INJURIES ADDING TO FATALITIES OF FIRE IN CLUB AT DETROIT

Death Toll Mounts to 18 and List of Injured Persons Grows to 47 as Investigators Launch Probe

(By The Associated Press) DETROIT, Sept. 20.—Eighteen dead and 47 injured tonight were the casualty record of the flames and smoke that early this morning swept through the Studio Club, a cabaret in East Vernor highway that for a year has been one of the bright centers of Detroit night life.

Ten men and eight women were scattered in half a dozen hotels, many too seriously injured to tell of their experiences.

The two rooms and the main stairway furnished the only means of escape and the stairway was crowded with flame. Windows of the hall had been sealed to conform with the scheme of decoration.

The fire started in the dining room and found ready fuel in the flimsy decorations that covered the walls. A flame that sprang from the room there was a wild rush for the dance floor in the center and then for the two small rooms.

The main dressing room had no exit and 30 men and women piled up there, some of them falling in the women's rest room which was crowded in panic.

NO GALLES, Arizona, Sept. 20.—A death which was reported here today with the finding of the body of Roy Sorrell, a leading cattle man of the Southwest, was found seated in his saddle, his feet in the stirrups, on his horse, slumped to the ground, on a "cattle trail" 15 miles northward here. He had been struck by lightning and the only mark on his body was a small burn on his neck. His horse was not injured and evidently died from the shock received through its rider's body.

IDAHO PENITENTIARY CONVICT TAKES LIFE

Companion of Robber of Hazelton Bank Dies in Preference To Surrender

LEWISTON, Idaho, Sept. 20.—An escaped convict from the Idaho state penitentiary at Boise slashed his throat with a razor in an open field near the city here today, preferring to die rather than surrender to police pursuing him. The man was identified as Oliver E. Jones, the convict, late the arson team Tuesday in company with another man.

Early today, Jones was discovered in a barn about three miles from his wife's home, and when officers ordered him to surrender, he said he would rather die than go to jail.

One also was fired in the back, and Jones dashed for liberty. Later he was captured by police near Cottonwood and as a pursuit, started across an open grain field. Jones slashed his throat with a razor. He ran 300 feet and tripped dead.

Jones, in company with Lawrence Wilson, walked away from the prison farm here in Blaine, Idaho, in March. He was serving a 10-1/2-year sentence on a charge of burglary.

SILENCE OF HOOVER ON TARIFF MEASURE

THEME OF DEFENDER Senate Chieftain Cautions Against Trying to Force Chief Magistrate Into Battle of Legislature

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—President Hoover's silence while the tariff controversy rages in the senate was defended today by Senator Watson, Indiana, the Republican leader, who said in a floor speech that he would use all the influence at his command to keep the executive out of the contest with the revision bill is in the making.

The senate chief magistrate cautioned against trying to force the president into the controversy and said it was the chief magistrate's duty to act only when the bill reached him. The president has stated he would not interfere with pending legislation, and Watson said he thought Mr. Hoover should and would stick to a hands-off policy.

Mills, under secretary, regarding duties facing the department in coming with requests from senators for financial data or copitations, that might be useful in consideration of the pending bill.

QUAKES, JAR VOLCANO AND HAWAIIANS SEEK SAFETY

HONOLULU, Sept. 20.—Earthquakes which rocked the volcano Hawaii throughout last night caused ranchers in its vicinity to move their cattle and household goods today in the belief that the volcano, dormant since 1801, might erupt violently.

Dr. T. A. Jørgen, volcanologist, said that eruption was dependent on whether the sharp quakes continued. The Hawaiian crater is located 8000 feet up on the slope of Maunakea mountain, peak 19,340 feet above sea level.

Search, according to advices on which officers here were working, was directed toward capture of a man reported to have been passing in the dark within a few feet of the body, blotting out all traces of the direction the child's assailant had taken.

JURY DISAGREES IN CASE OF WOMAN BANK ROBBER

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas, Sept. 20.—The jury which for nearly 48 hours sought to determine the guilt or innocence of Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers, tried for bank robbery, was discharged at 5:40 P. M. for failure to agree.

Prosecutor Fred Brandell had indicated that he did not intend to attempt an appeal.

The jury stood 9 to 3 for acquittal. This the fourth court appearance of Mrs. Rogers, demure 24-year-old former Texas university student, since she led up the bank robbery, was charged in the Bush, Texas, Farmers National bank in December, 1926, and sentenced to a year in prison.

It was the first such material of a felony in this county within 10 years.

Berlin Man's Invention Aids Police in Finding 'Hit-and-Run' Motorist

BERLIN, Sept. 20.—A device to catch "hit-and-run" drivers of automobiles has been made by a Berlin inventor named Rudolf Hoffmann. The mechanism is described as "an automatic traffic projector."

The inventor stated that the mechanism of any impact raises a white plate with a winking red light about the car's license plate, and also registers the number of the police, no car carrying it could long escape notice and arrest.

\$143,000 GOES FOR NAVAL PROPAGANDA

Senate Committee Obtains Startling Information on Activities of Builders

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—Expenditures of \$143,000 by shipbuilders for activities here at the end of the month while the marine act was passed a year ago, was discovered today by a senate committee in opening its investigation of William B. Sheerer's activities for shipbuilders at the 1927 naval parity which collapsed in 1928.

Clinton L. Barco, farm-born president of the New York shipbuilding company told the operations of the shipbuilders in national and international affairs. He bluntly denied that Sheerer was hired to interfere with the Geneva negotiations instituted by President Coolidge.

He said \$25,000 was paid Sheerer by the committee to learn from him the trend of the conference. He said he didn't care about the result and was "disappointed" that the conference failed.

Barco said the Trans-Oceanic company, a subsidiary of the American Export-Rowe Electric corporation, spent \$102,000 in its drive for legislation at the time it was projecting a four-day trans-Atlantic service.

The New York shipbuilding company also a subsidiary of the American Export-Rowe Electric corporation, \$250,000 of General Electric corporation, \$500,000 of Babcock and Wilcox company, \$500,000 of Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing company, \$100,000.

Officers Establish Identity of Victim of Hazelton Blaze

Authorities of Two Counties Learn Little More Than Name of Man Burned in Farmhouse Conflagration

Little more than the name of a man whose charred body burned beyond recognition, was turned over from the ashes of a four-room farmhouse in Hazelton, three miles southwest of Hazelton early yesterday morning, had been learned last evening by officers in two counties following an all-day investigation.

"Scotty" McIntosh was the man by which the dead man had been known among his acquaintances on the farm and at a ditch construction camp near Milner where he had been employed earlier in the season.

They knew but little more about the man. He had told one of them that he had worked three years with the British Expeditionary force in France. His true name was said to have been McLaughlin. He was about 35 years of age, had a mustache, and only three days at the farm where he met his death.

Four Men Unmasked The farm is owned by F. D. Potter and his son, D. D. Potter, who with Victor Brown, another employe, made their way unscathed from the house after C. D. Potter woke to discover it in flames at about 3 A. M.

McLaughlin's room was a lean-to adjoining the kitchen. The other three men were in the living room in front of the kitchen.

Plans were issued from the rear of the kitchen when C. D. Potter awoke and ran out into the yard. Potter turned back into the house to wake Brown, who opened the door to the kitchen and called McLaughlin, but was driven back by a wall of fire. McLaughlin's body was found in the ashes of his room.

It was brought here after consultation between the county attorney, coroner and a deputy sheriff. The body was taken to the Hazelton mortuary, where it was examined by a coroner, who was summoned by one of the Potters.

No one questioned by authorities today could shed light on McLaughlin's antecedents. It was learned that he had been employed by the construction work near Milner, and that he had told a fellow employe he had served three years with the British Expeditionary force in France. He had disclosed nothing about his relatives or former residence, so far as inquiry yesterday revealed.

He was described as being about 35 years of age, height 5 feet 2 1/2 inches, blue eyes, dark complexion and brown eyes.

He brought no luggage to the Potter home, and his only personal effects were a strong and capable workman. McLaughlin and Brown, after work Thursday night, went to Hazelton, returning about 10 P. M. when McLaughlin was to bed.

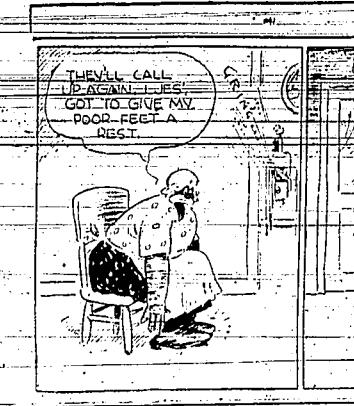

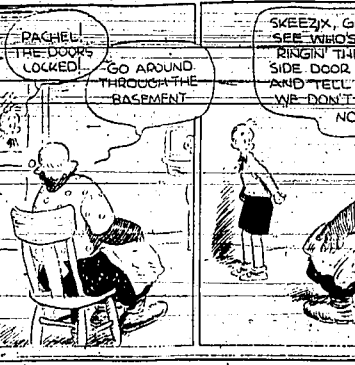

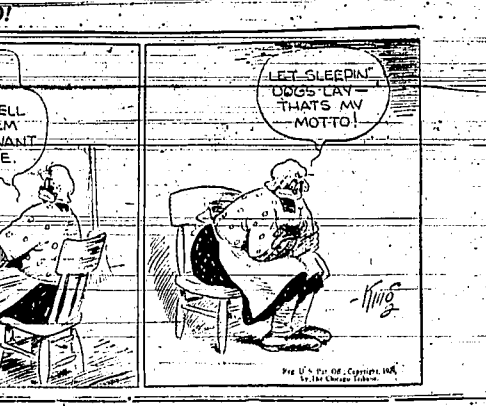
