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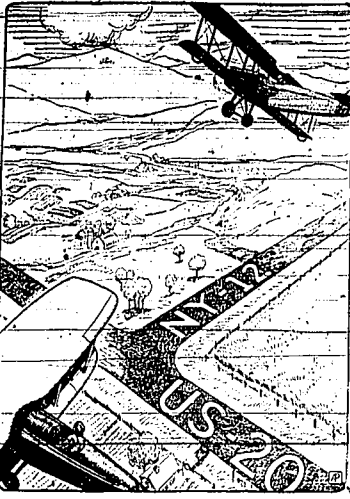
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# Department of Commerce Urges Road Markings for Aviators

## PLANS DRAWN UP BY AIRPORT HEAD WILL APPEAR IN BULLETIN

### Colonel Blee Recommends Use of Highways' Numbers Official Factors Figures From 10 to 30 Feet High Labels to Prove Great Aid to Pilots Seeking Location

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Marking highways for the aviator as an aid to aerial navigation is urged by the department of commerce.

Specifications for such markings have been drawn up by Colonel H. H. Blee, head of the department's airports section, and soon are to be incorporated in a bulletin for distribution over the nation. The markings will be placed on the pavement of the highways and will consist of large numbers, ranging from 10 to 30 feet high, depending upon the width of the highway. The numbers will be placed on the pavement in the same manner as the numbers on the pavement of the main highways.

# New Planes Indicate Trend Toward Development of Amphibian Type

**CRAFT CAPABLE OF  
ALIGHTING ON LAND  
OR WATER POPULAR**

**Novel Ships Offer Special  
Appeal to Executives  
and Sportsmen**

**Flying Boat to Become  
Carrier Over Waterways**

**Wide Variation in Design  
of Latest Models at  
Aviation Show**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—A definite trend toward development of amphibians is shown in the recent appearance of several new craft of this type.

While most of the planes are small four and six place craft, appearing more to the sportsman and executive than to the far-reaching men in aviation, who urge its development.

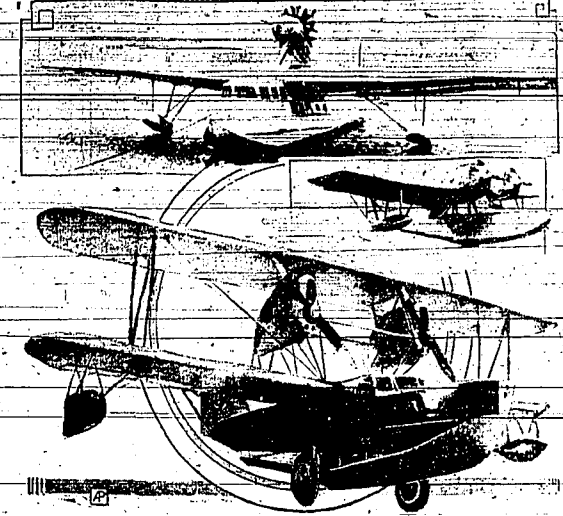
Amphibian Service Best Present development in this country, however, is running more to sportsmen, the majority of manufacturers feeling that this type of craft which may alight on either land or water, best serves the current need.

Direct appeal is made to the sportsman by virtually all of the amphibian builders. Secluded lakes several hundred miles distant are made accessible, they point out, to the business man who likes week-end fishing or hunting.

Several new types of these land and water aircraft, which draw up their wheels to alight or take off on land and then let them down for use on water, were displayed at the national air races and aeronautic exposition in Cleveland. They represented wide variations in design.

One was a twin-engined biplane designed by Captain H. C. Richardson of the Great Lakes Aircraft corporation, who as a naval aeronautic engineer, has created the new flying boat, the first plane to cross the Atlantic.

## LICENSE LAW DOES NOT TOUCH HEALER

District Court Orders Release of Otto Voska, Kimberly, After Hearing

There is no law in Idaho to require Otto Voska, Kimberly, to obtain state license to practice the healing art according to his particular school. District Judge H. A. Baker ruled here Tuesday, in issuing an order releasing Voska from restraint under complaint filed at the instance of the state department of law enforcement last August. The court's ruling and order following a hearing in habeas corpus proceedings in district court here last September 12.

The order described Voska's method of treatment as "laying on of his hands on his patients and sometimes rubbing and massaging." It asserted that he neither prescribes nor administers medicine and does not use any instruments or other mechanical contrivances, and that he does not follow the act as practiced by osteopaths and chiropractors. It asserts also that Voska has been refused a license by the state. That he holds a diploma to show that he is qualified to practice his art; that there is nothing in his practice that is inherently injurious to public health, safety or morals, or tending to that direction; that he supports himself and family by means of his practice, and that his reputation in the community of his residence is good.

Complaint against Voska charged a misdemeanor, practicing a healing art for compensation without first obtaining a state license.

### MACHINE TO COUNT CHANGE OPERATING IN BANK HERE

If you have had so much change in the past that you could not count it, this difficulty has been solved by the introduction of a new counter, made by a Brooklyn company, the first of which is now operating in Twin Falls and third to arrive in Idaho, has just been installed by Twin Falls Bank and Trust company here.

For the reason that silver dollars are scarce in most sections of the country and that they are easier to count upon where used than smaller coins, the country has fitted to crack up on dollars. It's of special value in counting savings, where all sorts of coins are thrown together, and also in counting change brought in with checks, bills and dollars. The receiving clerk, tucks the coins to be counted, and the machine counts dimes, nickels and pennies into the machine and puts it into operation. 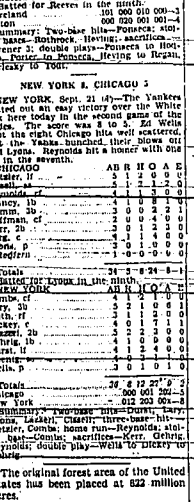

Commissioner of Education Indicates Members of Freshman Class from Minor Schools Rank Highest in Achievement of Scholarship

By The Associated Press BOISE, Sept. 21—Generally, these students coming from the small towns of this state make big city clubs sit up and blink when it comes to achieving scholarship at the University of Idaho, a report to W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education, indicated today.

The report covered 100 students in scholarship of last year's freshmen class at the school and showed beyond doubt that the youngsters, who struggle in the school in ones and twos from the smaller schools, were longest on learning.

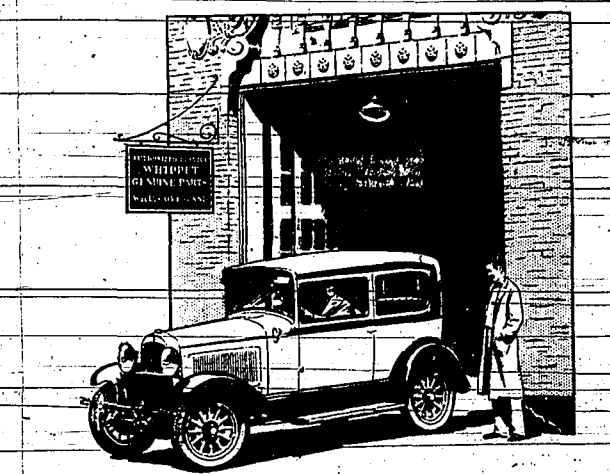

## Mustapha Kemal, President of Turkish Republic, Sponsoring Program of Americanization

### Influence of United States Replaces Cultural Domination of France and Ethical Effects of Koran; Schools Teaching English

ANGORA, Turkey, Sept. 21.—The influence of the United States is replacing, almost entirely without the cognizance of Americans, the traditional cultural influence of France and the ethical effects of the Koran in the new Turkey.

The young republic which has weathered so many tidal waves of reform is now to be transformed into a new era of transformation. That is the aim of the government which has just proclaimed its "Americanism."

The order which Angora has just given for the teaching of English in all Turkish schools beginning with this year points definitely toward the trend away from French cultural domination in Turkey.

One of the foremost spokesmen of the government and closest friends of President Kemal, the deputy Pasha Rikfi Bey, has just written in the official daily "Milliyet":

"Desire American Spirit. In a nation where nature, cities, science, knowledge, and men all need to be made over anew—and such a nation is ours—Americanism must serve as the basis for reform. The first step is to have the American spirit we must change not only our method of production but also our system of education.

"The habit, imbued through education, of considering everything from the standpoint of prosperity, the ideal of gain, the ambition to acquire—all, in short, that denotes Americanism, constitutes the basis of what our derivatives and priests have been teaching us for centuries and is towards this antiquated system we must now awake or die of stagnation.

"The literate Turk has been mooning away in the meshes of his ancient education of yore. Hence is afraid to look far and long, afraid to lift his hands to break hard ground while the time the one thing he does is to talk too much.

"The religion of Americanism must come to us as the one true religion because its ideal is to create. This American God loves not the parasite, who dies of hunger in the streets, but the man who labors who out of his labor builds himself a palace."

## TRANS-EURASIAN AIR SERVICE OBJECT OF REICHTAG SUBSIDY

### German Government Grants Special Credit for New Lufthansa Project

BERLIN, Sept. 21.—A special credit has been granted by the German Reichstag to make the projected Trans-Eurasian air service an actuality. Negotiations are now under way with the Russian government to settle the details of the project.

The project, which will be coordinated with the Russian-American flight of the "Land of the Soviets" and that accumulated on the recent Russian-American flight, will all be coordinated as a basis for the establishment of the new air service from Berlin to the Orient.

## Archaeologists Unearth Roman Ruins in France

SAINT GANDENS, France, Sept. 21.—A mine of antiquity seemingly inexhaustible, has been discovered by the archaeologists, MM. Jozan and Saligne, at Saint-Bertrand-de-Comminges.

It is now but a township of 315 souls in the B. C. 212 was Lucanum, the Roman city of 60,000 inhabitants, capital of an important territory.

Every day its soil yields treasures, the picks of the servants. An Imperial trophy, busts of Emperors, statues of gods, temples, villas, and a vast quantity of smaller objects, more human and domestic, that have been dug up.

Most curious of all finds are little bells which the archaeologists say were hung around the necks of children to ward off evil spirits and driven by their silver tinkling sounds of ill-omen.

"The airplane is the biggest thing yet for export business," said Mr. Finsinger. "In a few weeks I made contracts, investigated the conditions of the market, saw food conditions and so on, visited agencies and established new branches, all of which would have been impossible in any other way."

The shorter haul from Rio, as compared with the distance from the orange country of the United States, is a natural help to Brazilian growers and they have the further advantage of being able to ship all seasons.

## Germany's Mouth Organ English Station Sells Industry 100 Years Old

PLAUE, Saxony, Sept. 21.—The German mouth organ industry can look back upon 100 years of existence.

The industry which has its center in Saxony was established by a violin maker named J. W. Giltz just a century ago.

The production of mouth organs has reached such proportions that the industry employs more than 2,300 workers and yearly exportations run for 45,000,000 to 50,000,000 instruments. From 600,000 to 1,000,000 instruments are also exported.

## English Station Sells Industry 100 Years Old

## Cuban Government Starts Extensive Campaign For Diversified Farming

### Officials Realize Future of Country Lies Not in Concentrated Production of Sugar and Tobacco

HAVANA, Sept. 21.—The Cuban government, realizing that its future lies not in the concentrated growing of sugar and tobacco but in diversified farming, has commissioned General Eugenio Molinet, secretary of agriculture, to start an extensive campaign of education.

Secretary Molinet said that the main object of the campaign would be to persuade Cuban farmers that they must give their attention to diversified farming under modern methods in order to escape from their present critical situation and in order to place Cuba on a closer and more lasting basis.

It is well understood by the grizzled veterans that it is going to be a labor of patience to convince the old time planter that crop cultivation is not the only way to success. Molinet said, with a warning, that Cuba has too long been a one-product nation and that no benefits have accrued from the Cuban planter's worship from his fallacious belief that sugar is paramount and that Cuba rules the world market.

Cuba has been a one-crop country for nearly a century and must educate her people out of a situation that has become a veritable tradition. Yet within a few years she hopes to have the Cuban planter lay aside cane planting, substituting tractors for oxen, haul plows and saws by machines instead of by hand—this is a modern and the government well knows it. Secretary Molinet expressed it when he said:

"Cuba holds fast to its traditions of sugar, cane planting and it will take effort and strong arguments to get on the right track to prosperity."

The agricultural department has already inaugurated a campaign for the diversification of farm news, weather reports, planting and harvesting advice, weekly radio lectures are given on farming and specialties, and sent out into all provinces to aid farmers.

A scientific fight is in motion against parasites, bacteria and fungi, which have been established at important farm centers.

A program for the government is the state of careful workers. They now raise only about 75 cents a day and Colombia and Mexico. Havana, sugar may be secured from the field than can not even raise a bare living at this rate. Official figures disclose that a population of barely 2,000 more than 20 are stricken with the deadly disease and a total of 262 per cent are affected to some degree.

There scarcely is a family that is not afflicted with at least one member. Two large medical establishments on the island deal with nothing but leprosy.

## Autos Menace Night Sweeper in London

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Cleaning the streets of London at night is such a dangerous job that the city fathers ordered that sweepers to wear white uniforms and black hats blended so perfectly with the dark and mist of the London night that the men could not be seen, and the owners declared that they could not do their best work with the fear of being run over constantly haunting them.

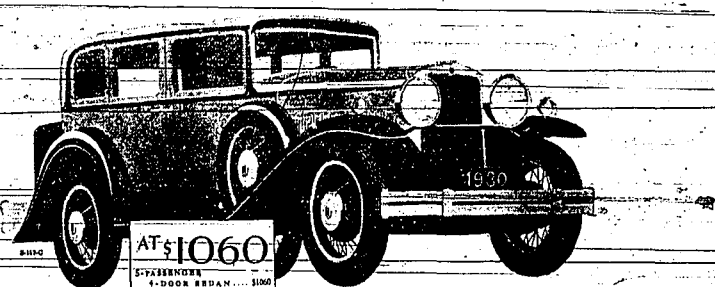

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# Borah and Hoover Lead in Propaganda Investigation

## Shearer's Services AT GENEVA MEETING UNDER EXAMINATION

Significance of Inquiry Deeper Than Study of Writings

President Refers Issue To William D. Mitchell No Statement Intimating Case Involves Violation of Law

By KIRK SIMPSON Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON, Sept. 21—By an unprecedented sequence of circumstances, William B. Shearer, who describes himself as a naval expert, became the leading figure almost overnight in the international naval litigation drama.

Yet his only actual naval experience or service of record was a hitch as an enlisted electrician back in Spanish war days, and limited service as an engineering in navy employ during the World war.

Obviously, the desire of President Hoover and of Senator Borah for investigation of Shearer's activities has a much deeper significance than study of the writings of any individual.

They want to know whether three great shipbuilding companies concerned through Shearer to prevent propaganda, American entry into international covenants to reduce and limit the naval power.

Shearer himself gave original impetus to the inquiry. His suit against the shipbuilders for recovery of \$250,000 or so of alleged unpaid balance for his services focused upon him the attention of President Hoover and the senate.

The services involved were rendered by Shearer at Geneva conference, the five three-power naval conference, which the Borah resolution seeks to explore the exact nature and purpose of those services rendered for his services.

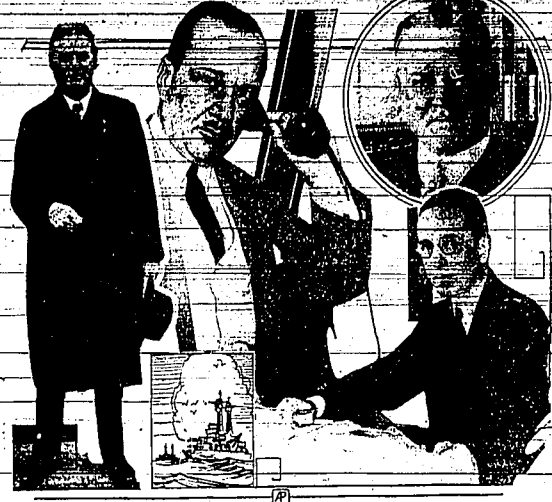
And what was indicated when the senate ordered its investigation was a disclosure of a situation which prospective naval contractors whose future business might be impaired by reductions of the fleet.

Neither in the Borah resolution nor in any White House statement was there an intimation that a violation of law might be involved, except that President Hoover referred the issue to Attorney General Mitchell.

## WASHINGTON'S WHEAT German Constructing Rocket-Driven Plane LEADS IN NORTHWEST

Idaho Close to Leader of Three States in Production of Spring Variety

SEATTLE, Sept. 21 (AP)—Washington will lead the three Pacific northwestern states in production of winter and spring wheat, with Idaho second in spring and Oregon second in the winter variety, the federal department of agriculture said today. Washington has 25,628,000 bushels of the winter grain coming up, as compared with 19,172,000 for Oregon and 12,220,000 for Idaho. The total for 1929 was forecast at \$7,580,000, as against 66,176,000 for last year, with an average yield per acre as follows: Washington, 22.5; Idaho, 23.8 and Oregon, 25.

The spring wheat, forecast on the basis of production indicated September 1 was a total of 22,162,000, including 14,766,000 for Washington, 14,356,000 for Idaho and 3,847,000 for Oregon. In 1928 the total was 24,748,000. The condition of spring wheat was highest in Idaho with 83 per cent, as compared to 73 per cent for Oregon and 75 for Washington.

Indicated production of all wheat for the Pacific Northwest was 49,722,000 bushels. In 1928 it was 102,754,000 bushels. For the United States, the forecast was all wheat, 88,728,000 bushels, compared with 92,101,000 for last year.

## Roger W. Babson Urges Purchase Of Bonds And Sounds Warning Against Excessive Speculation In Stocks

Noted Business Statistician Praises Advice in Motto, "Buy When Everyone Else Is Selling, and Sell When Everyone Else Is Buying." Expert Shows Value of Investment Securities

By ROGER W. BABSON

**BABSON PARK, Mass., Sept. 21.**—The man who makes money and keeps it is the one who is not content to follow the crowd. The old motto, "Buy when everyone else is selling and sell when everyone else is buying" was never better advice than now. No one wants bonds at present. Hence they are being sold on the market—even the best of them. High-grade bonds can be bought today to yield 6 per cent, and many others which are perfectly safe can be bought to yield 7 per cent, or even 8 per cent. The investor who will be in the best position five years from now is the one who holds on to his good bonds and buys more, not the one who sells them at present depressed prices and puts his money into inflated stocks. While it is true that a few carefully-selected stocks in depressed industries, or industries having an exceptional long-run outlook, are all right to hold, I also want to emphasize that this stock market as a whole has the makings of much grief in it.

### Reasons for Buying

1. There are ten big reasons why bonds should be purchased now.
1. Bonds are bought primarily for income or yield. We are now witnessing a monthly 2000 yield on the highest-grade issues. Not since 1921 has there been such an opportunity to acquire such an opportunity.

## Huge Shovels Bite 20 Tons Each Dip

MARION, Ohio, Sept. 21 (AP)—A fleet of steam shovels each towering eight stories high, with diggers that bite 20 tons of earth at a dip, have been shipped from the factory here for strip mining in the Illinois coal fields. An ordinary road grader can be driven into the dipper. The shovels were built to cut a 300-foot path through a 70-foot blanket of earth overlying the coal beds. A central electric motor puts each shovel under control of one man. Eighteen months were required to build the first of the great excavators, and several months for assembling. It was shipped on 30 flatcars, six for the boom alone.

In addition to urgent labor problems the convention is scheduled to deal intensively with such subjects as immigration, labor injunctions and industrial conscription.

The latter is, by far, the chief subject of debate. At behalf of the war department, Representative Woodruff of Michigan has introduced a bill in congress to regulate industrial wages in event of war, principally to prevent their increase.

The federation fears it might result in conscription for labor much the same as conscription for military duty.

## Cambridge Acts to Curb Undergraduate Aviators

**CAMBRIDGE, England, Sept. 21 (AP)**—Flying has become such a popular hobby among undergraduates that Cambridge university authorities have found it necessary to draw up regulations governing student flights. The regulations prohibit undergraduates flying except by members of the Cambridge university air squadron who are licensed. It was also decided that no students may fly except with the consent of parent or tutor and no undergraduate may fly in the morning without written permission.

## Microscopes Leading to Prevention of Ore Waste

**SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 21 (AP)**—The microscope, long an ally of science, has assumed a new role in the analysis of complex ores. Powerful lenses in the Internontain Experiment station, of the Bureau of Mines with cooperation of the University of Utah, are tearing from the texture of tiny-grained ores new methods to prevent waste of valuable minerals. Examination is made of the most intricate mineral associations for knowledge to be applied in mill operations to insure full extraction of valuable contents. Ores, ground to varying degrees of fineness, are studied and graphs drawn to show the efficiency of extraction for each method. When completed, the charts will enable mill operators to concentrate on the best method.

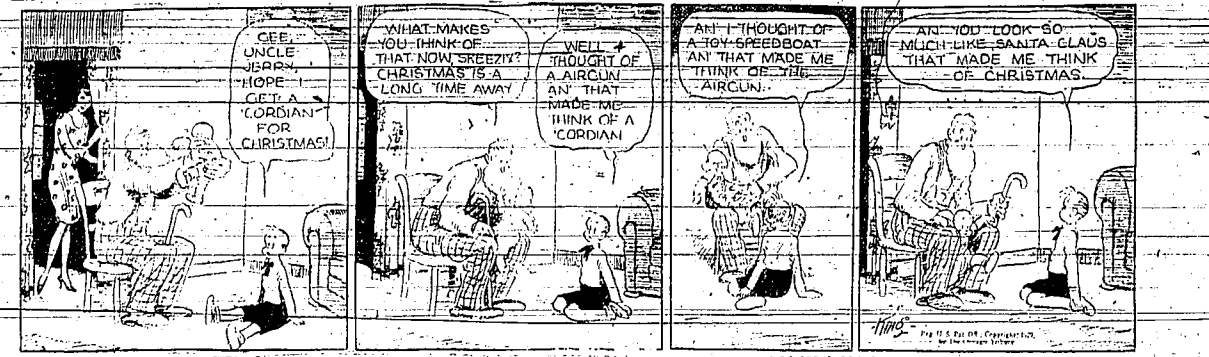
