believes preventive measures include proper handling and storing of logs and correct methods of air seasoning, storing and transporting of lumber.

Liquor Violation Brings Sentence to Burley Man

BURLEY, Sept. 18 (Special to The News)—E. B. Coates received sentence of six months in jail in Justice Arthur C. Danny's court Monday for liquor violation. Mrs. Coates drew a fine of \$100 which was paid. Coates began serving his sentence at once.

GERMAN AERIAL CARRIER FINDING FREIGHT PAYING

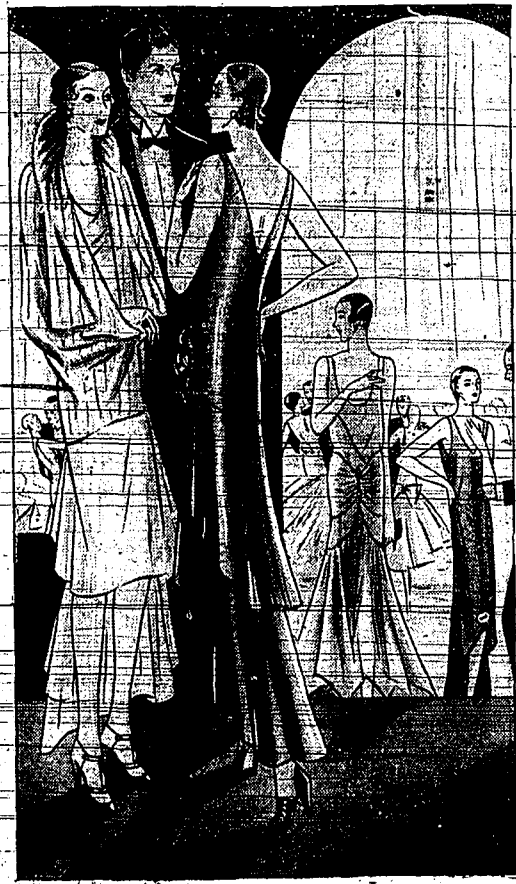
BERLIN, Sept. 18 (AP)—Passenger traffic is less profitable than freight for airlines, the Luftthansa, or German airways corporation, finds. If the gigantic jet-works and airplane routes, spreading over Germany, were to be maintained solely for the accommodation of passengers, the Luftthansa says it might as well go out of business. It says that the great money, experts declare, is the package freight and mail. For this purpose the Luftthansa is acquiring a large fleet of freight planes and is paying less attention to passenger machines.

One way of stimulating freight air service, it was found, is to increase the number of routes flown at night. At present only the stretches from Berlin to Koenigsberg and Danzig on the east and from Berlin to Hanover in a westerly direction are satisfactorily equipped for night flying.

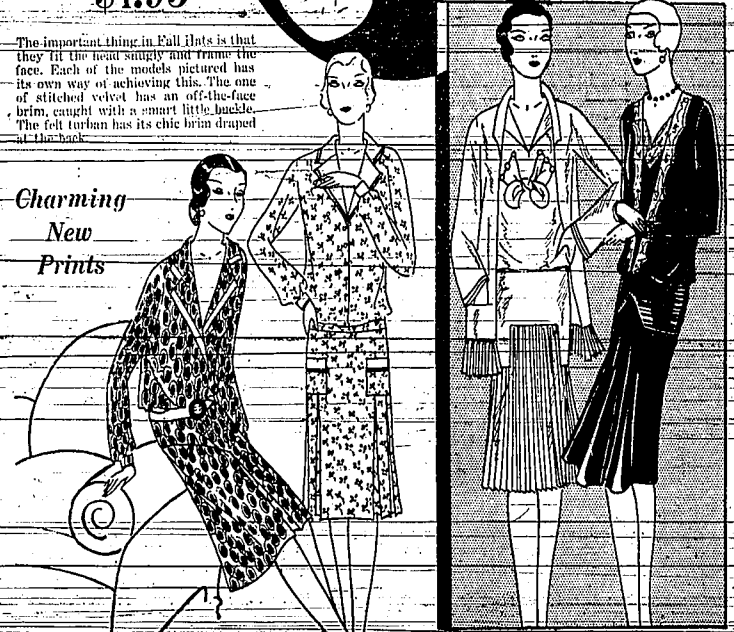

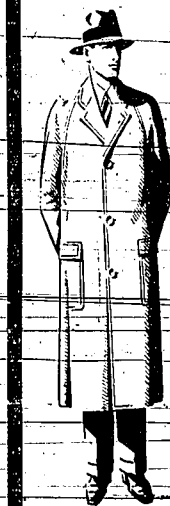

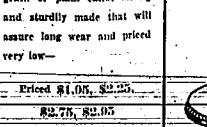

PROGRAM CALLS FOR EXTENSION OF ROUTE SOUTH OF SAN DIEGO

Proposed Roadway Involves Difficult Engineering Problems in Mountains, Jungles and Moving Sands

By The Associated Press LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18.—A west coast Pan-American highway— from British Columbia to Santiago, Chile— is the hope of the Automobile club of Southern California.

The route from Vancouver to San Diego is an accomplished fact, and correspondence has been entered into with the governments of the nations through which such a highway would pass in an effort to bring an agreement.

The auto club's plan provides for a mutual agreement between the powers along the route to the end that road work which is projected in the interim will be considered as possible links of the great thoroughfare.

The west coast project would extend from San Diego to Nogales, Arizona.

Eastern States Prepare For Autumn Fire Menace

BOSTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—While huge forest fires rage in the West, fire-fighting forces of the Northeastern states are being marshaled against the fire menace when the leaves fall in September and October. Unusually dry weather this year has advanced the menace and made the earlier fires more difficult to fight because they burn into the ground. Hundreds of fire towers, mounted high on the peaks of the Appalachian chain from the Great Smoky Mountains to the White mountains of New Hampshire and the peaks of Maine, are used.

Two of the daughters of soldiers who fought in 1776 were found this year in Georgia and were accepted by the national society as members last June. They are Miss Sarah Pool and Mrs. Mary Pool Newcome of Glascock county.

Actual flying, however, will not be a part of curricula. Practical flight as a subject for college training has been voted as undesirable.

"There is no more reason why flying instruction should be given," said Harry F. Guggenheim, president of the Daniel Guggenheim fund for the promotion of aeronautics, "than instruction in ship piloting and operation."

High-Tariff May Be Unnecessary By End Of Next Decade Declares Noted-Statistician Of Bay State

Because "European Nations Still Live in 'Dark Ages' from Industrial Standpoint, Manufacturers of United States Must Continue to Demand Protection, Roger W. Babson Explains"

By ROGER W. BABSON
BABSON PARK, Mass., Sept. 18.—The only reason United States manufacturers need a tariff is because Europe is still in the "dark ages" from an industrial standpoint. We cannot ask our workmen to live on the low wages that foreign workers get. Our wages are high. So is our purchasing power. So are our profits. Everything here is on a level of comfort. The unemployment problem of Europe is a level of penury and misery. The unemployment problem of Europe and Great Britain can never be settled by legislation. The only remedy is higher wages, which in turn would create more business and more employment. And the only way Europe can pay higher wages is to cut the cost of production through the use of labor-saving machinery and the adoption of American mass production and distribution methods. This would make it possible for Europe to prosper as America has prospered. These methods would raise European standards of living to par with the United States. Then this country would no longer have to fear the competition of low-wage European production. We should have competition to be sure, but it would be fair competition. Also there would be a much larger consuming market to com-

bankers have recognized it and have loaned liberally to industrial enterprise abroad. We must continue to finance those developments. It is very shortsighted to say that we are crossing a high capital, and that it may come back at us as a boomering in the form of competitive merchandise. A boom in the view of the situation will at once reveal that what we do to establish the European industry on a mass production basis will result in a corresponding increase in demand, intensify foreign business, and inevitably increase American export trade.

There is one stumbling block to mass production and distribution in Europe, however, which must be overcome. It is the tariff. The tariff is a barrier between adjacent countries. The map of Continental Europe is a maze of boundary lines separating nations which are scarcely any larger in area than our individual states. One big reason why national advertising, mass production, and mass distribution will not succeed in our country is because there are no customs boundaries between states. Europe is gradually breaking down these tariff walls, however, through reciprocal economic agreements between leading industrialists in the various countries. While there may never be a union of Europe politically, there is very likely to be one economically before many years.

World Shows On Business
It is to be hoped that the tariff will not be so high as to prevent the emergence of a moderate one and not a prohibitive one. Politics, and not the best interests of the country's industries, has dictated the course of the bill to date. Of course, American industry must be protected from ruinous foreign competition as long

as the low wage standards abroad prevent Hoover will not allow any unjustified boom in duties; but special consideration will be given to depressed industries to place the European worker on a par with our own. Other industries have a test case for higher duties there is the tariff on wool. The tariff on wool must have a tariff of protection. However, if we pass a bill that virtually abolishes all import, now are we going to maintain our exports in the least as equal as we can. At the same time we will sustain power so necessary to prevent the goods we send. Also, how are we going to aid Europe to establish that so that competition will be on a more higher living standard and larger competition for the goods we send.

Ten years from now a high United States tariff may be entirely unnecessary to react unfavorably upon American business. Furthermore, considerable juggling and reiteration on the part of foreign countries would undoubtedly follow.

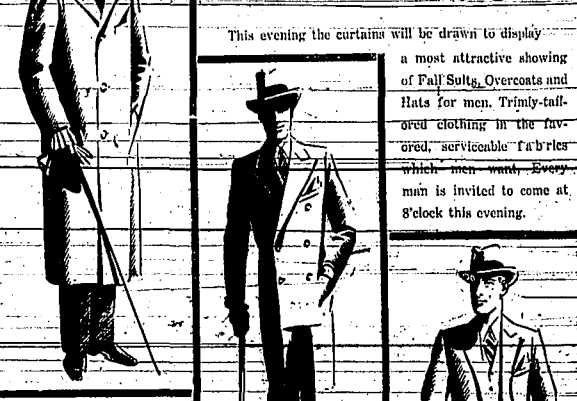

STEELMAKERS OUTDO BLADES OF DAMASCUS

Mystery and Secrecy of Centuries Disappear in Production of Metals

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 18 (AP)—Mystery and secrecy that for centuries have surrounded the art of steel hardening in America has almost entirely disappeared, according to W. H. Stettin, secretary of the American Society for Steel Treatment.

The famous blades of Damascus, tempered by heating and cooling through the body of a "live" fluid, no longer are made in the same manner as is produced now that it harder than Damascus and possibly more ductile.

Dr. W. C. Carrara, a metallurgist of Canton, Ohio, has produced a sword with which he can slay and yet so ductile that he can wind it several times around his arm. It is of carbon vanadium steel.

The mystery of 10 years ago, some of the processes of hardening steel were carried on in gloom and secreted basements. The surprising quality even were a high silk hat, mottled arabacabas and made passes over the treating tank.

"Potatoes played an important role. Half a pound was set afloat on the water. Where the potato came to rest was the best place to plunge the white-hot steel.

During the World war, a great silo was made when a group of steel treaters in Poughkeepsie, New York, could not obtain water from Sheffield, England. They thought this had given Sheffield steel its quality which steel treaters the world over had tried to imitate.

Today the process of steel hardening has become "automated" with rollers and lights flashing the instant steel assumes the proper hardness.

California and Kentucky Develop Southdown Sheep

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 18 (AP)—Kentucky and California, separated by almost the width of a continent, are nevertheless cooperating in the development of pure Southdown sheep flocks.

Members of the Kentucky Purebred Sheep Breeders' association recently shipped 29 Southdown ewes to the Pacific coast state to supplement the first shipment made a year ago.

California breeders regard success with the first shipment and have called for more breeders to extend the Southdown in their state.

Man Thinks Novices Can Pilot Airplane in Day

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 18 (AP)—Dwight M. Turbin, Kansas City flying school operator, believes a competent airplane pilot may be trained in as few as three days. "It is Turbin's theory that the average youth really may learn to fly after a day of concentrated lesson. He said that in his school's history, he has trained, with 15-minute rest intervals, 150 pilots in less than a year. Turbin's plan is to test the practicality of his contract on some pupil who has never flown, even as a passenger. The only requirement, he says, would be that the novice first pass tests as prescribed by the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce.

CASSIA COMMISSIONERS DENY ROAD WORK LEVY

BORLEY, Sept. 18 (Special to The News)—Commissioners of Cassia county, meeting Monday, declined unanimously to levy a 2 1/2 mill tax to cooperate with the federal and state highway authorities on through highway construction. Many arguments for and against the proposed levy were advanced by commissioners and individuals. The Burley chamber of commerce had endorsed the levy and the Oakley Valley Commercial club had gone on record as opposed to it.

Only Musicians Worry Over Work in France

PARIS, Sept. 18 (AP)—There is almost no overwork in France, according to a report of the Ministry of Labor show only 428 people in receipt of emergency relief.

Through the coming of the talkies, however, it is feared that several hundred musicians now playing in motion picture houses, will be thrown out of work. "There have been given to the orchestra of one big cinema on the Grand Boulevards, while contracts of other orchestras will not be renewed. 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
